Mahaney Wins Contest, Gast Weekly Winner

A record breaking number of 310 contestants entered the local merchants football contest this year. C. L. Mahaney outcalled his nearest opponent Willie Dannheim to win the contest by a two game margin. Mahaney called 79 games right during the 12 week contest and Dannheim had a total of 77 games right. In third place with 76 games right was Lonnie McFarland; Buck Gregory had 75 games right, and Glen Phillips and T. J. Kittrell each ended the season with 74 right games. By winning the contest, Mahaney is recipient of two tickets to the Cotton Bowl football game on New Year's Day and \$50 expense money for the trip. Only once during the season

was Mahaney winner of any weekly prize money; the 10th week he was first place winner calling nine games right. Dannheim also received a first place weekly award one week (second week calling eight games right). First place weekly winner in the final week of the contest was Smokey Gast who called all ten of the games right and missed the tiebreaker score by only one point, calling Sudan over Clarendon 14-6. Second place winner in the weekly contest is Dale McCuan who two weeks ago was third place award winner. McCuan also called all of the games right but missed on the tiebreaker score 23 points. nine games right to receive third place weekly award. 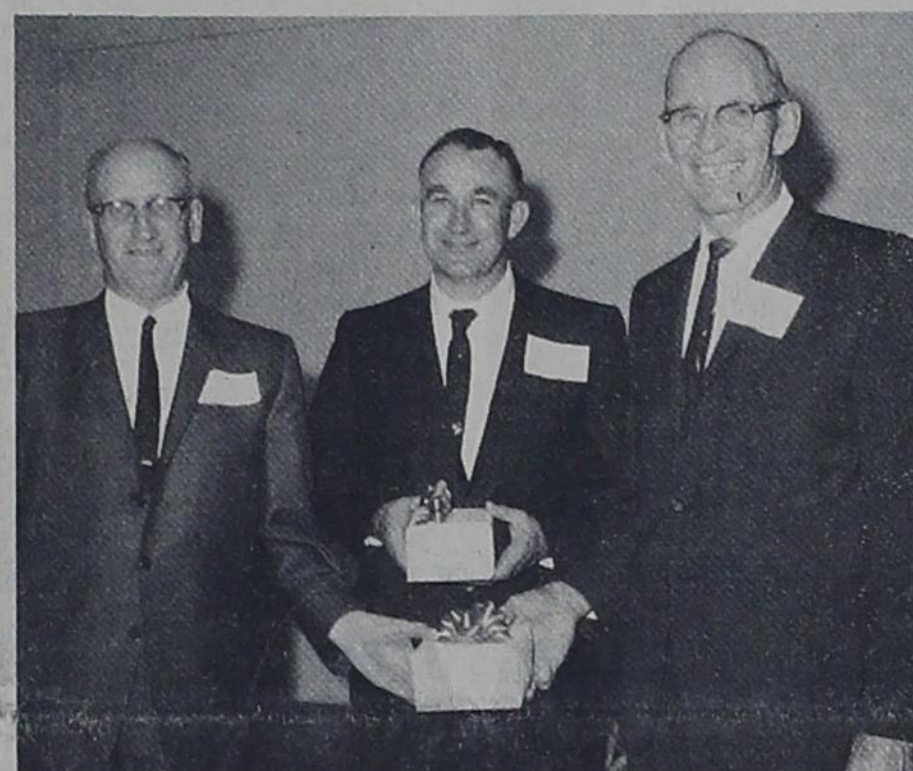

Effective Dec. Billing --

City Commission Approves Electric Rate Increase

According to announcement by Otis Huggins, local manager for Southwestern Public Service Co., early this week, Farwell City Commission has approved the general rate increase in electric service for local patrons of the company.

An average increase of 7.62% for residential and commercial customers in the Texas portion of the company's service area will become effective with the December billing (Jan. 1). The new rates had already been approved for communities the company serves in New Mexico by the rate-making authorities in that state.

It will switch to single meter billing for all residential customers. Presently, those customers who heat their homes or heat water with electricity are billed on two meters.

Single meter billing offers several advantages since a single minimum bill charge is in effect in case of an extended vacation. In addition, the customer has a smaller investment in the wiring needed to bring service into his home and during the winter season. In electrically heated homes, the usage after 500 kwh per month will be billed at a rate of less than one cent per kilowatt-hour.

For residential service in homes which are not heated electrically or who do not heat water electrically, the new rate schedule is: 6.50¢ per kwh for the first kwh used each month, 4.30¢ per kwh for the next 50 kwh used each month, 2.15¢ per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month, and 1.70¢ kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

The 1.70¢ bottom step on the rate schedule for regular residential service is the lowest rate for this type service the company has ever offered.

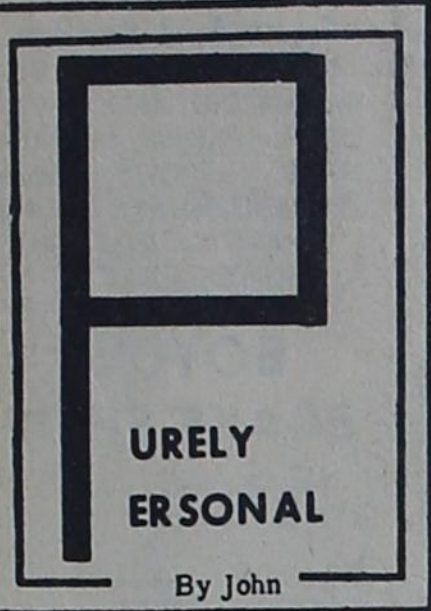

We are only on the very fringe of being "old timers" as our residence here dates back only about 20 years. Entertainment was furnished by several of our outstanding musical alumni and reminiscing talks were also given by three ex-students.

These tales of happenings and escapades of a bygone day were enjoyable, even for an outsider to hear. A roll call by year of the classes present revealed two members of the class of 1916 with representatives of various classes down through 1962. That year ended the class of returnees. Definitely, age makes one more appreciative of the past.

Oh yes, a great mystery was cleared up as Mitz Walling explained how he lettered in football at Farwell for six consecutive years. It was done legally and without old Mitz spending too many years in any one class. This past Thanksgiving was a great day for followers of the football fortunes of the Texas Aggies. On this day, the great 1967 Aggie team beat the University of Texas and won the Southwest Conference crown. They also guaranteed the Conference a fighting and determined representative in the Cotton Bowl come New Year's Day.

We, personally, were pleased to see this come about, as Texas Tech appeared to us as to erratic a team to represent the Conference in this nationally acclaimed post season game. It is our thought that until the Lubbock school changes head football coach, they will never have a team playing consistent winning football of the caliber necessary to win the Conference crown and the right to be the Conference representative in the Cotton Bowl.

While we are on the subject of football, another conviction has been taking shape in our mind. Namely, an athlete from a small school is terribly handicapped when he chooses to go to one of the bigger colleges or universities. We feel that most smaller schools offer an academic standard on a par and often above the schools struggling with masses of students. We feel that a boy looking forward to the possibility of playing professional sports is also in better shape to attract attention at a smaller school.

We know of many fine athletes from small schools who are warming benches in big schools. These boys could reasonably be expected to play in a school with a lesser enrollment and with a smaller number of other athletes to compete against. To be seen by the pro scouts, a boy must play. If he never plays, he is never seen or scouted. We know that professional scouts do see every boy from any school that makes a reputation for himself. Many, if not most, professional football players today came to the pro ranks from small and often insignificant schools.

We think the boys should carefully evaluate these factors in looking at the tempting offers that will soon be dangled in front of many of our fine area athletes. Remember boys, to be seen, you must play.

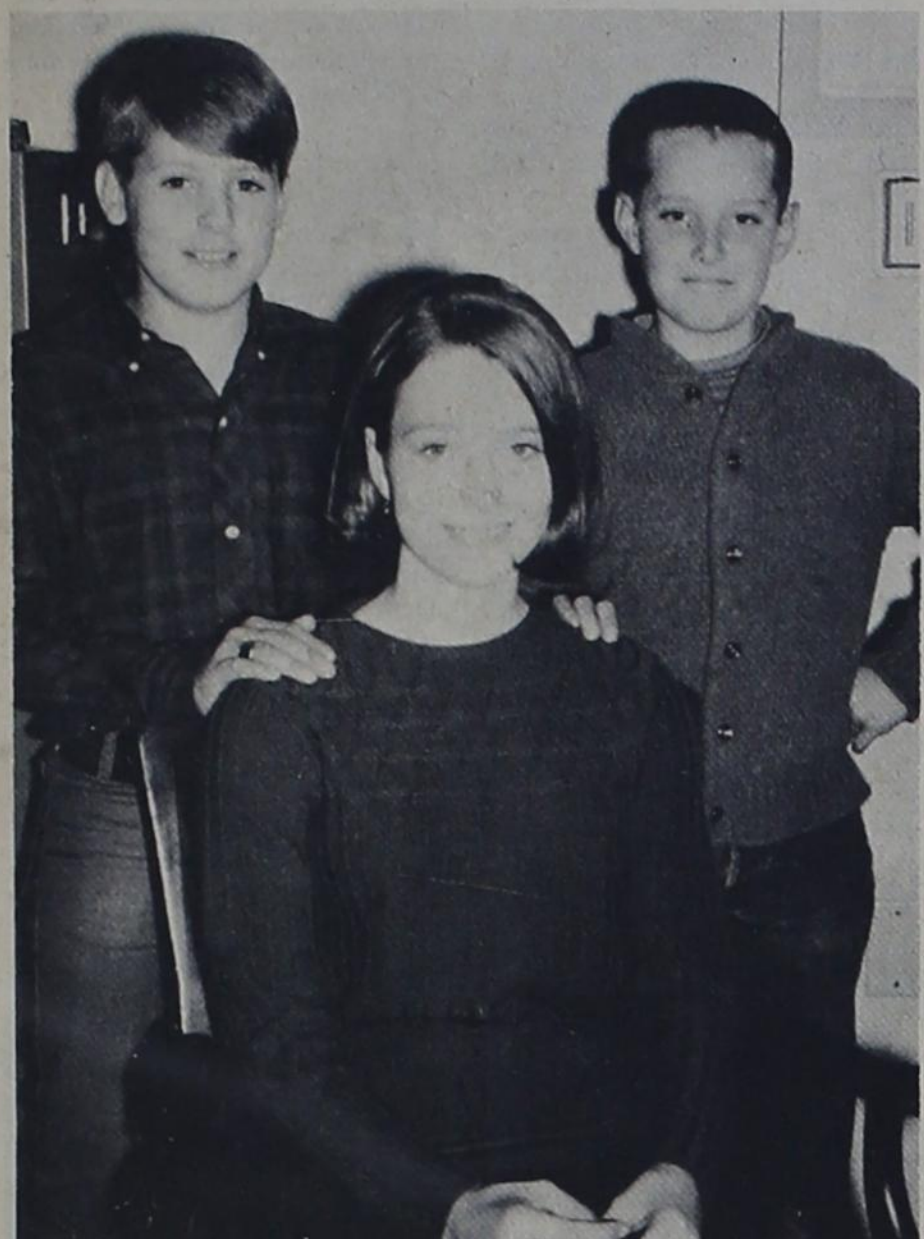

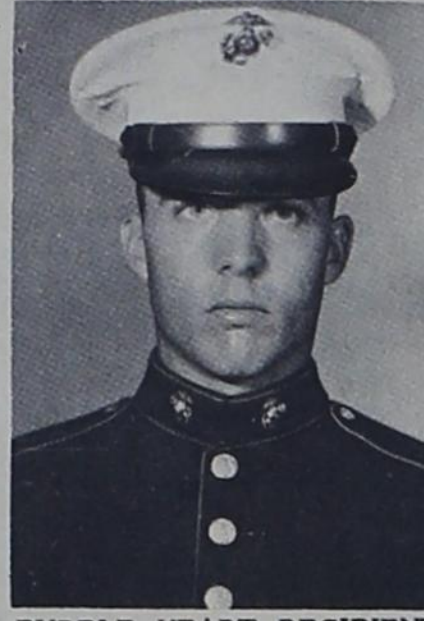
