Law and order is maintained only because the vast bulk of the people want to obey the laws. There cannot be enforcement of the law, short of a complete police state, unless the people want and cooperate in keeping the law. If this willingness on the part of the people to obey the law disappears, then all semblance of order will also disappear and our society as we know it will disintegrate. We look upon the judiciary as the keystone in the arch of orderly government. It must not be allowed to crumble.

(Continued from Page 1) co school, Parmer County residents nixed the referendums, but ok'd Preston Smith as gubernatorial candidate. One hundred twenty-six votes were cast in the Republican County primary. Also in May, G.D. Anderson, Jr. of Bovina was named to head the Texas Grain and Feed Association. The citizens and the surrounding counties were faced with a Junior College Tax District Formation, which was later defeated. A new feature "Turnrow Tunkel," began in the Tribune. It was discontinued near the end of the year due to the fact that O.C. McBride, editor of the column, was unable to continue his writing until after the first of the year. Nelda Winegeart was presented with the "Old Loving

Cup" at the Farwell Commencement, and Carolyn Langford was presented with the Citizenship award. A new Methodist pastor, Phil Baker, arrived to assume duties at the local church. In June, cleanup week was set for June 10-15 in Texico-Farwell. Farwell voters okayed Preston Smith as Democratic candidate for governor of Texas. The first load of wheat arrived in Farwell during the first week in June and open-house was held at Farwell Country Club. Demolition of the old Texico school building was begun in June and completed later in the summer. The State Line Tribune received two awards, one in features written by Chris Moss, and the second on editorials, written by Mike Getz, at the annual meeting of the Texas Press Association. One of the driest Junes in history was recorded in the county with only .7 inch of rainfall recorded.

Most of the month of July was given over to planning for the Border Town Days festivities. A total of 40 girls were entered in the "Queen" contest. Death claimed John Aldridge, long-time Parmer County resident and well-known lawyer, late in the month. The Border Towns Days Celebration saw a record number of visitors in Texico-Farwell and Carolyn Langford was named Border Towns Days Queen. Highlighting August was the invasion of the Twin Cities by some 74 Boy Scouts and eight adult leaders from New Jersey, who were stranded for several days in Farwell. The town went all out to make the visitors feel welcome.

Early in September, Pleasant Hill area farmers received severe hail damage to their crops. The highway department approved spending \$3,900 for road improvement in the county. The football contest was off to a good start with 206 contestants entering the first week. The fall proved to be a good season for the Farwell Steer football squad as they were able to defeat each of their opponents with the exception of Friona until the final game when they were defeated by Sudan, who won the district title. However, all was not lost as the Steer squad placed seven men on the all-

district squad with an additional three making all-district honorable mention. Water rates in Texico took an increase in prices on Dec. 1 and the first killing frost was recorded on Oct. 18. Farwell acquired a new post office and the postal services were moved to their new location on Nov. 4. Parmer County voters, as was the trend across the nation, gave the nod to Richard Nixon as next president of the United States. A new business, Loomix, Inc., opened its doors for business in Farwell late in the fall and the town has promise of another business venture in the near future; if the training device for football players, perfected by Harry Sheets, catches on, it will be manufactured here. Mrs. Roy Everett won the football contest and two tickets to the Cotton Bowl and expense money and Jim Wiman won the second place prize of two tickets to the Sun Bowl and expense money for the trip. Lazbuddie football team advanced to the regional football contest and then placed eight players on the district team. Mrs. Cricket Taylor, Parmer County HD Agent for the past five and one-half years, resigned effective Jan. 31, to do a bit of traveling. . . her successor will be named in early January. The year ended on a sad note when the towns had their first casualty of the Vietnam war when Harvie Winkles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Perry Winkles, lost his life on Dec. 8. Final services were held for the young hero who gave his
