## Wolverines Down Melrose; Lose Homecoming Game

High spirit and numerous recognitions during the evening failed to boost the Texico Wolverines to a victory last Saturday night as they dropped a crucial homecoming game to Tatum, 67-58.

Special activities during the evening included crowning the 1974 homecoming king and queen, Craig Chumley and Linda Autrey. Other contestants were Diane Luce and Regina Kelley and Dwayne Kelley and Steve Harrington.

Crownbearers for the ceremony were Steve Smith, six, son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Smith, and Karen Snodgrass, six, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Snodgrass.

Also recognized was B. A. Rogers, a 1914 graduate of Texico High School; the 1973 graduating class for having the largest representative number at homecoming; and several other recognitions during the evening.

The Texico Wolverine Varsity and JV teams downed the Melrose Buffalo teams Friday night at Melrose.

The B team controlled the Melrose team through most of the game to come out on top, 32-25.

The Varsity squad won their game over Melrose 67-57 after being tied up with the Buffaloes at the end of the third quarter, 44-44.

"We looked good at times with the fast break, but we just couldn't get it going like we were capable of doing," com-

mented Coach Darryl Haley. Steve Harrington was high point man with 16 points, Dusty Leatherwood had 14 points. Also Craig Chumley and Curtis Lindley each had 11 points.

"Leatherwood and Chumley played a real fine game against Melrose," added Coach Haley.

Terry Christesson was high point man for the Buffaloes with 14 points.

Saturday night, the Wolverines hosted the Tatum Coyotes in a very important district game for second place.

"We played a 'sparkling' first half as we had a ten-point lead, 37-27," stated Coach Haley.

"But we got completely cold in the third quarter, as Tatum scored 21 points to our 8 points, to take the lead 50-45," added the coach.

In the fourth quarter, Tatum retained the lead to stop the Wolverines in the district contest, 67-58.

Coach Haley added, "Tatum beat us at the free throw line as they had 25 points to Texico's 12 free throw points."

Curtis Lindley was high point man for Texico with 13 points. Roger Pace had 12 points and Craig Chumley had 11.

Tatum's high point man was Rick Huckabee who scored 28 points.

Texico B team outscored the Tatum JV by a score of 32-31 in

a "very close game" stated Coach Haley. The Wolverine Varsity District record now stands at three wins and two losses.

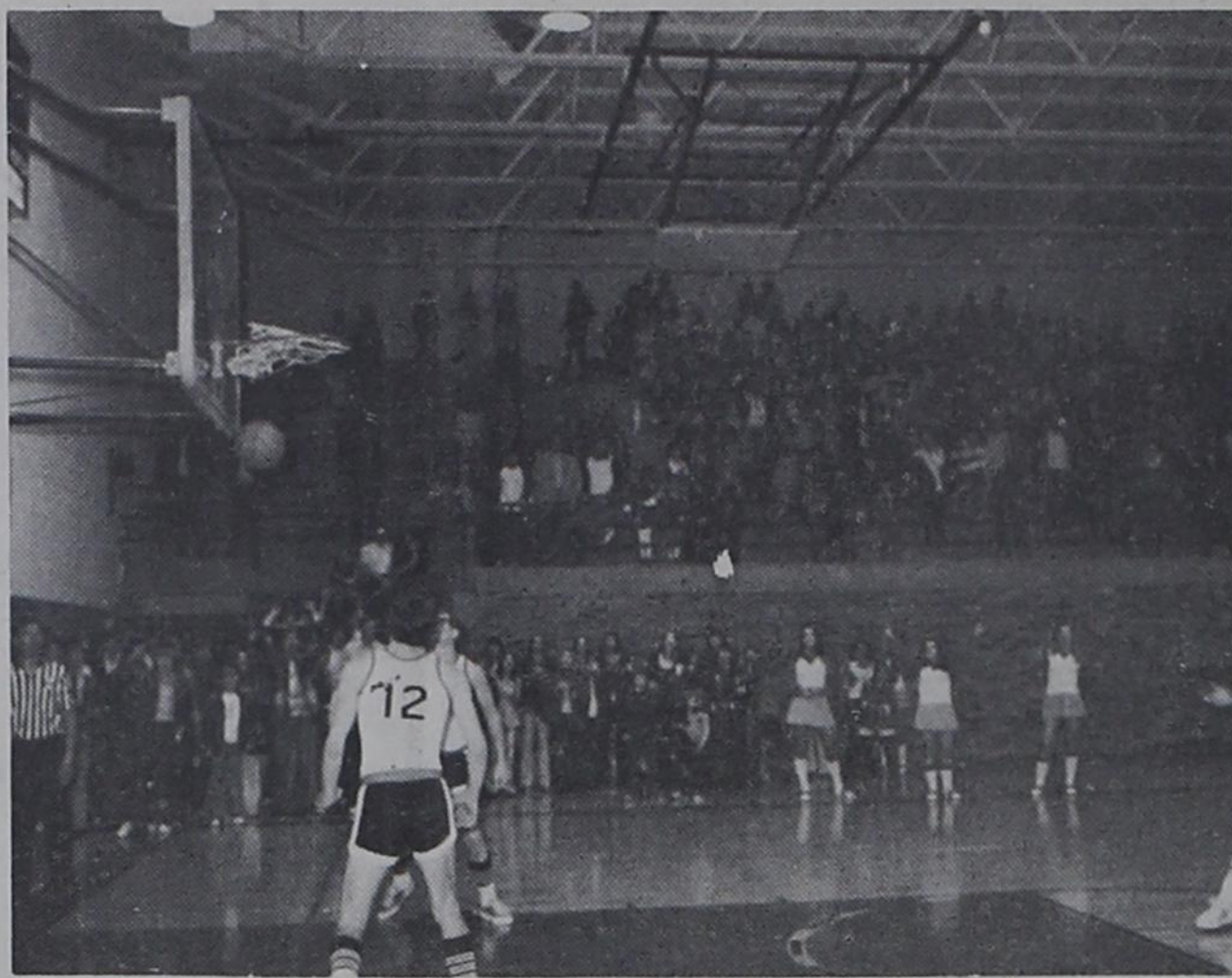
Friday and Saturday night the Wolverines will face two more District foes.

Friday night (tonight) the Wolverines will be at Floyd to meet the tough Bronco team for the second time this season. In their first encounter, Floyd outscored the Wolverines, 84-53. "Floyd has a 19-0 season record, so we're going to have to play some keen basketball," stated Coach Haley.

Saturday night Texico will take on Elida at Wolverine Gymnasium.

Elida will be a very tough team to beat as they now stand in District with a 4-1 record.

The games will get underway at 7:30 p.m. MDT.

## B-Team Steers Win Second In District

"We have had a better season than I anticipated at first because of inexperience of this young team at the beginning of the year," commented Coach Don Alana of his second place winners, the B team Steers.

"As far as improving goes," he added, "they improved probably more than last year's team that won district."

Excluding tournament games, the B team ended the season with a 9-7 season record, and 6-4 in district action, taking second place in the district.

On January 29, the B Steers downed Kress 66-44 with Clint Robertson having high score honors with 22 points, followed by Billy Roberts, 17 and Gerald Hardage, 10. High rebounder was Clint with 18, while Billy had 16 rebounds.

Against Sudan in the next to final game for the season, the B Steers downed the Sudan

team 45-40 with Ruben Castillo having high points with 14, followed by Billy Roberts, 12 and Mike Goetsch, 10.

The final game of the season, against Vega, was cancelled due to illness to most of the team.

High scorer for the 1973-74 basketball season for the B team Steers was Billy Roberts, who had 209 points. He was also high rebounder with 264. In second place in scoring and rebounds was Clint Robertson, who had 175 points and 247 rebounds. Gerald Hardage was third place scorer with 138 points. He had 73 rebounds.

Other team members include Ruben Castillo, Mike Goetsch, Travis Bibbs, Ron Hancock and Chip Craft.

## Parmer Co. Ranks First In Barley Production

He said barley production in this county had drastically increased from 34,600 bushels in 1972 to a record 478,500 bushels in 1973. This was an increase of 443,900 bushels.

Farmers averaged 74.8 bushels per acre from 6,400 acres of barely harvested. The average yield per acre in 1972 had been 43.3 bushels.

"Barley is a significant

crop, and we are proud that Texas ranks in the top twenty barley producing states," added White.

In 1973, Texas produced 3,510,000 bushels of barley compared to a total production of 1,980,000 bushels in 1972.

Parmer County also ranked in the top ten counties in the production of winter wheat. The total yield was 3,564,000 bushels with an average of 40.8 bushels per acre. Texas ranked sixth in total wheat production.

According to an announcement late last week by Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White, Parmer County was the state's leading producer of barley for 1973.

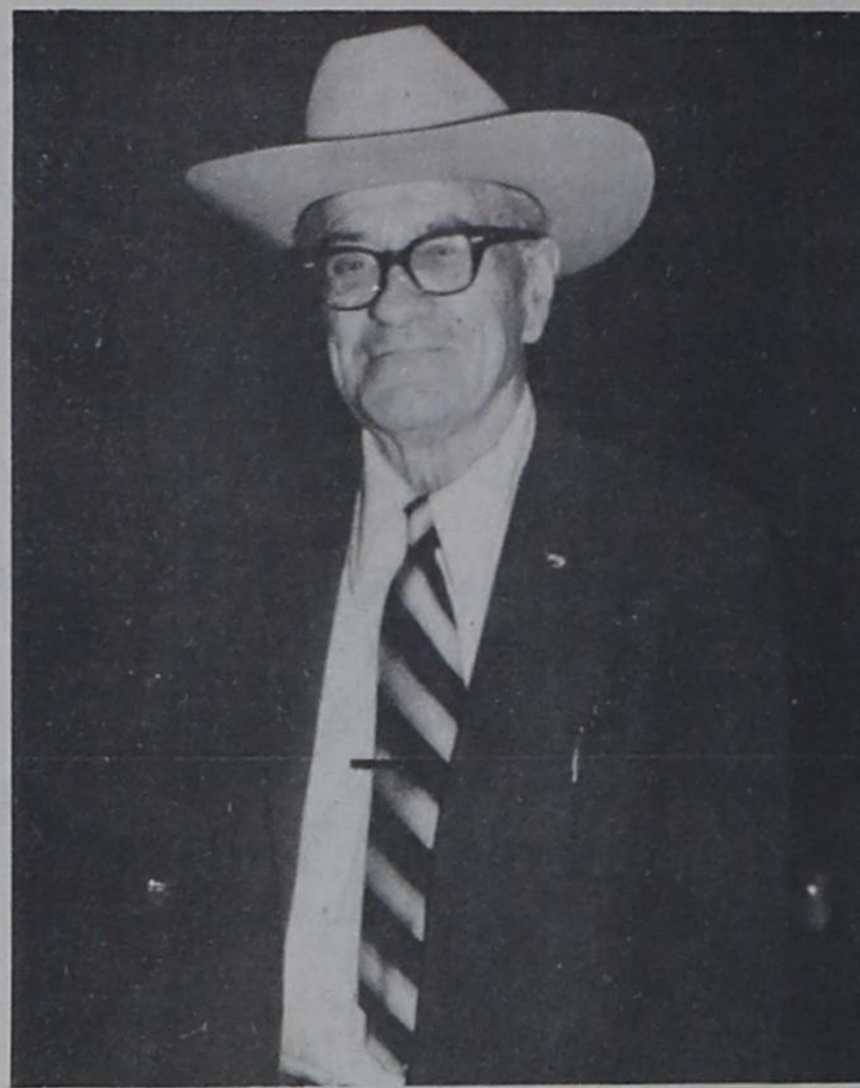

**Junior Livestock Show Set To Begin Thursday**

The 26th annual Parmer County Junior Livestock Show will be Thursday, Friday and Saturday of this week in Friona. The event will take place in the new community center and show barn, which has just been completed in time for this year's show. The new complex is located just north of Highway 60 and west of Highway 214 in Friona.

By having the new show barn, the show's schedule has been changed to include judging of all three divisions of the show - barrows, sheep and steers - the same day, which will be on Friday.

The steers, which have been shown on Saturday morning in the past, will be shown Friday evening beginning at 7 o'clock. All of the judging will take place inside the new show barn, which features a complete heating system and bleacher seats for everyone who desires to attend the show.

By moving the steer judging to Friday evening, main item on the agenda for Saturday will be the auction sale, which will begin at 1 p.m.

Friday's judging will have the barrows beginning at 8 a.m., the sheep at 1:30 p.m. and the steers at 7 p.m.

Harmon Boone, vocational agriculture instructor at Spearman, will judge the steers; L. M. Hargrave, agriculture education instructor at Texas Tech, will judge the barrows; and Ronnie Dennis, vo-ag instructor at Kress, will judge the sheep.

Some 302 animals are expected, say show officials. This is up 42 over last year's total of 260, an increase of 16 per cent.
