This is fine, but they are going to move Indian families into the old officer's homes on the base. Somehow the visions of a cowchip and woodstove culture being moved into \$15,000.00 homes leaves us cold.

We are not complaining about the need for raising the educational level of the Indians, nor are we complaining about the City of Roswell using these abandoned structures. But, we are complaining about the high level decision that made such facilities surplus while other and like facilities are being built fairly close at hand.

We think the Tribune's editorial on "cost effectiveness" in this issue could be read with this in mind. Politics is indeed a wasteful game.

22-0 --

Farwell Kicks Kress

Keeping their record intact of blanking district foes, the Farwell Steers blanked Kress Kangaroos, 22-0 last Friday night at Kress. The talented toe of Al Phillips and the crowd pleasing scampers of leaping

Lewey Bradshaw proved too much for the bigger and heavier host club, it was a case of the Steers playing flawless ball and outrunning their opponents. The Steers, haping up as a veteran club, did not give the ball up via

either the fumble or pass interception route for the first time this season.

The game began on the only Steer bad break as the Farwell defense contained the Kangaroos on their first series of

downs and forced Kress to punt. The Steer forward wall crashed the Kress line and the punt was blocked but recovered by Kress on their own 35-yard stripe. The aroused Blue and White came back two plays later and recovered a Kress fumble to own the ball on the Kress 35. In five plays, Farwell moved the ball to the Kress 17 where Al Phillips lofted a beauty through the uprights for Farwell's first 3 points with just three minutes of playing time gone by. Farwell contained the Kress ground game and took the ball again on the Steer 45. The Steers marched to the Kress 31 where another perfect 41-yard field goal by Phillips gave the Blue and White a 6-0 lead with still 3:05 left in the first quarter.

The scoring abated until with the half closing, the Steers took a Kress punt on their own 35 and worked it down to the Kress 41 with only 11 seconds showing on the clock. Quarterback Lewey Bradshaw took the ball and in a shifty cross field run, scampered in for a touchdown with no time left on the clock. The PAT pass was no good and Farwell owned a 12-0 lead at halftime.

Kress managed to stay in the ball game in the third quarter on the strength of some excellent punting that kept the Blue and White from gaining very good field position. Finally, taking the ball on their own 9-yard line, the Steers took 15 plays, to arrive on the Kangaroo 14, from which spot Phillips again demonstrated his pedal accuracy with a booming shot over the goal posts. This put the game at 15-0 Farwell.

Playing down into the fourth quarter, the Steers took the ball on a pass interception by Dean Stovall on the Kangaroo 23. Bradshaw cut loose on a scamper on the Kress 36 and cracked up the final Steer TD. This time the PAT kick by Phillips was good and the game soon ended on the 22-0 note.

On Housing Project --

Questionnaires Sent To Farmers

Money for the proposed labor housing project is available on a 33-year loan at 3% interest, according to J.T. Ford of the Steering committee. However, before plans can be completely on the project it is necessary to know how many farmers might need such a housing project for their laborers and if they do need such housing, would they be interested in joining the association. During the past week, letters containing questionnaires have been set out to area farmers. They should be completed and returned to the Farwell Chamber of Commerce no later than Nov. 10.

The proposed housing is to be

a family type unit of one or two bedrooms and dormitory units for single laborers. It is believed that this will encourage a better class of laborers. Indications are that the units will rent for approximately \$15 per week per family. Rent for the units will pay for the construction of the housing over a long period of time.

Some of the questions included on the questionnaire are: Have you ever planted vegetable and if so how many acres? Do you think you will plant vegetables in the next five years? Make an estimate of the full time laborers you will need on your farm in 1968 and also

of the part-time laborers you might need. Do you have adequate housing for your laborers now? In your opinion, what is the maximum rent your employees could pay per week for an attractive, permanent, sanitary apartment with all bills paid?

Miracle Of 'Cost Efficiency'

Just how much will this country have to pay for "cost efficiency"? Since this topic seems to concern the Secretary of Defense more than defense itself does, perhaps it would be worthwhile to examine "cost efficiency" more closely.

A typical example of this wizardry is the "more bang for the buck" theory. In other words, by phasing out manned bombers and placing total reliance in an ICBM system, we can get more bang for the buck since missiles cost less than bombers. The fact, though, that as soon as Russia develops an effective ABM network, we will have to scrap our present system and develop a more sophisticated system, doesn't seem to have been thought of. Of course it would always be cheaper to depend on our diplomats rather than our missiles. In this case, we could at least go to our radioactive tomb knowing McNamara had saved the taxpayers' money.

Speaking of ABM networks, our own version of same has also run into cost efficiency difficulties. Once again, Wizard McNamara has gazed into his crystal ball and decided that the estimated 60 million lives that it could save would not be worth the 40 billion it would cost to install the system. According to my primitive calculations, this comes to approximately \$666 dollars per person. If you happen to lose your life in a nuclear attack at least you will not have died in vain - you will have saved the government \$666 dollars.

Another splendid example of "cost efficiency" is the TFX warplane. Originally intended to provide a highly reliable, high speed fighter interceptor for BOTH the Air Force and the Navy, the TFX has met with nothing but misfortune since McNamara overrode the advice of civilian and military technical advisors and chose the General Dynamics version of the TFX over the Boeing entry. The concept was to provide a common answer to the aircraft problems of both services (whose requirements are as different as B. Kennedy and G. Wallace) thereby saving the taxpayers' money once again. How lucky we are to have Robert McNamara for Secretary of Defense - the original price tag for TFX was to be three million dollars a copy. Now, thanks to cost efficiency, the Air Force version will cost only five million, whereas the cost of the Navy's version has gone up to only seven million a plane. To top it all off, the Navy will not get its version until 1970, as problems have set the timetable back over two years. Wow! Think of all the money and time we saved by not following the advice of the best technical minds in the nation and building two separate aircraft.

Now, another "cost efficiency" miracle seems to be taking place, although this time, it is our men in Vietnam who must pay the price of saving money. Apparently the wrong type of ammunition is being supplied for the M16 rifle and training and equipment needed to maintain it are in desperately short supply. Both factors are contributing to the weapon's current tendency to jam in the heart of battle.

A condition such as this is enexcusable in a situation where men's lives depend on the battle efficiency of the weapon and not its cost efficiency!

If we are lucky enough to stay out of nuclear war until November 1968, I suggest that the American public toss McNamara and his boss out on their cut-rate, bargain basement ears, before "cost efficiency" puts us all out of business.

STATE Capital NEWS

AUSTIN, Tex. -- Newspaper readers throughout Texas soon will be seeing long columns of type about important issues as Secretary of State John Hill begins to advertise the six proposed constitutional amendments to be voted on November 11.

Fourteen additional amendments will be on the 1968 ballot.

Eight of the 20 amendments are of interest mainly to special groups (eg: legislators or state employees). Eight others would provide local governments with new powers or duties. Only four of the group directly affect most Texans.

Amendments to be voted on this year will appear on the ballot in this order:

- No. 1, House Joint Resolution 3, to permit counties to put all tax money in a single general fund rather than dividing income in specified amounts among separate funds for earmarked purposes as is now required.
- No. 2, HJR 37, allowing cities and other governmental units within hospital districts to levy taxes for participation in mental health and mental retardation community centers.
- No. 3, HJR 17, reviving the veterans land program and authorizing a total of \$400,000,000 in bonds to finance continued purchase of farm and ranch land by veterans, including those who have served in Southeast Asia during present hostilities.
- No. 4, HJR 6, authorizing counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of county law

emphasize the importance of Amendment #2 to the new community center approach of treating mental patients close to home.

Calling the 1967 election for Veterans Day and a Saturday, undoubtedly, to assure a large voter turn-out for the land fund amendment. A substantial campaign to urge its passage already is taking form.

Gov. John Connally is the principal backer of the parks bond issue. Last December he unveiled a 10-year plan for acquiring and developing 150,960 acres of recreational lands and historical sites. This would more than triple present state park acreage and open a variety of new facilities for outdoor recreation.

Only opposition to the amendment to date has been based on the \$1 a car park-entry fee, initially proposed by Connally to finance the vast program; and scattered complaints that facilities included in the governor's master plan do not adequately serve some areas of the state.

He is expected to spearhead an intensive fall campaign--supported by parks, recreational and outdoor groups--to put over the bond issue.

The veterans land amendment would add another \$200,000,000 to state bonds previously authorized and through which 35,300 veterans have purchased farm and ranch properties at low interest rates spread over a 40-year pay period.

This amendment would raise the amount which could be borrowed under the program from

\$7,500 to \$10,000. The program was initiated in 1949. Additional bonds were approved by voters in 1951 and 1956. Amendments to enlarge the bond authorization were rejected at elections in 1963 and 1965. Opposition came mainly from Dallas and Houston.

Proponents emphasize that, while thousands of veterans have benefited from the program, it has cost the state no money and actually has turned a profit of \$2,500,000 a year while providing an expanded land market.

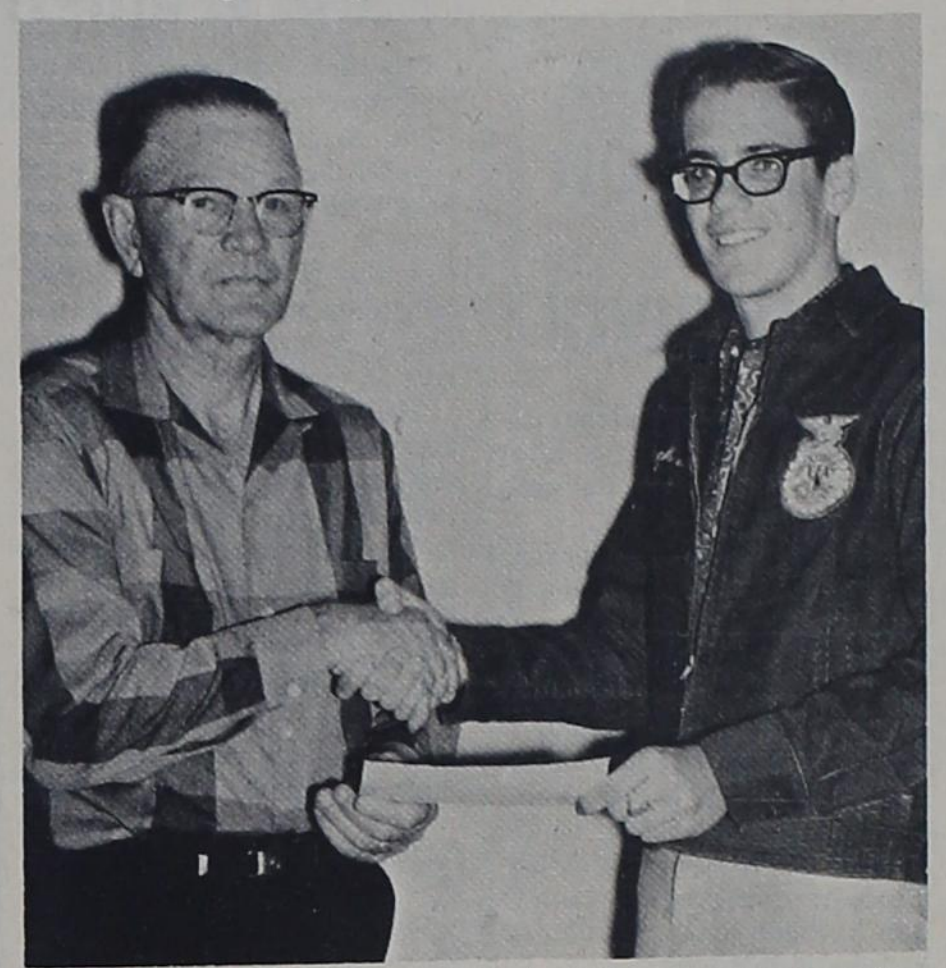
Opposition has adopted the argument that it is not the function of the state government to engage in the loan business and that veterans have had plenty of time to participate. Some also contend that "cheap money" invites purchases of land not needed and which will not be put to productive use.

Amendment #2 specifies that the legislature, in providing for creation of hospital districts, does not have to require that the districts assume full responsibility for community mental health and retardation centers and services. It would permit cities and counties to levy taxes and issue bonds for such services. Subdivisions within existing districts would be authorized to do so unless statutes creating the districts expressly prohibit.

An attorney general's opinion held that the constitution does not allow political subdivisions within the boundary of a hospital district to levy taxes for medical and hospital service. Under that ruling, cities and counties located in such districts were restricted from participating in establishment of community health centers. Therefore, only hospital districts could establish such centers, a key part of the mental health program.

Amendments #3, #4 and #5 are self explanatory and apparently non-controversial.

Amendment #6 is aimed primarily at permitting educators, who are paid from state funds, to serve on federal advisory boards.

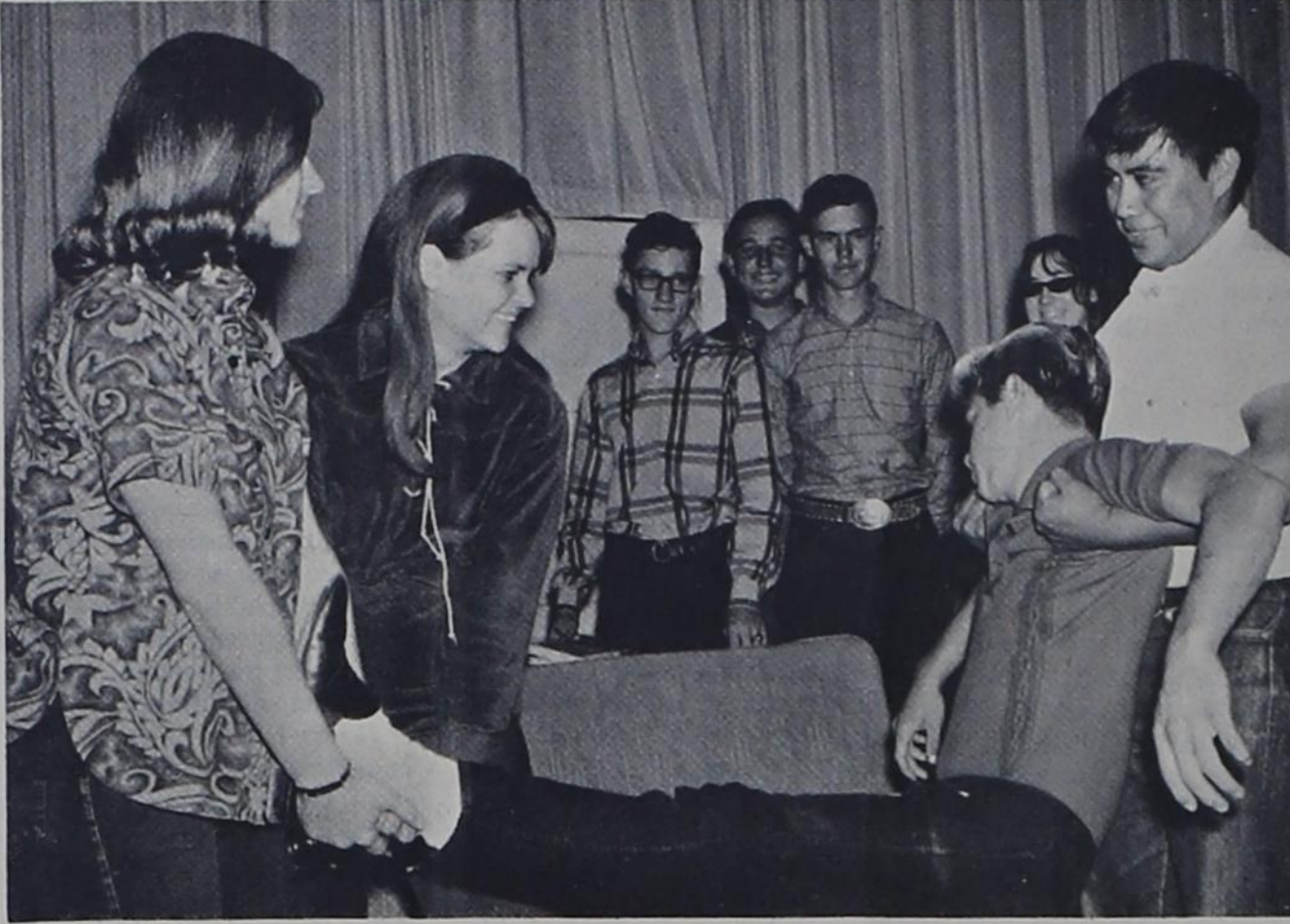

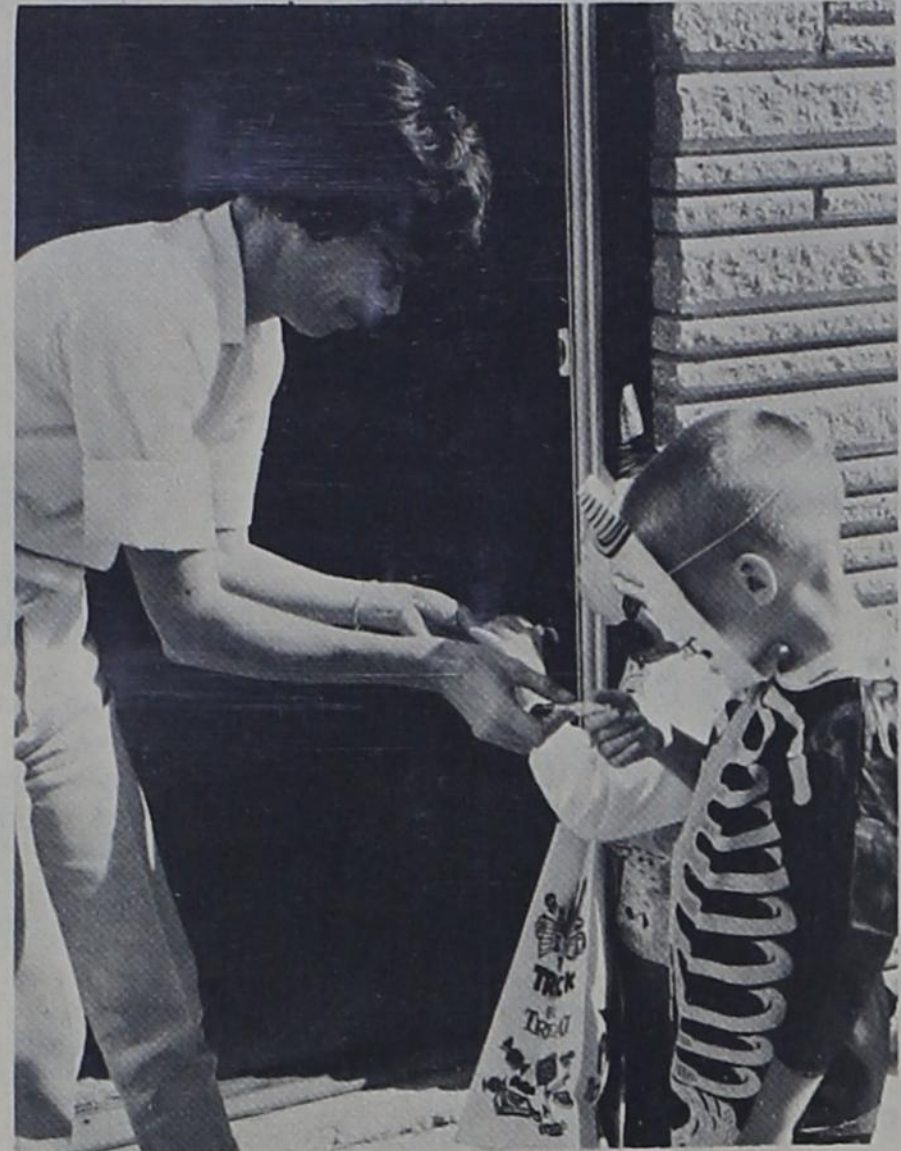
Stanley Kelm Receives Promotion

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
