One Injured In Accident

At 5:15 p.m. Tuesday afternoon, an accident involving a 1963 Buick Skylark driven by Carolyn Curd of Texico and a 1953 Ford driven by James Allen Cunningham of Farwell resulted in approximately \$900 damage to the vehicles and painful, but not serious, injury to one of the persons involved.

The accident allegedly occurred when the Buick driven by Miss Curd, headed north on Turner Street, was struck almost broadside by the Ford driven by young Cunningham, at the intersection of Turner and Hereford Streets in Texico.

Miss Curd was taken to a Clovis hospital by ambulance where she was treated for a head laceration and released. Cunningham was not injured.

The Buick was damaged in the amount of approximately \$700 and the Ford received approximately \$200 damage. Cunningham was cited for failure to yield, by James Light, town marshal, who investigated the accident.

40th Year --

Old Loving Cup To Be Presented

The "Old Loving Cup" which will be presented to some outstanding Farwell senior this year for the 40th consecutive year could tell many tales if only it could talk. The cup was first awarded in 1928 to an outstanding senior and since that time, 38 other names have been added. The name which is being added this year remains a deep secret.

Since the "Old Loving Cup" is not an unusually large trophy space for adding the names of graduates was growing nil, but Dr. Larry J. Cooper, 1957 recipient of the cup and 1968 commencement speaker, has had a silver and walnut base added to the cup (honoring the 1968 graduating class) in order that 60 more names may be added. In this way the cup will be awarded to an outstanding

senior for at least 100 years. Through the years the "cup" has become the most coveted award presented at the commencement service.

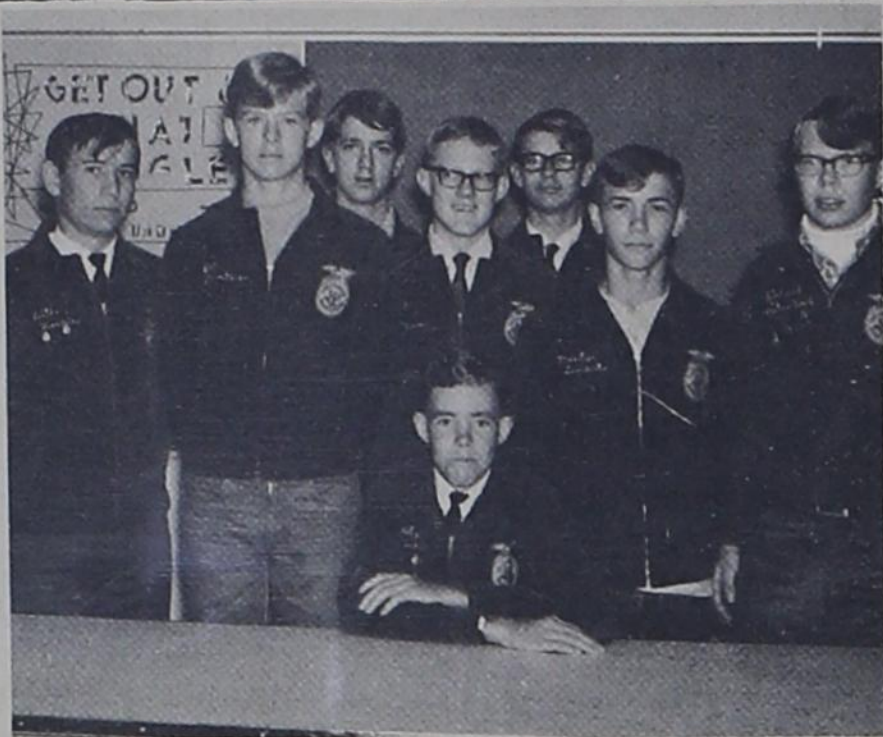

History Repeats Itself Once Again

How often must we repeat our mistakes before we finally see the light? Are we forever doomed to follow in the path of repetitious futility, or will we someday cast aside the emotions which lead us astray and begin to reason with our minds rather than our hearts.

I am referring of course to the so-called "peace talks" taking place in Paris. How stupid we Americans are! Having been fed crow once during negotiations with the Communists, we are now back for a second helping.

We have failed to realize, time and time again, one simple truth. Negotiations cannot succeed unless both parties earnestly desire a reasonable settlement. If this prerequisite is not met, negotiation becomes nothing but intimidation.

This is precisely what is occurring in Paris. The North Vietnamese do not desire a reasonable settlement. Their goal is, and always has been, the political conquest of South Vietnam. The negotiations in Paris are simply another tool toward this end. They are using the peace talks as a means of expelling the American desire for an end to the hostilities, and while they talk, they fight -- further intensifying our desire for peace. By utilizing this old Communist tactic, the North Vietnamese hope to win at the peace table, what they could not win on the battle field. It's an old tactic, and more often than not, it works. It works because we allow it to work. We have deluded ourselves into believing that the Communists are not really conquerors, but merely "revolutionaries", who if handled with kid gloves and reasoned with, can be brought into the world community on a basis of coexistence.

Our experience should have taught us that nothing could be further from the truth. Time and time again, the Communists have demonstrated that their purpose is domination, not coexistence. If the so-called "intellectuals", the Kennedys and the McCarthys, cannot see this, then they are as blind as the south end of a north bound jackass!

While we exercise restraint, Hanoi makes war, moving men and supplies into the south at ever increasing rates -- free from U. S. air attacks. While our diplomats talk, our soldiers die. The weekly death toll in Vietnam last week was the highest yet in the war. All this, and still we hope against hope that negotiations will somehow lead to an honorable peace.

The simple reality is that Hanoi is demanding nothing short of total U. S. surrender at the conference table, and this she may get if the administration continues this farce much longer.

What is needed now is a cold realization on our part. We must come to understand that someday, somewhere, we must come to grips with the Communist menace. We may put it off this time, and maybe several more times, but at some point, we are going to have to put an end to the Communist campaign of conquest, before we ourselves fall victim.

The question then is not really "How many times will we repeat our mistakes?", it is "How many times will be allowed to repeat our mistakes?"

Contract Awarded For Post Office

Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Roberts of Plainview were recently awarded the contract for the new post office building in Farwell, according to Postmaster General Marvin Watson. Announcement of the award to the successful bidder advances the new building closer to the construction stage. When the building is finally completed it will provide more space and modern equipment for more efficient handling of mail.

The new building will be leased to the post office department for ten years with options to renew for an additional 20 years at an annual rental of \$5112, for the basic term. It represents the lowest responsive bid of four received by the department on competitive basis.

The new Farwell Post Office, located at 4th Street and Ave B, is expected to be completed early next spring after the plans are approved. Postmaster Watson explained that the Department's capital investment is limited substantially to postal equipment. The building will remain under private ownership, with the owner paying local real estate taxes.

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NURSERY NEWS

The rose stands head and shoulders above any other plant in helping to dress the area around a house, making it "homey." The rose is rather limited in adapting since it is a native of the northern hemisphere. It has been recorded in history as long as man has been keeping records. The rose pays more in beauty for the amount of effort than any other plant. The only thing that it demands is that when it needs attention it expects to receive it.

There are all kinds of roses, from the miniature which is only a few inches high to the running or rambling rose that seems to never end. Roses are like people in some respects. Some are wide and not too tall and others are tall and not too wide. All have a personality of their own. There are hybrid tea roses, polyanthas roses, perpetual hybrids, floribundas, pillars, trees and just about any other adaption that one can imagine. The classification of roses is extensive and there are several people that do nothing but study roses so we will get into that part of it right now.

The thing that we would like to bring to your attention is the fact that there are some rather large rose companies that are willing to furnish roses for a test plot. These companies will furnish from 50 to 100 roses each year. That is a number of roses when you consider that there are some four to five major companies that are serving the western part of the United States. The roses will probably be numbered and some will be patented and others will not. As a rule there are some three or four a year that are picked for the AARS, All American Rose Award. To be chosen as All American from a field of 50 to 100 is quite an honor to the producer. The competition to develop new and better roses is rather keen.

The people if the area around Clovis can take advantage of this opportunity and make this a spot of beauty by convincing the companies that the roses will be adequately taken care of. There has been a great deal of work done in this direction, so if you are interested just talk it over with your neighbor and then call.

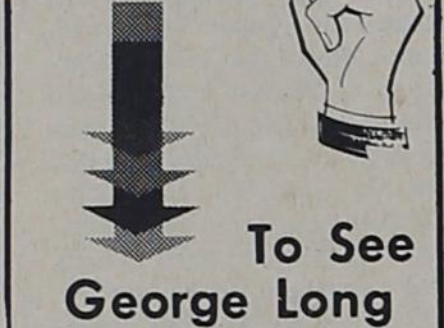

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


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
