

Monday morning was quite a morning for politics. Folks that ordinarily aren't much for political "gab" had some sort of speculation on the President's withdrawal statement. To say the least, the country was shocked and many people were certainly dismayed at his statement. As a political announcement, this was certainly the "big bomb" of the century.

As a political prognosticator, we will adopt a wait and see attitude. The enormity of this well-kept secret is evidenced by the fact that, as we write this, almost 24 hours have elapsed and we have not heard of a TV special or a pundit panel being convened to let the common man in on the thinking of the experts. And THAT is extraordinary.

We noted the interview with Representative Wright Patman following the President's speech. This was a sorry spectacle in our estimation. Rep. Patman literally bled for the Administration's legislative program. He prated on and on about the evils of inflation and Farwell School -how the only answer to the inflation problem was for the government to siphon off the excess purchasing power of the public by a raise in taxes. The "typical politician" said nothing about the possibility that by curtailing government spending, the excess money in circulation could be reduced. The spending policies of the government and its agencies are the biggest source of money in our economy. To reduce the flow of money would take only a few simple acts of economy on the part of congress. But, here was a "peerless leader" of the "peeple" whose only thought was RAISE TAXES rather than health and physical fitness. Stu-CUT SPENDING.

This year 1968 is barely three months old and already it has produced more surprises than a near-sighted gentleman wandering into the ladies rest room.

First, everybody was sure George Romney would fight all the way for the Republican nomination - he didn't. Second, it was certain that Eugene McCarthy would not get more than 10 per cent of the New Hampshire vote - he did. Third, Robert Kennedy would surely support McCarthy's candidacy - he didn't. Fourth. Nelson Rockefeller would, without a doubt, toss his hat into the ring - he didn't either. Last, but certainly not least, the old politician, Lyndon Johnson, would never voluntarily give up another term in the White House - he did.

All in all, it has been a year calculated to intensify the inherent ulcers of all political prognosticators. Just as sure as one of the crystal ball gazers wandered out on the limb, he found that the seemingly sturdy branch was but a weakened twig, and more often than not, wound up on his head.




If there is any one thing that has been on farmer's minds for the past 50 years it is a cotton with a good turnout, and this is certainly emphasized when a farmer has to take 3,000 lbs, of stripped cotton to the gin to make a bale in the fall of the year. Likewise, he also wants a high production cotton along with that good turnout. But where will you find such a cotton? Our new Gregg 45 will meet all the requirements of high production and high turnout.

In 1965 the first year that there was a seed block of Gregg 45, Mr. Troy Pritchard of Plainview produced 90 running bales (avg. 505 lbs. compressed weight) produced from 38 acres of Gregg 45, and it took 695 lbs. seed to make a 500 lb. bale. The turnout was 26.5%. 1965 was a fair year for growing cotton, however, it did turn rather cool after the 15th of September.

In '66 some of his cotton made 2 bales to the acre, and in '67 the field of 58.8 acres that was left made 1,004 pounds lint to the acre, net weight after deducting bagging and ties.

In looking through some experimental tests in which the new Gregg 45 has been included we find one on the Plains in 1965 with 1189 lb. production; one in Oklahoma in '65 with 1,066 pounds, with a 31.1% turnout hand pulled; and one at Chickasha 1966 (dryland) with 777 lbs. This last mentioned is very impressive for dryland production.

# Waterways Help Control Erosion

By Jerry Isbell Several farmers in Parmer County have recently constructed waterways on their farms to stop erosion and control runoff water. Some of those that have recently completed their waterways include Joe Jones and John Aldridge of Farwell, Dean McCallum of Bovina, V. M. Ferguson and O. T. Patterson of Friona.

During heavy rains, more water falls on nearly all cropland than can be held by the best crop rotations, strip cropping, or even terraces. This water will run off through some kind of waterway. Unless a safe waterway is provided, it will probably cut a gully. Usually it is easier and cheaper to use a natural depression for a grassed waterway to carry the water soon as possible. It will be away safely. However, in Par- easy when the damage is small, mer County this is impossible but each rain increases the becauseof irrigation. The waterway is usually built along the it back. side of the field that has the drainage problem.

Any grassed waterway that is to carry extra water safely safely must be designed to take care of large rains. Its grass cover must be dense enough to keep water from running on bare slopes, and it must be kept in good condition year after year. If properly built and main-

tained, a waterway will pay its own way in added income. Many are handled as pasture and grazed by livestock. Some are bailed for hay. All of the waterways can be pastured at certain times of the year. Pasturing, if properly managed, has the added advantage of improving the sod.

After the waterway has been shaped, preparing a good seedbed is the key to getting a good stand of grass in the waterway. Young plants must have a firm soil for their roots if they are to live through periods of unfavorable growing conditions. #### PUFFED EASTER BASKETS

#### Makes 8 baskets

7.1/2 cups puffed rice 3-1/2 cups miniature marshmallows 1/4 cup butter or margarine

1 teaspoon lemon extract

For baskets, heat puffed rice in shallow baking pan in preheated moderate oven (350°F.) about 10 minutes. Pour into large greased bowl. Melt marshmallows and butter in top of double boiler over hot water, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon extract.


Pour over puffed rice, stirring until evenly coated. With greased hands, press puffed rice mixture to line well-greased 6-oz. custard cups. Bend 8 pipe cleaners to form handles. Insert ends into baskets. Press puffed rice mixture firmly around ends of pipe cleaners. (If mixture hardens before shaping is complete, place in moderate oven to soften for a few minutes.)

Cool thoroughly, about 2 hours. Gently lift baskets out of custard cups with small metal spatula or knife.

For grass, place coconut, water and food coloring in a jar Cover and shake vigorously. Spread on absorbent paper to dry. When dry, fill baskets with coconut and lemon drops. Attach a name card to the handle of each basket with cellophane tape, if desired.
