Texas, N. Mex. Voters To Decide Amendments

Not only will voters across the nation go to the polls to cast their ballots for local, county, and statewide candidates in the November 2 General Election, Texas and New Mexico voters will decide the issues on several constitutional amendments.

Deadline for absentee voting in person in Farmer County is Friday, Oct. 29, while absentee ballots will be accepted in the mail as late as November 2.

In Curry County, absentee voting deadline is Thursday, Oct. 28. Deadline for mailing out an absentee ballot is October 23.

Absentee voting may be done in person at the County Clerk's office in the respective counties during regular office hours.

Texas voters will decide on six constitutional amendments as well as selecting the candidates of their choice.

A brief synopsis of the proposed amendments are as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 1 proposes a constitutional amendment that prohibits any state ad valorem tax. Receipts from previously authorized state ad valorem taxes that are collected after the effective date of the proposed amendment shall be deposited to the credit of the general fund of the county collecting the taxes and may be expended for county purposes. Taxes collected before that date shall be distributed by the legislature among educational institutions eligible to receive those funds under prior law. The proposed amendment also repeals a section of the Constitution levying an ad valorem tax for a construction fund for 17 state colleges and universities.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to provide assistance through the appropriations process to needy persons and to place a ceiling on payments for needy dependent children at one percent of the state budget."

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment that would exempt machinery and equipment used in the production of farm and ranch products from taxation. No dollar limits would be imposed and the exemption would apply to corporations and partnerships as well as to families and individuals.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment exempting implements of husbandry (agricultural machinery and equipment) from ad valorem taxation."

PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 77 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the Legislature to set a four year maximum term of office for board members of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

ASCS Crew Stays Busy On Crop Loan Program

The Farmer County A.S.C.S. office is amid a flurry of paper work, humming calculators, and ringing phones this week.

At the helm of this busy office is Martin Chandler, newly appointed executive director of the Farmer County A.S.C.S. office. In addition, there are six regular employees with two more persons being on call. One new employee is to report for work later in the month, Chandler said.

Chandler said, "At least 98 percent of those eligible for participation in the loan program are applying for the reserve loan for a three-year period of time." He further stated that the reserve loan rate for Farmer County corn is \$5.43 per hundred weight. Some grain sorghum loans have been processed but most of these are to be made later due to a later harvest date for sorghum. The Farmer County reserve loan rate for grain sorghum is \$4.95 per hundred weight.

Only a small number of soybeans have been placed in the loan as the county is lacking in commercial storage. Most of the beans stored for loan purposes are farm stored

beans. The loan for the soybeans differs from the reserve loan as the beans are stored for a period of nine months instead of a three-year period. Monies available through the regular storage for beans is \$4.91 per bushel.

Farmer County, along with 75 other counties, has been designated as eligible to participate in the disaster program. As of October 19, payments made to the farmers in Farmer County totaled \$555,112.52. The office is lacking payments being made to another 20 percent of the farmers totaling about one-quarter million dollars. These payments are to be finalized and mailed within the next two weeks. To be eligible a farmer must apply for these disaster payments along with having sustained a 40 percent or more loss on all commodities other than cotton. A loss of 25 percent or more qualifies a farmer on cotton. All requests for disaster payments must be made within 15 days after harvest. If a crop is not harvested; then a request for the disaster benefit must be made prior to destruction of the crop. Chandler estimates that three-quarters to one million dollars will be paid out

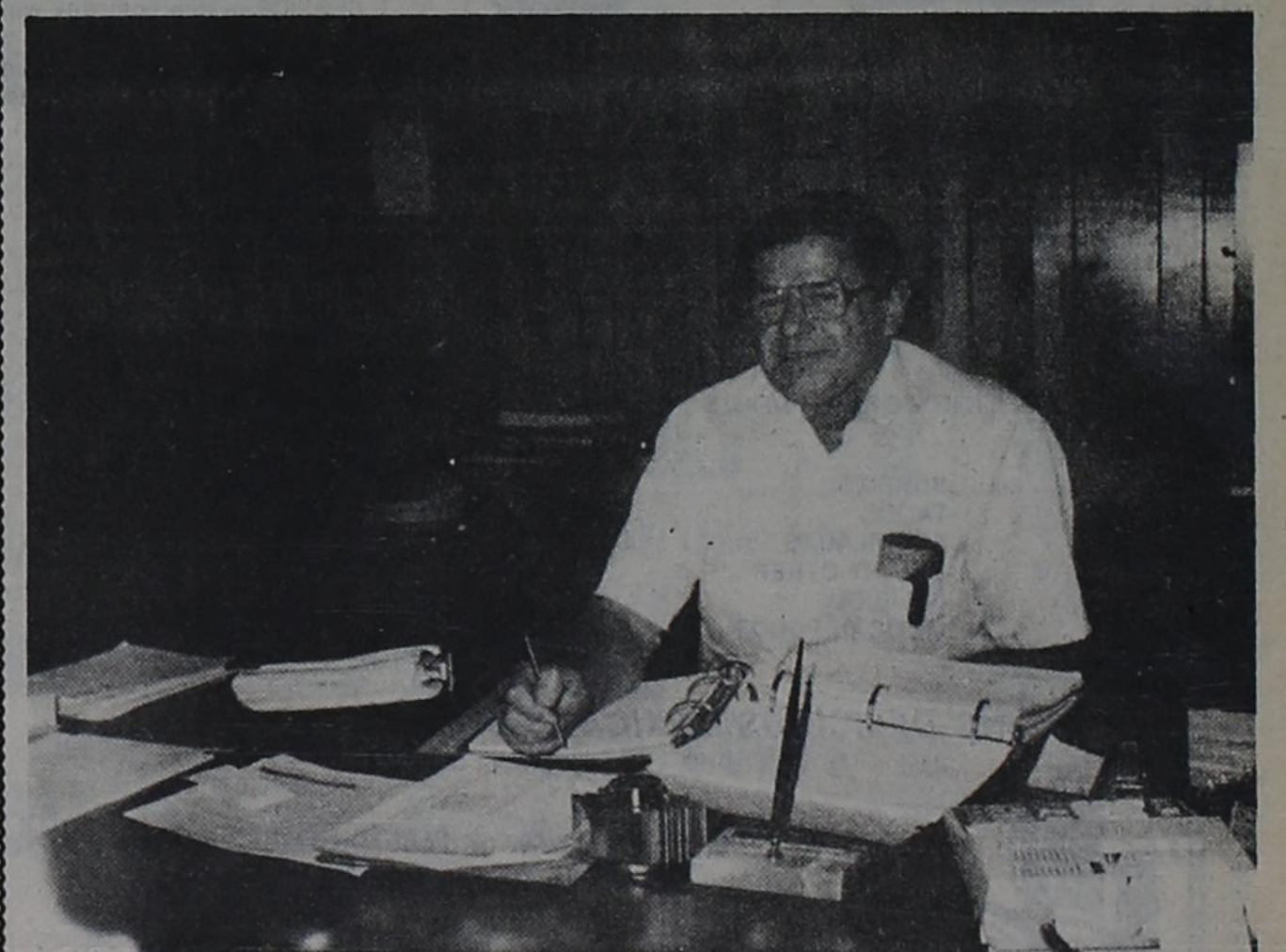
under the cotton program.

Another new endeavor is being pursued as the local office is in the process of getting all of the farm information to the central receiving computer office in Kansas City, Mo. This information consists of farm planted acres, farm yields, production share, etc.

The disaster and loan program checks are made in the local office but the deficiency checks are figured and made out in the Kansas City office.

Chandler said, "Normally no corn and grain deficiency payments are made until April, but an advance deficiency payment on corn and grain may be made in December if the farmer requests such a payment." Chandler further explained that in order to know a farmer's desires a questionnaire is to be mailed to all producers and/or operators asking if they desire their payments in December or after January 1st.

Signup is now in progress for the 1983 farm program but Chandler expressed his appreciation for the farmers' patience in holding up on the 1983 signups.



Chandler Keeping Busy

Martin Chandler, new executive director of the Farmer County ASCS office in Farwell, is having no trouble keeping busy these days. With all the farmer signups for the loan programs on corn and grain

sorghum, Chandler and his crew of six full time employees plus two part time workers are being challenged just to "keep up" with the tremendous flow of paper work. Chandler says that about 80 percent of the

disaster payments due Farmer County farmers have been sent out and that the final 20 percent should be mailed out within the next couple of weeks.

The wonder of Mother Nature manifested herself over the past weekend. Silently, in the cool of the evenings, the foliage in the Twin Cities took on the brilliant hues of fall. Given a good fall with little of our usual wind, our area compares favorably with any for color and fall foliage beauty.

We were not in a position last Sunday to have watched the NFL Union footballers fiasco that took place in RFK Stadium in Washington. Had we so been at home we still would not have tuned in to it. We read where only a little over 8,000 tickets were sold and even fewer than that actually showed up. Imagine, this handful in a place that will hold over 55,000 people.

We are surprised that even that many were duped into buying tickets, let alone actually going to such an exhibition. Any reflection would reveal that it, just by its very nature, could not be a real first class game.

No coaching, no team work, no practice, no really big name stars, no blood-stirring competition. We think that this is one deal that Ted Turner and his TBS network would be wise to get out of - quickly.

Farwell Mayor Walter Kaltwasser has been trying to interest the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation in putting a stop and go light at the intersection of Highways 70-84 and Ninth Street in Farwell. Locally we believe it to be a substantial danger to all north or south bound traffic at that corner.

The good Mayor wrote about it to the said department and received a reply that sounded suspiciously like a standard answer to such inquiries. Sure enough, it was a standard type answer.

The City stands the proverbial two chances, slim and none, of getting a traffic control light at that corner. As a coincidence last week we read in the McLean News published in McLean, Texas, almost the identical letter that the community received in response to their request for a stop light at one of their intersections. Their need for a stop light is infinitely greater than Farwell's.

I-40 goes through McLean by taking all east bound traffic on one street and all west bound traffic on another street just one block to the north. Now the folks in McLean want a stop light at the intersection of one of their main streets and the west bound street carrying I-40.

If you think getting across 70-84 at Ninth Street is dangerous, try scooting across even one lane of I-40. That takes some doing, and it looks like the Highway Department is not going to give the residents of McLean a stop light, and we would bet a tidy sum that Farwell is not able to slow the pell mell rush of traffic on its main street either.

We often speak from a position of not knowing all the facts, but here we go again. We read where the Chrysler Corporation has informed the United Auto Workers that the Company cannot offer any higher wages than their present offer. The Union has responded with the threat of a strike. A strike could bust Chrysler, and our last recollection was that the pelf of the taxpayer was behind some loans to that stricken company.

If the Union strikes and Chrysler goes belly up, the big question is who gets stuck for the obligated loans? If the answer is the taxpayer then the Government has an obligation to settle the dispute and require both the Company and the Union to get with it.

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide terms not to exceed four years for members of governing boards of certain water districts and conservation and reclamation districts."

PROPOSITION NO. 5 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 119 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize Tarrant and Bee counties to hold county-wide elections to abolish the county treasurer's office by majority vote.

Should the county treasurer's office be abolished, the duties, powers, and functions of that office would be transferred to the county auditor or the successor to the auditor's functions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:
 "The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county treasurer in Tarrant and Bee counties."

PROPOSITION NO. 6 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 6 proposes a constitutional amendment that would raise the constitutional interest rate limit on state general obligation

bonds from 6% to 12%. The new 12% ceiling does not, however, apply to bonds issued by the Veterans' Land Board.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment increasing the maximum interest rate allowed on state general obligation bonds to a weighted average annual interest rate of 12%."

In New Mexico, seven constitutional amendments are listed on the ballot, as well as a bond issue question for a new Curry County jail, and a decision on Sunday liquor sales.

The question on whether to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages on Sunday will be placed on the ballot for only those voters who reside in the Clovis city limits.

The bond issue question reads:

"Shall the County of Curry, New Mexico issue its general obligation bonds in the total sum of \$4,700,000 for the purpose of securing funds for the purpose of erecting and furnishing a law enforcement complex including separate detention of adults and juveniles for the County of Curry,

to be an addition to the existing courthouse and jail, and including the purchase of land therefor?"

A brief analysis of each constitutional amendment listed on the New Mexico ballot is as follows:

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1

Provides for a system of appointed supreme court justices, judges of the court of appeals and district judges with the appointees serving for periods of four years, at which time they are to be evaluated by the judicial standards commission.

After the evaluation, the commission is required to recommend the retention or nonretention of the respective judge or justice, and the recommendation will subsequently appear on the general election ballot alongside the name of the judge or justice. No other name will appear as a candidate in opposition to the judge or justice on the ballot.

If the vote is in favor of retention, the judge or justice will serve another four-year term, but if the voters reject retention, the judge's or justice's term will expire the succeeding January 1.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 2

Removes the power of the legislature to appropriate money from the severance tax permanent fund by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3

Allows the legislature to enact an income tax exemption for resident members of the national guard of New Mexico in an amount up to \$3,000 of pay received for service in the guard.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 4

Allows county sheriffs to be elected to serve unlimited consecutive two-year terms.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5

Increases the reimbursement of legislators for per diem expenses from the present \$40 to \$75 and for mileage traveled going to and returning from Santa Fe from 10 cents per mile to 25 cents per mile only for one round trip per session.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 6

Permits the state corporation commission to consider the earnings, investments, and expenditures related to the

sale of the telephone directory listing services in setting telephone rates.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7

Enlarges the purposes for which a county may incur indebtedness, from the present authorization to use such funds only for erecting, remodeling or adding to public buildings, or for constructing and repairing roads and bridges, to include the construction or acquisition of water, sewer, or sanitary landfill systems and airports.

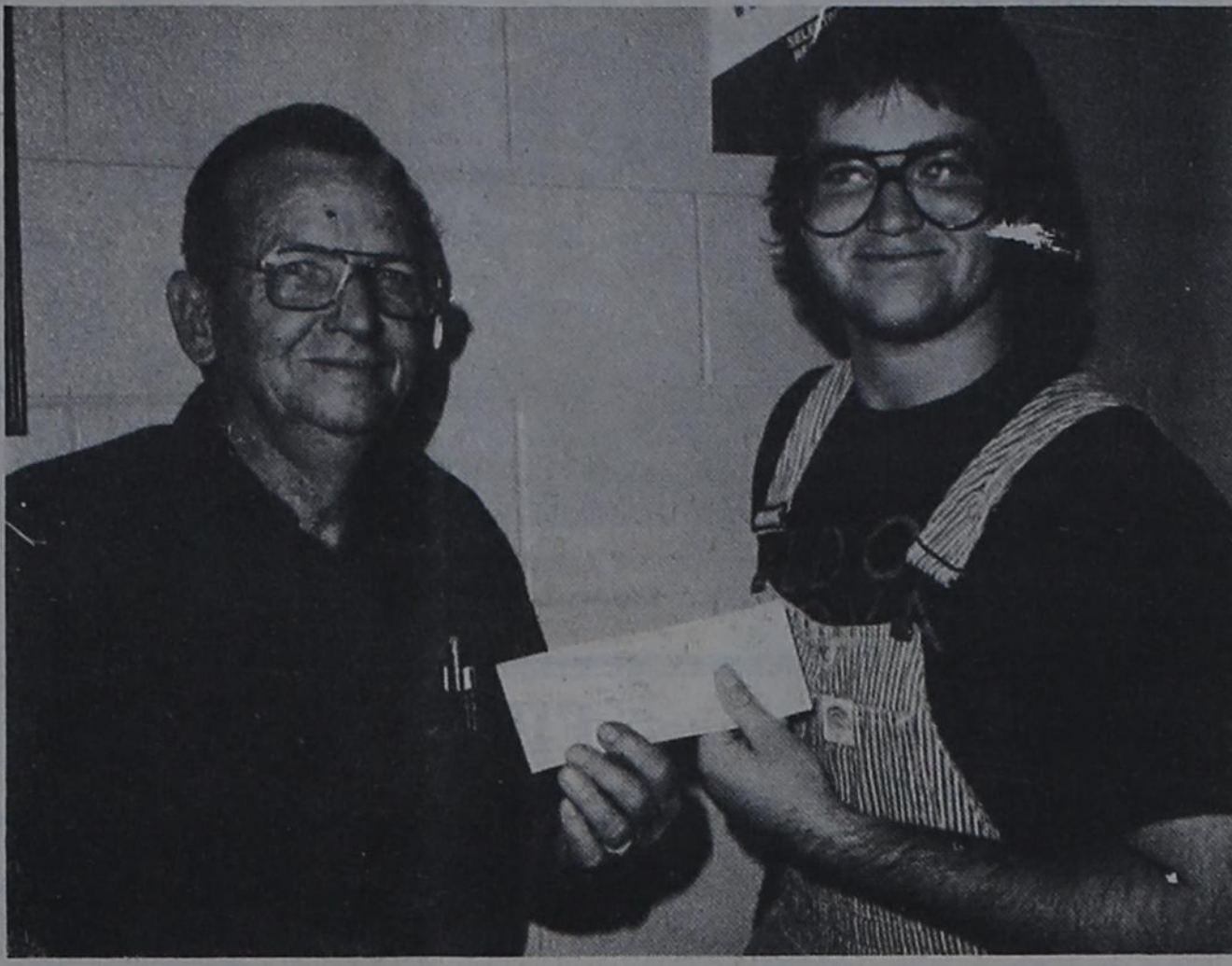
Of these 13 entrants, nine picked Farwell to win, three picked Kress, and one entrant picked a tie.

Farwell School Board Increases Tax Rate

At a called meeting of the Farwell School Board on Monday, Oct. 18, members voted to increase the tax rate for the 1982 tax year to \$1.21 per \$100 valuation.

The tax rate for 1981 was \$1.20 per \$100, and the school board had originally intended to set the 1982 tax rate at \$1.18/\$100. However, since the Board of Review for the Farmer County Tax Appraisal Board at its meeting on October 16, lowered the valuation of property in the Farwell Independent School District by \$1,875,025, this brought about the increase of \$0.01/\$100 in the tax rate.

Members present for the meeting were Wilbert Kalbas, Joe Hughes, Maxine Williams, Richard Haseloff, Floyd Coates, and Edward Corn.

Absent was board member Darrell Stephens. All members present voted for the motion to increase the tax rate.

Also present were W.M. Roberts, superintendent, Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Lonsdale, Barbara Trimble, and Marcia Bell.

Also passed was a motion that the maintenance and operation rate be set at \$1.06/\$100 and that interest and sinking fund rate be set at \$0.15/\$100.

from 8:30 a.m. until the allotted cheese is disbursed. Applications for eligibility will be available at each site.

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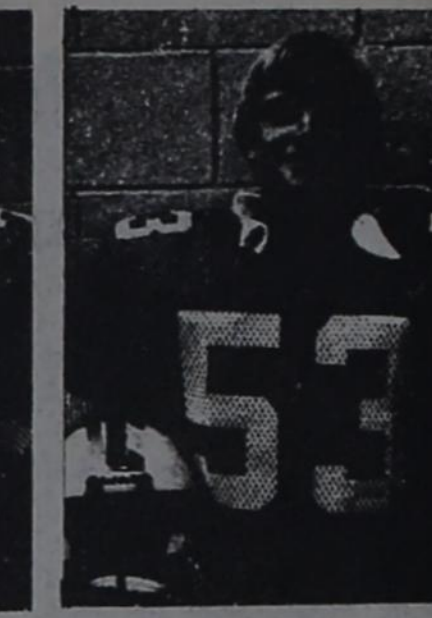

Message From The Social Security Administration

Is the name on your W-2 or other tax forms the same as the name on your Social Security card? Perhaps after marriage or divorce you forgot to request a name change.

If this is your situation, you need to update the name that Social Security has attributed to your Social Security number.

Before Social Security can process a name change, the law requires that you present whatever legal document makes the name change necessary — for example, your

marriage license or divorce decree. The document must be the original or a certified copy.

Many offices can process your request by mail, returning your document to you, of course, after review. Call or go by your local Social Security office and request the application form to make a name change. Be prepared with your marriage license or divorce decree.

Making this change promptly will insure trouble-free income reporting and tax returns, so don't delay.

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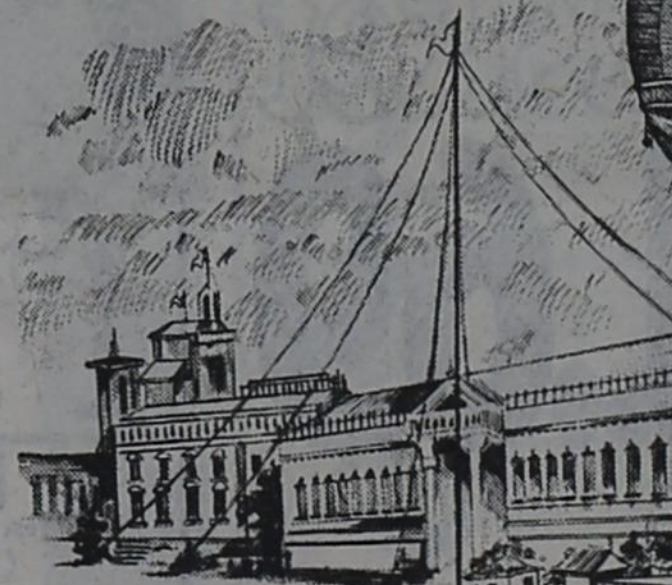
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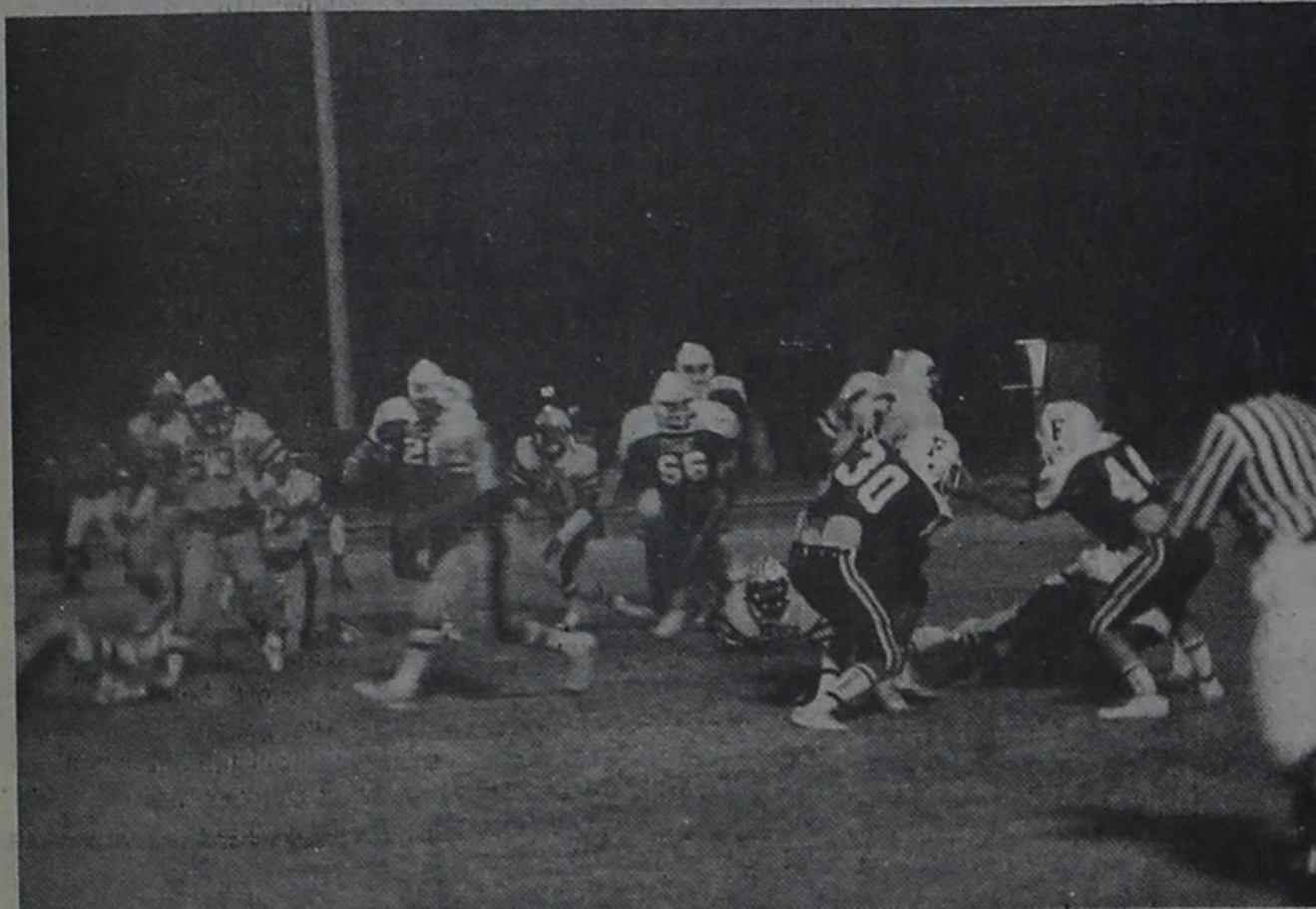

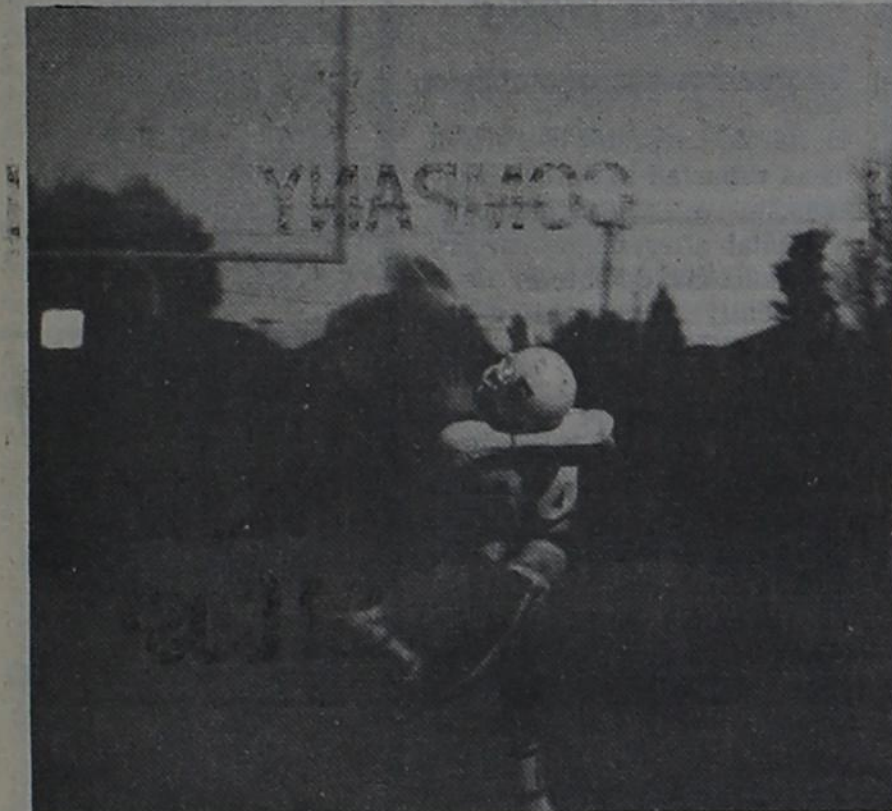


Nowhere To Go

Steers Kick Kangaroos For 2nd District Win

The Farwell Steers put on an impressive show for the home folks at Steer Stadium Friday night, soundly trouncing the Kress Kangaroos 52-16 in a game that was never in doubt from the middle of the first period.

The second win in a row put the Steers at 2-0 in district and 3-4 on the season. They are tied for the district leadership with the new kid on the block, the Olton Mustangs, the team that the Blue and White will visit tonight (Friday) at 7:30 to settle the probable district outcome.

The Steers highly successful outing came with the aid of the good blocking of the offensive line, the running and catching of the Steer backs and receivers, as well as a strong and alert defense.

Early in the game, each team had possession of the ball before the Kangaroos fumbled on the 31 yard line and Farwell took control of the ball. The Kress fumble set up a Farwell touchdown pass from Steer quarterback Alan Eubank to Manuel Cantu who went 30 yards for the touchdown. After the Raymond Sierra kick, Farwell took a 7-0 lead, with only about two minutes gone in the first period.

On the kick-off, the Farwell players hustled all the way down the field and Manuel Cantu got the ball after it touched a Kress player, once again giving the Blue and White the ball on the 29-yard line. Santiago Lucio ran the ball to the three-yard line where Paul Fulcher then ran three yards for the touchdown. Sierra's kick was good, and the Steers were then ahead 14-0, still early in the game.

Kress took over the ball on the 20, but on first and second downs their running game was stopped so they took to the air. With hard pressure from the Steer defensive line the Kress quarterback tossed the ball only to find Steer Kevin Owen reading the play perfectly and making the interception, taking it 25 yards untouched for the touchdown, Farwell's third TD of the game.

Kress took the ball on the 46, but again fumbled, this time with Steve Schilling coming up with the ball for the Blue and White. Three Farwell plays later, Santiago Lucio, behind the blocking of the offensive line and adding a few moves of his own, went 30 yards for the fourth Farwell TD. Another PAT and that ended the first quarter 28-0, Farwell.

In the second quarter Kress came alive and scored on a fourth and one situation. The Kangaroos ran in the two point conversion to make the score 28-8 in the favor of Farwell.

Farwell started their next drive on the 45 and went downfield with runs by Alan Eubank and Raymond Sierra, and

finally a 30-yard run for the touchdown by Santiago Lucio, his second TD of the evening. The half ended Farwell 35-Kress 8.

The second half started with the teams trading possession of the football. On Farwell's next possession, on their second play of the drive, Paul Fulcher sprinted 57 yards for his second touchdown despite being hit by several Kress players.

Kress again tried to run the ball but was stopped by the Steer defense. Steve Schilling racked up a 12-yard Kress loss and Roger Robertson helped out with a three-yard Kress loss, to force a fourth and 25 punt giving Farwell the ball.

Later Kress was again forced to try to go through the Farwell defense and was once more shocked by the coverage of the Steer secondary on passes. This time Jimmy Bernal made the interception and ran 35 yards for a TD. The score was then 49-8.

Kress later took advantage of a Farwell fumble on the five-yard line and score a touchdown and a two-point conversion for their final score of 16 points.

Farwell then began one more scoring drive highlighted by a 35-yard pass completion from Eubank to Robertson and a 20-yard run by Robby Armstrong. The drive was stymied, but Raymond Sierra kicked a 23-yard field goal to give Farwell the final score of the game. Sierra was also perfect on seven extra point kicks.

The Steer defense held together and stopped a Kress drive when Manuel Cantu intercepted a pass in the end zone. Kress made one last effort but was again stopped by an interception by Steve

Schilling. Farwell ran out the clock ending the game with the final score Farwell 52-Kress 16. This week the Steers travel to Olton to play their third district game.

"The team played great and I could not be more pleased with the results of the game against the Kress Kangaroos," said Steer Coach Bruce Dollar.

He had praise for the offensive player of the week, Santiago Lucio, who had a good night in his 128 yards of rushing in only 11 carries and Steven Schilling, who seemed to be in the right place at the right time with his defensive efforts. The coach also recognized the efforts of junior back Paul Fulcher and Alan Eubank the quarterback.

When asked about tonight's game with the Olton Mustangs, Coach Dollar said, "This game will be a deciding factor in who will win district. The Mustangs have scored 75 points and have not been scored on. They carry the same winning record as Farwell, 3-4 for the year and 2-0 district. One thing in our advantage is that we play as a team effort and everyone is well and no one is hurt. Game time is 7:30 p.m. in Olton. We are looking forward to a lot of local support and fans at the game."

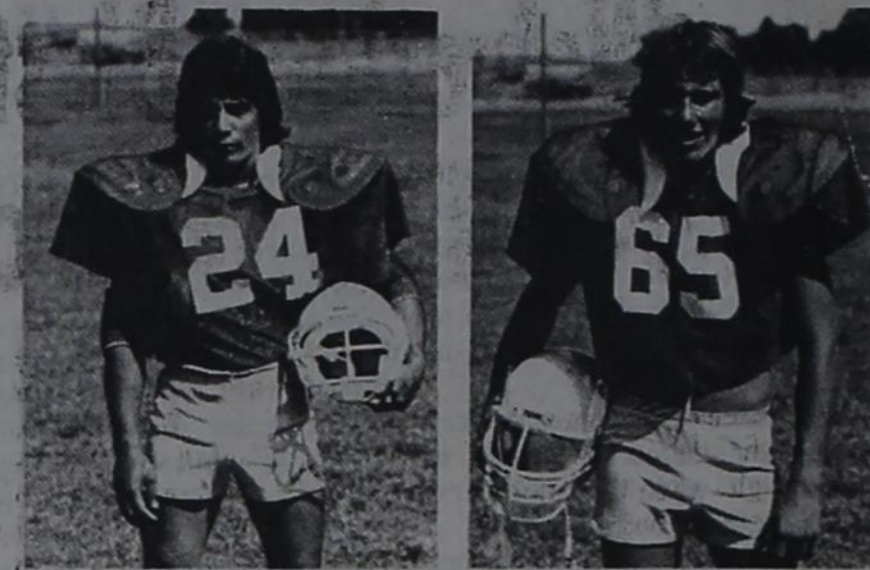

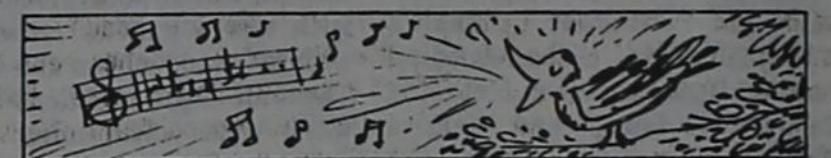

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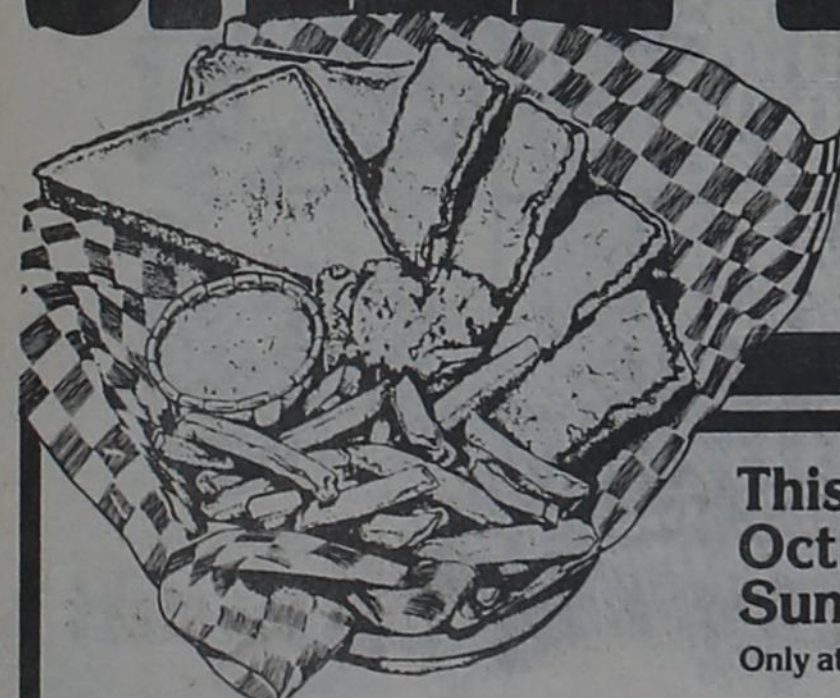

Wolverines Blast Melrose For 47-0 Homecoming Win

The Texico Wolverines took their sixth win of the season Friday night when they defeated the Melrose Buffaloes by a devastating score of 47-0 in the homecoming clash in Texico.

With 8:18 left in the first quarter, Texico got on the scoreboard when quarterback Brad Steward hit Kevin West for a touchdown pass capping off a 75 yard drive. Lloyd Williams kicked the PAT and Texico quickly had a lead of 7-0.

Two plays later, West recovered a Melrose fumble and ran for 31 yards and another TD. The extra point attempt was good by Steward and Texico had a lead of 14-0 with 7:09 still left to play in the first quarter.

Melrose took the pigskin again and committed another fumble, this one recovered by Tommy Boardman of the "No Respect Defense" on the Melrose 20-yard line. Texico capitalized when fullback Lynn Tubbs ripped through the holes provided by the offensive line for seven yards and a TD. 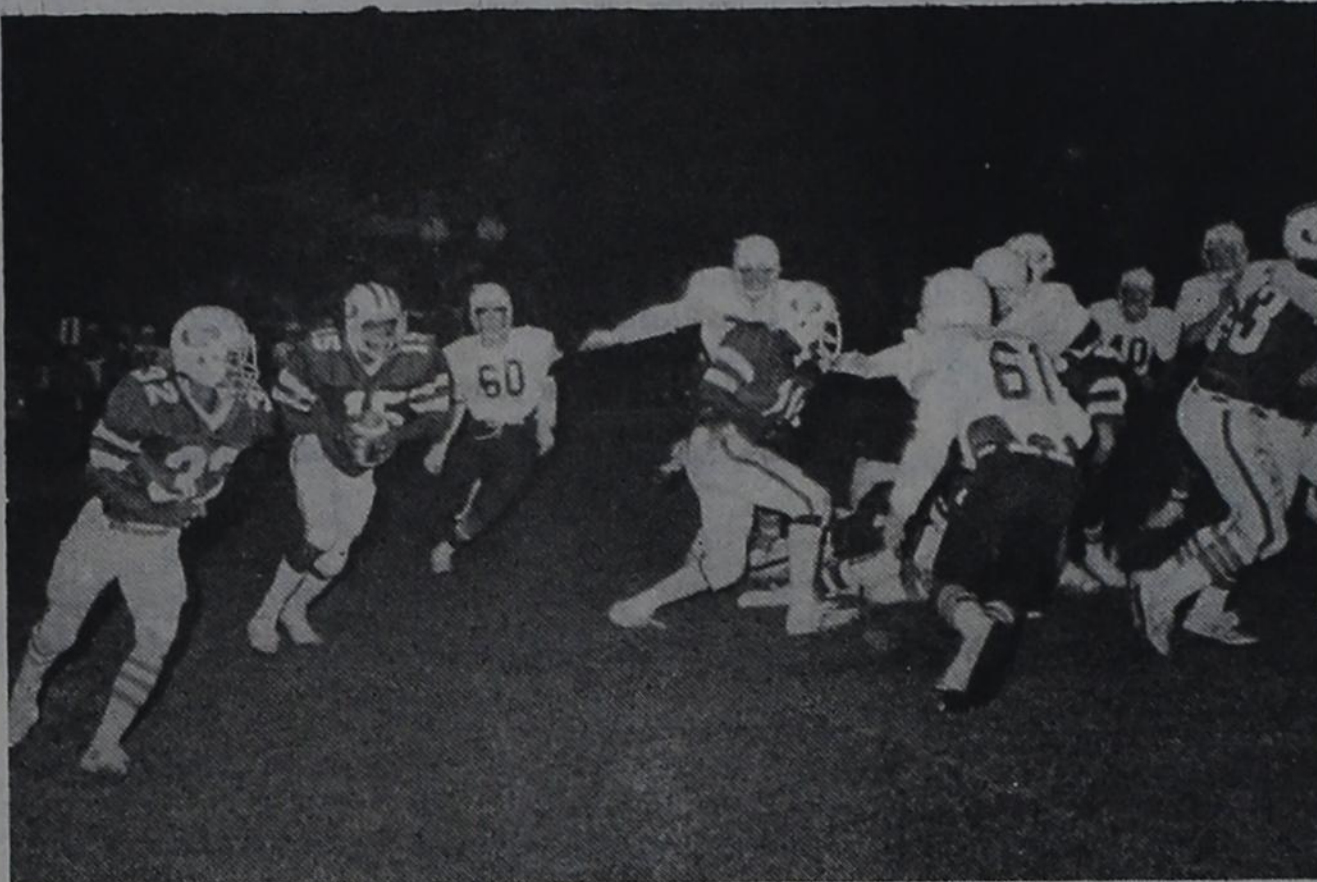

"I will very gladly spend and be spent for you; though the more abundantly I love you, the less I be loved" (II Cor. 12:15).

The true man of God will faithfully serve the congregation which the Lord has entrusted to him without thought of reward. Like Paul, he will "gladly spend and be spent" for them even if his toil and sacrifice go unappreciated. Where the congregation is too small to support him fully he will cheerfully engage in enough secular work to supply the deficiency.
