

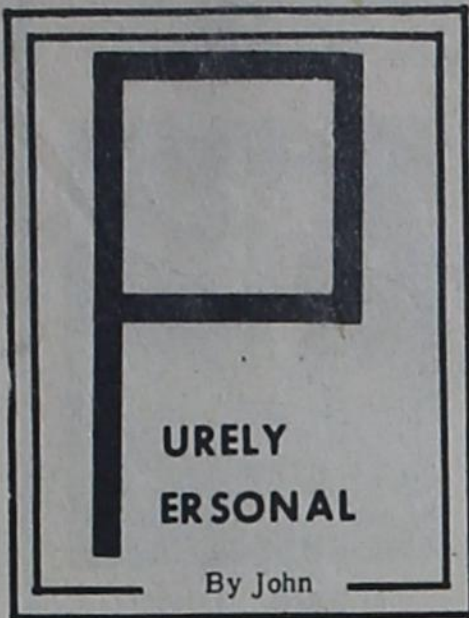

Tentative Schedule For Border Town Days Told

At a meeting of the Border Town Days planning committee on Tuesday night tentative plans were made for a schedule of events for the three-day celebration.

Kicking off the celebration will be a gigantic parade at 4 p.m. on Thursday, August 1. The parade will form in the area north of highway 60 and west of the Pleasant Hill highway (FM 108) in Texico (near the Burger Barn) at 3 p.m. It will move through both towns and disband at the rodeo arena, in east Farwell.

Participating in the parade will be floats from business firms and clubs in the Twin Cities, the Drum and Bugle Corps from Clovis an Antique Car Club from Portales, all queen contestants, and various bands, etc. Parade marshal is Fred Chandler, assisted by Mitz Walling and Delbert Garner.

Business firms or individuals who wish to rent or purchase a banner for their business to display during the celebration should contact Pat Patrick before July 20, in order that the banners and pennants may be obtained.

Banners and pennants will be put up on main street, around the city park and at the rodeo arena by the Farwell Firemen. These are being supplied by the Chamber of Commerce.

Each evening during the celebration all queen contestants will ride into the rodeo arena and be introduced at 7:45 p.m. prior to the grand entry; and on the final night, after the grand entry, the queen will be crowned and gifts presented. Queen contestants will also be introduced and interviewed at the barbecue set for Saturday afternoon, August 3, 4-7 p.m. at the Farwell City Park. Henry and Adolph Haseloff assisted by the ladies from the Farwell school cafeteria will prepare the barbecue which will be served by the Quarterhorse club. The meal will be \$1.00 per plate.

Tentative plans call for a golf tournament to be held at the Farwell Country Club, beginning at 8:30 a.m. on Saturday, Aug. 3. On Saturday afternoon at 1 p.m. the Lions club will sponsor a Trap Shoot, at the trap north of town.

Also on the agenda beginning at the park at 1 p.m. is a cow calling contest, whittlers contest, country crooners, Minnie Pearl hat contest, and various other events. The Chamber of Commerce will give a \$5,000 prize to the winner of each contest and they will also present a \$5,000 prize for the best parade float.

Charlie Phillips and Ed Hard-

age will provide music for the afternoon festivities on Saturday.

All Twin Cities residents are urged to wear Western attire during the celebration. Also, announcement is made that the Hager Sign Co. of Clovis will be available to paint signs for business firms, beginning on the Monday (July 29) prior to the beginning of the celebration.

Gubernatorial Candidate --

Paul Eggers To Visit Farwell

Paul Eggers, Republican candidate for governor, will visit Farwell Wednesday, July 17, as part of a campaign bus tour through the Panhandle.

Eggers is expected to be in Farwell 12:45 to 1 p.m. His bus will park at Holiday Store parking lot and then the group will go to the community room of Security State Bank where coffee will be served. Every-

one is urged to attend this reception.

"I'm looking forward to meeting people in all walks of life and discussing with them the major problems that confront our state," Eggers said.

The GOP candidate is a 49-year-old tax attorney who has practiced law in Wichita Falls since graduation from the University of Texas School of Law

in 1948. He is chairman of the Taxation Section of the State Bar of Texas and a member of the American Bar Association.

In 1966 he received a Sports Illustrated Silver Anniversary Award for former athletes who have achieved successful careers in their chosen field. Eggers served during World War II in the Air Corps and was honorably discharged with the rank of major.

The Episcopal Diocese of Dallas selected Eggers 1968 Layman of the Year. He is the son of a minister and is a past director of the Wichita Falls YMCA.

"I believe," Eggers said, "Texans want to elect a governor this year who will provide vigorous, responsible leadership. This is what we need to develop the potential of this state."

He and his wife, Frances, have a son, Steven, 10.

PRESIDENT JOHNSON has recommended that the voting age be lowered to 18. Would this help the Democratic Party?

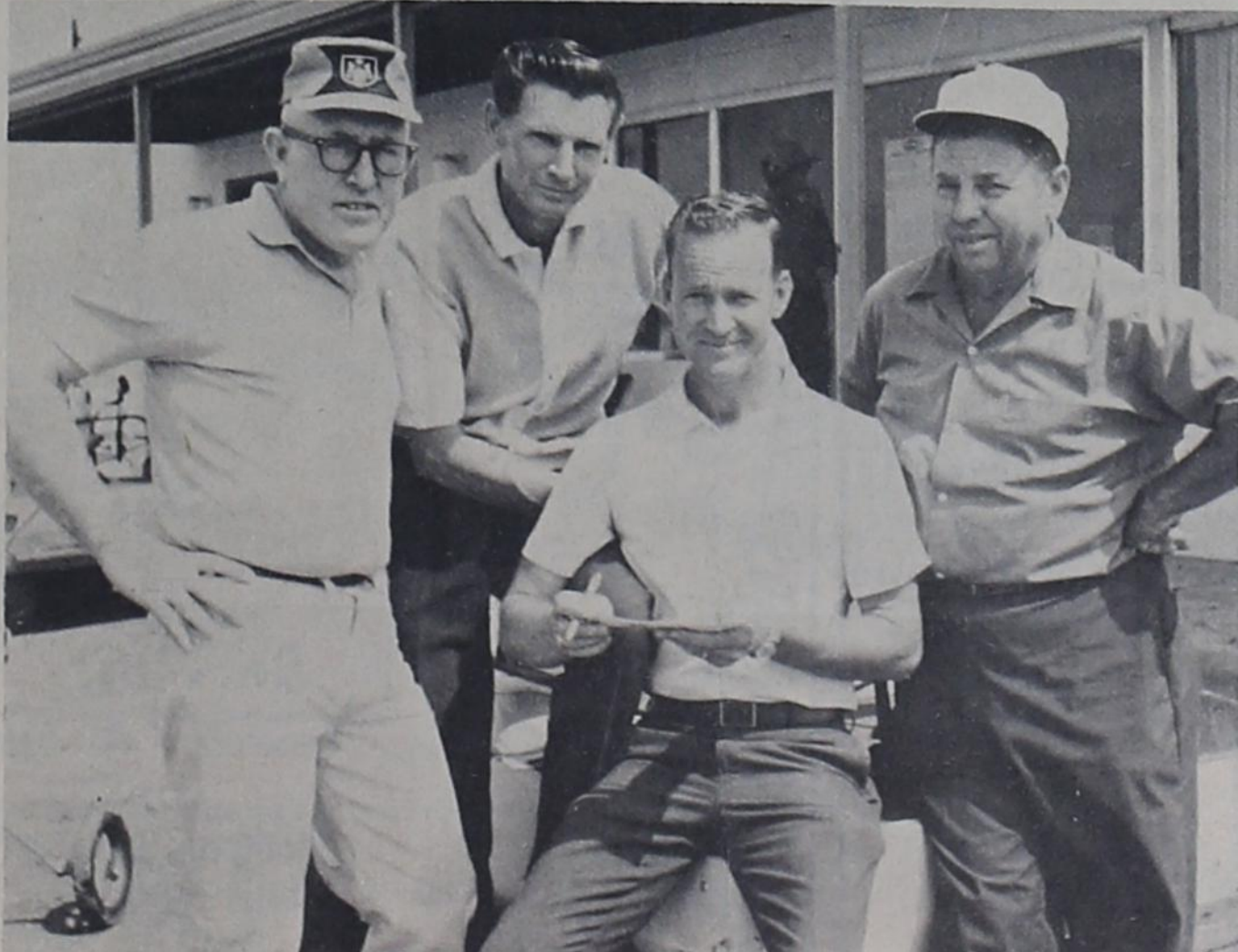
Just temporarily. In a few years those kids would be old enough to start paying taxes.



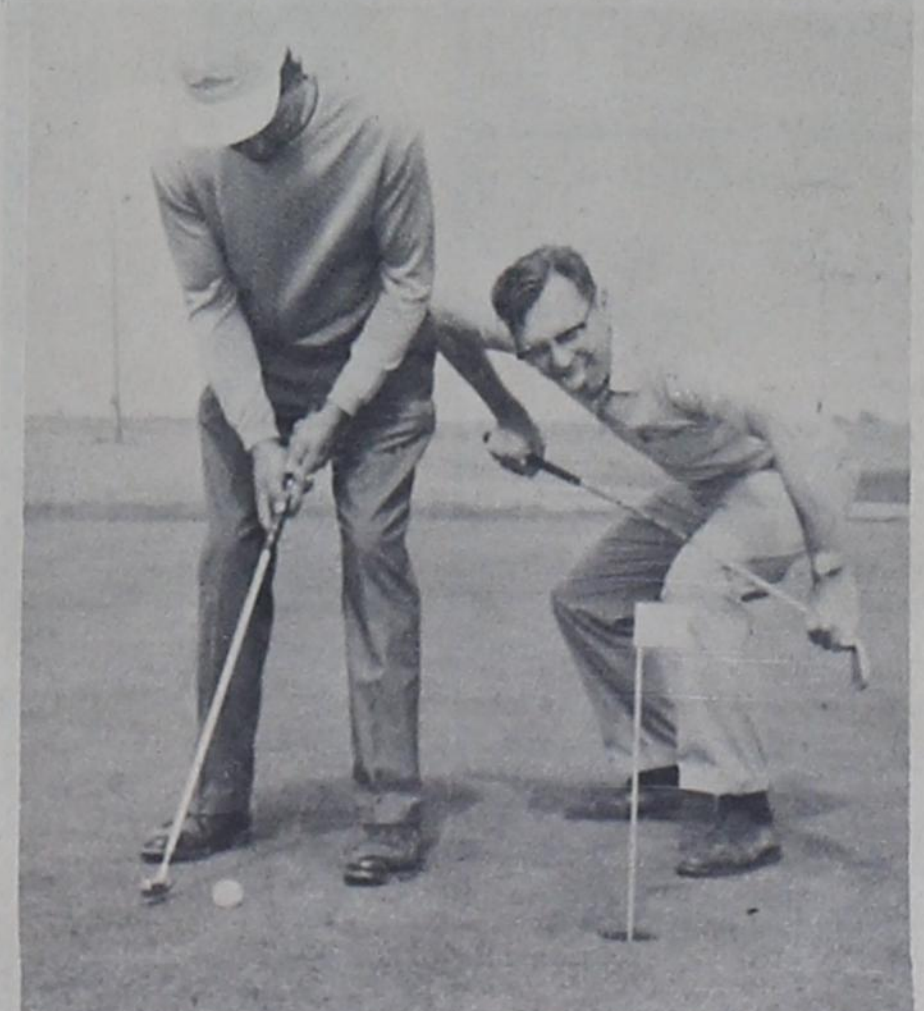

Dear Mr. Getz:
Your editorial in last week's Tribune entitled "Tourists, Watch Out" has disturbed me considerably. In three different places in the article you mention "overzealous enforce-

ment" "too technical enforcement" and "undue and over-strict enforcement" of traffic laws. Surely anyone familiar with the traffic situation in Texico realizes the great volume of traffic that passes through the town; and any pedestrian who has tried to go from the north side of the street to the south (or vice versa) surely realizes that he is literally taking his life into his own hands. You mention in two different places "unsuspecting motorists". It is my contention that if the motorist is observing the posted speed limit (50 MPH, decreasing to 30 MPH just be-

fore "downtown"), that he could travel through town with a clear conscience, without having to watch his rear view mirror to see if a "cop" were following. I feel that I understand the point you were trying to make--that is, that if a motorist is travelling 32 miles an hour, he shouldn't be fined for it. But where is the cut-off point above which he should be cited into court? Should we raise the speed limit to 40? Then what about those who are going 42? Etc. etc. Webster defines the word "limit" as "the utmost extent; the maximum amount, quantity, or number". So if those responsible for setting the limits say it should be 30, and then signs are posted stating "Speed Limit 30", shouldn't that be the maximum legal speed?

You mentioned "profitable tourist revenue", another term with which I feel the need to disagree. Of the average 5,850 cars that pass through Texico every 24 hours, I would venture to guess that less than one-half of one per cent of them ever stop. As you pointed out, you believe that traffic laws should be enforced -- my only quarrel with you is that I believe they should be enforced to the letter in this particular situation. I occasionally let my children cross the highway to do some errand or other, but it is always with trepidation and a sense of relief when they get back home safely. Thank you, Mr. Getz, for

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letting me "say my piece," and may I point out that this letter is not in defense of any persons or personalities, but rather my own personal feeling about the traffic situation here in Texico after having lived here for several years.

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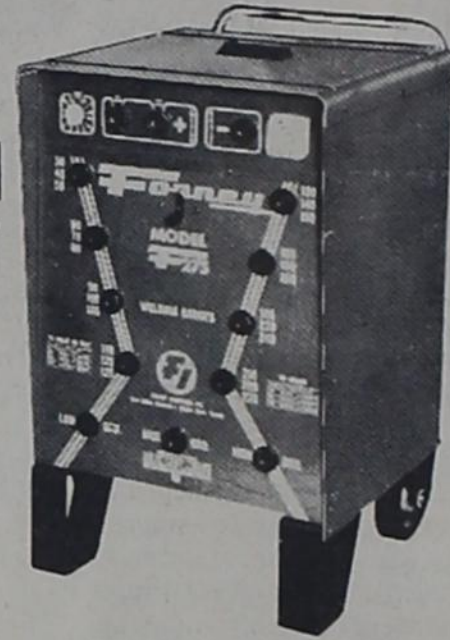

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NURSERY NEWS

We are often amazed at the timetable of nature. This past week we saw the appearance of the locust or cicada. In a day or two, the cicada killer showed up for the rest of the season. We can go into a lot of detail as to how this just happened or we can just accept the fact that it was planned that way. The cicada killer is that large, wasp-like, vicious looking insect that is brown and orange or yellow in color. Some will swear that they will eat a person alive, but to the best of our knowledge they won't harm you. Of course, they may scare a person into harming himself, but we know of none that has actually been bitten by one. Vicious as they may look, they are a friend in that they are a definite help in the control of the locust or cicada.

A trip to the encyclopedia will tell us that this insect is not a native of this area and it might well be a good thing that they like some plants we know, cannot read this same book. Then, too, it might be just another fact of nature that they can adapt to a varied set of conditions if the need should arise.

A lady called the other day to say that her tree started wilting after the locust had shed a number of skins on the limbs and wondered what to do. The root system of a tree catches a lot of damage that we don't see and which doesn't show up until the afternoons get rather warm as they were last week. The damage the locust or cicada did was to the root system -- not to the top of the tree. The grub of the locust had two years to eat and feed on the roots and had cut so many of them that the damage really showed up when the air temperature reached 100 degrees or better. 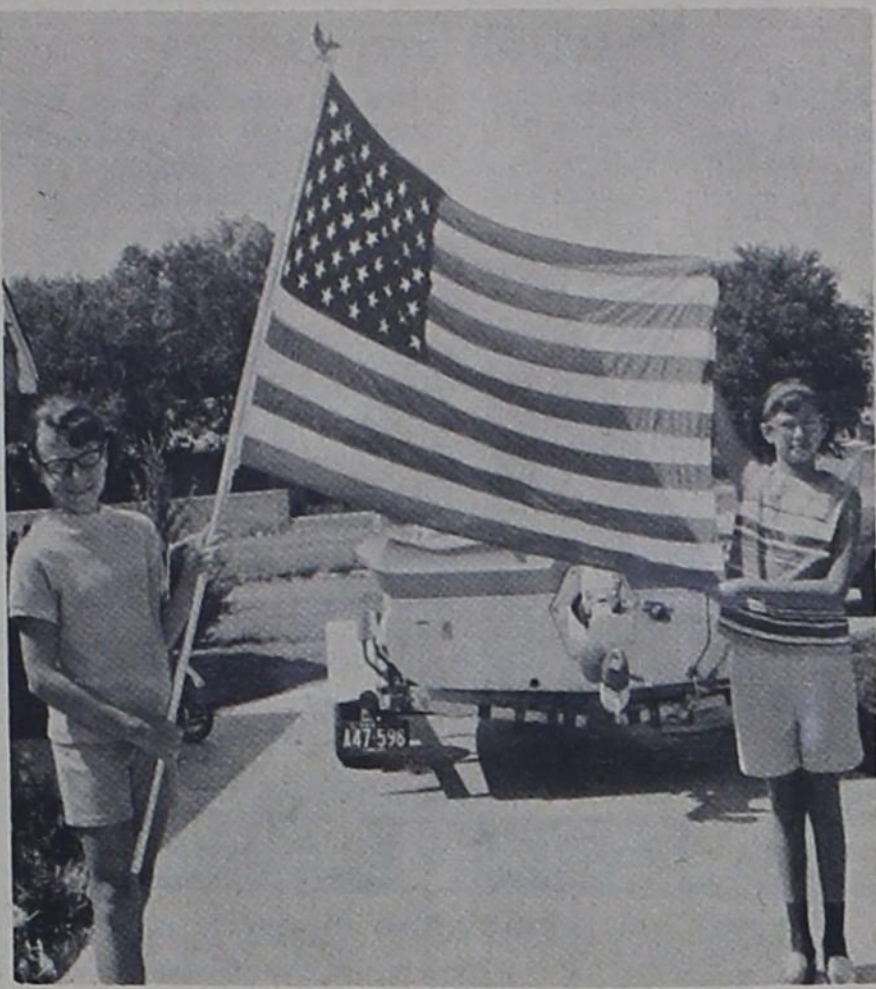
School Hires Teachers, Secretary



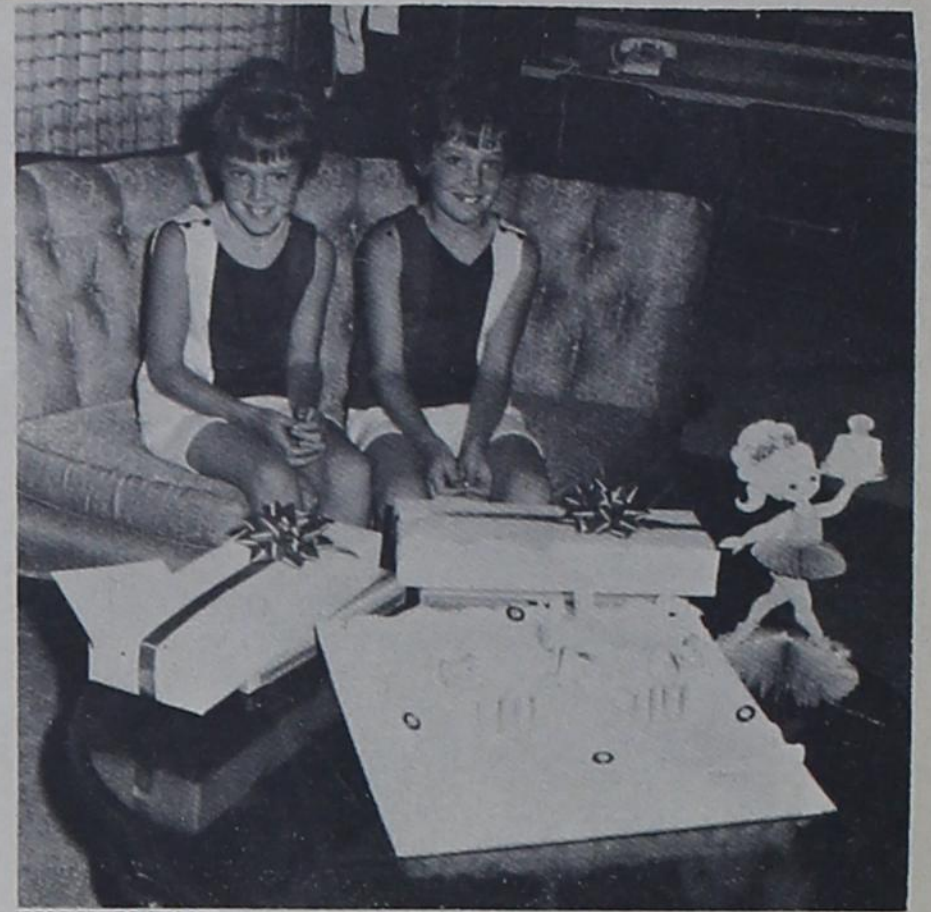
