This is the program about which folks in Parmer County have been battling with Hereford. It is obvious that the junior college plan is not laid to rest but will continue to be with us in the future.

This summary of the size of education in Texas is intended to impress upon us that probably the area of largest tax increases will be in the field of raising money for education. Heretofore, a person could grumble a little about school taxes, vote against a local bond issue or two, and put it out of his mind. This will not be so in the future. Taxes and taxes for education will be of major economic concern to all citizens. The pros and cons of educational taxation will have to be known and understood by the ordinary citizen if he is to keep the politicos and "pie in the sky" educators from taxing him into

the poor house. Of course, this thing of burying oneself in personal day to day activities and forgetting about the world about us in long gone. Economic survival is going to depend more and more on an informed electorate. There is going to have to be less boob tube viewing and more reading on current local, state and national issues.



NOTICE TO PARENTS Of School Age Children

CLOVIS

The school census is being taken during the month of January this year. All children who are six years old on or before Sept. 1, 1969 but will not be 18 or older on or before that same date should be counted in this census. It is very important that all children six to 18 years be counted in this census. The child should be counted even though he may not be in school and even though he or she may be merried.

If you, as a parent, have not received and filled out a school census blank on or before January 31 you are being overlooked and should do one of the following:

1. Phone the school office and ask for a census blank, Phone 431-3682. 2. Call in person at the School Office and get a census blank and fill it out.

Remember, if your child will be six years old next Sept. 1st, he should be counted in the census now, even though he is not in school now. If he is six but not 18 or older next Sept. 1 he should be counted now. All children from six to 18 should be counted. The six year olds who start next September to school are the ones most overlooked in the census. Failure to count them costs the school and taxpayers extra money. Please help us not to overlook anyone.

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

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
