Over the past several months, we have commented on the Governor's report for higher education and what it might mean to the smaller communities over the state of Texas. Do not be fooled, education in Texas is big business and it will take big taxes to pay for it.

Higher education is the largest industry in Texas today. Public colleges and universities alone have facilities valued at more than \$1 billion and they own more than 70,000 acres of land. If a person converted only the floor space in the facilities for higher education into farmland, he would have a 1,500 acre farm. There are presently 115 colleges and universities in Texas to accommodate a 1.3 million college-age population. Public senior colleges and universities alone employ 29,800 persons.

The student enrollment in this higher education system in Texas is already 165,000 more than the entire population of Texas was in 1843, the year the state's first permanent institution of higher learning was established.

The projected size of education will double in the next 12 years, with enrollment in public colleges and universities up 102 per cent and private institutions will grow 34 per cent for a total enrollment of 707,800 in 1980.

Also, the Texas College and University System Coordinating Board is recommending the establishment of 53 public junior college regions as a means of carrying out this program.

Thirty-four regions already have districts with at least one college. Two colleges exist in six districts. The rest have no community junior colleges, but do offer the possibility and potential for such a community junior college in the next 20 years.

This is the program about which folks in Parmer County have been battling with Hereford. It is obvious that the junior college plan is not laid to rest but will continue to be with us in the future.

This summary of the size of education in Texas is intended to impress upon us that probably the area of largest tax increases will be in the field of raising money for education. Heretofore, a person could grumble a little about school taxes, vote against a local bond issue or two, and put it out of his mind. This will not be so in the future. Taxes and taxes for education will be of major economic concern to all citizens. The pros and cons of educational taxation will have to be known and understood by the ordinary citizen if he is to keep the politicians and "pie in the sky" educators from taxing him into the poor house.

Of course, this thing of burying oneself in personal day to day activities and forgetting about the world about us in long gone. Economic survival is going to depend more and more on an informed electorate. There is going to have to be less boob tube viewing and more reading on current local, state and national issues.

The State Line Tribune as your local newspaper plans to continue to pass on information of this nature and to be an instrument of thought and action as well as a purveyor of local happenings.

Ronnie Wines Brings In Longest Tail Feather

Ronnie Wines of Bovina was recipient of the first place prize for the longest pheasant tail feather brought in during the recent contest held in Farwell. The feather brought in by Wines measured 25 7/8 inches. The prize-winning tail feather was on a bird killed on the J. R. Sewell place east of Farwell. Wines received a \$15 first place award from Security State Bank. Prentice Mills, father-in-law of young Wines, was recipient of the second place award on a 25 3/16 inch feather brought in from a bird killed on the Duane Herington place southeast of Farwell. Sherley-Anderson-Pitman was donor of the second place prize money.

Max Bush of Muleshoe was recipient of the third place prize of \$5.00 donated by Far-

well Hardware. The feather brought in by Bush measured 25 inches, one-eighth inch longer than the longest feather brought in in the Friona contest and one-half inch longer than the longest tail feather turned in at Bovina.

Phillip Weatherly turned in the longest tail feather at Friona to take top honors in that area while Charlie Flynn turned in the longest tail feather at Bovina.

Ronnie Wines will receive a trophy denoting him as the person bringing in the longest tail feather in the county from the Parmer County Game Protective Association.

A total of 31 feathers were turned in during the contest in Farwell.

Thursday night, the Blue and White played host to the Bovina Mustangs in the first round of play and sent them home smarting from an 81-41 shellacking. Dennis Ensor paced the Steers with 19 points followed by Kyle Sheets with 12 and Danny Prince with 10. Dean Stovall grabbed 11 rebounds to lead the Blue and White. Also making a good showing on the boards were Greg Meeks and Dennis Ensor with nine each. The Steers hit 40 per cent of their field goal attempts. Bruce Caldwell paced the Ponies with 14.



NURSERY NEWS

The New Year always brings a feeling of regret about leaving the old, while at the same time we extend a welcome to the new. It does more than just change a sheet on the calendar. Some calendars change at other dates; say April 1 or almost any other time that a person may choose. Old timers have said that, in the plant world, the sap starts up on the first day of January, regardless.

The New Year also brings about a resolve to profit by mistakes made in the past and plans to do better next time. Again, that is the basis of civilization itself; an accumulation of ideas, practices, knowledge and other factors. A beautiful yard did not just happen; often it is an accumulation of several factors.

Methods of today are so advanced that it is much easier to keep a good yard, garden or other endeavor than in the past. It has been said, and is entirely true, that you cannot change the nature of a plant. But, you can change the environment in such a manner that the plant will adapt to conditions that are not true to form. A more soluble plant food, better soil conditions, root stimulators, pre-emergence weed control and selective plant control are only a few of the things that we now take as commonplace that weren't known to gardeners of not so long ago.

The use of advanced chemicals, like other forms of knowledge, does not necessarily come free. Along with the privileges come quite a bit of responsibility -- the proper use of the chemicals involved. If used properly, they work wonders. Used carelessly or improperly will create havoc. Timing is of major importance also. If we now apply soil conditioners and dormant sprays and other items to get the plants cleaned up for the rest of the winter, we can then let the miracle of spring take over and it will also greatly reduce the problems of next summer as well.

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NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1969 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be married.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank, Phone 431-3682.
 2. Call in person at the School Office and get a census blank and fill it out.
- Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next Sept. 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

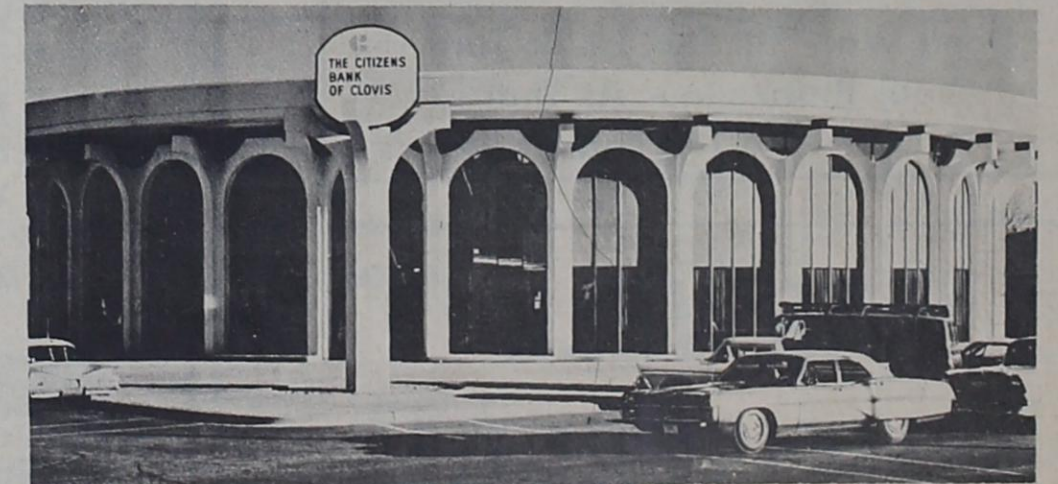
