Factory Rebates On Cars Help Some, Hurt Others

Have the cash rebates from car manufacturers helped new car sales in Littlefield?

Depends on the dealership, evidently.
"You bet! Oh gosh yes!" said B. D.
Garland. "It's just fabulous. I've never
seen anything like it. We've never sold
this many cars in the month of January
in the history of the company," was this
Dodge, Chrysler, Plymouth dealer's

"No way," is the arswer Joe Carlisle gave at the Ford dealership. "The rebates haven't helped our sales any, since the cash refunds only apply to the very small cars. And we just don't sell many sub compacts."

J. L. Marcum said the rebates on the small cars he sells through his Oldsmobile, Cadillac, Pontiac dealership have hurt his sales.

"If anything, these rebates have hurt our sales," Marcum said. "We sell very few Astro, Omega, Ventura and Starfire

models. And right now, those are the only ones where the rebate applies."

"The rebates have helped a little," said Troy Armes at Armes Chevrolet. "But General Motors is only rebating on Nova, Vega and Monza.

"What would really help would be if GM would rebate on all models. Then things would really pick up," Armes added.

In this part of the country, most people still prefer to drive a medium sized to a large, luxury car, and for most purposes the rebates just haven't helped all that much with the exception of the offers made by the Chrysler Corporation.

Even at Garland Motors, the majority of the new cars sales have been on the heavier, more luxurious cars including five Chrysler New Yorkers, a Charger, van and club cab pickup.

Marcum said he feels like people thinking that GM may start rebating on all their models is one reason their sales haven't picked up. Many who are contemplating buying a car are sitting back and waiting for GM to offer rebates on all models.

There is one bright note along this line. If cash bonuses or rebates are offered on all the GM models, this offer is retroactive and anyone buying a car between Jan. 12 and Feb. 28 will be re-

imbursed.

So far, GM is holding out, saying they don't intend to make this offer on all models or across the board.

In metropolitan areas and large towns with colleges, the rebates on the small cars have beined car sales

cars have helped car sales.

"But most people around here want bigger cars," Carlisle said. "I've had people tell me they prefer to drive just half as much and drive a bigger car."

"We haven't been allowed to offer rebates long enough to really tell, yet," Armes said. "But rebates on the three cars we can offer won't help us like it may some other dealers."

"Overall Chrysler sales are up 89 percent," Garland said. "And we have a fabulous inventory— 37 new cars and 27 used ones. It's even helping used car color."

That's the way sales are in Littlefield.

Just depends on what the dealers are allowed to do.

2 Area Savings & Loan Firms Seeking Branch Offices Here

Two savings and loan branch offices have made application for offices in Littlefield.

A consolidated hearing on the applications has been scheduled for March 20 at 9:30 a.m. in the office of the Savings and Loan Department of Texas in Austin.

The Texas Employment Commission will begin taking claims for extended unemployment benefits Feb. 3, according to Roy Wilson office manager of the Littlefield TEC.

Unemployed persons who have filed initial claims for benefits within one year prior to Jan. 26, 1975, and who have exhausted those benefits, are eligible to file a claim.

Payments will be made at the same rate as for regular unemployment insurance, but the total extended benefits will equal only 50 per cent of regular benefits. However, a new federal program may pay extended benefits in the same amount as regular extended state benefits.

Persons claiming unemployment insurance benefits as ex-servicemen or ex-Federal employees are also eligible for these extended benefits.

Extended benefits are available only so long as the rate of unemployment remains at levels specified by law.

Claimants who file for extended benefits on or before February 19 may file claims backdated to include January 26, 1975, if they meet the usual requirements for drawing unemployment insurance.

Claims for extended benefits may be filed at the nearest Texas Employment Commission office.



Highway Construction To Include County Work

Highway construction contracts let in January by the Texas Highway Commission include work in Lamb County.

The work, supervised by District Engineer George C. Wall, Jr., will be in Bailey, Castro, Crosby, Garza, Hockley, Lamb and Yoakum Counties.

A contract was awarded to W. D. Turner Construction Company and High Plains Pavers, Inc. of Lubbock. Low bid was \$998,464.35.

The project, which will require an estimated 75 working days, will be under High Department Engineer William M. Pope of Lubbock.

The contract is for seal coating 112.3 miles, including:


