From time to time in our "coffee cup" conversations, we are referred to as being against many of the new programs. This does not bother us because we know each other locally and realize that each of us has those things he favors and those things he is against. However, one of our prominent politicians in a political "non-political" talk castigated people who are born "aginners." It is thus easy to cast aspersions upon those who disagree with us by issuing such blanket indictments. It is not easy to dodge such labels when you oppose a worthy plan, such as that which might put food in hungry children's stomachs. An example is the government's Food Stamp Program, which is worthy in concept but is open to criticism in actual practice.

During October of last year, 3,809 families of workers striking against Ford Motor Company, representing some 16,970 individuals, obtained food stamps with a purchasing power of \$273,171.00. These strikers were able to obtain these stamps through the Food Stamp Act of 1964. The strike is over but some important questions arise on the use of such federal tax dollars.

Wasn't the food stamp program designed to subsidize the purchasing power of the poor? If so, why should these stamps be used to subsidize organized labor's costs during a strike, especially when the union had a very substantial strike fund available and should be subject to the effect of economic risks the same as management? If food stamps are given to strikers in other parts of the country, literally millions of OUR tax dollars can be spent to prolong strikes by minimizing the effect of economic pressures which otherwise might shorten them.

After all, aren't dual risks supposed to be part of our free enterprise, collective bargaining system?

Now these are not easy questions to answer and we sometimes feel like a born "aginners", but somewhere in our personal and national life our beliefs in fairness and justice should take precedence over just "do good" tendencies.

Most of the comment we have heard about a proposed one per cent city sales tax has been favorable. We note Muleshoe has voted in in and Bovina is given the idea favorable consideration, Farwell City Hall has a supply of explanatory literature and Janie will be glad to give you some for further study. This is a program that needs immediate attention and only an active and informed citizenry will get the job done.

As Told By Jim Dixon --

Water Incorporated Tour

EDITOR'S NOTE

The following article, written by Jim Dixon, Parmer County Water Inc. representative, tells about the purposes, members, itinerary, and recommendations of the tour group. It is a concise report on the findings of the group.

I. PURPOSE

This is a report to the Parmer County Farm Bureau board of directors on a trip taken by Jim Dixon as a member of the Water Incorporated tour to California. The purpose of this tour was to study the California Water Project and to see if such a project would be feasible for the Southern High Plains.

II. MEMBERS

The tour was composed of 80 members from the High Plains. The group included farmers, bankers, ranchers, newspapermen, and television reporters.

III. ITINERARY

The trip took four days. We left on December 10 and flew from Lubbock to Sacramento via El Paso and Los Angeles. That afternoon Preston Walker from Plainview and I toured the Governor's Mansion. He wasn't in.

The next morning we went by bus to Oroville Dam which is the heart of the California Water Project. Money spent in the Oroville Dam Area will total \$474,757,000. The dam has a height of 770 feet, a volume of 80,000,000 cubic yards, a capacity of 3,484,000 acre-feet, a surface area of 15,500 acres and a shoreline of 167 miles. The Oroville powerplant will produce 2,467,000 kilowatt-hours of electricity, yearly.

After our visit at Oroville Dam we rode the bus to Modesto where we met with Mr. Banks who is a member of the firm which is doing consulting engineering work for Water, Inc. He told us that water costs the California (Kern County) farmer from \$20 to \$45/acre foot. It takes about 3 1/2 acre feet for most crops. (An acre foot is one acre covered with one foot of water.) Mr. Banks said the problem with a water project is not engineering but one of politics and economics. "Who pays and what do I get out of it?"

From Modesto we went to the Delta Pumping Station. Eleven pumps lift 10,300 cubic feet per second of water from the delta to the California Aqueduct which has a length of 444.5 miles. (A cubic foot per second is

equal to 450 gallons per minute.)

The San Luis reservoir is located down stream from the Delta Pumping Station for the purpose of water storage and power generating. It is unique in that all the water is pumped in, none comes from natural flow. San Luis reservoir has a capacity of 2,095,000 acre-feet, an area of 13,800 acres and a shoreline of 65 miles.

That night, December 12, Bill Bryant, who is chief of the Kern County Water Agency, explained how the farmer receives his water, what he pays, and how the water districts are set up. Some farmers chose not to belong to a water district and they will not share in the water even though the canal may pass through their land.

Part of the cost of the water is to be paid for by an ad valorem tax. This tax is a "zone of benefit" tax paid by everyone including city people because they receive benefit from the water from sales of gasoline, machinery, groceries, etc.

The next morning we rode the bus to the Tehachapi Pumping Station which will lift the water over the Tehachapi mountains and into the Los Angeles area. There will be 14 pumps lifting 4,410 cubic feet per second of

water 1938 feet. The water is lifted over, rather than through, the mountains because of two faults inside the mountains. These faults cause earthquakes which would ruin a tunnel.

We arrived in Los Angeles about noon, ate dinner, and then went to Long Beach where we saw a project which uses fresh water to keep the salt water from seeping in under Long Beach. Recharge wells pump in fresh water which pushes the salt water back toward the sea.

Finally, we saw a 600 acre percolating basin which uses excess rain water and some fresh water to recharge the water sands under Los Angeles. This basin was noteworthy because the land was valued at \$50,000 per acre.

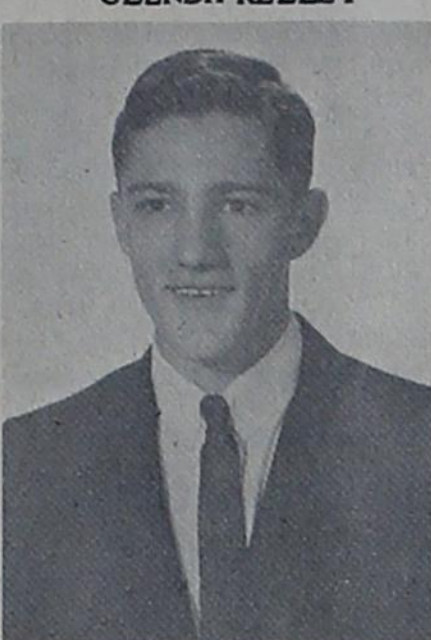
The total cost of the California Water Project will be about \$2,814,108,000; about half will be paid by California and half by the United States government.

December 13, we boarded a plane which took us back to Lubbock.

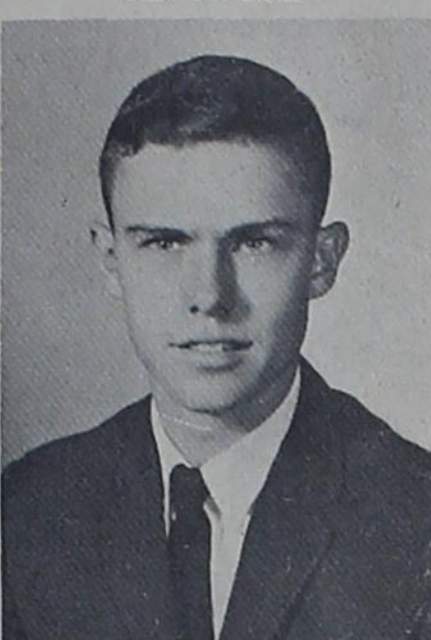
IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

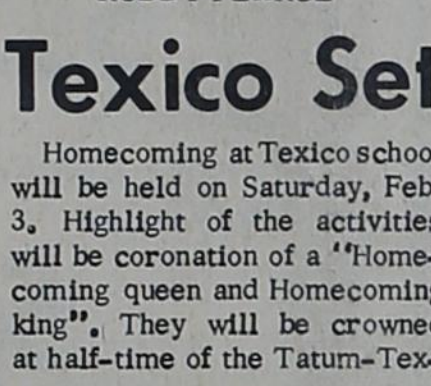

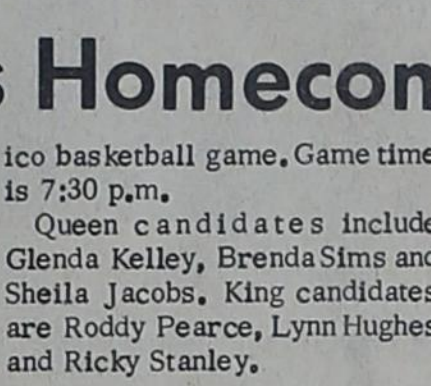

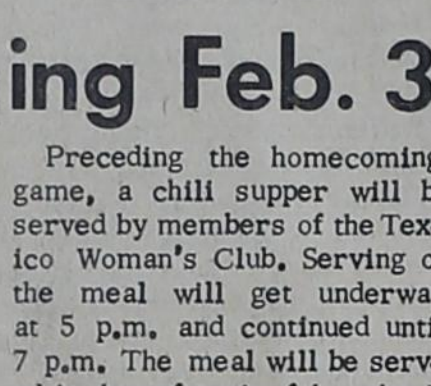

Sugar Beet Harvest Nears Completion

It is estimated by Richard Hunfaker, manager of the Clovis Sugar Beet Receiving Station, that the best sugar beet crop ever harvested in the area will be completed by end of this week.

First beets were received at the Clovis station on Oct. 9, with beets received daily at both the Clovis and Bovina stations since that time. Beets received at the stations are shipped to Hereford for processing. It has been estimated that some 6500 to 6700 tons of sugar beets are processed daily at the Hereford plant, with many of the

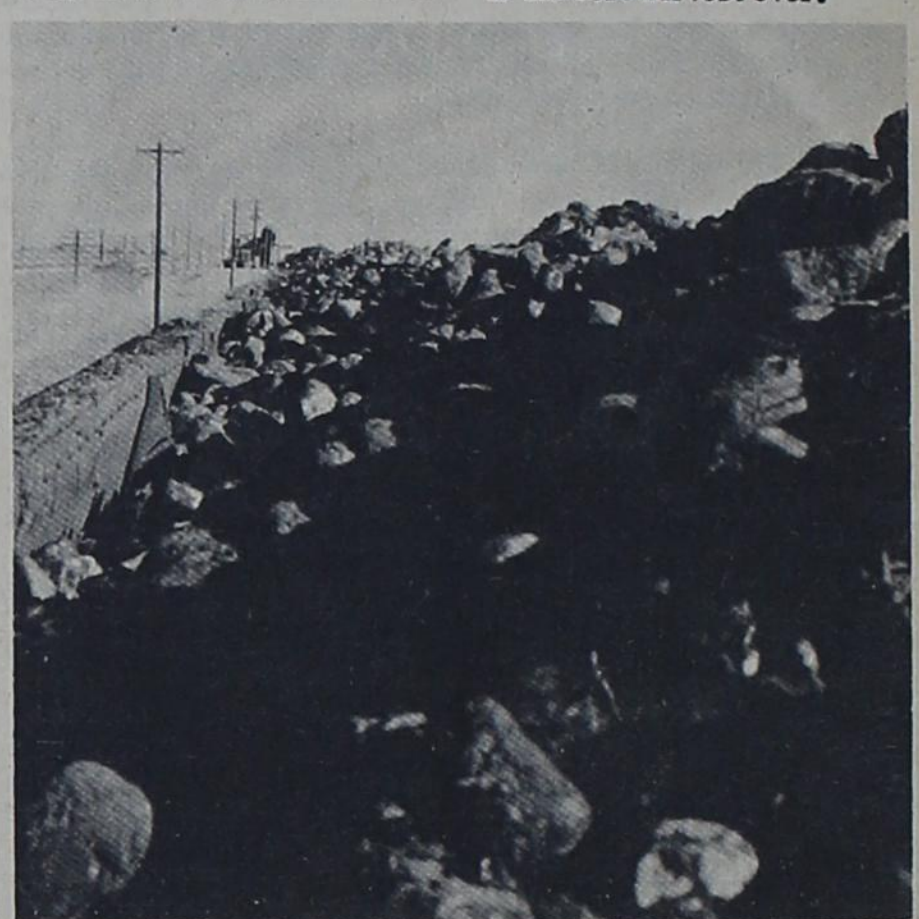
beets coming from Parmer, Curry, and Deaf Smith Counties.

Hunfaker stated that the sugar beet crop this year (1967) has been the best ever, with good weather conditions and knowledge gained by the farmers in previous years, adding to the fine crop in the area. "Experience is the best teacher and as farmers learn more about the growing process of sugar beets, the better their crops are" he said.

Most of the beets in the area have averaged around 25 1/2 tons per acre with a 15 plus

sugar content, much above that of last year. Hunfaker blames the disease which hit the beets in 1966 for the poor harvest of last year but adds that much has been done to eliminate that di-

sease. "Farmers are learning more about raising the beets each year," he said. Sugar beets have been raised in the area each year since 1964 and this is the best harvest ever.



Long lines of railroad cars loaded with sugar beets waiting for transfer to the sugar beet plant at Hereford have been a familiar sight at the sugar beet dump at Bovina and also near Clovis since harvest began early in October. Harvest of the "sweetener" is expected to be completed in the area this week.

Representative Clayton Seeks Re-Election

State Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake announced Monday his candidacy for re-election to the office of State Representative, District 72 consisting of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb and Parmer Counties.

Clayton has received many honors while serving this District as State Representative. He was one of the few men in Texas History to become a Chairman of a Committee during his first term. In the past five years, Clayton has been Chairman of four Committees, two of which were Water Committees. It is reported by the Speaker of the House, Ben Barnes, and other key people that Clayton is probably the most knowledgeable man in the Texas House of Representatives on water and water related problems of the State.

This past year Clayton presented an award for outstanding service to the Citizens of Texas by the State Soil and Water Conservation Districts.

Clayton said, "In seeking re-election I feel we can play an important role in water development and water importation to this area of the State and I pledge my continued influence and efforts to that end. Your past support and influence have been greatly appreciated and we ask for your continued support in the coming election."

Clayton filed on the Democratic ticket for Primary Election to be held May 4, 1968.

Registration Deadline Is Jan. 31

Parmer County voters are warned that in order to vote in this year's elections they must apply for a voter's certificate by the end of this month, January 31.

Application for the certificates may be made by visiting the county tax assessor-collector's office in the Parmer County court house; the city hall in Bovina, the city hall, radio station, or Ehridge-Spring Agency in Friona.

This is the first year in which all voters are required to register. Prior to last year, a poll tax was levied to all tax payers in the state of Texas.

All persons who will attain their 21st birthday prior to the general election in November and who wish to vote must register before the deadline. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and runs through Feb. of 1969. Parmer County voters over 60 years of age are reminded of the new law which requires all voters to register. Previously those over 60 were not required to register.

As late as Monday of this week, only 2,534 persons in the county had registered to vote. It is hoped that at least 3,000 county residents will register before the Jan. 31 deadline.

Thomas Serving In Vietnam

All children who are six years old or before Sept 1, 1968 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census.
