

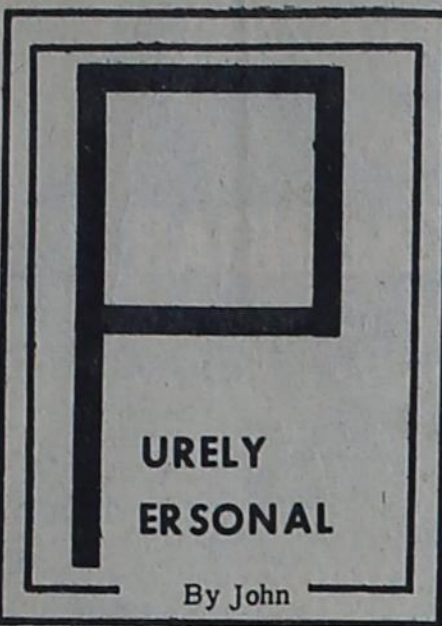

Each citizen has an excellent opportunity to take an active part in his state government. In Texas, this can be done by writing our State Senator, Jack Hightower, and our State Representative, Bill Clayton. They can be reached by simply addressing a letter to State Senate or State House of Representatives, Austin, Texas.

Representative Bill Clayton voted for the rejection of the bill to exclude Texas from Daylight Savings Time. In a news letter, Rep. Clayton stated that he believes that he voted as the majority of his constituents felt on this matter. I am sure he was right, if his mail is an accurate criteria. However, most everyone I have talked to around here was for retention of Standard Time. But, on further questioning, I did not find one person who had written to Rep. Clayton of his feelings. This neglect deprived Rep. Clayton of a more accurate census of the feelings of his constituents.

Remember, all the special interest groups are going to be heard. They make a point of being on record, if you would overcome the viewpoints of those who have a special ax to grind, YOU must make your views known, or suffer the penalties of legislation inimical to your interests.

Following is a list of legislative bills that will affect the comfort and financial well-being of most everyone. Take the time now to write our legislative spokesmen on these vital matters.

(In identifying the bills, HB stands for House Bill and SB stands for Senate Bill.)

SB 94 by Brooks and HB 76 by Rapp prohibiting governmental bodies from holding meetings which are closed to the public. -- The public's right to know must be upheld.

SB 423 by Parkhouse and Herrington and HB 933 by Slider, et al, permitting optometrists to advertise. -- If this doesn't pass, the price of glasses may go up double or more.

HB 343 by Hawkins and Rapp requiring published notices of trustee sales. -- You could have your property sold out from under you before you were aware of the time and place.

HB 177 by Murray killing public notices of Texas Water Rights Commission. -- These rulings are too vital not to be seen and known by everyone.

HB 56 by Murray cutting public notices of applications for appropriation of water from four times to only two. -- Again, the public needs to be aware of all demands upon their water.

These bills will affect the welfare physically and financially of all of us and we as citizens must make our views known. If we do not, then we must take the blame for poor legislation.

Our legislative spokesmen are not seers or crystal ball gazers. They cannot, in the short length of a legislative session, see or talk to even a small fraction of the people. The people MUST see or otherwise CONTACT them.

This is democracy in action.

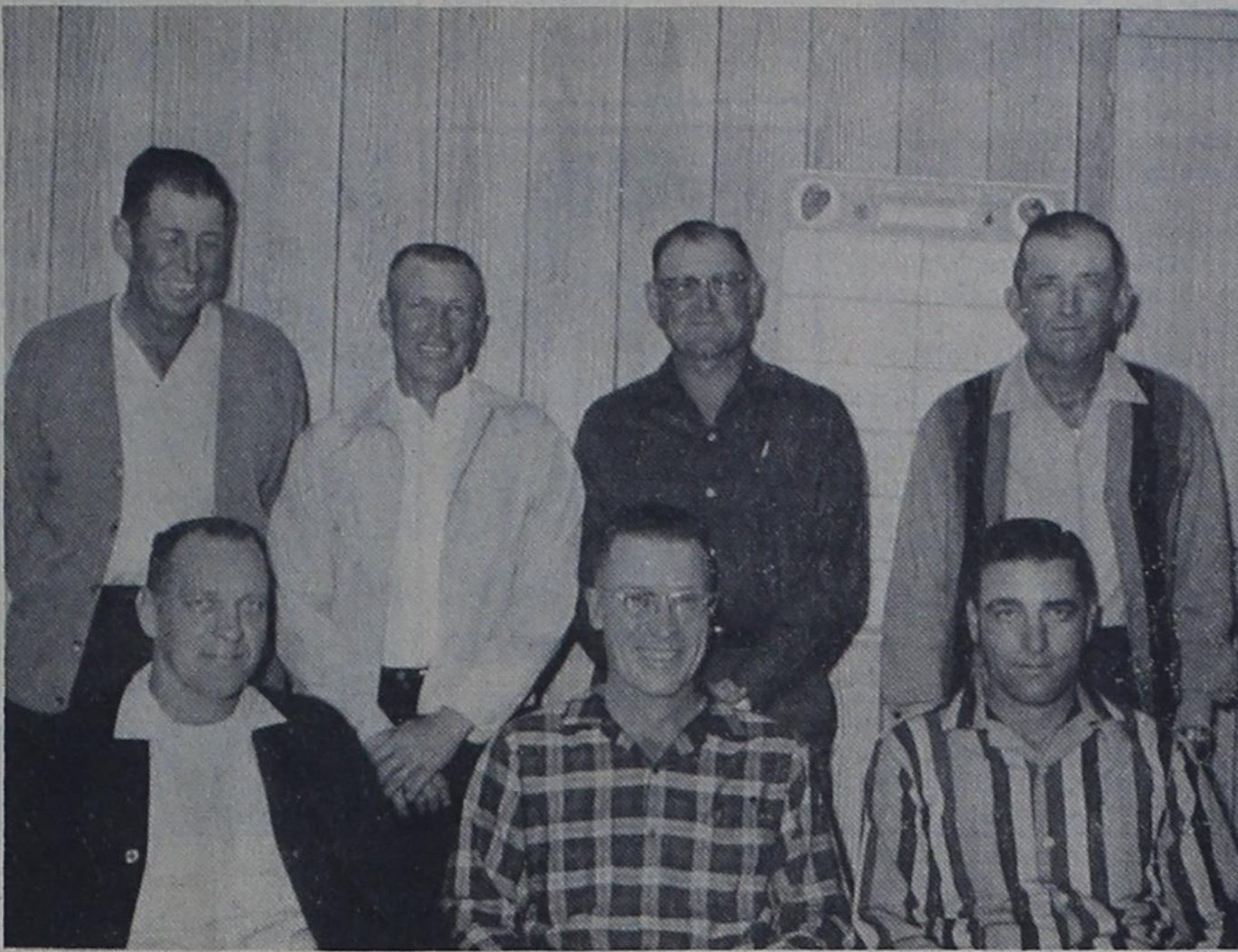
Services Held For Mother Of W.E. Martin

According to Elementary principal Jack Williams a pre-enrollment clinic will be held at the Elementary school library in Farwell beginning at 1:30 p.m., Friday, April 21.

The clinic is under direction of Mrs. Katherine Lockhart, school nurse; Mrs. Frances Clarke, school counselor; and the first grade teachers.

Light Rains Bring Relief

Light rains fell in Curry and Farmer Counties on Tuesday, and again on Wednesday evening with a report of .02 reported on Wednesday night in the Farwell vicinity.

On Tuesday evening some 1.6 inches of rain was reported to have fallen in the area north of Texico-Farwell however, the rainfall in town measured slightly over .01 inches.

In the area near Friona 2.2 inches was reported and in areas of Curry County reports varied from .01 to 1.3. How-

ever in other areas of the Panhandle reports of severe electrical storms with heavy hail were reported. At Hereford two twisters were reportedly sighted. Rain measured 1.93 in that area with pea sized hail also reported.

The rains will bring some relief to dryland farmers whose crops were hurting badly for lack of moisture however much more rain is needed in this area before irrigation well-motors can be cut off even temporarily.

Farwell To Have New Post Office

According to a telegram received from Senator Ralph Yarborough by the local post office personnel late last week, Farwell is soon to have new facilities for the post office. The telegram stated, "I am happy to announce that the post office department has approved new facilities for Farwell. Building site has not been selected, but the new building will have approximately 2400 square feet of interior space and adequate area for parking and maneuvering of vehicles."

According to Postmaster Jim Bob Smart, the present office facilities have been in use for the past 30 years, prior to which the office was housed next door to the present Piggly Wiggly location. Previous to this, the

office was housed in the old Security State Bank building facilities (in the rear).

Postmaster Smart indicated that he had no idea when the contract for the building would be let, but as soon as he receives notification he will release the information.

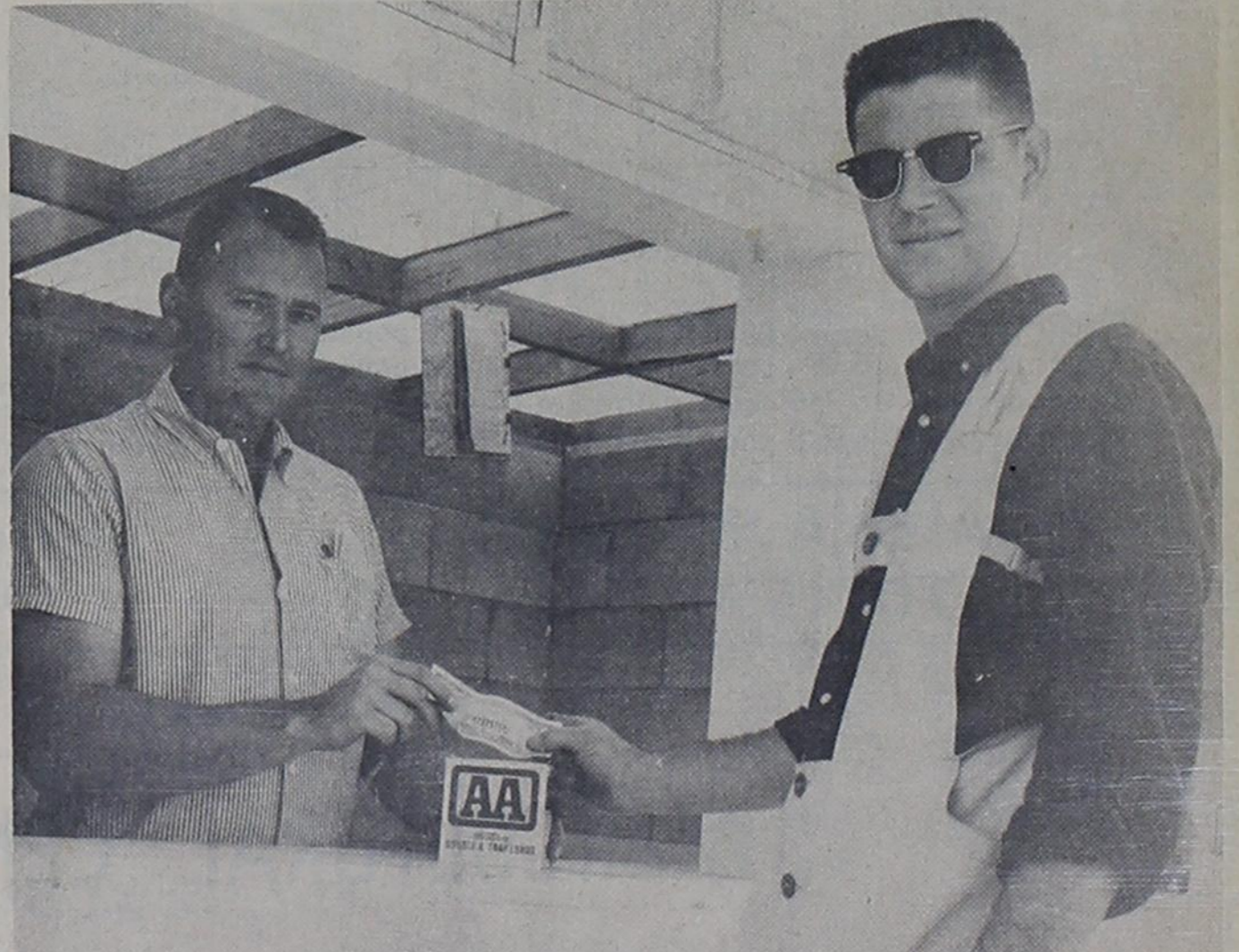

Ambassador of Peace

THE ANTI-VIOLENCE ambassador Martin Luther King Jr., who succeeded last year in stirring up so much violence in Chicago, has threatened the city with more intense agitation this summer than ever before. King Saturday led 5,000 peace marchers to an anti-American Vietnam war rally in the city. "This war is a blasphemy against all that America stands for," King told the Chicago peaceniks.

Coincidentally, perhaps, an equal number of Communist Viet Minh troops from North Vietnam were attacking Laotian government forces in the Nam Bac Valley as King spoke. These three battalions from North Vietnam comprising about 5,000 armed troops were perhaps on missions of good will. The veteran ambassador of peace otherwise would have denounced them as aggressors.

It is ironic that King is concerned about what America stands for while advocating that it not stand at all against Communist aggression. The King version of Americanism should make a peculiar stump speech. So much of what King says is aimed against one thing or another that it should be interesting to hear him say openly some of the things he thinks America stands for.

What he has said so far is itself a blasphemy against the civil rights he supposedly advocates: the civil right of all men to remain free.
