



They suggest that you plan in advance to burglar-proof your home and to guard against possible thefts or consumer frauds on your trip. While the number of such occurrences is small compared to the number of vacationers, it only takes one bad experience to ruin a trip.

Here's a list of things to check before you leave: -Stop mail, newspaper, and other deliveries.

-Tell a neighbor or your apartment manager that you will be gone and ask them to keep an eye on the place. -Leave a few lights on or buy

an automatic timer to turn certain lights on and off each -Cut your lawn just before

leaving and, if you will be gone a long time, have someone cut it while you're away.

-Check all windows and doors to make sure they are locked. A sliding glass patio door can be more securely fastened by wedging a stick at the top or bottom of the door.

-Check with your local police if you plan an extended vacation. Many forces offer



Livestock producers should be aware that 1974 has the earmarks of an extremely bad screwworm season, and we should make every effort to reduce the number of outbreaks. A positive case of screwworms has already been found in the Bovina area.

Livestock producers can support the screwworm eradication effort by carrying out an improvement in cotton three key practices: 1) In- prices as the 1974 crop prospecting their animals frequently; 2) Treating all found wounds with an approved product; and 3) Collecting and sending worm samples from wounds to the USDA Screwworm laboratory at Mission, Tex., for identification. The post office box is 969.

As cases are confirmed, sterile screwworm fly treatment is initiated by the USDA. It is vitally important for program officials to know where cases are too numerous.

As spring migrations of fertile files from south of the Rio Grande continue, the cases move northward across Texas rather rapidly.



Early in the year many people had visions of a bumper cotton crop for 1974. This led to depressed prices and a scarcity of buyers for the remaining 1973 crop as well as little interest in forward contracting of this year's crop.

However, specialists now see gresses and supplies continue to diminish.

Carryover by Aug. 1 is expected to be down to 3.4 million bales, the second lowest level in the past 22 years. Cotton mills had only about an 11-week supply on May 4, with supplies of one inch and longer cotton especially short.

Both foreign and domestic demands continue to keep pressure on cotton stocks. About six million bales of the-1973 crop will be exported and some 5.5 million bales of the 1974 crop should move abroad. Although domestic consumption was down to 7.5 million bales during the past season, this should increase to about 7.9 million bales during the coming year.



Dry, hot weather continues in Parmer County. This is not news. It does make us all more conscious of how much irrigation means to each of us.

Native grass pastures in the northern half of the county are still as brown as they were af-ter frost last fall. There has not been enough rainfall to green up even careless weeds or Johnson grass.

Irrigation water management is very necessary right now because our crops are using maximum amounts of water. Good management is needed to apply an adequate amount of water on each crop at the right time. Tail water systems are proving their worth during this peak water use season. Some producers would not be able to keep up with their irrigation without tailwater pits.

City dwellers are also finding it is necessary to manage the water on their lawns and gardens. Good, uniform, thorough grass waterings create beautiful lawns and save money on

Sharon Williams Receives Degree



logician, perhaps the greatest logician of all time, and in this case his words were Spirit-inspired, so that we have in his epistle to the Romans a powerful logical argument as to God and man, condemnation and justification. It is wonderful thus to have God's plan of salvation explained for us. This is all too lacking in modern evangelism.

The doctrinal argument of Romans begins by demonstrating the moral depravity of man and says, even to the self-righteous: "Therefore thou art inexcusable..." (2:1).

The apostle then goes on to show that the law was given, not to help men to be good, but "that every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may be brought in guilty before God" (3:19). The conclusion: "Therefore by the deeds of the law shall no flesh be justified in His sight, for by the law is the knowledge of sin" (3:20).

sin that we might be "justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (3:24). His conclusion: "Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith, apart from the deeds of the law" (3:28). Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (5:1). Next, he shows how those who trust in Christ and confess His death as their

just penalty for sins, are "baptized into Christ" (6:3), made one with Him by faith. The conclusion: "There is therefore now no condemnation (judgment) to those who are in Christ Jesus" (8:1). And the apostle closes the doctrinal part of this great epistle by exclaim-

"Who shall lay anything to the charge of God's elect?... Who shall separate us from the love of Christ?" (8:33,35).

A DAY TO HONOR AMERICA July 4th, 1974

John Hancock of Massachusetts signed the Declaration of Independence with a bold, elaborate and most legible flourish. It was followed by the signatures of 55 others from the 13 American colonies, 198 years

And in signing this document they called their erstwhile colonies, "FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES", by appealing to the Protection of divine Providence (the capitals are theirs) and did "mutually pledge to each other our lives, our Fortunes, and our Sacred Honor.

On July 4, 1776, this was no empty pledge. It meant very starkly that each signer had affixed his signature to his own death warrant. Each inscription convicted its perpetrator, automatically, of treason.

Yet such was the overwhelming strength of their patriotism in their fledgling nation that they pledged their all that it might be achieved.

And in years of battle, blood, hardship and often despair, it was achieved. Today nearly two centuries later, we of America are still a nation bound by the principles set forth in that Declaration and in the Constitution which followed it.

John Adams, second President of the United States, wrote of July Fourth-"It ought to be solemnized with pomp and parade, with shows, guns, bells, bonfires, and illuminations, from one end of the country to the other, from this time forever more."

Our nation has survived much, from minor upheavals to major corruptions, to bloody civil war. But that Declaration and that Constitution remain intact. We still pledge to them our lives, our fortunes, and our sacred honor.

And in these troubled times, more than ever, we might take heed of one of our most prominent contemporary constitutional lawyers, Louis Nizer, who in a recent address at New York University Law

"Ours is a great and noble nation. We must not give vent to despondency or skepticism. . .our great nation couldn't have achieved its eminence in science, business, and culture without a healthy core. . .'

We hold these truths to be self-evident. . And by honoring America's founders we also honor

America, itself.
