

# Look Again Senator

So Senator McCarthy wants to develop a dialogue on Vietnam does he? Prey tell, what does he think the present never-ending yap, yap, yap that goes on nowdays is -- a PTA discussion on the acceptable length of skirts? Hawks cryfor escalation, doves scream for de-escalation, chickens burn their draft cards and blubber about the immorality of the war, and all the in-between species of fowl manage to get in their two bits at one time or another. No dialogue you say? Look again Senator. Vietnam manages to creep into almost every level of discussion from the dinner table, to the barber shop, and even to the pulpit. Every junior politican from here to Podunk Junction has some magic formula for everlasting peace, and what's more, they aren't the least bit hesitant in telling the world about it.

Thousands of so called intellectuals attack our policies in massive force every day. Civil rights has taken a back seat to Vietnam, even within the core of the civil rights movement, and yet you say, Senator, that this country needs a dialogue on Vietnam. This is like suggesting that what Sunday afternoon needs is more football games!

What's that? What you really said was that this country needs is a useful dialogue on Vietnam. Oh, pardon me. Well then please define what you mean by "useful". If you are referring to the "stop-the-bombing now, talk later maybe" idea, then forget it. That's real great talk around intellectual circles, but unfortunately doesn't go over with a big smash in Hanoi. Since your memory seems bad on this point, you are reminded that this has been tried before, with total and resounding failure. Many will suggest, Senator, and I'm not sure I disagree, that your call for a dialogue is nothing more than a smokescreen set up to hide your lack of a workable formula.
