## City Tally Indicates 'Dry', However . . .



A GRAND TOTAL of 2,235 votes were cast in the local option election alone Tuesday. Only registered voters living inside the Littlefield city limits in voting precincts 10 and 14 were eligible to vote, and the lineup of voters reached to the curb in front of the City Hall all day long.

Littlefield and Lamb County voters turned out in record numbers in near perfect weather election day to join the national trend of putting Nixon back in the White House almost three to one.

In other matters of vital concern, Lamb County voters split their tickets in the U.S. Senate race with John Tower winning over Barefoot Sanders, but in the governor's race, Dolph Briscoe edged Hank Grover.

Voters turned out 5,533 strong across the county, and a steady stream of voters cast ballots in the 15 voting precincts throughout the day.

The biggest interest locally, however, was the local option election which was narrowly defeated by an unofficial 33 votes. For almost 11 hours the line of voters at the City Hall stretched from the election center inside the City Hall past the curbs in front of the building.

Total votes cast reached 2,235. One thousand, one hundred thirty-four voted against the local option, and 1,101 voted for the local option proposition, resulting in the extremely narrow margin. Of the total votes cast in this city election, 173 of the votes were by absentee ballot.

When Rev. J.B. Cagle was contacted Wednesday morning he said as chairman of the Concerned Citizens of Littlefield he would like to thank the voters for their concern and interest in helping to defeat legalized liquor.

Rev. Cagle added that there are some other areas which need investigation, and as concerned citizens the group must not stop now, but continue to see that these other problems are corrected. "Let us continue to work together to accomplish our goals," Rev. Cagle added, "making Littlefield a better place in which to live."

Charles Ary, chairman of the Citizens for Progress was contacted. He said those for the local option election ran the best race that had ever been run here.

Some proponents for the local option election said they were still sure of a victory. At press time Wednesday those favoring the local option said they were taking a second look at Tuesday's election and that there was a very good possibility that they would ask that every vote cast be certified.

None of the local political candidates were opposed on the ballot. There was a write-in campaign waged in Lamb County commissioner precinct three, however, with George Stewart trying to unseat incumbent Jack Peel.

Peel won handily in the Tuesday balloting, getting 1,892 votes to Stewart's 415.

## Wildcats, Olton In 'Must' Game

If Littlefield wins over Olton Friday night the Wildcats are in like Flin in the district.

Littlefield is 2-0-1, Friona is next with a 2-1 record, Olton is 1-1, and Morton is 0-1-1.

The Olton Mustangs are certainly a team to be respected. In the past two years the Mustangs are the only district team able to beat the Wildcats in conference play.

The Mustangs are big—a little bigger than Morton. Olton is a triple option team on offense and they run the Houston veer. Add to that that they are certainly capable of throwing the ball, and several outstanding players who've seen plenty of action the past three years.

Don't forget that it was Olton who beat Morton 13-10. So Coach Jerry Bakely is predicting an exceptionally close ball game.

For those who like to compare scores, Muleshoe beat Olton 21-8, Floydada downed the Mustangs 17-8 and Friona won 7-0.

Olton has a very good defensive team.

Some outstanding Mustangs are Keith Workman, the 6-2, 210-pound senior fullback who was named All South Plains running back as a sophomore.

Steve Lewis is another three-year starter. Lewis is a very good offensive guard at 5-10, 165.

Jimmy McCurry is a three-year starter. This 5-11, 200-pounder starts both offensively and defensively at his tackle position. Don Deberry is another experienced tackle. He stands 6 feet and weighs in at 235.

Another outstanding returning starter is Randy McCoy, 5-11, 180, at tight end.

With either Tim Givens or Vic Allcorn

at quarterback, the Mustangs are able to take to the air at will.

Littlefield's lineup will have at ends Chris Pope, 170-pound junior, and Leon Hodge, 140-pound senior.

Tackles will be Doug McCain, 185-pound sophomore, and Randy Cook, 190-pound junior.

At guard will be Bill Hamblin, 170-pound senior and Floyd Smith, 195-pound junior.

Kenny Francis, 160-pound senior, will be at center; 155-pound junior Terry Bryson will be the starting quarterback.

Running backs will be Lenearl Lewis, 160-pound senior; Pat Henderson, 145-pound junior and J.E. Johnson, 185-pound senior.

## Barbara Black, Aubrey Pitts Honored

Barbara Black of the Sudan 4-H Club and Aubrey Pitts of the Pleasant Valley 4-H Club were honored as Gold Star Girl and Boy for 1972 Saturday night during the Annual Lamb County 4-H Achievement Awards Banquet in the Littlefield Junior High School Cafeteria.

Theme for the event was "A New Day, A New Way," and several other awards of recognition were presented along with year pins.

Serving as master of ceremonies for the banquet was Randy Bales of the Amherst 4-H Club, and the mistress of ceremonies was Sheila Lewis of the Earth-Springlake 4-H Club.

Aubrey Pitts presented the welcome address following a recitation of the motto and pledge, led by Dean Walden of the Littlefield 4-H Club, and the invocation by Howard Tooley of the Amherst 4-H Club.

Connie Ham of the Sudan 4-H Club introduced the guests prior to the introduction of the guest speaker by Kent Lewis of the Earth-Springlake 4-H Club.

Special speaker for the night was Lee R. Colgan of Lamesa, County Extension Agent from Dawson County. Colgan commended the young people who are involved in 4-H work, and remarked twice that he would not be afraid to take them by himself to any place in the world, because he was confident they

would be a well-behaved group of people.

He charged the youngsters with the statement "It will be competitive the rest of your life, so get into a field you like and it won't be hard work." He was relating three basic experiences they would face in life: pride, competition, and achievement.

And on the final step, achievement, he remarked that things achieved come through learning. "You'll make some mistakes along . . . and we adults make them too. You are going to fill the shoes of all the adults one day, so take pride in what you do."

Reports from the various 4-H clubs throughout the county were presented by Ricky Yantis of Amherst, Joe Foley of Littlefield, Pat Britton of Olton, Gary Don Barton of Pleasant Valley, and representatives from the Sudan and Earth-Springlake clubs.

Bobby Brunson, county extension agent, introduced the Gold Star Boy.

"The Gold Star Award recognizes outstanding achievement, leadership and contribution to the County 4-H program. A 4-H member must have completed at least 3 years of 4-H work and be a senior club member. Record books are judged by a committee of out-of-county personnel.

"Our Gold Star winner tonight has

contributed much to the Lamb County 4-H program and has been outstanding in leadership.

"Our winner is from a strong 4-H family with two older brothers and one older sister winning the Gold Star Award.

"He has been a 4-H member for eight years, and has served as reporter, vice president, president for two years, county council delegate of his local club. He is presently serving as chairman of the county 4-H Council.

"He has been very active as a teen leader in helping younger members. He has carried projects in meat animals, poultry, horse, tractor, share-the-fun, rifle and leadership.

"He has served as chairman of the 4-H Rally Day and master of ceremonies of the 4-H Achievement Awards Banquet.

"Lamb County's 1972 Gold Star winner is Aubrey Pitts of the Pleasant Valley 4-H Club—son of Mr. and Mrs. Kirk Pitts."

Mrs. Lynn Bowerman, county extension agent, introduced the Gold Star Girl, and began, "In presenting the Gold Star Award this year, we recognize a girl who has been a 4-H Club member for 9 years. She has carried and completed projects in foods and nutrition, clothing, leadership, lamb money management and home improvement.

"She has served her club and Lamb County as County Council delegate, reporter for County Council and secretary for County Council. Also, as a

## Cable TV Here Soon

Preliminary activity toward the construction of a cable television system for Littlefield is to begin immediately according to Jack M. Thornell, president of Diversified Communications, Inc. of Lubbock.

The announcement came from Diversified Monday after the Federal Communications Commission, in a report and order issued Nov. 1, awarded a certificate of compliance to Diversified Communications, Inc. for the cable television system in Littlefield.

The protest by Lubbock television stations was denied and the Commission ruled that since only 0.47 square miles of the incorporated city limits of Littlefield was within the 35-mile broadcast zone of Lubbock, a waiver would be granted and Littlefield would be considered as totally

outside any television market area.

Thornell estimated that the citizens of Littlefield will be hooking onto the cable television system by early next spring.

When completed, the cable television system will carry KCBD (11), KLBK (13), KSEL (28), KTX (5), KMXN (34), all Lubbock stations; WFAA (8) and KDTV (39) from Dallas, and KTVT from Fort Worth.

In addition to these channels, a local time and weather channel and tv test signals will be carried. One channel will be reserved for the origination of local programs. This channel will be made available, without charge, to the Littlefield School system and to the city government.

Effective immediately Lamb County adults (18 years or older) and all out-of-county residents of the Lubbock Major Resource Area may borrow library materials from Lubbock City-County

Libraries by presenting a current library card from their local library and identification showing their current address.

All rules and regulations observed by Lubbock County borrowers will be applicable to out-of-county borrowers with the following exceptions: (1) All seven-day materials, films, art prints and sculpture reproductions will be unavailable for circulation to out-of-county borrowers; (2) out-of-county borrowers may return library materials to their local library which will in turn mail them to Lubbock. The borrower may be asked to pay the postage, however.

A Lubbock City-County Libraries' card issued to an out-of-county borrower at some time in the past will be honored only one more time after the above date.

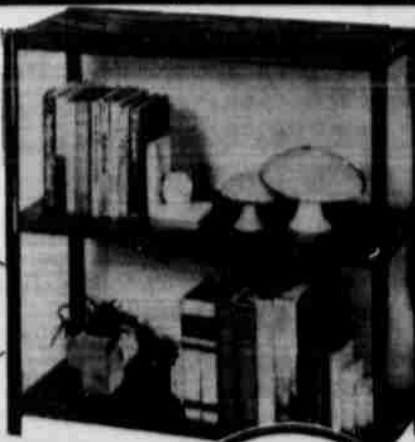

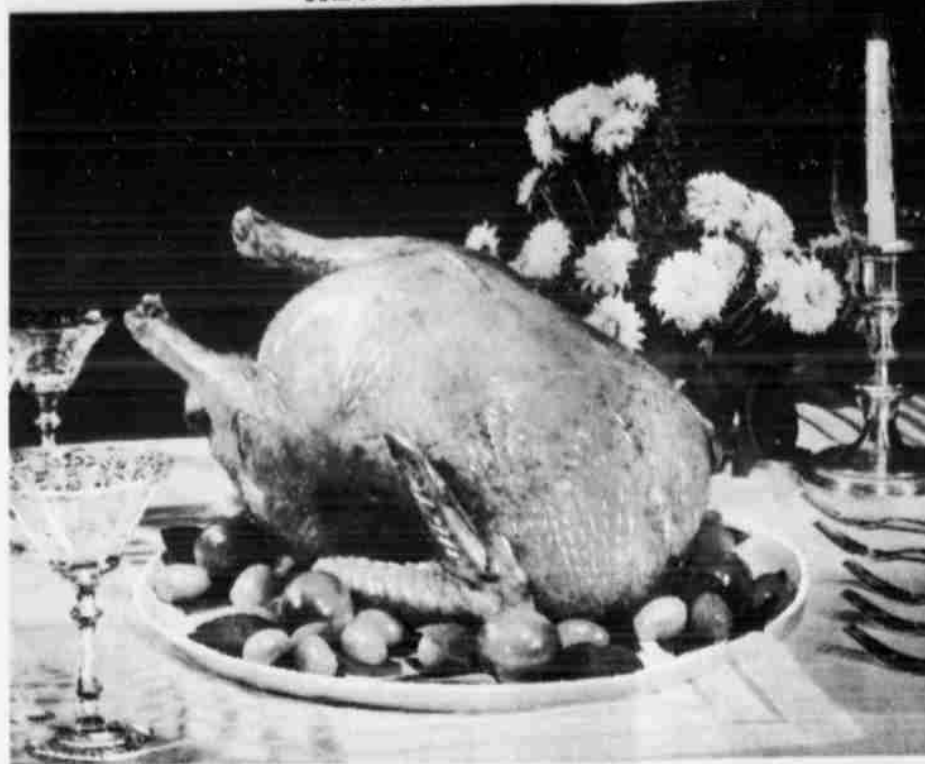
