In the past, we have commented on the Texas Farm Bureau "Facts for You" publication. Again, we will mention several articles appearing in the latest edition. The first piece of news that caught our attention was the article on activities of the National Council of Churches in encouraging support for legislation to extend the National Labor Relations Act to agricultural employees.

The article notes that headquarters of the organization for promoting agricultural labor legislation is in the Methodist Building in Washington, D.C., and also notes that there are two Methodists, among other denomination representatives, on the board. The article closes with the remark that this is another case where many church members' money is being used in direct opposition to their interest and desires without their consent. We do find many instances of where national church officers work at direct variance with our local sentiments.

We think that this action of many church leaders is causing church funds to become more scarce. This drying up of local funds seems to bother them not, as they manage to get a tidy tax tidbit whenever it is needed. We wonder about the professed attitude of many leaders when they loudly proclaim the separateness of church and state.

The second article brings this point out quite clearly, as it lists 81 Texas colleges and universities that are recipients of over \$7 million in special funds to assist students. A look at the list reveals several religious or denominational schools as recipients of these federal funds. So it is easy to ask the question, "Why is saying a simple prayer a violation of the first amendment, when the using of federal (taxpayers' money) funds to directly aid denominational school students is not?" Well of course it isn't, but this is just another example of law "as determined by administrators" as opposed to the equal application of law to ALL citizens.

The moral of these two articles is that the poor old citizen in the long run has very little to say how his hard earned money is to be spent. If he gives it away, it can be spent contrary to his beliefs and wishes; and if he lets it be taxed away, it goes down the same drain. The "do gooders" have won the battle.

An opportunity is now at hand to donate a little money locally and be reasonably sure your money will be spent in a manner calculated to be of direct benefit to you locally. The Farwell Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture will soon stage its annual membership campaign. This year we expect to double our last year's totals. This will take the cooperation of all business and farming interests in the area. Not an impossible goal but one that will be challenging. More on this program at a later date.

Indian John Crim Reads Signs --

Good Crops Indicated

"This will be the best crop year since 1941," stated J. W. "Indian John" Crim who has been making his annual weather forecast at the Crim farm for the past 44 years, as he reads signs from a ceremonial fire which is lighted each March 22 at sunrise.

As the smoke began to rise skyward Indian John said, "Those irrigation wells will get more rest than they have had in the past 18 years and this year's crop will be in the category with those of 1913, 1931, 1941, and 1947." Crops were only fair in 1961 and 1962.

At sunrise this year, the wind was from the north-northeast which according to legend is "tops for crops". Along with the moisture prediction, Crim also forecast "wind". However he saw nothing in the signs to indicate heavy storms or excessive amounts of hail. "All in all," he concluded, "it will be a pretty good year!"

Approximately 35 friends, family members, and newsmen were in attendance at the ceremonial fire and sign reading to lend an ear to what Indian John had to say about the crop and weather forecast, as they have been for the past several years since knowledge of the annual ceremony first became public.

Indian John was taught the reading of smoke signals by his father, who learned from the Indians themselves. Legend has it that a tepee shaped fire, burning at sunrise on March 22, will give signals of a good or bad crop year in wind direction and the way the smoke carries. If the wind is from the north or northeast and carries the smoke south or southwest, the crop will be average, but wind from the west, southwest or south

Outstanding girl's basketball player award was presented to Nelda Winegeart by Coach Gano Wilson, and the principal's

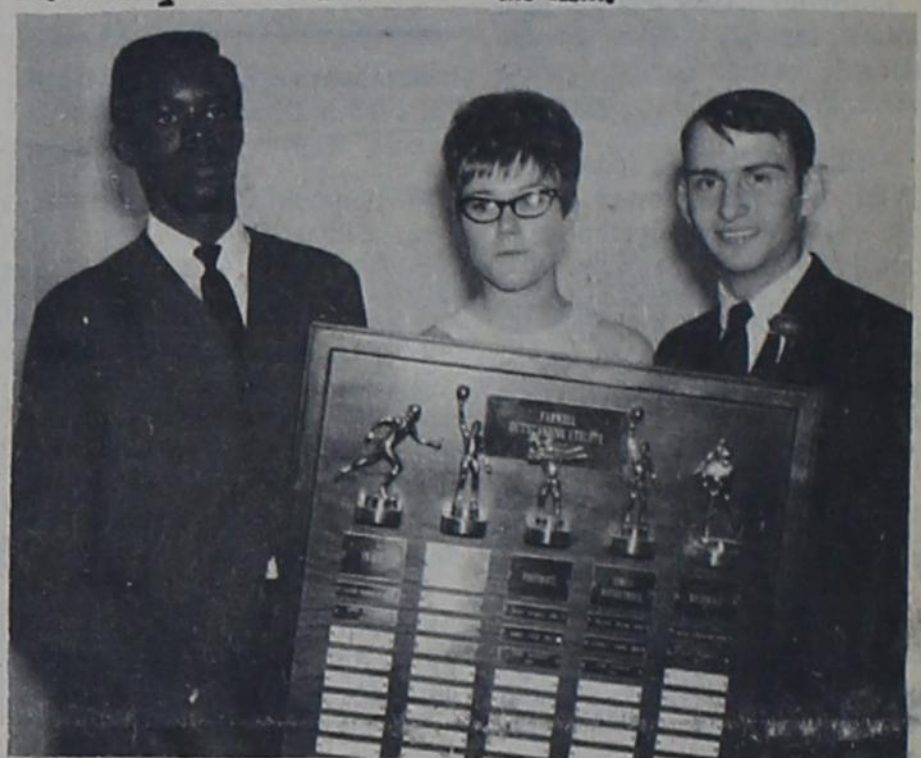

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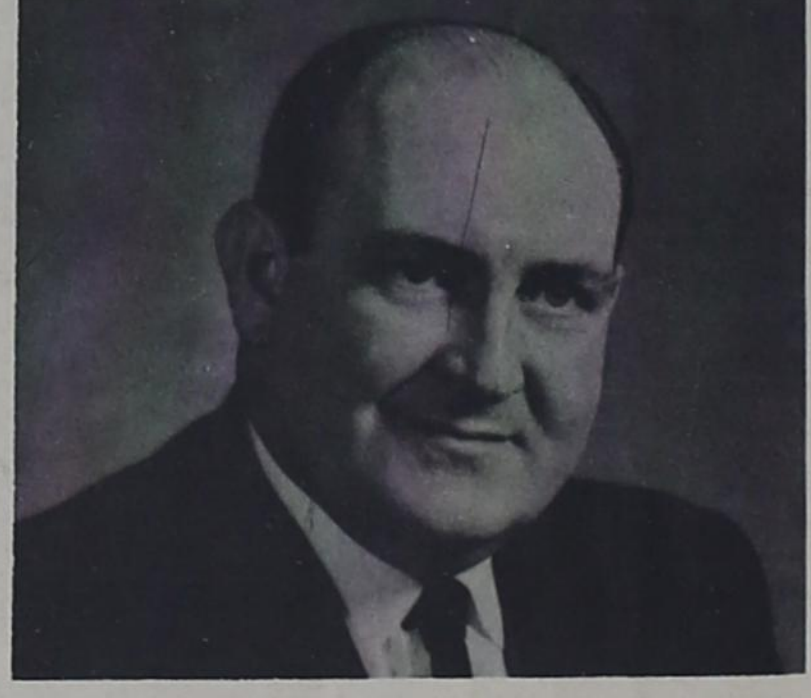

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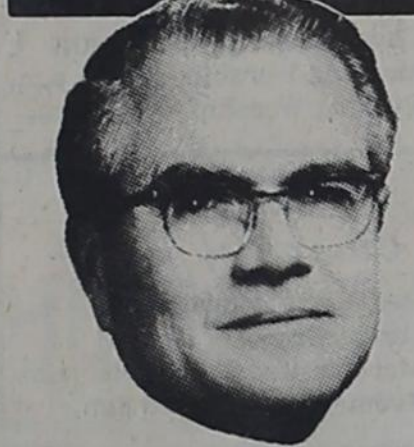
