Tonie Gardner, Richard Barton Top Graduates In Littlefield

Gardner is valedictorian and Barton is salutatorian of the Littlefield High School graduates. Gardner heads the list of top LHS with a 97.39 grade point average. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Troy Gardner, 917 W. Fifth. Barton is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack Barton and completed his 12 years of schooling with a 96.18 grade point average. The accomplishments of Miss Gardner are sweater honors in English and algebra II, geometry and trigonometry. She has been named to Who Among American High Schools as a member and vice president of the National Honor Society, and as representative and secretary of the Student Council.

Always active in basketball and tennis, she was named All-District Forward her junior year and won district in tennis her freshman and sophomore years. She won the state tennis title as a junior. She participated on the LHS Live and Learn Team this year. She was a member of FHA her freshman through junior years and served as vice president of the club and as Area I secretary her sophomore year. She was secretary of the Science Club as a junior.

RICHARD BARTON'S achievements include being named Outstanding Bandsman and drum major his freshman year. He has lettered in football three years and was named Outstanding

Defensive Back as a varsity player his senior year. He participated in varsity track as a sophomore and junior. Hail Suppression Program Gets Underway This Week

This year's hail suppression program is slated to begin this week.

Better Weather Incorporated officers said Friday that the program is to go into effect beginning Thursday, May 1.

Officers said they still had not collected enough money for the entire program, but that they would begin their operations this week with every intention of running the entire six months as originally planned.

Dale Stanley said that as of last Monday, Better Weather officers had raised \$114,000 and that several checks had come in since that meeting date.

If money runs out before the program

is completed, a few days will be chopped off this fall.

The final target area will not be drawn until May 1 and will depend on the participation of each area. At press time a spokesman said that some of the area in the program may be trimmed out due to poor participation. Land in the Amberst area may be cut out of the target area. And the hoped for participation in the immediate north, northwest and northeast Littlefield area may be trimmed, depending on the number of operators who pay.

Meantime new equipment is being installed at the radar center at the Littlefield airport, and the crew is getting ready for spring storms.

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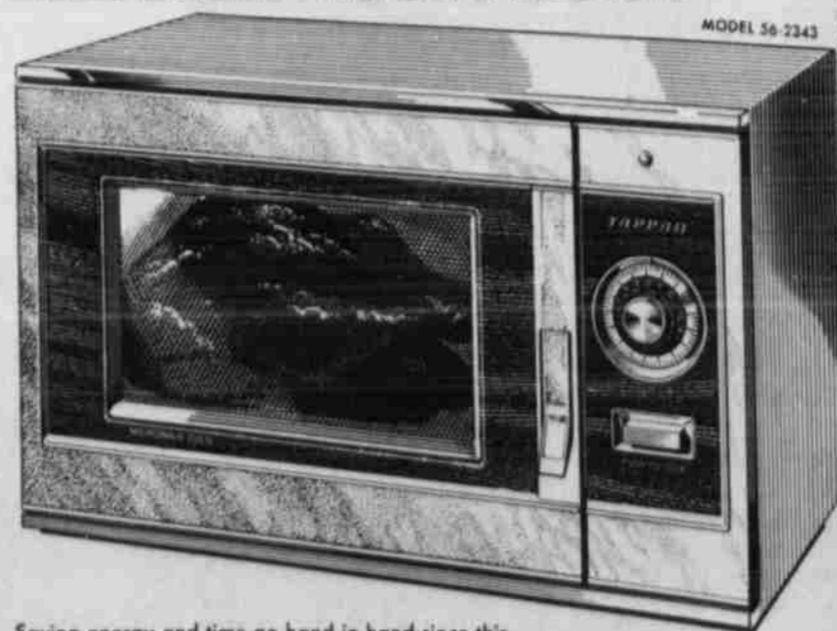
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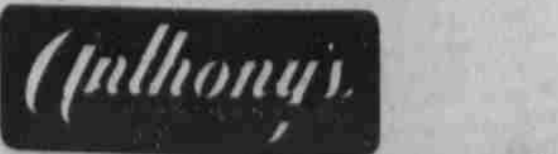
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Moya-Sanchez Wedding Solemnized Here Saturday

Joe James (pastor of Littlefield, Amherst and Sudan churches) led the time-honored Blessing of a Church Building at the site of the old Garcia Cafe on the Clovis Highway in Sudan.

Two hundred twenty-five people were on hand to share in the solemn blessing, the Mass and the meal prepared for the occasion.

Singing was led by a group of "guitaristas" from the mother parish, Sacred Heart Church of Littlefield.

The church in Sudan, named St. Mary's, in honor of the Mother of Jesus Christ, will serve the worship needs of the Catholics in that area by offering Mass on Thursday nights and various other activities throughout the year. Sudan Catholics will still attend Sun-

day Mass in Littlefield until a priest or deacon is assigned to serve their mission full time.

"The building itself is a testimony to the power of the Holy Spirit working in the hearts of some committed Christians," states the pastor. "The transformation from cafe to church has been complete. The insides were gutted and rebuilt, an addition was put on the front and the new area was rewired and carpeted."

Rev. James, working with several families, is "gratified with the fruits of their labors. The church utilizes a visual-aides system, casting slides on the walls, that can take up to six-projector programs.

"This has been shown to be a very effective way to create a worshipful atmosphere and enhance teaching of the Word. Furthermore, the lights are controlled by dimmers, making maximum use of the different moods that light can portray. The building also includes a meeting room and prayer room, and it will serve as a place for fellowship in, and worship to, the Lord Jesus Christ," the pastor continued.

"In an age where the values of the world, self-interest and division, haunt the Body of Christ, it is a refreshing and victorious sign that is seen in the accomplishment of St. Mary's in Sudan. For in this place some Christians responded to the call

from God to work together, to sacrifice and to seek the Kingdom of God. That kind of attitude produces marvelous results, and the results were obvious and beautiful last Thursday night. Praise be to God!", he concluded.
