



This past Thanksgiving was a great day for followers of the football fortunes of the Texas Aggies. On this day, the great 1967 Aggie team beat the University of Texas and won the ference a fighting and determined representative in the Cotton Bowl come New Year's Day.

We, personally, were pleased to see this come about, as Texas Tech appeared to us as to erratic a team to represent the Conference in this nationally acclaimed post season game. It is our thought that until the Lubbock school changes head football coach, they will never have a team playing consistent winning football of the caliber necessary to win the Conference crown and the right to be the Conference representative in the Cotton Bowl.

While we are on the subject of football, another conviction has been taking shape in our mind, Namely, an athlete from a small school is terribly handicapped when he chooses to go to one of the bigger colleges or universities. We feel that most smaller schools offer an academic standard on a par and often above the schools struggling with masses of students. We feel that a boy looking forward to the possibility of playing professional sports is also in better shape to attract attention at a smaller school.

We know of many fine athletes from small schools who are warming benches in big schools. These boys could reasonably be expected to play in a school with a lesser enrollment and with a smaller number of other athletes to compete against. To be seen by the pro scouts, a boy must play. If he never plays, he is never seen or scouted. We know that professional scouts do see every boy from any school that makes a reputation for himself. Many, if not most, professional football players today came to the pro ranks from small and often insignificant schools.

We think the boys should carefully evaluate these factors in looking at the tempting offers that will soon be dangled in front of many of our fine
