

Another committee has been heard from; and to achieve its laudable aims, the public will have to ante up considerably more tax money. Recently Governor John Connally's blue-ribbon committee report, the study of Texas education, had been made public. This committee has recommended a monumental 10-year plan for improving Texas public schools that will triple costs and require a \$300,000,000.00 to \$400,000,000.00 tax bill next year.

This 15-member committee said this plan would live our schools out of "mediocrity" and "inefficiency". Altogether, the proposals of this Committee on Public School Education would increase local, state and federal school costs in Texas from \$840,000,000.00 to \$2,100,000,000.00 at the end of ten years. Under the plan, about 4% of the state's income would have to go to schools. Some \$503,000,000.00 more would be required, bulk from state sources, for 1970-71.

Some key recommendations include: Increasing basic allotments from \$23 to \$50 per pupil, plus additions for transportation, materials and vocational teachers.

Adding 16,000 teachers, even though enrollment may decrease slightly. This would provide a pupil-teacher ratio of 21 to 1 instead of 24 to 1. Increasing teacher pay from \$4,734 minimum to \$5,400 in 1969-70 and \$6,300 the following year. Maximum pay would go up from \$6,912 to \$8,800 by 1970-71, as covered by state guarantee.

Incorporation 17-step pay scale in 1971-72. This would provide \$3,000 for teacher aides and go up to \$28,567 for administrators.

Requiring districts were fewer than 2,600 average daily attendance in 12 grades to consolidate by June 1, 1972. Redistricting recommendations will be provided in six weeks, committee said.

Abolishing county school superintendents as terms expire. Creating free public kindergartens for five-year-olds by 1980, summer programs with priorities for the poor and free adult courses for those over 18 who have not finished high school.

Replacing 20 regional education service centers with fewer regional branch offices of Texas Education Agency.

Districting of the 21-member Board of Education to conform with 23 present congressional districts.

Establishing new program for 25,000 student teachers and for interns in school administration.

Setting up variety of teacher benefits including continuing contracts, professional consultation, teacher aides for every 100 students, and ten free hours a week for teachers to grade papers, plan lessons and study. Non-teachers would be used for routine supervisory duties in some cases.

These are the highlights of some sweeping and costly proposals that will be presented to our legislators in the near future. It is important for all citizens of Texas to acquaint themselves with all the ramifications of this program as it will soon affect the pocketbooks of all Texans, especially property owners. Do not wait until it is too late to present your views to your state legislators and to your Governor. Willy-nilly, vast and expensive changes are in the offing in Texas education.

Superintendent Roberts reports a total of 654 students, 191 of whom are in the high school division. Elementary enrollment is 297 and junior high enrollment numbers 166.

Band Boosters of Farwell School met in the band hall last Wednesday at which time a new vice-president, Mrs. Darrell Norton, was elected. The group also discussed the band trip to Enid later in the year and appointed sponsors and chaperons for the trip, if it is approved by the school board. Steers Kick Off Season

Tonight (Friday), 8 p.m. at Steer Stadium, is kick-off time for Farwell Steer football squad. They will be meeting their cross-county rivals, the Friona Chieftains, in the opening game of the current football season.

Coach Toby Booth stated earlier this week that after seeing the Chieftains play a scrimmage game with Stratford last weekend, he is impressed with the fact that they are a team similar to Portales, whom the Steers scrimmaged, in size and plays used. The Chieftains use an "I" formation, said Coach Booth. In addition, Friona has one of the best backs in the area in Tony Perea, who made the all-district squad last year. Perea gained 786 yards last year to pace the Chieftains and was also leader in pass receptions. The other backs for Friona are experienced men; however, Coach Booth was quick to say, "We also have some good backs in Al and Craig Phillips, Greg Hargrove and Kyle Sheets, who are also returning to the Steer squad from the 1967 team.

Friona has a heavier backfield than does Farwell, whose backfield averages around 165 lbs. Serving as quarterback for

the Steers will be Greg Hargrove, a 135 lb. junior, who saw limited action last year.

The Friona line is also heavier than the Steer line. Charles Bowery and Randy Johnson, linemen, have seen much experience in the past and will be fighting alongside their less-experienced teammates to start the season with a win. Dean Stovall, end, was also a starter on last year's squad.

Coach Booth says that although his squad has been hampered in practice by minor injuries, they will all be in shape for the Friday night game. He is well pleased with team spirit and effort, saying, "The boys will be in there to win and will be fighting every step of the way."

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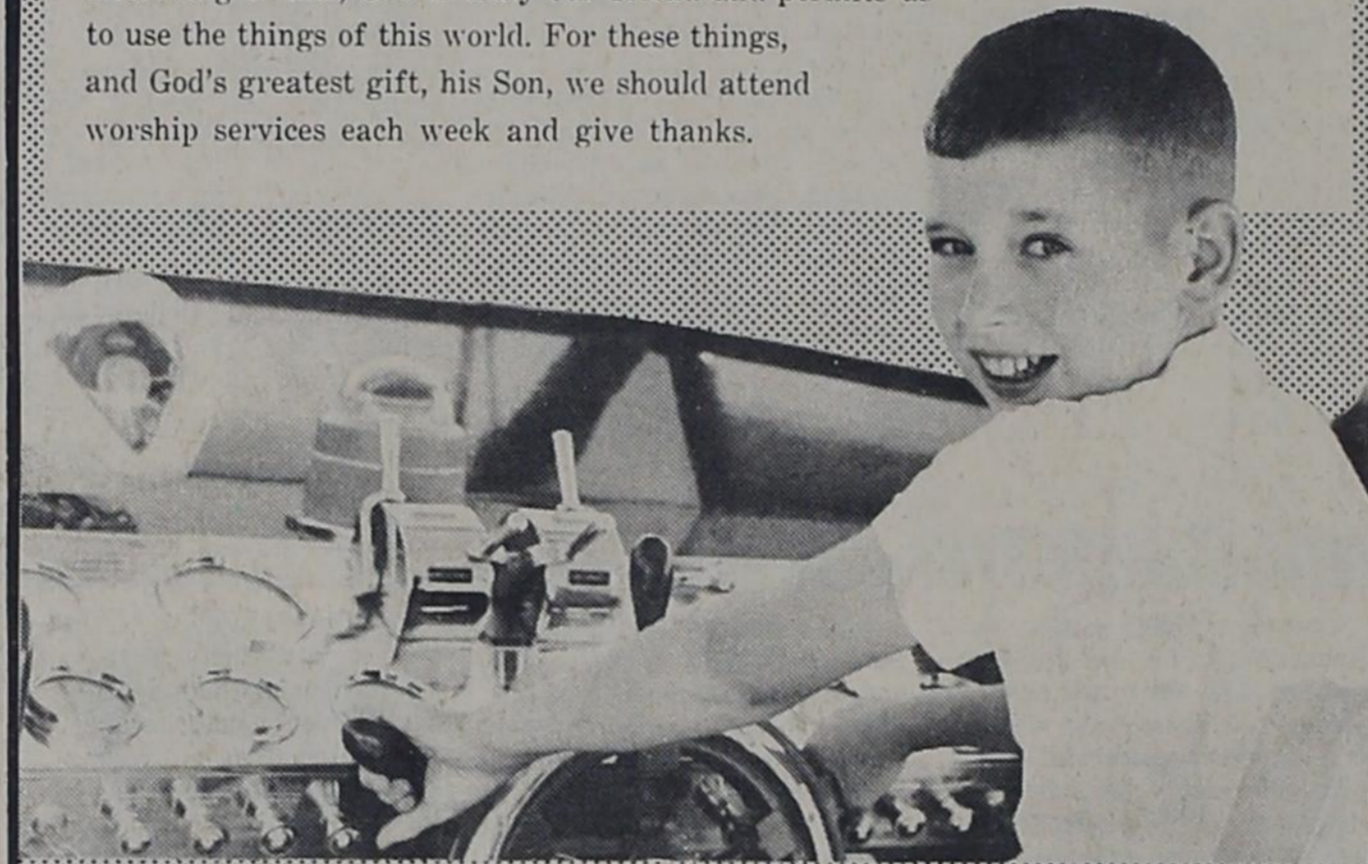
