'Tripoli' Is Inspiring Drama Of The U. S. Marines

John Payne, Maureen O'Hara Head The Cast

Co-op Allowed To Continue B Construction

O. B. Bryan, superintendent of the Caprock Electric Cooperative, returned Saturday night from Washington with orders which will permit the continuation of construction of the "B" section line of the local unit.

He said that the War Production Board had given orders which cleared the way for resumption of construction work, which was halted summarily a week ago when the job apparently snagged on WPB regulations. Failing to get the matter straightened out by telephone, Bryan left last week for the National Rural Electrification Administration office in St. Louis. From there, a REA official accompanied him to Washington.

The "B" section job was started from Stanton and was halted when five miles of holes had been dug and poles strung along 15 other miles. McClure Electric Co. of Dallas had contract for the work and was in process of assigning 75 men for a rapid completion. Notified by Bryan, McClure was back at work.

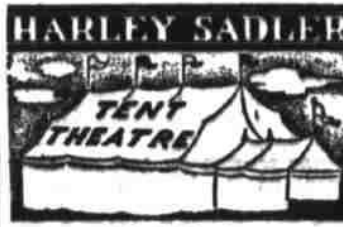

Industrial Sugar Users Will Register At C of C This Week

The chamber of commerce offices have been designated by the Howard County Rationing board as the place of registration Tuesday and Wednesday for industrial handlers and consumers of sugar. It was announced on authority of B. F. Robbins, chairman, Saturday.

Everything is being made ready to accommodate registrants as rapidly as possible, but J. B. Fickie and Horace Reagan, advisors to the trade, urged all who can to come as early as possible to expedite work and avoid last-minute rushes. Registration opens at 9 a. m.

Affected for purposes of the registration are cafes, restaurants, boarding houses, cafeterias, as well as users of sugar at fountains, bottling works, ice cream factories, bakeries, candy factories, or users of sugar in any form where the processed product is for re-sale. Even hospitals, jails, prisons, etc. are not excepted.

Warning was issued to all who should register to do so, for failure means loss of opportunity for at least two weeks, and those not properly registered cannot get sugar for resale or use. Too, late registrants must show good and sufficient reason for not having registered.

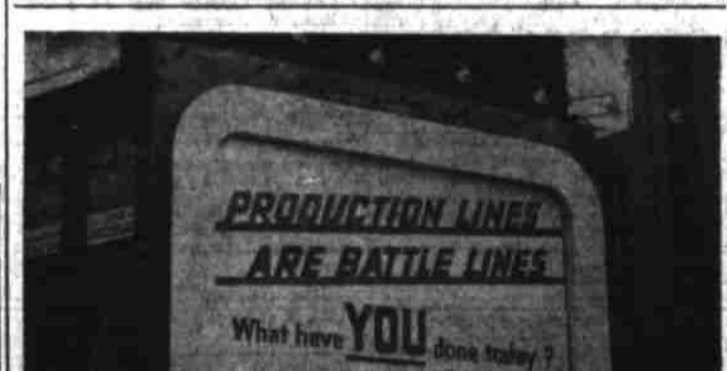

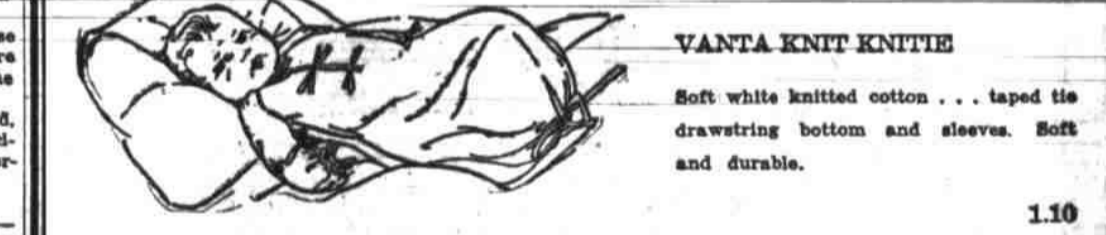
