

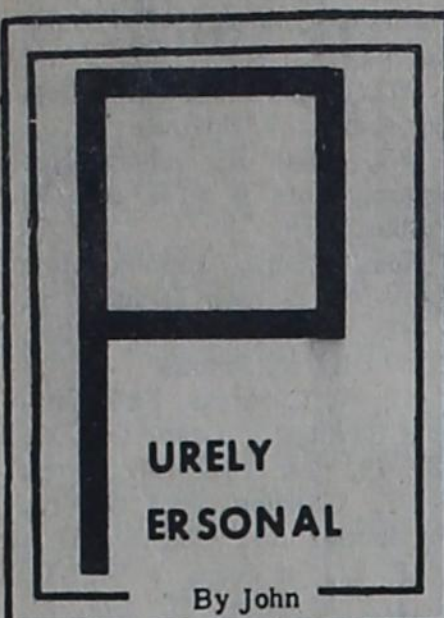

Last week we devoted our column to the imminent discontinuance of the Santa Fe passenger train service between Farwell and Houston. We wish to further develop this situation this week.

In talking about their money loss in the passenger service trade, the Santa Fe representatives used the term "travel revolution" in discussing people's lack of train use. This we feel is an indication of their thinking. This seems to say they are ready to throw in the sponge and quit. This says that they believe the passenger train cannot compete with the automobile, bus or airplane. We believe this is faulty thinking. The mode of travel in this country is in a process of evolution rather than revolution. This is a continual process of change and we certainly have not reached the end as the term "revolution" indicates to me. Any study of the problems of this country reveals that mass transportation is one that heads the list.

Basically, the steel wheel on the steel rail is still potentially the most economical means of locomotion. The rail line can move more people in a smaller totality of space than any other means of locomotion. These precepts should not be overlooked or forgotten in planning for the future. Further, we believe that the railroads have an obligation to the future of this country. Economic projections of the future hold out small hope for the small town. If rail passenger service ends for these towns, their future becomes even more beggarish.

Our High Plains area is on the verge of a tremendous expansion from industries, from farm related businesses, and from the increasing necessity of this section of the country providing more food and fiber for our expanding national population. As commerce increases, rail passenger demand will also increase and will become necessary to more people. Without this attraction of passenger transportation to offer to businesses and industry interested in our locality, we will be in an increasingly disadvantaged position.

This is why locally we must put every pressure possible on the public officials concerned with this passenger train discontinuance. Remember, individual votes are represented by individual letters is the coin that politicians universally recognize. Share Not In The Guilt

It is not the purpose of this editorial to discuss the merits or demerits of the late Dr. Martin Luther King. The man is dead and continued debate will serve no useful purpose. I will rather concern myself with the events which have occurred in the aftermath of Dr. King's death, as it is these, I believe, that are worthy of further discussion.

My main concern is not the violence that erupted "spontaneously" in a large number of major cities, although condemnation is certainly in order, just as it is for the manner in which King died, neither is justified.

What really concerns me however is somewhat more vague and harder to get a grip on than the cold reality of racial violence, but it is there nevertheless. No one who followed the events of the last two weeks could be unaware of the tendency to charge society as a whole with the death of Martin Luther King. This massive persecution complex was everywhere. It was counseled by the leaders of our country, fostered by countless newsmen and reporters seeking to dramatize their stories, and egged on by numerous show business personalities. It permeated many of our sports events and became a major theme of the academy awards presentation. It has furthermore resulted in the passage of Civil Rights Act of 1968, a bill that was given little chance of passage until the death of Dr. King.

I for one am sick of it. This senseless condemnation of society serves no useful purpose. It is neither intellectual nor justified, and its only effect is to tear down rather than build. It encourages not understanding between the races, but racial violence. It undermines belief in what history will record as perhaps not a perfect, but nevertheless the greatest society ever to grace the face of this earth. If left to grow in this environment of national mental imbalance, it will continue to gnaw away at the roots of this system of government until we ourselves vote away that which has given us greatness.

Let us never forget that racial prejudice is certainly not a unique product of this society. It thrives and has thrived in every system of government that mankind has ever conceived. This is so because prejudice is not the product of government but is the product of the individual, and has been since the dawn of time. I dare say that we as a society have done more to foster understanding on the level of the individual than any society which has gone before, in spite of ill begotten attempts to legislate it. No other society has ever made the elimination of prejudice a national goal.

An associate of Dr. King stated shortly after his death, that "it is a sad society which could produce the assassination of two leaders such as John F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King within the short space of five years." I refer this individual to the history books and even to the front page of his local newspaper. How many village leaders of South Vietnam for instance are brutally murdered by the Viet Cong in a single day? Would this individual prefer this system of government? Perhaps he would prefer the ancient Roman system in which a national sport was made of murder, or perhaps he would have preferred to live in Nazi Germany during the elimination of six million "inferiors". The sins of this society are indeed pale in comparison.

It is granted that the fact that there have been worse does not excuse wanton murders such as the slaying of John Kennedy and Martin Luther King, but it is extremely important that these occurrences be viewed in proper perspective. I urge you to reject the notion that it is this particular system of government which is somehow responsible. Disregard the hypocritical tears of vote-seeking politicians and above all, keep your faith in this society which has given you the gift of freedom. There are many other miserable wretches in this world who would gladly trade places.

Town Fathers Have Lengthy Session

At the meeting of Texico Town Council last week, town fathers approved releasing approximately \$1,508 to the Texico school for its use during 1968. The amount is a part of the property tax levied at the rate of .002225 mills per \$1,000 valuation.

They also passed a resolution to balance the town budget and passed several building permits. Building permits went to Kenneth Taylor or park a trailer house at a location on Garwood and Mildred Streets in the B zone; and to C. E. Christian to park a trailer house in south Texico in the B zone, and to move in a boxcar to be painted and used for storage in the C zone.

C. E. Cavallero, a Clovis resident, was also granted permission to move in several cabins to used as a tourist court on Wheeler Ave., near Golden West Seed Co. in the C zone.

The appointment of Jim Light as town marshal was also approved. He had been working on a 30-day contract. The police magistrate report in the amount of \$190 for the period Feb. 21-April 4 was approved.

In other business, the budget for Texico Fire Department was tentatively approved in the amount of \$7,000.

To us, the plants need to be beautiful, useful, or convenient before we justify the effort involved in setting them out. The builder of a house cannot do much other than make the house fit on the ground as it was designed. The architect cannot soften the straight lines of the material that he has to work with. The plants can and do soften the building and set it in the surroundings in a manner that is pleasing to the eyes. At the same time, they serve a useful purpose of furnishing shade for comfort and color pattern, keeping the soil stabilized so that mud or dust will not get into the house, dissipating the runoff water from the roof, and several other ways to make our place more enjoyable in which to live.

County Clerk Tells About New Election Law

Voters in the May primaries who moved into the county on or after November 4, 1967, must vote between April 15 and April 30 in the office of the county clerk in the county of their present residence, according to information supplied by Bonnie Warren, county clerk of Parmer County.

A new law enacted last year permits registered voters with less than six months' residence in the county to vote on all statewide offices and issues if they have lived in the state

longer than one year, but they must vote in the county clerk's office under procedures similar to absentee voting. The new law puts into effect a constitutional amendment adopted in November, 1966.

Formerly, a person who moved from one county to another within the state was totally disfranchised for the first six months after he moved, unless one or more of the various types of districts (congressional, legislative, judicial, etc.)

included both the county of his former residence and the county of his new residence. If he had lived in a district for six months before the election, he could vote on statewide offices and issues and on the offices for districts in which he had six months' residence, but he could not vote on local offices and issues within the county.

The new law preserves the voting rights which existed under the old law, but the procedure for voting has been changed. Heretofore, a person entitled to vote on the basis of six months' residence in a district voted on election day at the regular polling place for the voting precinct of his new residence. Under the new law, no one who has resided in the county less than six months may vote at a regular polling place, and all voting by such persons must be done through the county clerk's office. The voter must appear in person at the clerk's office between the 20th day and the fourth day preceding the election unless he is unable to appear because of sickness or

physical disability or unless he is absent from the county during that period. Sick or disabled voters and those temporarily absent from the county may obtain a ballot by mail.

The local County Clerk's office is open each day, Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. until 5 p.m. and on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. until 12 noon.

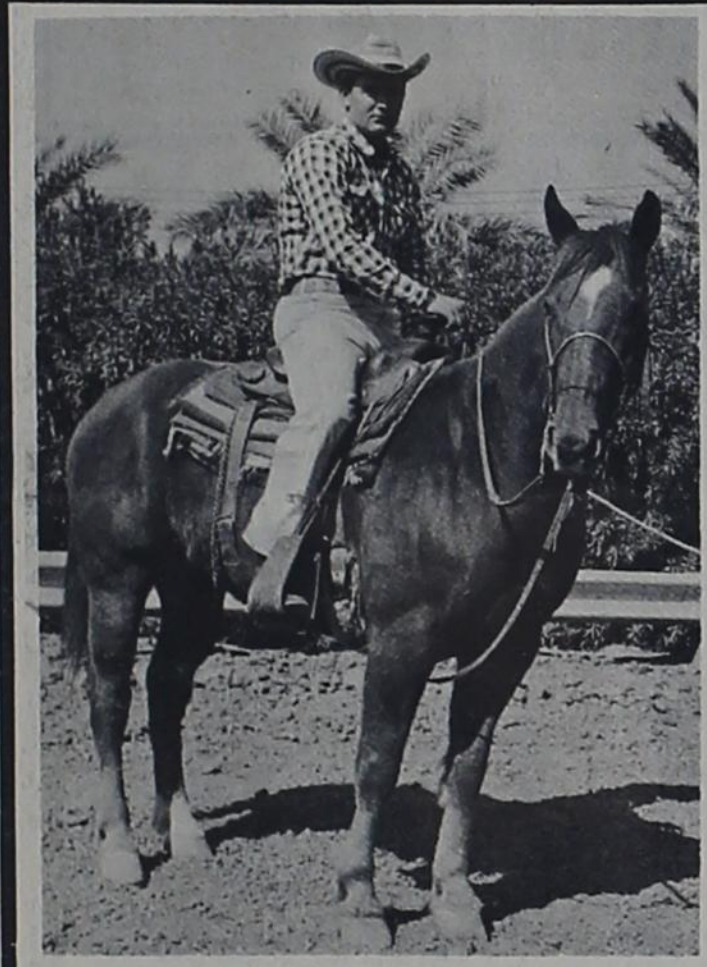
DST Coming Soon

 You may laugh, fuss or simply take a "don't care" attitude, but DST is just around the corner.



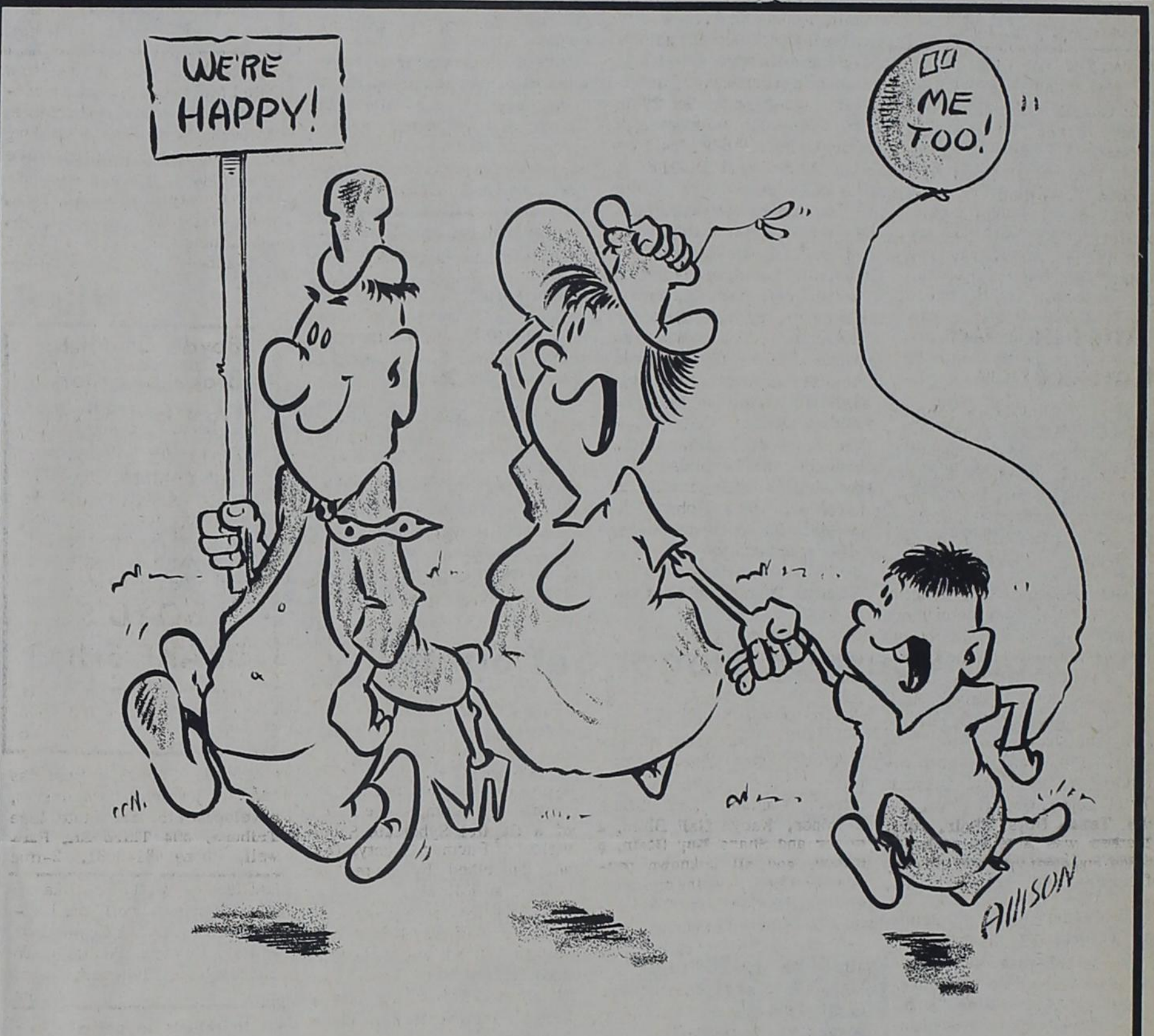

Chemical Banned From Market
 In its attempts to keep hazardous substances off the consumer market, the government has moved to ban carbon tetrachloride, a common household cleaner, from interstate commerce, reports Cricket B. Taylor, county home demonstration agent.
 The Food and Drug Administration proposed to list carbon tetrachloride and mixtures containing this chemical as banned hazardous substances, she explains. The use of this chemical in fire extinguishers would also be included in the ban.
 The use of the chemical in or around the home is a hazard to public health. Extension label warnings are now required on products containing carbon tetrachloride, but deaths and injuries connected with its use are reported every year.
 And since many other, safer substitutes are available, the use of this chemical is an unnecessary hazard.

Calf Roping Champion To Be In Clovis April 26-27

Glen Franklin, who was 12 years old when he entered his first competitive rodeo at Tucumcari, N.M., will be in Clovis Friday and Saturday, April 26 and 27. Rodeo fans are invited to meet him personally at Beagles Chrysler-Plymouth, 520 East 1st. His trophies, belts, ribbons, and other awards will also be on display.

In high school, Franklin won the State All-Around Title in calf roping, ribbon roping, and cutting horse contests. He entered the professional R.C.A. at nineteen years of age and came in third for the entire year. The following ten years since then, he has won second place four times, and the World Championship two times. In 1965 he broke the record for money won in a single event. He won three big

rodeos in a row, something never accomplished before or after, at Denver, Ft. Worth, and San Antonio. Each rodeo won by Franklin attracted over 150 ropers, adding importance to the magnitude of his victories.

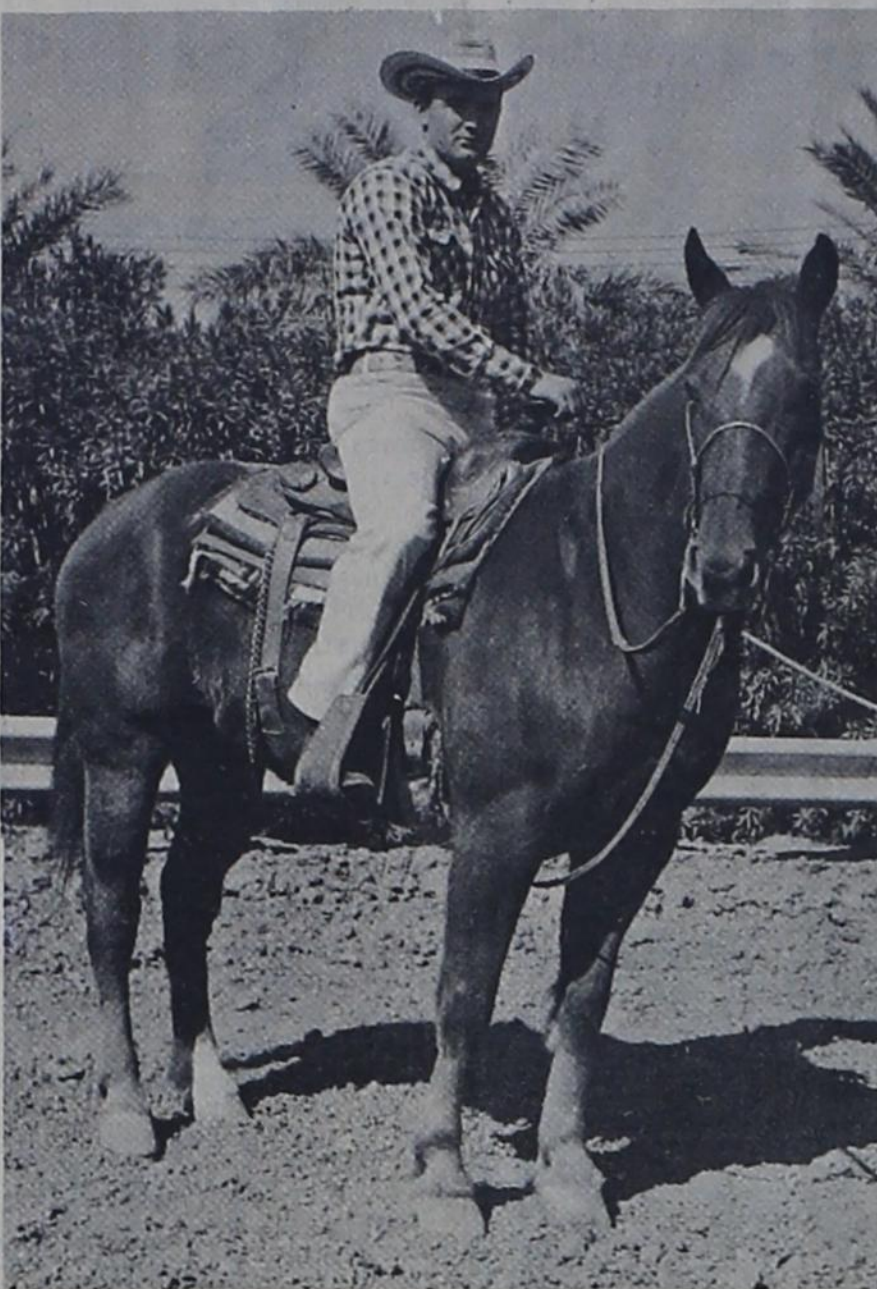
In 1967, Franklin won more money in one event than at any time in history, thereby breaking his own record. He won six twelve-calf-matched ropings with the most outstanding ropers against Jim Bob Altizer twice; and against Junior Garrison, 1967 World Champion, twice; Olen Young and Lee Cockrell, once each. He reports his greatest thrill was winding up the 1967 championship, winning the National Finals at Oklahoma City.

Other outstanding perform-

ances included setting the record for the fastest time in 1956 at New York Madison Square Garden; winning Calf Roping at Montreal, Canada's Expo '67; and winning the largest amount of money ever won at Cheyenne, Wyoming in 1967.

Even considering the importance of his many winnings since, Franklin reports he still remembers the year 1958. That was when he won the Curry County Mounted Patrol Annual Calf Roping Contest in Clovis.

His winnings so far this year already total \$12,000. He has won first place in his last three rodeos, at Phoenix, Ariz., Lubbock, Tex., and Ardmore, Oklahoma. His best times this year were at Lake Charles, La., with a time of nine seconds flat and 9.3 recorded recently at Lubbock.

Meeting Set Tonight --

Group Opposes Junior College

Second in a series of meetings to discuss the proposed Junior College, to be located in Hereford, has been called for tonight (Thursday) in Hereford. All schools in Parmer County will be represented at the meeting and Richard Collard, Friona attorney, will act as legal counsel for the group. Representatives from Farwell are Pat Patrick, Joe Jones and Elmer Hargrove.

At the meeting in Bovina on Tuesday night, all of the Parmer County schools were represented with the exception of Lazbuddie. The group at Bovina on Tuesday night went on record in opposition to the location of a Junior College in District 5, which is composed of Deaf Smith, Parmer, Oldham and Castro Counties.

Should the college vote carry, and a junior college locate in District 5, cost of same would be borne primarily by Parmer

County, who is already heavily overloaded with taxes. Pat Patrick, Farwell representative at the meeting, expressed the belief that if Parmer County is to be forced into supporting a Junior College, they would be better off to be in District 4, since the cost would be less to the taxpayers than building a college in District 5. Dr. Black, president of South Plains Junior College in Levelland (District 4) and two representatives from the college met with the group and explained that much of the expense of that college is borne by the oil rich area surrounding Levelland, (taxed at the rate of 62¢ on \$100).

Dr. Black also told his listeners that the Levelland College facility will be able to take care of area Junior College needs for another 32 years, as it is now set-up.

Petitions bearing at least 10

per cent of each of the four counties' population of qualified voters would be required before an election can be called. However, location of a college in District 5 would require a majority vote of the total combined population of the four counties involved. Consensus of opinion is that the cost is much greater than the need for a Junior College in this area at this time.

Seven other junior and senior colleges and universities are located within a 100-mile radius of Parmer County and the opinion has been expressed that should a junior college locate as close as Hereford, few Parmer County students would attend it.

Most persons attending the meeting expressed the opinion that should a junior college be built in the area, it would benefit no one except the town in which it is located.

UIL Results

At the University Interscholastic League meet held in Farwell last Friday, Farwell school had one person to qualify for the regional meet to be held later this month and two others to qualify as alternates to the regional meet.

Cheryl Boling qualified to participate in the Typing event at the regional with Tina Rundell, as alternate; and Roger Patrick was listed as an alternate in "number sense".

Farwell school failed to enter many of the events, according to W. M. Roberts, superintendent.

In the junior division, Debbie Stancell, Farwell, placed first in the oral reading contest for girls, and Mike Travis placed fourth in boys oral reading.

In picture memory, a team composed of Estelle Embry, Bruce Kaltwasser, Jacquelyn Langford, Tami Haseloff and Paula Martin, placed third for Farwell school. Seventh and eighth grade spellers, Jana Bass and Debbie Stancell, placed second following behind the Springlake team, while the fifth and sixth grade team from Farwell, Sandra Watkins and Karla Smart, placed third following behind Bovina and Springlake.
