A source of much information to the news media in our area is the wide-awake West Texas Chamber of Commerce. They keep a sharp eye out for business activities on which to report and also function as a watchdog on state and national happenings that will affect the huge West Texas area.

We received a news release from them concerning the new proposed Federal budget of \$304.4 billion now before Congress. It points out that Texas' share of this astronomical amount would come to a figure of \$15.1 billion. It asks the question, "How much is \$15.1 billion?" and then gives an answer in terms of assets and business incomes in the State of Texas.

Here are a few of their mindboggling comparisons:

This much money would give every person in Texas nearly \$1,350.00 each.

If you owned ALL the railroads in Texas? Well, it would take the total net income from all the railroads in Texas, based on 1971 income, for the next 250 years to pay the \$15.1

Then, to consider that the Federal government is proposing to spend 20 times this amount, it is almost more than





Most trees are subject to damage from winter ice storms and freezing weather. But with careful pruning and good cultural practices, damaged plants will generally

The first step in caring for ice damaged trees is to survey the damage and plan corrective pruning. Remove damaged limbs at the point of origin or just above a good side branch. Do not allow stubs to remain unless absolutely ne-

When extremely severe damage makes it necessary to stub back a branch or main trunk, paint the wound with a good tree wound dressing available at any nursery or garden center. Orange shellac makes a good temporary dressing. Continual pruning and attention will be necessary to keep down sucker growth at the end of the stub

If a trunk or main branch has split due to ice accumulation, remove the portion of the trunk that has broken away. Cables and bolts may be used to pull the damaged trunk together, but unless done by a professional tree man, the results are seldom satisfac-

When a broken limb has pulled bark loose along the side of a trunk, smooth the torn area with a sharp knife or chisel and paint all exposed cuts with tree wound dressing.



They argue by and large, that man is inherently good, while overwhelming evidence bears witness that he is bad. Therefore human philosophy offers no salvation from sin and its just penalty. Only the Bible does this by "the gospel (good news) of the grace of God.'

In Paul's day the Greek philosophers condemned the uncivilized pagans for their open immorality and wickedness. But

while preaching virtue, these moralizers practiced vice, and God said: "Therefore thou art inexcusable, O man, whosoever thou art that judgest: for wherein thou judgest another, thou condemnest thyself; for thou that judgest doest the same things (Rom. 2:1).

It is the same today. Multitudes of self-righteous people are outwardly cultured and moral, but they forget that God looks upon the heart and sees hate as murder, jealousy as theft and lustful looks as adultery. He considers, not what we do, outwardly, but what we desire to do or wish we dared to do. He sees the desires and motives of the heart. But thank God, "Christ died

for sinners" - guilty sinners, and all who come to God by faith in Christ are "justified freely by His grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).
