Under the program set up by the association, payments this year to Atmospherics has been through installments, with the total amount covered by contract.

In discussing the program this year to date, members stated there had been some confusion on the part of participants as to why aircraft from Atmospherics had not always been seen seeding in hail areas. Bill Carley, project supervisor, joined with members of the association in agreeing that more technical data was needed by farmers to understand the seeding procedure.

"The silver iodide process calls for seeding updrafts, while hail usually rides a downdraft to the ground," Moore said. 'The updraft, located perhaps a mile to three miles from the hail, is where the planes have to work to cut off the feeder supply to the hail," he added.

Moore said several participants in the program had called, wondering why planes were not seeding, when in acutality, he stated, "they might have been in the air continuously for more than six hours seeding clouds.

Carley said there are two types of thunderstorms which cuase severe damage in this High Plains area and added that the pilots and crew had "learned quite a bit about weather here during the past two years." He listed squall lines as potentially the most severe, but easier to control, individual cell clusters in most stationary thundershowers less severe but more difficult to seed."

The supervisor, who also is one of three pilots assigned here for the program, said weather had been so turbulent during that summer that he had come back from several cloud seeding operations with his hands bloody from being slammed against the instrument panel of the aircraft.

School Enrollment Shows Small But Steady Increase

Littlefield school enrollment for 1971-72 was up nine students from last year's enrollment during the first five days of school.

A grand total of 1,929 students is recorded on teachers' rolls, compared to 1,920 for 1970-71 according to Superintendent Paul I. Jones

Comparisons of the new figure show that this year's enrollment is up 79 students from two years ago, making the second year in a row that enrollment has increased

Two years ago, 1,850 students were enrolled and at the same time three years ago, the total enrollment was 1,918, compared to 2,010 the year before that.

There are 399 students in the primary building this year, with 51of that number in the kindergarten classes, 200 in the first grade, 150 in the second grade and 13 in level one special education.

In Elementary I, 152 third graders and 161 fourth graders are enrolled -- a total of 313 students

Telephone Rate Change Delayed

President Nixon's wage-price freeze will delay inauguration of new long distance telephone rates for calls within Lamb County and other portions of Texas.

L. L. Porter, traffic director of General Telephone, said lower rates for customers who dial their own intrastate long distance calls would have gone into effect Sept. 1. But the rate changes were coupled with higher rates for persons placing long distance calls through the operator. causing conflict with the wage-price guidelines

"The change in rates would have brought customer dialed station-to-station calls within the state in line with already established lower dial-it-yourself rates and calling periods for interstate calls," Porter explained.

He said the long distance rate changes would be delayed until termination of the wage-price freeze.

FM 168 Work Slated In 1972

The Texas Highway Commission has approved the expenditure of \$551,000 for highway Farm to Market Road improvement in Lamb County during 1972. District Engineer Oscar L. Crain of Lubbock said that a total of 8.7 miles in Lamb County, from the Castro county line on FM 168 to South of Olton, will be involved in the annual program.

Work, which will include reconstruction, grading, streets and surfacing, will be under the supervision of Rhea E. Bradley, supervising resident engineer, of Littlefield.

The work is part of the Highway Commission's combined Farm to Market Road Improvement and State Highway Safety and Betterment Program for 1972.

'Overnight' Mail Delivery Sought For City, Area

Littlefield Postmaster George Thompson said the Littlefield post office and 55 area towns in the Lubbock sectional center are included in plans for "overnight" delivery of first-class mail deposited here by 5 p.m.

The goal is next day delivery of letters

and other first-class mail within cities and surrounding area. This affects more than half of all first-class letter mail.

By Sept. 9, regional and local post offices will identify exact areas where next day delivery will be provided for ZIP-coded first-class mail deposited by 5 p.m. A minimum goal of 95 per cent successful performance has been set for Oct. 31.

In Littlefield, as well as other communities, in order for next day delivery, the first class letters will have to be mailed in time for the 5 p.m. pickups and will not include mailings after carriers have made their deliveries nor mail deposited in receptacles after pickups.

At a minimum, overnight delivery will be provided within and between all 55 post offices in the Lubbock sectional center. In addition, many destinations farther away such as the Dallas area, will receive overnight deliveries, too.

Dollar Day, Labor Day Set Monday

Most businesses in Littlefield will be open for Dollar Day, when numerous bargains are being offered in special sales.

Schools are closed for their first holiday of the year, and students will return to the classrooms Tuesday morning.

Both banks in Littlefield, and the Federal Savings and Loan office will be closed. City hall and courthouse employes will observe the holiday.

No mail will be delivered, with the exception of special delivery and boxes at the post office.

Other people, however, who perform the "essential" services-like grocery store workers. doctors and nurses, law enforcement officers, telephone operators and waitresses-will be in their regular posts working for those who get a holiday.



They think that rudeness is becoming more and more a way of life, and most of us see instances of uncouth, offensive behavior everyday. We also see many instances of genuine, cheerful politeness.

RUDENESS IS WIDESPREAD enough to be alarming to the people who care, and who understand why people are rude in they behavior. The basic meaning of "rude is "being in a rough or unfinished state

It is described by such words as "primitive", "undeveloped" ~crude "ulgar", "the immaturity of 'conrse' adolesence", and "lacking in refinement"

UNCIVIL BEHAVIOR reveals a loss of respect for self, and therefore loss of respect for others. Of course, it reveals many other had flaws in the life of the uncivil person

There is insecurity, some elements of immaturity, a feeling of inadequacy and interiority, a degree of retardation, and oftentimes a growing regression.

THE UNCIVIL PERSON is a constant threat to the safety, the peace and the necessary harmony of the social order.

He is, in many ways, a dangerous person, because his actions undermine the total structure of an orderly and workable society ()f course, he is trying to pull down his own house. too:

whatever extent it is disappearing, savagery is appearing. WE MUST SAVE civility. Let us begin with ourselves by maintaining a constant alertness which will help us preserve it in our own lives. We must not react to rudeness with more rudeness, but we must be courteous.

We must see courtesy as something more than a mask to put on and take off. It must become a permanent part of our character and personality.

THE WHOLE STRUCTURE which supports human well-being, individually and collectively, will collapse when there is no longer sufficient civility to give this structure the resilience and flexibility it must have to survive.

If the persons who are working to destroy all forms of politeness and courtesy succeed, that which we now call "a way of life" will become "a way of death and destruction"


