## Hopes Sparked For End Of Drouth

Four cloudy days with intermittent rain and showers have given crops in the area a little nudge and even sparked a glimmer of hope that the drouth will be breaking in areas where it has been too dry even to plant this year.

The welcome sight of slow, gentle showers soaking into sunbaked land has been fairly widespread throughout this area.

Through Tuesday afternoon, varying amounts of moisture were reported all

over the Littlefield trade area. Monday's showers provided from .7 of an inch to 2.5 inches.

The heaviest downpours reported were in portions of the Sudan community. Showers started just west of the cemetery and grew heavier as they moved toward Sudan where as much as 2.5 inches fell in 20 minutes during a brief downpour about 2 p.m. Monday.

Some Bula farmers reported two-inch rains Tuesday morning.

Prior to the Monday and early Tuesday morning showers, most communities had received from 2 to 6. The rains which began late Friday night and continued through Tuesday raised hope in the hearts of irrigation farmers and gave irrigation wells a brief rest.

Although the showers perked up dryland grain sorghum, more rain will be needed. But the moisture gives farmers hope for another week or so. The showers will definitely benefit

irrigated crops and give farmers a chance to catch up. They can water a little deeper, and the showers give some relief to wells and farmers worn out from constant irrigation.

The rains haven't broken the drouth, but farmers hope the rains hold crops until there is additional rain or until they can get across with irrigation.

Meantime, everyone seems to be thankful for moisture received and very hopeful of more showers.

## Anton Citizens Dedicate Jubilee To Ed M. Hart

At Anton Saturday during a drizzle of rain, citizens dedicated their Golden Jubilee Celebration to the memory of Ed M. Hart "for his unflinching time and devotion in serving Anton, 'The Town With A Purpose'."

The dedication came as the speaker for the day, James A. Ellis of Amarillo, Anton High School's first graduate, closed his reminiscence speech on his recollections of Anton and the history of it through the present time.

Mrs. Clarence "Hank" Matthews of Levelland, wife of the master of ceremonies for the day, presented a plaque to Mrs. Ed (Virginia) Hart, designating the dedication, and immediately following, Anton's Mayor Olen Johnson presented a plaque to Mrs. Hart from the citizens of Anton "for being the woman behind the man." Mrs. Hart was also informed that a special memorial is to be erected in the park, honoring her husband.

Although rain dampened a few hairdos and soaked a few shirts, the spirit of the citizens of Anton and their guests for the day remained constantly enthusiastic. The weather was pleasant throughout most of the day, with a most-welcomed rain topping off the day's celebration.

Registration and reminiscing started the day off with a bang in the museum, where numerous pictures and other items of early-day history were on display.

Registering as the persons coming the farthest distance for the Jubilee Celebration were Dieter Strasilla and Gabi Ehrlich of Bischotsuain, Germany. Dieter Strasilla was an exchange student at Anton 14 years ago, and the two are visiting in the home of Mike and Edna Crews at Anton. They have been in the United States four weeks and came to Texas a week ago from San Francisco.

Recognized and presented a plaque as the oldest person present was Mrs. S. J. Farquhar of Littlefield, 91. She said she helped serve food with her church group on opening day at Anton, Dec. 3, 1924. She also recalls that "it was one of the worst sandstorms we've ever had", that blew up later in the day.

Revealed as being the first person born at Anton, was Mrs. Amos Shockley, now deceased. She was born Lila Lea Morgan, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. C. C. Morgan, now of Clovis, N.M., who were present for the celebration.

Mrs. Morgan stated that Rev. Morgan helped dig the first grave in the Anton Cemetery, and helped organize the Anton Baptist Church in March, 1925. Morgan was ordained into the ministry in April, 1932 at the Anton church, and all seven of their children were born at Anton. They moved from Anton in 1940 when he accepted the pastorate of the Progress Baptist Church near Muleshoe, and since have gone to Texico and Clovis churches.

David Morales, an Anton High School sophomore and member of the Gypsy Band, was lauded for his art work he did for the celebration, and was presented a check for \$100 as a token of appreciation.

Earlier in the day, activities of

various kinds were enjoyed by the young and old alike, and another highlight of the day came when the re-organized Gypsy Band, formed of Anton High School students, led the large parade.

Winning the float trophies were, first place, Anton HD Club, second place, Conoco Oil; and third place, the float bearing members of the original Gypsy Band and being pulled by a Model T Ford.

Honorable mentions went to the mule team and wagon, owned by Arch Lamb of Lubbock, and the Anton Quilting Club's float.

Winners of the riding club division were, first place, Lubbock Saddle Club; second place, Lamb County Sheriff's Posse; and third place, Abernathy Riding Club. In the junior riding club division, the Anton 4-H Riding Club won first.

Winners of the antique car division were Joe Vasek of Littlefield, first place; and Gale Ballard of Shallowater.

Drawings for prizes donated by Anton merchants were held periodically during the day, and one of the prize winners was Mrs. Rosie Ellis, mother of James A. Ellis, speaker of the day. The Ellises moved to Anton in Feb., 1927.

Winners of the whiskers contest were: nastiest, Alvin Swanson; scrungiest, O. H. Barnes; greyest, Raymond Stevens; and the two with "most kissable" beards were Johnny Harper and B. J. Foster.

A special plaque was presented to the speaker of the day, in recognition of his being the first graduate of Anton High School, and for his participation in the 50th Anniversary Celebration.




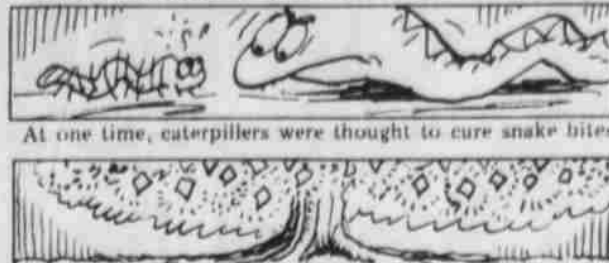

# EDITORIAL

## Prepared For School?

THE BEGINNING of school is just around the corner. When the month of August rolls around, thousands of Texas mothers suddenly realize that only a few more weeks remain until school begins.

News of that impending event may surprise most of us, who wonder where the summer has gone; it will delight mothers who will welcome the chance to see the kids out from underfoot; and it will mean the end of summer freedom for thousands of Texas youngsters.

NOWADAYS, going back to school is a major enterprise for those families with school age children. It usually means new shoes and school clothes, the requisition of pencils and notebooks, or simply getting back into the old routine and habits.

There are certain other requirements that parents need to think about, and they need to think about them early enough to avoid the delays of last-minute requests. Children entering the first grade must be able to show proof of age. That usually means a certified copy of the child's birth certificate must be obtained from the city registrar, county clerk, or the Texas Health Department in Austin.

AS USUAL, many Texas families will wait until the last moment to think about securing a certified copy of their first-grader's birth certificate. That means a heavy last-minute demand on officials who keep those records, and a probable delay in receiving the document from registration officials.

Across the state of Texas some two and a half million children will be heading to the public schools this fall. Nearly a quarter million will be first graders, and their birth certificates will have to be searched out of the files of the Texas Health Department's Bureau of Vital Statistics or other agencies at the city or county level which may have copies on hand.

ANTICIPATING the rush of birth certificate requests, health officials have put into effect a fast and efficient service operation at the Texas Health Department in Austin. Requests already are pouring in.

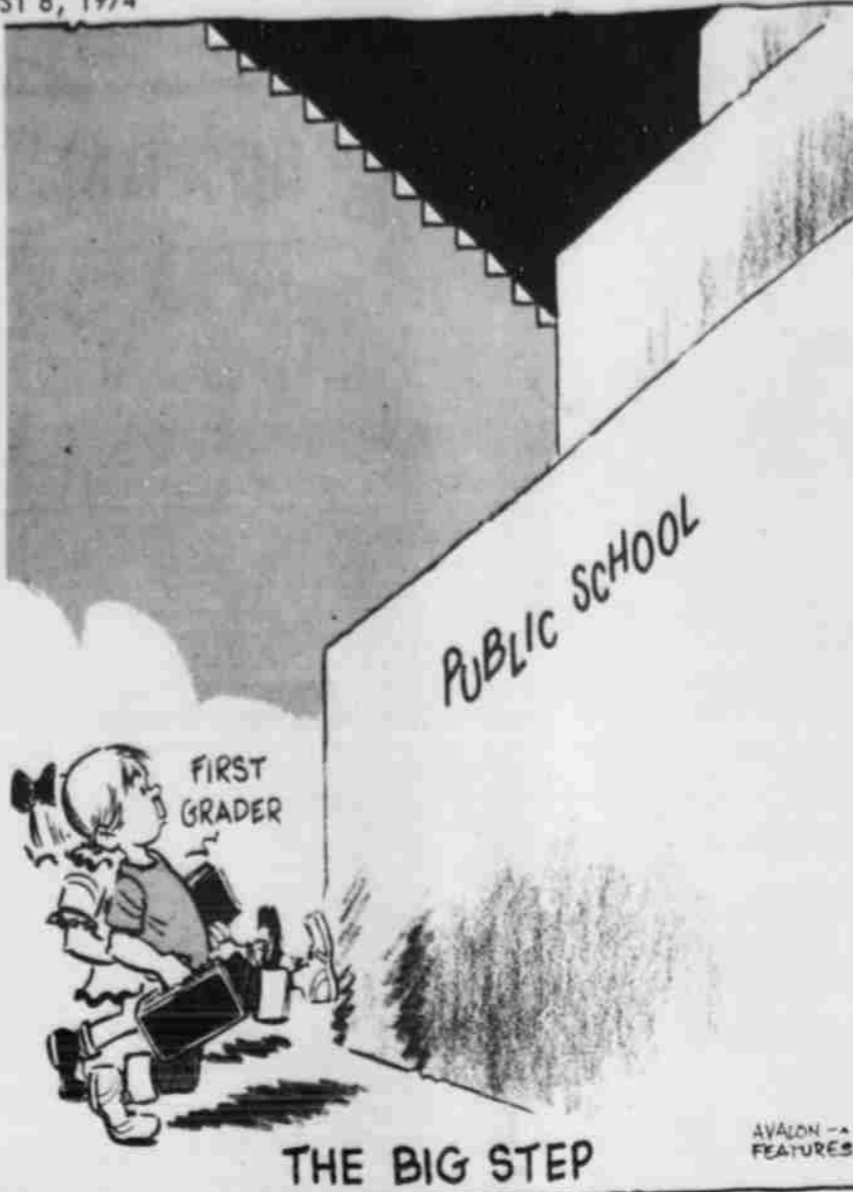
It takes a sizeable staff just to open the thousands of letters received daily, let alone search out a requested certificate, remove it from the thick volume, make a certified copy, mail it out, and then return the original certificate to its proper place in the files.

YEARS OF EXPERIENCE have eliminated nearly every bottleneck. The operation is smooth and fast. Usually the copy is mailed within two or three days after the request is received.

One bottleneck still remaining, however, is the individual who makes the last-minute requests. Parents are urged by state health officials to take time now and write for a certified copy of the child's birth certificate, or contact either the city registrar where the child was born, or the county clerk in the county of birth.

IF YOU PREFER to write to health officials in Austin, address the request to the Texas State Department of Health, Bureau of Vital Statistics, 410 East Fifth Street, Austin, Texas 78701. Be sure to include the child's name, place of birth, date of birth, and the parents' name (including the mother's maiden name). The fee is \$2.

And don't forget. When you're thinking about getting your child ready for the beginning of school, a new state law now requires compulsory immunization for all school children. The immunization program must be begun before the end of this year, so it's a good idea to see your physician or visit a public health clinic early to begin your child's immunization program.



## CLIPS & TIPS

WANT TO ADD an oriental flair to a meal sometime? This recipe for Oriental Chicken makes six servings, and can be served over hot rice or those crisp chow mein noodles you find at the store.

**ORIENTAL CHICKEN**

3 whole chicken breasts  
1/4 cup salad oil  
2 cups celery (sliced diagonally)  
1 green pepper, sliced  
3 green onions, sliced  
1 pkg. Chinese peas, thawed  
1 cup sliced bamboo shoots  
1/4 pound fresh mushrooms, sliced  
1 can (4 or 5 oz.) water chestnuts, drained and sliced  
2 cups chicken broth  
2 Tbsps. soy sauce  
1 tsp. sugar  
1 Tbsp. salt  
1 Dash of pepper  
2 Tbsps. cornstarch  
1/4 cup water

Slice meat from bones into short narrow strips. Saute the chicken in salad oil until meat is lightly browned.

Add to the pan the sliced celery, green pepper, green onions, Chinese peas, bamboo shoots, fresh mushrooms and water chestnuts. Fry together, stirring constantly, until the vegetables are wilted.

Then mix together the sugar, salt, pepper, soy sauce and chicken broth, and pour over the chicken and vegetables; cover and steam about 5 minutes.

Dissolve the cornstarch in water; add to the cooking mixture and stir until the liquid has thickened.

Dish onto plates over the hot rice or chow mein noodles, whichever you prefer.

That dish really goes well with V-8 vegetable juice—either hot or cold.

1 1/2-oz. can French fried onion rings or make your own, crisp

Cook green beans about 5 minutes. Drain well, then mix with other ingredients—except onion rings. Pour into a greased 2-quart casserole and bake at 400 degrees for about 20 minutes. Sprinkle top with onion rings. Bake 10 minutes more. Makes 8 to 10 servings.

**TIPS AND TIDBITS:**

HERE ARE SOME more helpful hints given to me by my neighbor and friend, Mrs. Jean Hasteley. Thanks 'a bunch', Jean.

**TO SAVE** daily washing of ash trays, wax them. Ashes won't cling, odor won't linger and disposable tissues will wipe them clean.

**WHEN USING** a recipe card, put the card between the tines of a fork and place the fork in a glass. The card will be held at just the right angle for reading, and will be kept off the table where it might become soiled.

**TO RUN** rods into curtains easily, cover the rod with an old glove finger.

**TO TEST FRESHNESS** of eggs, place the egg in a pan of water. If fresh, it will lie on its side. If a few days old, it will tilt upwards. If stale, it will stand on end. If very old, it will float.

**EVER GET** two glasses stuck together? Pour cold water into the upper glass to contract it, and then immerse the lower glass into warm water to expand it. They can then be separated very easily.

**YOU'LL NEVER** lose your pie plate at a church or community feast if you don't take it. Make your pie on a plate lined with aluminum foil. After the pie is baked, slip the pie-in-foil on a piece of cardboard.

**BEING AS CUCUMBERS** are in abundance at this time of the year, here is a good salad recipe utilizing them. This serves six.

**CUCUMBER SALAD**

3 medium cucumbers  
Lettuce  
Parsley  
1 Tbsp. green onion top, chopped  
1 Tbsp. minced parsley  
1/8 tsp. pepper  
3 Tbsps. vinegar  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1 1/2 cups low fat cottage cheese

Peel, quarter and slice cucumbers. Place in bowl and sprinkle with salt; set aside.

In a small bowl that goes with your mixer, blend until well blended the cottage cheese, vinegar, parsley, pepper and green onion. Mix with the cucumbers and chili. You can serve this over lettuce leaves on a salad plate and garnish with parsley or a dash of paprika (for color).

**GREEN BEANS** are another garden product that are available this summer, and here's a recipe that you can say is "different".

**GREEN BEANS CASSEROLE**

2 (10 oz. pkgs.) or the equivalent in fresh green beans  
1-pound can bean sprouts, drained  
1 can condensed cream of mushroom soup  
5 to 6-oz. can sliced water chestnuts, drained  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1/2 cup grated cheddar cheese

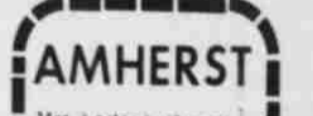

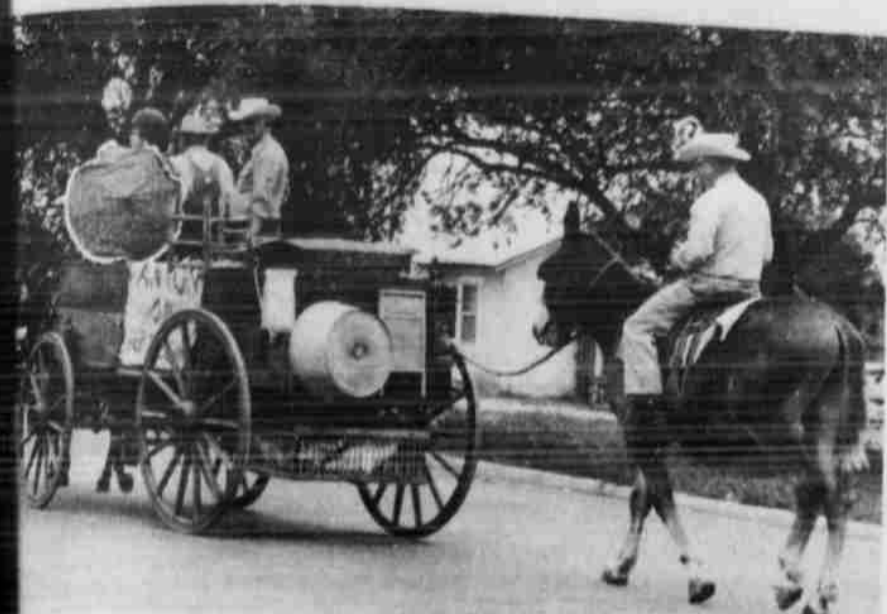
