There were 1,134 votes cast against the local option proposal, with 1,101 votes for it, edging out the legal sale of alcoholic beverages by a narrow margin of 33 votes. Contesting of the election and certification of all votes is almost a certainty.

Littlefield and Lamb County voters turned out in record numbers in near perfect weather election day to join the national trend of putting Nixon back in the White House almost three to one.

In other matters of vital concern Lamb County voters split their tickets in the U.S. Senate race with John Tower winning over Barefoot Sanders, but in the governor's race, Dolph Briscoe edged Hank Grover.

Voters turned out 5,533 strong across the county, and a steady stream of voters cast ballots in the 15 voting precincts throughout the day

The biggest interest locally, however, was the local option election which was narrowly defeated by an unofficial 33 votes. For almost 11 hours the line of voters at the City Hall stretched from the election center inside the City Hall past the curbs in front of the building

Total votes cast reached 2,235. One thousand, one hundred thirty-four voted against the local option, and 1,101 voted for the local option proposition, resulting in the extremely narrow margin. Of the total votes cast in this city election, 173 of the votes were by absentee ballot.

When Rev. J.B. Cagle was contacted Wednesday morning he said as chairman of the Concerned Citizens of Littlefield he would like to thank the voters for their concern and interest in helping to defeat legalized liquor.

Rev. Cagle added that there are some other areas which need investigation. and as concerned citizens the group must not stop now, but continue to see that these other problems are corrected. Let us continue to work together to accomplish our goals," Rev. Cagle added. "making Littlefield a better place in which to live.'

Some proponents for the local option election said they were still sure of a victory. At press time Wednesday those favoring the local option said they were taking a second look at Tuesday's election and that there was a very good possibility that they would ask that every vote cast be certified.

None of the local political candidates were opposed on the ballot. There was a write-in campaign waged in Lamb County commissioner precinct three, however, with George Stewart trying to unseat incumbent Jack Peel.

Peel won handily in the Tuesday balloting, getting 1,892 votes to Stewart's 415.

construction of a cable television system for Littlefield is to begin immediately according to Jack M. Thornell, president of Diversified Communications, Inc. of Lubbock

The announcement came from Diversified Monday after the Federal Communications Commission, in a report and order issued Nov. 1, awarded a certificate of compliance to Diversified Communications, Inc. for the cable television system in Littlefield.

The protest by Lubbock television stations was denied and the Commission ruled that since only 0.47 square miles of the incorporated city limits of Littlefield was within the 35-mile broadcast zone of Lubbock, a waiver would be granted and Littlefield would be considered as totally

Thornell estimated that the citizens of Littlefield will be hooking onto the cable television system by early next spring.

When completed, the cable television system will carry KCBD (11), KLBK (13), KSEL (28), KTXT (5), KMXN (34), all Lubbock stations; WFAA (8) and KDTV (39) from Dallas, and KTVT from Fort Worth.

In addition to these channels, a local time and weather channel and tv test signals will be carried. One channel will be reserved for the origination of local programs. This channel will be made available, without charge, to the Littlefield School system and to the city government.
