This is in direct competition with the railroads which pay local taxes on their traffic arteries. Also, the railroads maintain, out of their own revenue, these arteries of trade. This strikes us as manifestly unfair to the railroads and ultimately to us, the high plains consumer. We are critics of much of the policies of the railroads and the unions but do feel that this is an unfair situation that is costing us, our pockets every year.

This type of "pork barrel" legislation is where the federal government could save millions of dollars each year, but will not do so until the long suffering taxpayer elects legislators with a modicum of decency and integrity.

Speaking of taxes on the common herd, Congressman Richard Ottinger observed that one of the nation's richest women put a \$56,000,000.00 legacyinto tax-free bonds and enjoyed a yearly income of more than \$1,500,000.00 without having to report it on her income tax return. Well, small fry, how does that grab you?

Several weeks ago our community lost a man who over the years had done much in contributing to the beauty of the community in which he lived. Many of the lovely trees we see and enjoy today are here as a result of the care and work of Sunday --John Aldridge. Many of the flowers and shrubs gracing the community do so because of his live of beauty and keen appreciation of nature. Our town in many respects will be the poorer for his passing.

This we realize is inexorable in the passing of the years, but we need to be mindful of the many contributions, known and unknown, these pioneers of our heritage made to their community. In John's case, it is a beauty of tree and flower that will enrich us in the years yet

Because of his interest in nature, it has been suggested by several persons that asmall memorial to John be established in a corner of the City Park. Therefore, all those wishing to make a donation to this memorial can do so at the Security State Bank or the Tribune office.





# **NURSERY**



For those that say that we have only two seasons in this area, we are half through the one and well into the other. The saying we refer to is "July-August --- and Winter." The plant world has started indications pointing toward fall while it is still trying to hold onto summer and spring.

Gardners with blue grass yards will welcome a little cool weather as the hot summer is very hard on the "cool weather" grasses. Those that have nurtured the blue grass in good shape this far will be relatively safe for another year. It is a good time to apply soil conditioners to help your blue grasses fight or counteract the conditions that are against it.

We have had the question asked, "Does watering make mildew and fungus." We would like to answer that by asking "Does bread make bread mold?" Watering makes conditions where fungus thrives but does not necessarily make it. Should a person water properly, he can keep the roots wet enough and still let the top inch or two get dry enough to break the spore of the fungus. The secret is studying the depth that the roots penetrate and water to that depth or more, and then wait until the top inch is dry before watering again.

The world of chemicals has seen more advances, more setbacks, more improvements and more wrecks than probably any other. It has had more use, mis-use and abuse than any other undertaking that we have tried. We have a lot of trees that are kicking out this year, and we more or less suspect some of the weed killers that have been put on in forms that did what it was supposed to do -- real well. In other yards where some chemicals have been applied to keep down given plants, this chemical not only kept down the weed -- but the cherry or peach tree a few feet from it. One lady said that she was afraid to use any of the chemicals for fear of damage, but by the same token, we find water very good to drink, but just a little uncomfortable to breathe. Yet we will continue to use water as it was in-
