From time to time we come across columns by various individuals that we consider an accurate reflection of our thoughts. Recently, one such column to come to our attention is by J. Edgar Hoover in the FBI Law Enforcement Bulletin. We believe it to be worth repeating so our subscribers can have the opportunity to read it. We quote it as follows:

"Morality, integrity, law and order, and other cherished principles of our great heritage are battling for survival in many communities today. They are under constant attack from degrading and corrupting influences which, if not halted, will sweep away every vestige of decency and orderliness remaining in our society.

"Certain groups, numerically weak but vociferously strong, appear determined to destroy all acceptable standards of personal conduct and sane behavior patterns. They seem bent on eliminating all ethical practices relating to our established order.

"For instance, most citizens would be horrified to think that someday it might be legally permissible for a person to rise in a courtroom and hurl four-letter invectives at the judge without fear of punishment. 'This cannot be,' we say, 'the court is inviolable. It administers justice under the laws by which we live.' Law enforcement is an arm of the same laws. It is charged with the responsibility under these laws of taking certain action which ultimately is resolved in court. However, a move is underway demanding that profane verbal abuse directed at police officers be legally recognized as a constitutional right. If it can be argued that such preposterous action is legally permissible at the enforcement level of the law, could it not also be argued that it is permissible at all levels of our legal system?

"History proves that the best interests of our Nation lie in a law-abiding, decent, and orderly society. We cannot live with lawlessness, unbridled vulgarity, obscenity, blasphemy, perversion, and public desecration of every sacred and just symbol. We should be alarmed when widespread recognition and monetary awards go to a person who writes a 'satirical' piece of trash which maliciously defames the President of our country and insinuates he murdered his predecessor. We should be alarmed when some groups, under the guise of academic freedom and constitutional privilege, flood our college campuses with obscene four-letter word campaigns and pornographic publications which violate all codes of ethics. And we should be equally alarmed when an enforcement officer making an arrest must fight for his life against assaults from onlookers who scoff and ridicule him for doing his duty.

"Why do these conditions exist? Certainly, an overwhelming majority of Americans do not want their families exposed to indecent, immoral, and unlawful practices which plague our communities. But unorganized protesters carry little weight against organized crusaders of filth, immorality, and crime. If this is not the legacy we want to pass on to our youth, then it is high time we took action to improve conditions.

"Let us stop persecuting enforcement officers when we should be prosecuting criminals. Let us stop deifying off-beat dolts whose ability is measured only by how deeply they can dip their poisonous pens into the pots of blasphemy, filth, and falsehood. Let us stop listening to half-truths and criticisms of time-tested ideals and start telling and selling the true story of democracy as we know it. In short, let us stop being led blindly toward the cavern of self-destruction by bogus Pied Pipers and get on with the perpetuation of the self-evident truths which, with Divine guidance, have served our Nation so well over the years."

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Editorial

Knowledge Under Attack Again!

Although most calendars proudly proclaim the date as being 1967, one would never know it by observing the recent activities of the Tennessee Senate as it valiantly stood up for clean living and good moral character by defeating a bill to repeal a law which should have been wiped off the books decades ago. The law under question is the one which makes it a crime to teach the theory of evolution in Tennessee. It was particularly nauseating to watch pot-bellied Tennessee Senators stand up and condemn scientists who accept evolution as atheists, without making the least attempt to understand the theory of evolution. In some respects, ignorance may indeed be bliss, but in this case it is nothing short of a return to the dark ages, when men were burned at the stake for advocating principles that ran against what was then "established" religious beliefs. Believe it or not, a man once suffered just such a fate for advocating that the earth rotated about the sun, rather than the other way around. Since this contradicted the teaching that the earth was the center of the universe, it was ho ho ho, and away to the bonfire for the poor scientist. Now, nobody will get consumed by the flames for advocating evolution, but many will undoubtedly get singed in a figurative sense.

Although in Tennessee, the argument is whether evolution should be taught at all, a similar debate rages in other sections of the country, although slightly less intense. The question in the majority of cases is whether evolution should be taught as established fact or as a theory. The big surprise is the fact that in the opinion of most biologists, evolution is just as much an accepted fact as the atomic theory! Neither of which by the way is the least bit atheistic in nature, regardless of what some amateur theologians may say.

Last week was particularly fruitful for opponents of evolution, as several religious leaders joined the "name the atheist of the week" club. A. A. Catanzaro of New York, district supervisor for Jehovah's Witnesses, launched a vicious tirade against science in general as he addressed a group of denomination members. Catanzaro blamed the teaching of evolution as being responsible for everything from teenage thug-ism to all our atheism. This is equivalent to saying that the invention of the wheel is responsible for the rising death rate on the highways. It just doesn't jive.

I was privileged to read a pamphlet published by this same group entitled "Evolution, or Creation by God - Which?" The obvious implication is that you cannot have both. Nothing could be farther from the truth! An equally ridiculous question might be "Was the house built by a hammer or by a carpenter?" As you can see, the only logical answer is both. The hammer is merely the tool of the carpenter, and evidence points out the fact that evolution was the tool of God, a viewpoint which I don't believe to be atheistic in nature. After all, man was not given a brain just to fill up the space within his head; he was given a brain in order that he might learn more about the world in which he was put, and not be condemned to live in ignorance.

The Bible was never intended to be a textbook in biochemistry or molecular biology; it was intended to convey the idea to man, that God created the heavens and the earth and everything that lives upon it. It was left to man to attempt to uncover the details, and I dare say that scientists are infinitely better qualified to do so than either politicians or A. A. Catanzaro, who by the way is credited with the brilliant statement that man absolutely did not exist on earth more than 6000 years ago. Dr. Leakey, whose latest fossil findings place the age of man at something like a million and a half years, would be tickled to death to hear that!

For those who still believe that scientists are atheists, let me say that I have never known one biologist who does not believe in creation by God. The more one digs into the miracle of life, the more overwhelmed he is by the complexity of it all, and the more he knows that this is the work of a supreme creator, not the product of chance. What the opponents of science fail to realize, is that God possesses the sum total of human knowledge and much, much more. He is in effect, the ultimate scientist, for whom nothing is impossible.

Man has made mistakes in the past, and will undoubtedly make many more before he has completely elucidated the mechanism of life, but the attempt to do so is not a sin. The sin lies in the wasting of the marvelous brain that we have been endowed with. The sin lies in the persecution of the informed by the uninformed for something that they have misconstrued in the first place. However, since most of us are guilty of the latter in some respect let me say only this:

She will be in San Francisco this summer to participate in the national FBLA spelling contest. Debbie is presently serving as secretary of the junior class.

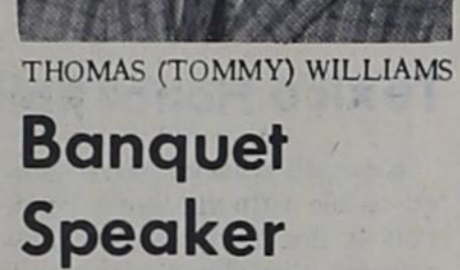

In addition, a scholarship award will be presented to the FFA member with the highest scholastic average for this school year.

Special guests at the banquet will be FFA sweetheart, Debbie Doolittle, and FHA president, Janet Wilson.

Attention Horse Owners

There appears to be some evidence that Sorghum-Sudan grass type forage hybrids used extensively for cattle grazing and greenchop may be injurious to horses, warns B.F. Yeates, Extension Animal Husbandman, Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

These widely used grazing and feed crops appear to be a factor in causing cystitis syndrome in horses, a little known disease of equines which is characterized by incoordination of the rear quarters, uncontrolled urination, and possible abortions by mares. Death sometimes occurs in chronic cases. To date, there is no known cure for this ailment, but it is not contagious. In addition, to the Sorghum-Sudan grass type hybrids, cystitis has been found in horses grazing Johnson grass, Common Sudan grass, and Sweet Sudan grass in a few isolated cases.

The cystitis syndrome and possible dietary connections was first reported by Dr. William M. Romane, D.V.M., Texas A&M University and his team of researchers in an article in "Southwestern Veterinarian" (Vol. 19, Winter, 1966). The report described symptoms and indicates it may be connected with feeding of the forages as greenchop or by grazing the horses on the forage. Dr. Romane's research team adds, "Only when the plant is in the growing state does this

syndrome develop. To our knowledge, cured hay will not produce the syndrome."

The cystitis syndrome of horses has been noted mostly in Texas and a few isolated areas of the Southwest, according to reports from veterinary colleges. Incidence of the cystitis syndrome was reported by veterinarians in Georgia, Alabama, Oklahoma, Washington, and Iowa, but there appeared to be no association with any particular forages. Other areas have not reported cases of the syndrome.

Exact cause of the ailment has not been pinpointed, and Yeates says, thousands of horses have probably grazed these forage crops with no ill effects; however, horsemen should be warned of the danger involved in using the forages in their horse program, and they should be very cautious until continuing research can establish the exact cause of the syndrome. A&M SCIENTISTS SAY THAT THERE IS NO REASON FOR CATTLEMEN TO BECOME ALARMED AS NO INJURIES HAVE BEEN REPORTED FROM GRAZING OR FEEDING THESE FORAGES TO RUMINANTS.

The seed industry is cooperating with the Texas Agricultural Station of Texas A&M University to help support continued research in an attempt to isolate and avoid causes of the cystitis syndrome and to find a cure.

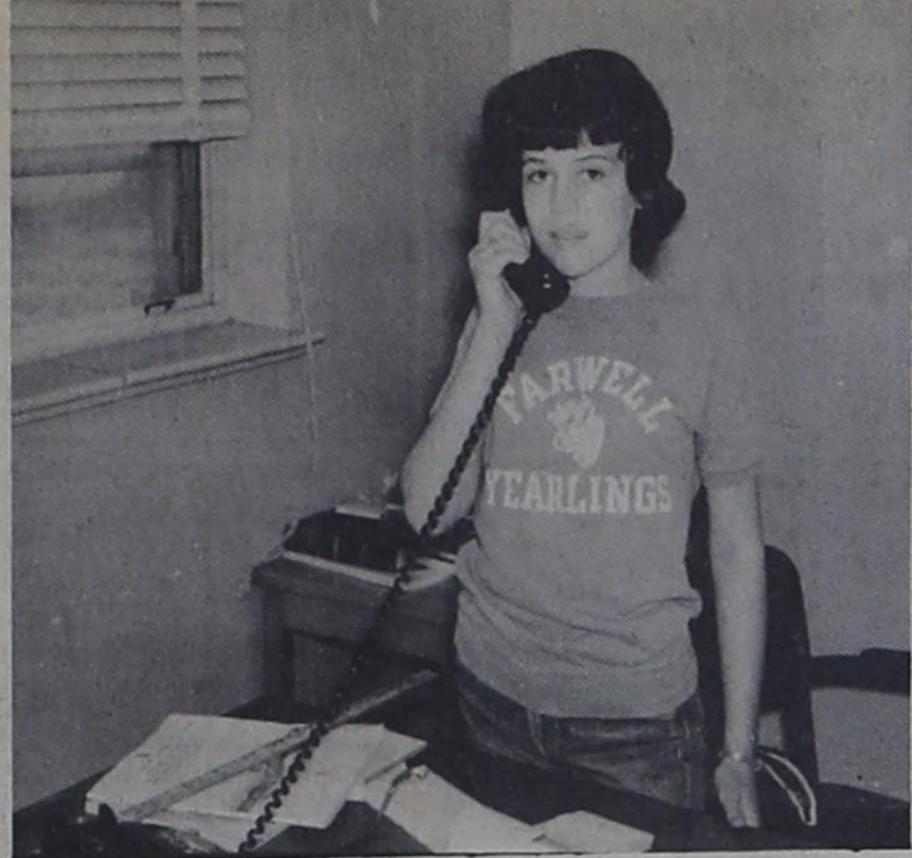
Town Fathers Have Busy Session

Extension Agent Tells About Pruning Plants

Pruning makes the difference between an expert gardener and an amateur, says Everett Janne, Extension horticulturist with Texas A&M University. Good pruning is essential to keep your property attractive and to keep ornamental plants healthy. However, you won't need to prune as much if you put plants in the best locations.

Early spring -- before growth begins -- is the best time to prune evergreens and late flowering shrubs. Early flowering plants, blooming in March, April, May and early June, should be pruned immediately after flowering. Avoid early fall pruning. It tends to produce late, immature growth, which is less tolerant to winter cold.

Prune or remove completely any dead, diseased, broken or injured branches, at any season. And prune all plants when you are transplanting.

Ornamental plants can be pruned several different ways.

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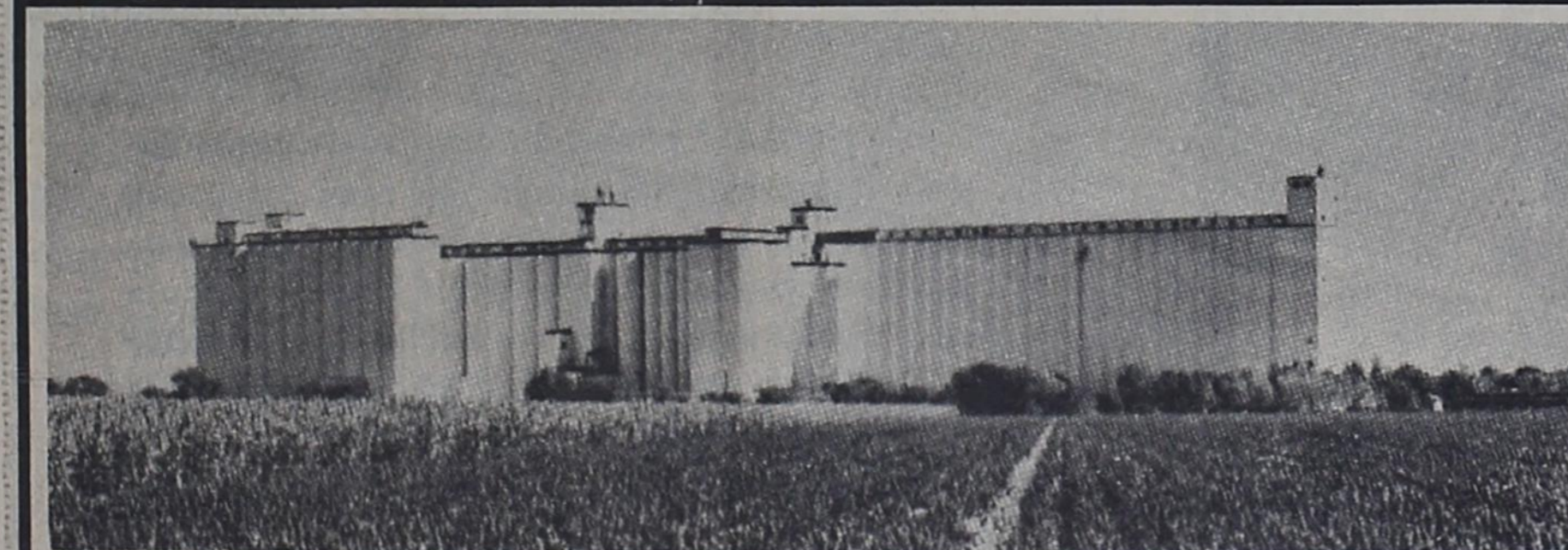

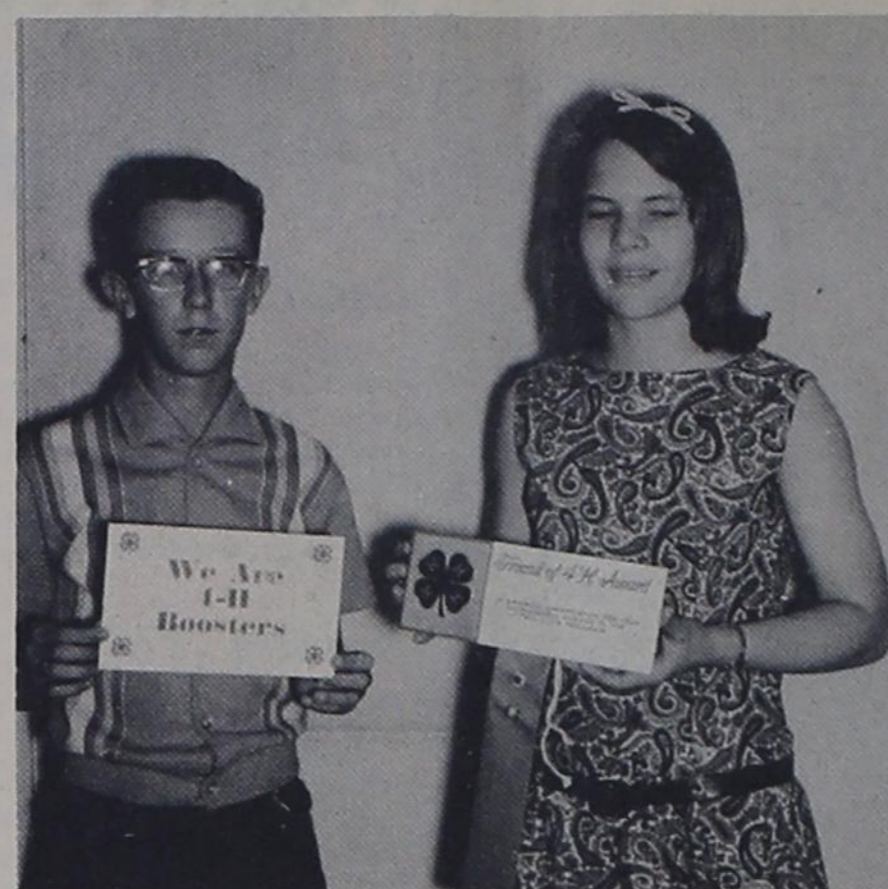

Wheat Crop Forecast At 60 Million Bushels

According to the Texas Crop Reporting Service, Texas Wheat production, based on April 1 prospects, is forecast at 60-62,000 bushels, 27 per cent below the 82,395,000 bushels estimated in December. If the present production is realized, it will be 17 per cent below 1966 production of 72,652,000 bushels. Acreage seeded for this year's crop at 5,493,000 acres is 29 per cent above acreage planted for the previous year.

High Plains wheat, which had adequate moisture at planting, has steadily declined in condition due to the lack of moisture. The Northern High Plains the major growing area, is critically short of moisture. Reports of heavy abandonment on dryland acreage is reported.

Greenbug damage is also heavy, but appears to be diminishing. Cattle have been moved off wheat where a grain crop is expected.

Wheat on the Low Plains and the Blacklands is temporarily improved with recent showers, and is entering the boot stage. More moisture is needed in these areas before heads can be expected to fill properly.

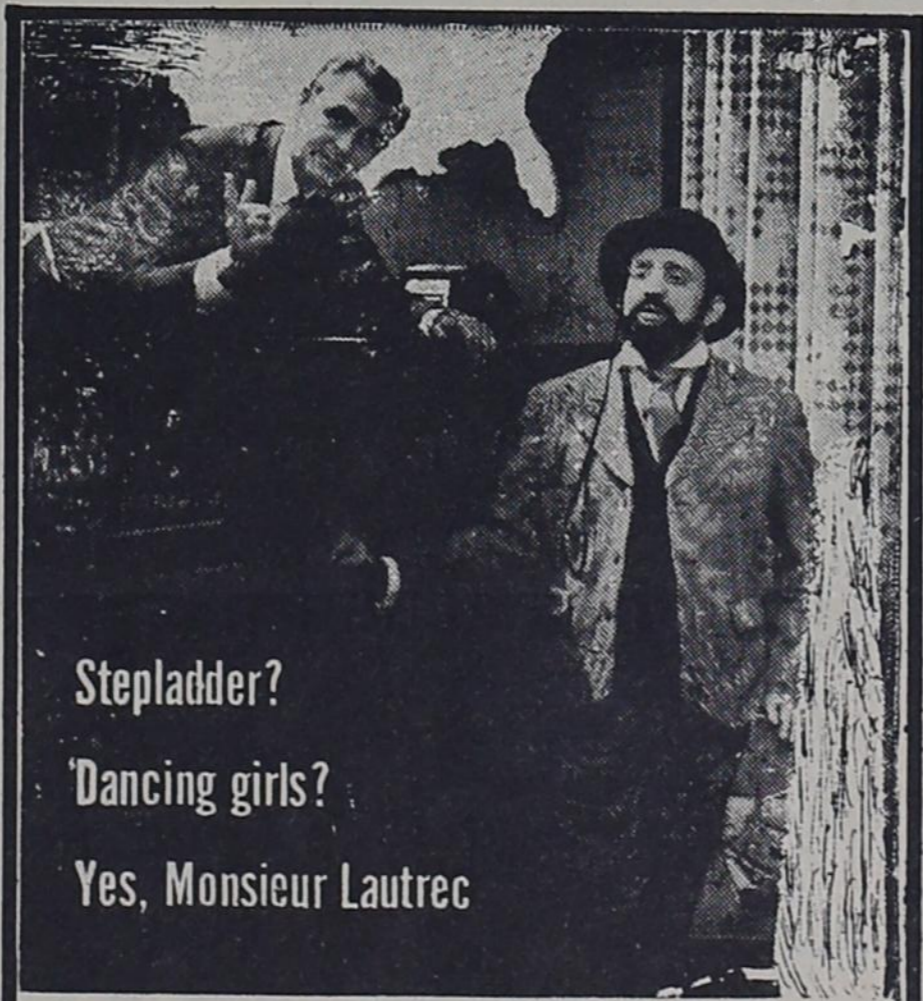

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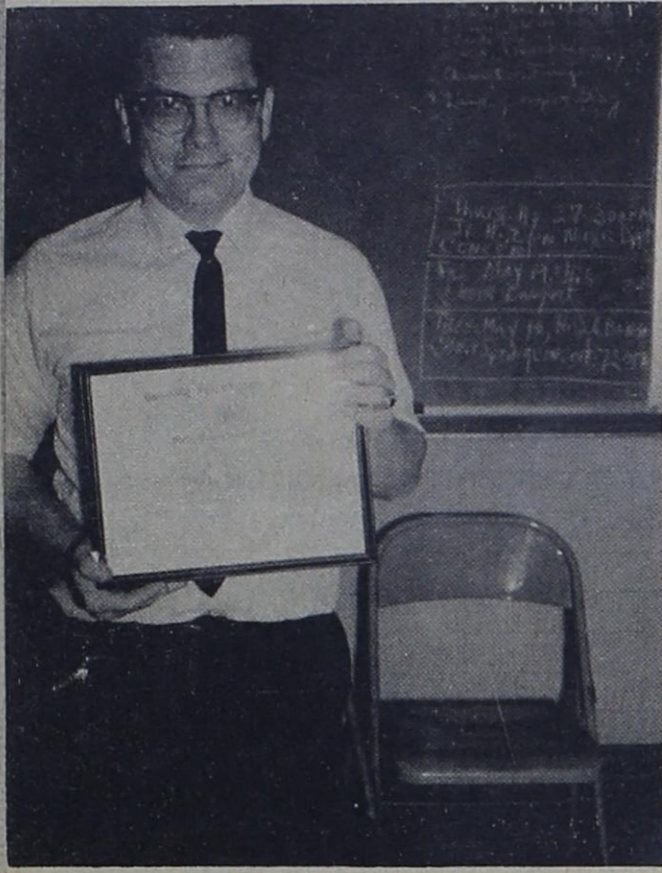
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Receives Rating

The following article, which recently appeared in the Los Angeles Times and was sent to the Tribune Staff by a subscriber who clipped it from the Times, tells the story of an area resident, Mrs. Alva Mays of Muleshoe, who holds something of a record for being lost. Thanks to the reader for submitting the article.

WHO CARES

The world's record for being lost on a freeway is 3 days, 11 hours, 26 minutes, held by Mrs. Alva Mays, 43-year old housewife from Muleshoe, Texas. She entered the Santa Monica Free-

way at 9:18 a.m., September 12, 1964 on her way to see a sister-in-law in Pasadena who had received serious multiple injuries in a minor freeway accident. After a journey of 947.2 miles covering nine freeways, 16 successful negotiations of the downtown Los Angeles interchange, a night in Bakersfield, a day trapped in dense fog two miles north of Oceanside, and six citations for both fast and slow driving, Mrs. Mays emerged from the freeways by driving through the barrier of the new four-mile extension of the Garden Grove Freeway at the Bolsa Chica turnoff, where she became entangled in the ribbon-cutting ceremonies.
