Attend Pro Football Game

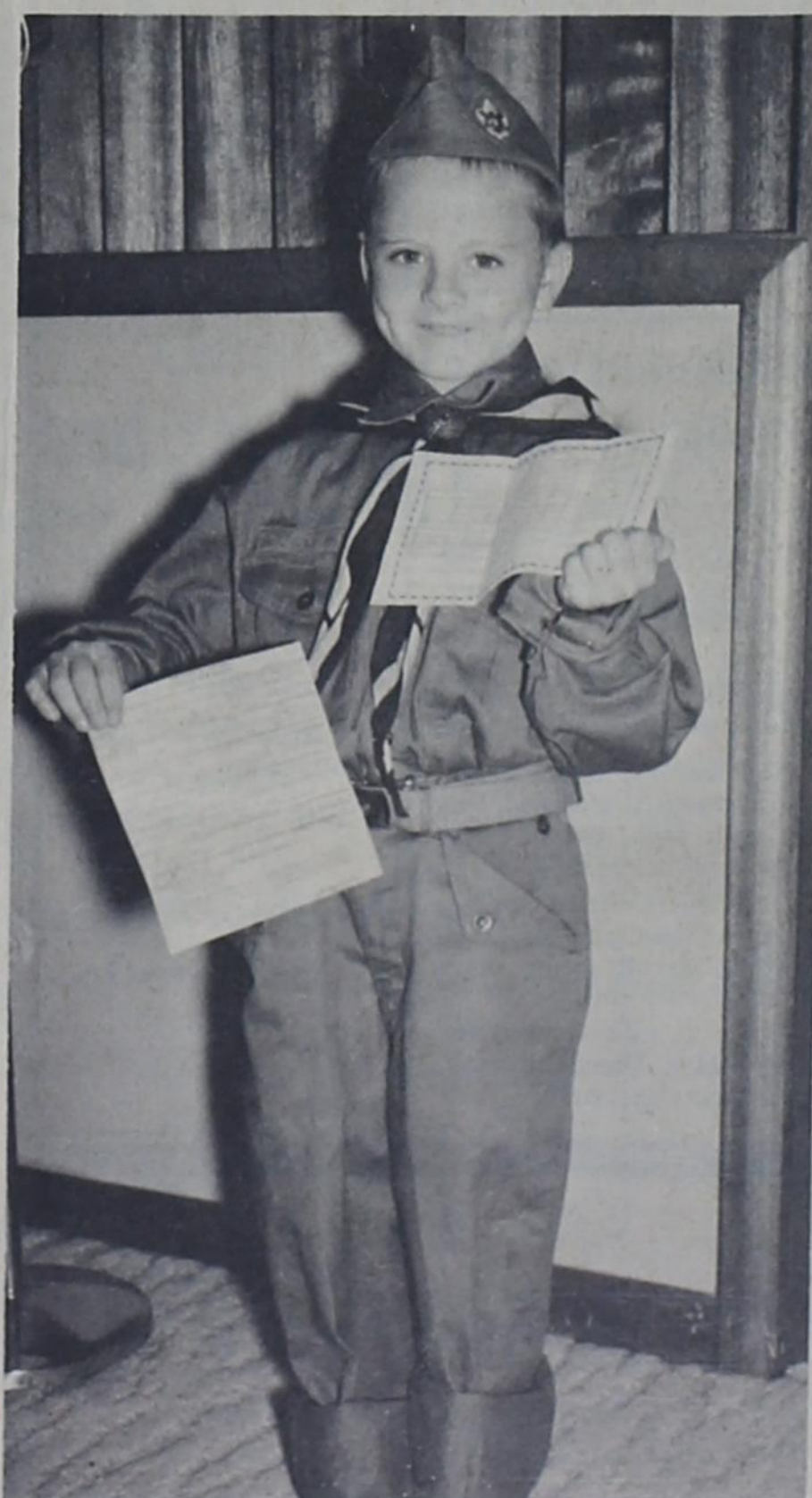

Registration Dates Set

Editorial

Agency Low-Rates Public Intelligence

Just how stupid do government officials think the general public is? Pretty stupid, I would say, judging from the explanation given as to why a federal antipoverty agency in Houston would require the purchase of seven telescopic rifle sights. The official explanation, given along with a lecture on why federal actions should not be questioned by John Q. Dum Dum, is that the rifle sights were ordered so that they could be converted into microscopes, yes, microscopes, for a manpower training program.

Hogwash! The likelihood of high powered rifle sights being converted into microscopes is equivalent to the chances of Martin Luther King becoming a supporter of George Lincoln Rockwell for President.

The fact of the matter is that trying to convert telescopic sights into microscopes is about like trying to convert a go-kart into a family sedan. The principles involved are entirely different although some components may be common to each. Besides, if microscopes were needed, then the logical thing to have done, would have been to simply order microscopes in the first place. A microscope of entirely adequate capability for an antipoverty agency could have been purchased for no more than a good high power telescopic rifle sight.

The really sickening thing about the whole affair though, is the manner in which the explanation was given. When the order was exposed by a civilian employee of Kelly Air Force Base, who was the last man to handle the order, and who rightly judged that something was not quite right, the Houston anti-poverty agency flew into a rage.

The agency, accused "people" of trying to fan the flames of hysteria in the country by making false allegations. It further implied that anybody who would dare to doubt the actions of an official of the federal government must undoubtedly be a bigot whose sole purpose in life was to discredit the antipoverty program, and thus to deprive hungry children of milk.

Baloney! I suggest that these actions were the product of a government agency trying to wasele out of the fact that they had been caught in a rather embarrassing situation to say the least. This is an old tactic used many times before. When they wish to divert attention from the fact that they themselves, have done wrong, they go on the offensive, charging anybody they can think of with anything they can think of, in the hopes that the original issue will be forgotten in the resulting turmoil.

All that needs to be said, is that it will become an agency of the United States Government to conduct itself like a spoiled brat, caught in the act of stealing cookies from the cupboard. If this is an example of the caliber of officials that are running the antipoverty program, then perhaps it is time to take another look at the desirability of the program as a whole. This becomes especially true when one considers the many other instances of mismanagement of poverty funds. It does neither the taxpayers, or the poverty stricken themselves any good to permit such frivolity with poverty funds to occur. If the federal government cannot find any better people to manage poverty money, then perhaps it would be a good idea to consider other methods of helping the poor.

At any rate, it is a shame to place as the heads of an antipoverty agency, people who are only incapable of telling the truth, but who are also too stupid to think up a believable explanation.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section in Article III to be known as Section 52e, reading as follows:

"Section 52e. Each county in the State of Texas is hereby authorized to pay all medical expenses, all doctor bills and all hospital bills for Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that while said Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, Constable, Deputy Constable or other county or precinct law enforcement official is hospitalized or incapacitated that the county shall continue to pay his maximum salary; providing, however, that said payment of salary shall cease on the expiration of the term of office to which such official was elected or appointed. Provided, however, that no provision contained herein shall be construed to amend, modify, repeal or nullify Article 16, Section 31, of the Constitution of the State of Texas."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on November 11, 1967, at which time the ballot shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution authorizing each county in this state to pay the medical bills, doctor bills and hospital bills for all Sheriffs, Deputy Sheriffs, Constables, Deputy Constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties; providing that the county shall continue to pay the maximum salary of these officials while they are incapacitated, but such salary payment shall not continue beyond the terms of office to which they were elected or appointed."

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; and no county, city or town shall levy a tax rate in excess of Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund so long as the Court does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations and so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property taxing voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15¢) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such county. Any county may put all tax money collected by the county into one general fund, without regard to the purpose or source of each tax. And the Legislature may pass local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 33, Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The Accounting Officers of this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant upon the Treasury in favor of any person for salary or compensation as agent, officer or appointee, who holds at the same time any other office or position of honor, trust, or profit, under this State, except as prescribed in this Constitution. Provided, that this restriction as to the drawing and paying of warrants upon the Treasury shall not apply to officers of the National Guard or Air National Guard of Texas, the National Guard Reserve, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, nor to enlisted men of the National Guard, the Air National Guard Reserve, the Air Force Reserve, and the Organized Reserve of the United States, nor to retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps, and retired warrant officers and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, and Marine Corps. It is further provided, until September 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the Legislature by general law under such restrictions and limitations as the Legislature may prescribe, that a non-elective State officer or employee may hold other non-elective offices or positions of honor, trust, or profit under this State or the United States, if the other offices or positions are of benefit to the State of Texas or are required by State or federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office or position for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this state, or the United States."

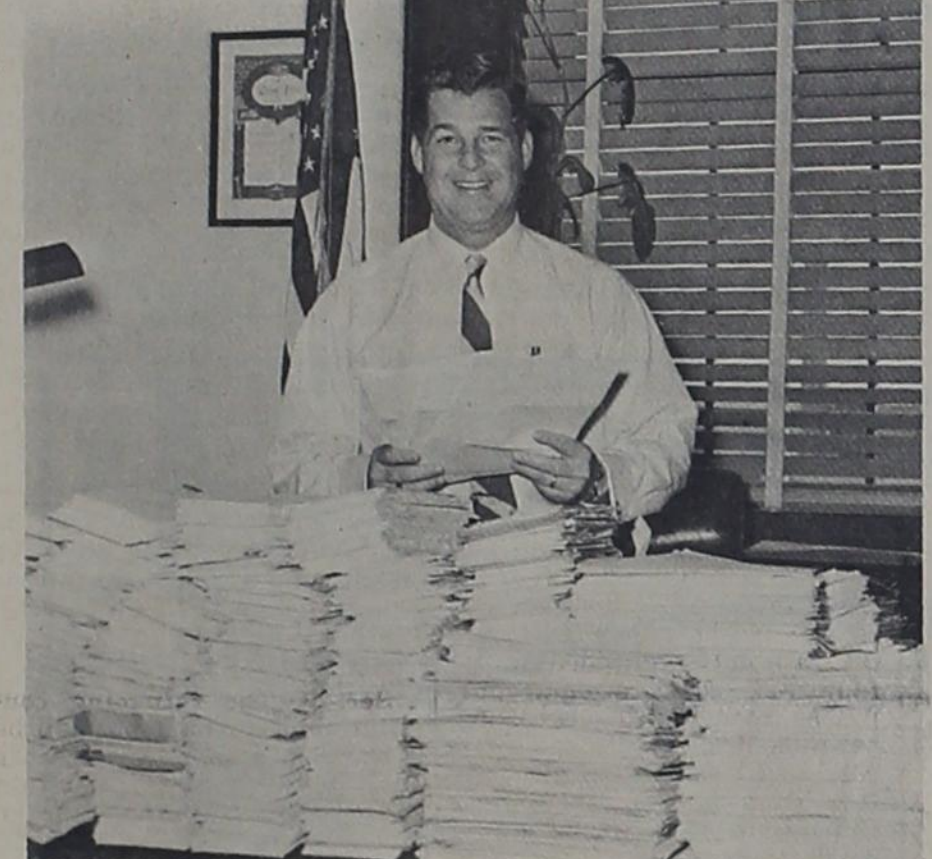

On The Farm In Palmer County

By RONNY McNUTT County Agent

The time is once again approaching to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall.

Since most soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients, the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs is the soil test. By sampling early, the report will be received in time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, such factors as the amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

Data at the South Plains Research and Extension Center clearly indicates that where wheat is grown on Pullman soils for grain only, the time of nitrogen applications is of little importance. However, when wheat is to be grazed, all or part of the nitrogen should be applied preplant to stimulate early growth. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can obtain 20 per cent protein or three per cent nitrogen on a dry basis. Insufficient phosphorus can

also limit wheat production. Profitable response has long been evident on many of the sandy and mixed land soils. Yield increases have also been noted on Pullman soils shown to be deficient by soil testing. Since phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture, it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permanent roots. Therefore, preplant application is recommended. Wheat plants utilize much of the phosphorus when they are young.

All wheat growers are urged to send in soil samples as soon as possible. Complete information on sample collection and mailing is available at the county extension office.

SORGHUM MIDGE REPORT

According to area entomologists, midge emergence from Johnsongrass head sampling has decreased significantly in the Panhandle area. Grain sorghum is now being checked for adult midge emergence. Midge populations appear to be widely distributed over the entire Panhandle area but populations to date are lighter than at this time last year.

Sorghum midge emergence has increased considerably over the South Plains area. Majority of the midge population is coming from grain sorghum. Grain sorghum is required as a host by the midge, before large numbers of midge can develop.

Sorghum midge emergence has increased quite drastically in Floyd and Hale Counties. Grain Sorghum which has not yet passed the blooming stage should be closely watched for midge activity.

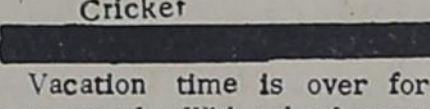

SCS Administrator Is Speaker

Further plans for dedicating the Knox City Plant Materials Center on September 7 were announced today by H.N. Smith, State Conservationist, Soil Conservation Service, Temple.

Donald A. Williams, SCS Administrator, Washington, D.C., will be the key speaker, and Smith will be master of ceremonies. The dedication program will start at 11 a.m. A catered lunch will be served after the dedication.

Smith said tours of the center will be conducted from 8:30 to 10:30 a.m. and from 1 to 3 p.m.

Several hundred seed dealers, growers, conservation district supervisors, farmers, ranchers, city developers, sportsmen, and others interested in the plants being tested will attend. The center serves Texas, Oklahoma and adjoining states.

Congressmen and State Representatives from the area are also expected to attend.

The job of SCS plant materials centers is to find, evaluate, and put into use better plants to solve varied soil and water conservation problems.

Planting materials being used include seed, sprigs, and rootstock.

Some 850 varieties of plants are being evaluated, including grasses, legumes, forbs and woody plants.

Native selections of shrubs, forbs and legumes are being tested for conservation use and food value for deer, quail, turkey and other wildlife. Turf-grasses resistant to heavy foot traffic are being studied for climatic adaptation. These grasses are important for lawns, commercial developments, parks and other recreational areas.

Other work being done at the center includes a search for better ways to harvest certain grass seeds; ways to make some grasses, such as vine mesquite, produce seed more consistently; and better ways to establish certain plants.

After improved plants are identified and proved at the center, they are grown in seed increase plots. After harvest, seed are used to make trial plantings on district cooperators' farms. After final tests, superior varieties are identified and released to commercial seed growers who produce seed for public sale.

These growers produced about two million pounds of grass seed in Texas last year,

Symposium Set

All interested agricultural producers and fertilizer dealers are invited to attend the Phosphorus Symposium which will be held in Lubbock, Sept. 6.

The Texas Plant Food Educational Society in cooperation with Texas Tech, Texas A&M systems, West Texas State University, High Plains Research Foundation, and the West Texas and Lubbock Chamber of Commerce are sponsoring the symposium. The symposium will be held at Texas Tech College (student union building). The program will begin at 8 a.m. and should be over by 4:30 p.m. Several leading authorities from educational experiment stations, extension service, and industry will appear on the program.

Topics to be discussed during the morning session are: practical problems in the use of phosphorus, the soils and crops speak, behavior of phosphate in

the soil, and present and future phosphate fertilizers.

The afternoon session will begin with a discussion on sulfur - phosphorus relationships; followed by phosphorus, zinc, iron relationships; influence of soil type and texture on phosphorus availability; time, rate and placement of phosphate; and also a coordinated research and education report for the High Plains.

Registration fee is \$5 for advanced registration and \$6 on the day of the symposium. Advance registration fees (checks) should be made payable to Phosphorus Symposium and mailed to Dr. A. W. Young, Dept. of Agronomy, Texas Tech College, Lubbock, Tex.

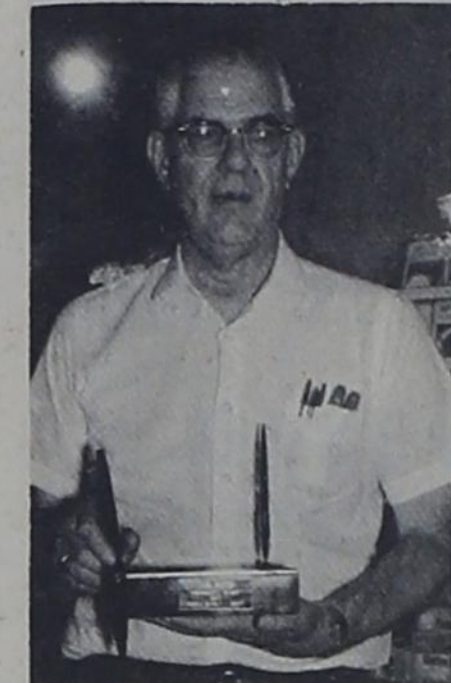

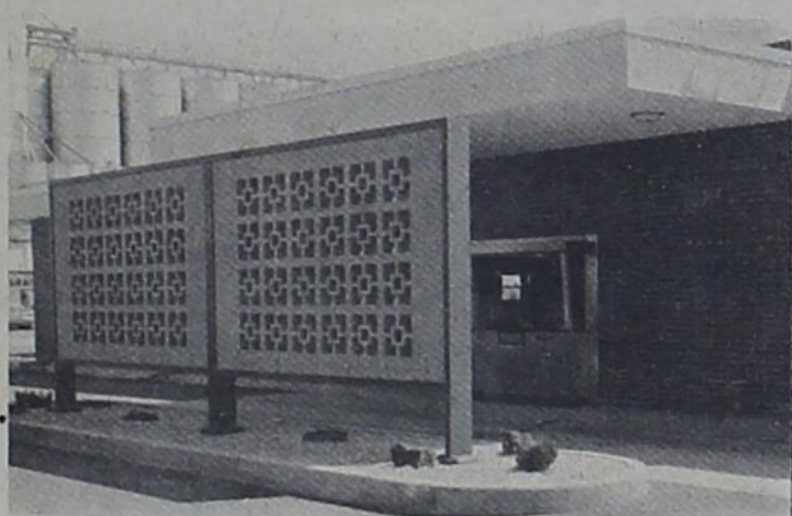
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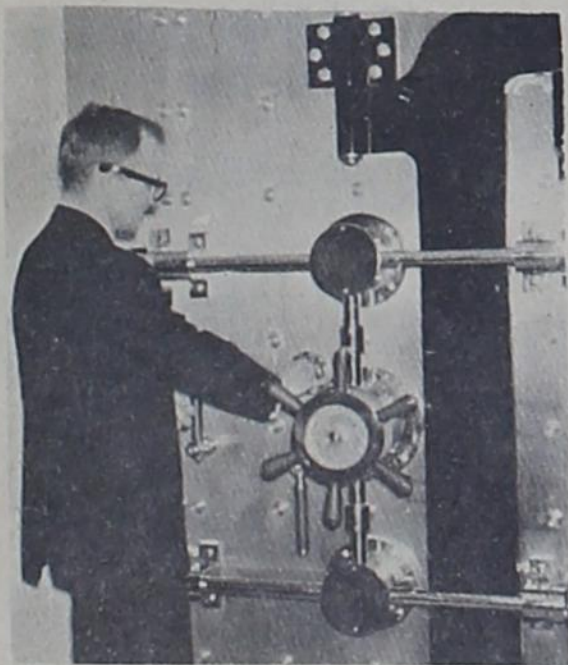
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
