Last week witnessed the curtain raiser on the local football madness. It also ushered in the first round of the 9th Annual Farwell Merchants' Football Contest. There was a record number of 216 first round contestants who took advantage of the opportunity to win one of the weekly prizes, and one of our "young pros", Randy Gregory, won the initial round. This week, with a tie game being played and with several upsets on the board, a guess of six games right was about the average entry this time.

We will explain several of the more common questions regarding the contest scoring. First of all, a tie game can be called as a tie, and thereby gain credit for that game. Otherwise, we score it as a miss for those who do not call a tie. We have had several contestants in the past who called tie games and did get the credit. For our selections, we usually try to pick five high school games, three major college clashes, and two professional blood lettings on each weekly card. When we have a tie in the number of correct games called, we use the score of the local game as a means of determining the winner. This is the only place that the score of a game is important.

Our method of computing the score difference goes like this: To use last week's score of Friona 19-Farwell 7, for example, one of the contestants used a guess of Farwell 19 and Friona 7. This was a total difference of 24 points. We subtracted the actual score of Farwell 7 from the guess of 19 and have 12 as the error; then subtract the guess of Friona 7 from the actual score of 19 and again have 12 as a difference. The two differences are added together for a total of 24 as the point spread on that particular entry. With this method, we generally can eliminate the tie scores and award the prizes fairly.

Probably as a carryover from our youth, when it was more used than read, we browsed through one of the large mail order catalogs the other evening. Their mail order methods of getting our dollars have vastly improved over the intervening years. However, we wonder if they may not have improved themselves out of our particular business. The pictures in the men and women apparel departments were full of lean, lithe, leggy youngsters modeling the latest styles in the "young" age group. Frankly, we did not see a thing we, as "middle-aged", could identify with, unless it was the abdominal support found on page 643 under medical appliances.

Politics in Texas is beginning to be played by our leading political luminaries, so early yet. Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, a local lad from Lubbock, made the announcement last week of his intention to run for the governor's job. This has brought forth some figures on finances in the state. The Legislative Budget Board estimates that \$192,900,000, in new taxes will have to be imposed on the Lone Star taxpayer. Governor Connally and House Speaker Ben Barnes say it's too high and Smith says it will be too low. Well, the average bill footer will probably never know who was right or wrong, but you can bet your boots he will pay through nose either way. With our Federal Government fixing to add a ten per cent surtax, our state government looking for roughly \$200 million, and our local boys always needing revenue, it looks like "Joe Doakes" will be the paying political patsy for further grandiose schemes to return assorted politicians to their public through. Stubborn Steers Trail Friona, 19-7

With inexperience standing out like a sore thumb, Farwell's young Steers lost to Friona last Friday evening at Chieftain Stadium. Final score was 19-7 against the Blue and White. This marked the first time in the last three years that the cross-county team was able to chalk up a win against Farwell. Farwell kicked off to Friona with Al Phillips putting the ball into the end zone and Friona starting play on their 20-yard line. Three plays later Farwell was assessed five yards for offsidess and this set the tone for the evening. The first quarter was a seesaw battle with the Steers' inexperience keeping them from mounting much of a ground or air game. A Steer fumble on the first play of the second quarter set the stage for the first Friona touchdown. Later in the quarter, another misdeed by the Blue and White deep in their own territory allowed the Chieftains to again score and post a 13-0 edge at the half.

The second half opened with the Steers receiving the ball and marching downfield paced by the running of Al and Craig Phillips. This Farwell drive

was ended by a pass interception. Again the game settled down to a give and take proposition until another pass interception by Friona gave them the ball on the Steers' 42-yard marker. Eleven plays later, the Chieftains quarterback sneaked over the goal line and another missed PAT left the score 19-0 in Friona's favor. The only Farwell score came in a freak situation. On fourth down and long yardage needed on their own 30-yard line, the Steers were forced to punt, and Farwell's kicker extraordinary, Al Phillips, booted a 65-yard kick. The play was nullified as a 15-yard penalty against Friona gave the Steers the ball with only short yardage needed for the first down. The Chiefs massed at the line of scrimmage, but Al Phillips bulled through into an open field and scooted for a 55-yard jaunt that put the Blue and White on the score board with only 1:16 left in the game. Again Phillips' talented toe gave the Steers the PAT and the night's scoring ended at 19-7.

The Farwell defense did a fine job all evening of containing the

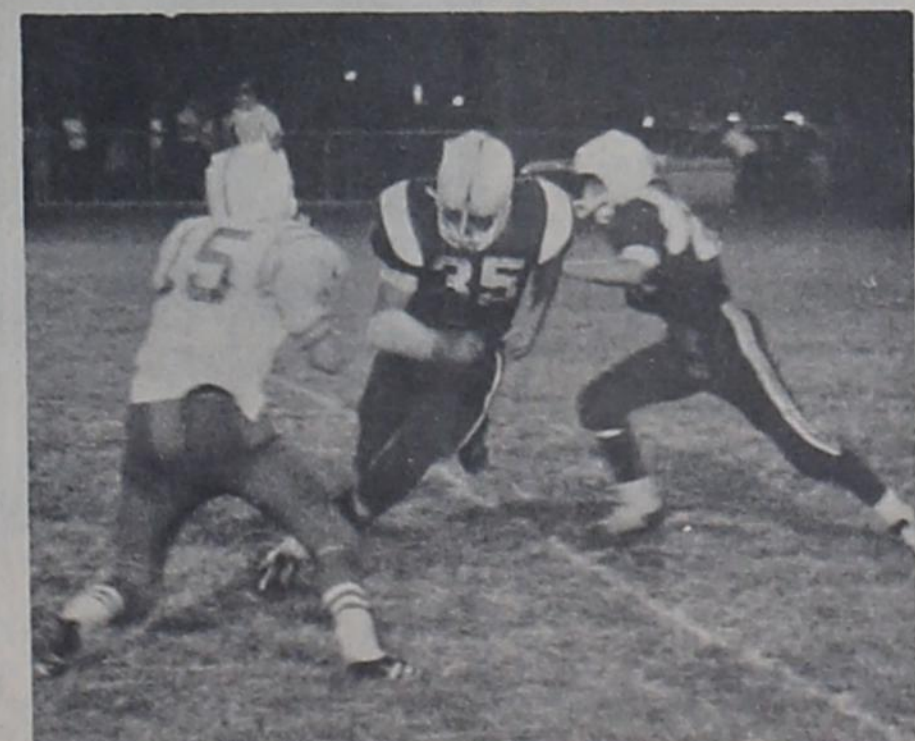
bigger and heftier Frionabacks and also completely stifled the Friona passing game. The Steer offense was erratic with inexperience counting for most of its inability to consistently move the ball. Coach Toby Booth commented following the game, "Our defense did a creditable job, but we were just a little over-anxious at times. Overall, we (the coaches) were satisfied, but we realize that we have a long way to go. This is a young team; we'll get there, but it will take a while."

The coach cited several offensive players for their fine performances in the game, including Gerald Hanna, James Haseloff and Randy Johnson, tackles, and Al Phillips, fullback.

Coach Booth commented that Friona's team "looked real good; they are going to beat quite a few people before the season is over," he concluded.

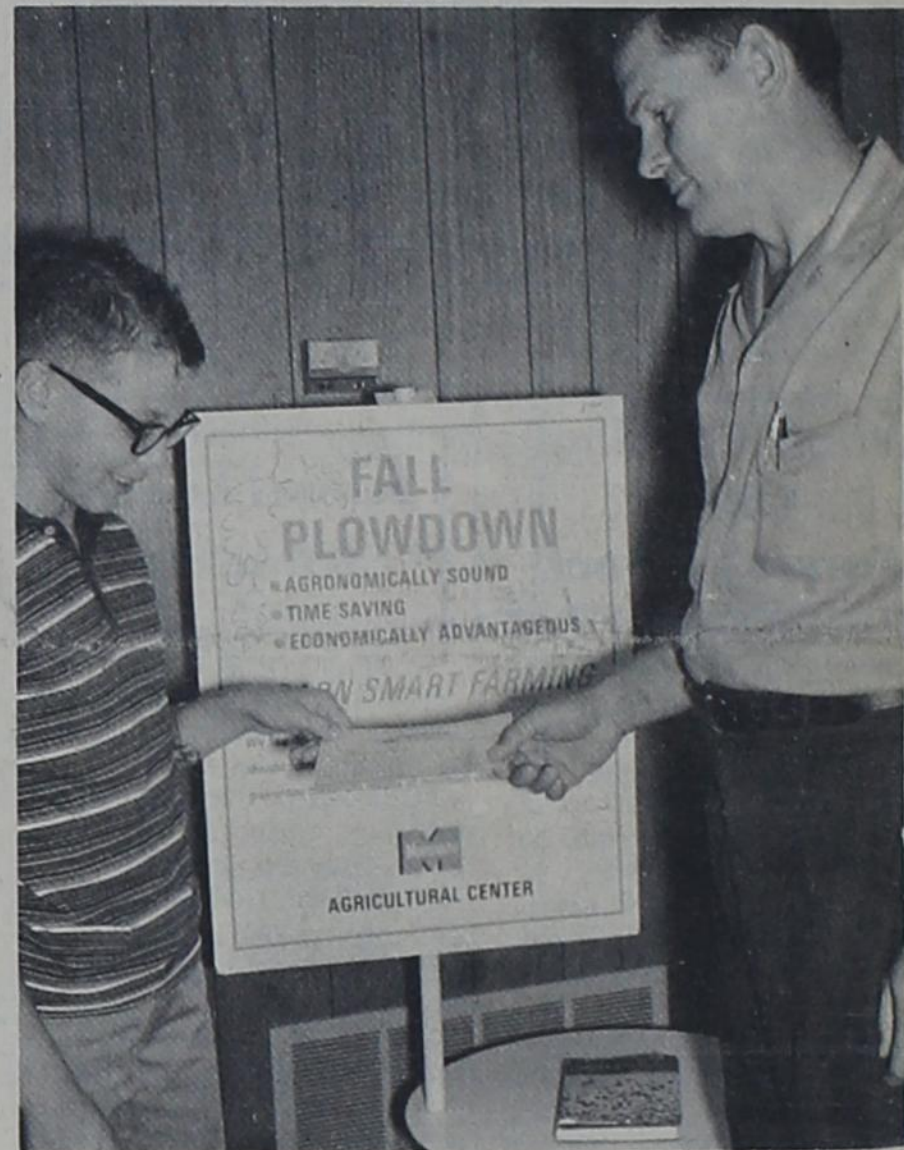

Report From The Sheriff's Office
