TAG SALES MUST WAIT

Some confusion has come to several automobile owners in Lamb County, because the wording on the new auto registration forms—"it is now time to buy your 1970 license plates"—doesn't mean what it says.

According to a spokesman in the Lamb County Tax Assessor-Collector's office, "We've had several people call and some who have come into the office to register their automobiles. We just have to tell them we have to wait until February before their plates may be issued."

Sale of license plates from the office will begin Monday, Feb. 2.

Area Bank Deposits Still Top \$50 Million

End-Of-Year Total Down Two Per Cent

A slight dent in the county economy due to the June hail, wet fall and early freeze is reflected in the year-end bank deposits.

Dec. 31 deposits for area banks are down two per cent from 1968 deposits.

Spokesmen at the Lamb County Banks, Littlefield Federal Savings and Loans, and Citizens State Bank at Anton show deposits totaling \$52,510,603.39 at the close of business on Dec. 31. Deposits on the same date in 1968 totaled \$53,662,882.87.

Loans and discounts at the eight banking institutions for the period ending Dec. 31, 1969 were \$29,623,081.65 down more than \$1 million from the 1968 figure of \$30,731,549.20.

Littlefield Federal Savings & Loan reported Dec. 31 total deposits of \$11,751,416.53. This is up from \$11,738,907.90 at the end of '68. Deposits for 1967 were \$11,625,418.

End of year loans and discounts at Littlefield Federal were \$10,283,922.61 compared to \$10,496,831.84 last year and \$9,099,004.33 in 1967.

The First National Bank of Littlefield showed total deposits of \$5,452,355.54 compared to \$6,749,263.89 in '68 and \$6,136,334.53 in '67.

Loans and discounts at the First National were \$2,019,440.62, down from \$3,880,670.15 in '68 and \$2,816,901.64 in '67.

Security State Bank of Littlefield showed total deposits of \$12,476,488.50 at the close of business Dec. 31. Total deposits in '68 were \$11,923,890.94, up from \$10,667,388.04 for '67.

Loans and discounts were \$5,682,100.40 for '69, compared to \$5,342,607.28 for '68 and \$5,268,319.70 for '67.

First National Bank at Amherst had \$4,656,035.44, up from \$4,630,671.48 for '68 and \$4,289,959.41 for '67.

Loans and discounts at the Amherst bank were \$792,997.41 for '69, \$838,319.85 for '68 and \$874,742.72 for '67.

Citizens State Bank of Earth had deposits of \$3,424,294.99 compared to \$3,591,565.37 a year ago and \$3,324,000 for 1967.

Loans and discounts at the Earth bank were \$2,165,189.17 for 1969, \$2,081,960.52 for 1968 and \$1,900,000 for 1967.

Sudan's First National Bank had deposits of \$3,948,424.26 at the end of 1969. Deposits of \$4,058,072.49 were recorded for 1968 and \$3,087,637.95 for 1967.

Loans and discounts at Sudan were up to \$1,260,818.18 from the 1968 total of \$1,049,261.05. Loan totals for 1967 were \$1,178,925.30.

Citizens State Bank at Anton had \$3,099,161.71 deposited at the close of business, 1969, compared to \$2,752,973.16 in 1968 and \$2,821,689.60 on deposit in 1967.

Loans and discounts at Anton were \$2,611,941.70 compared to \$1,883,112.60 in '68 and \$1,852,030 for 1967.

Olton State Bank showed \$7,702,426.40 closing deposits. Totals for 1968 were \$8,217,537.64 up from \$7,475,087.51 in 1967.

Loans and discounts were \$4,806,671.56 compared to \$5,158,785.91 a year ago and \$4,350,620.65 in 1967.

Voter Sign-Up At Average Pace

Approximately 3,400 Lamb County residents have registered to vote to date, according to Lamb County Tax Assessor-Collector Herbert Dunn, and voters will be facing several elections in 1970.

"Registrations are running about average for this time of the year, and we expect them to increase in the next few days," Dunn remarked. "I would guess that we've registered less than half of the voters we expect to register this year," he said.

"We want to urge voters to register ahead of the Jan. 31 deadline. Our office in the courthouse will be closed Saturday, Jan. 31, so registrations should be made in person by closing time Jan. 30, or applications must be postmarked by Jan. 31, in order to meet qualifications," Dunn emphasized.

The 1968 figure for Lamb County, in a presidential election year, was 8,623.

To be included on this year's balloting are election of county clerk, county judge, county treasurer, county commissioners for Precincts 2 and 4, county school superintendent, 17 county Democratic and Repub-

Measles Shots Are Available

Vaccine for immunization against German Measles is now available for children ranging in ages 1 to 10, who previously have not been vaccinated.

Special immunizations will be given to anyone wishing the shots between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. every Thursday at the Migrant Health Center, 605 E. 5th.

There will be no charges assessed, but donations to help pay for the vaccine would be appreciated.

FARMERS AND RANCHERS throughout the United States are receiving 1969 Census of Agriculture forms in the mail this month and, for the first time, are asked to fill them out and mail them back before Feb. 15. Bub Stewart, who works in the Rocky Ford Community, takes his form from the mailbox. The information he writes on the form will be released only in statistical form, with no reference to the identity of the individual operator who filled the form out. The information will provide the yardstick by which American agricultural development is measured each five years.

Feed Grain Program Details Are Announced

Producers in Lamb County will receive notice of their feed grain bases and an explanatory leaflet on the 1970 Feed Grain Program later this month, according to Lamar Aten, Lamb County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

The period for the voluntary feed grain programs, including wheat, grain sorghum and corn, will run from Feb. 2 through March 31, 1970.

Lamb County farmers can determine their approximate diversion by multiplying their base acres by 48 cents a bushel times the average price support, depending on rail rates.

Approximate price support can be found by multiplying the base price by 100 cents a bushel times the diversion rate.

Producers will receive their diversion notices before the sign-up period begins.

The 1970 Feed Grain Program will be much like the program, Aten said. Producers of the 1970 wheat and grain sorghum programs were announced in December. Details on the grain diversion program were released Dec. 29. The diversion rate at 20 per cent of a farm's feed grain acreage will be required for program participation. No

payment will be made for this first 20 per cent diversion except for small farms.

Payments will be made for additional diversion of corn, grain sorghum and barley. Maximum acreage that can be diverted for payment will be the larger of 30 per cent for a farm's feed grain base or 25 acres less the qualifying 20 per cent diversion. Payment rate for this additional diversion will be based on 40 per cent of the total county price support (loan plus support payment) times a farm's projected yield of the crops involved. No advance diversion payments will be made.

Upper limits will be established on the per-bushel rate which will be paid for the additional voluntary diversion of feed grain acres. The maximum payment for grain sorghum is 55 cents per bushel (not hundredweight); for corn, 60 cents per bushel; for barley, 40 cents per bushel.

National average price-support loan rates on all feed grains will be the same as in 1969. However, corn loan rates, while unchanged, will be \$1.08 per bushel. "No. 2" basis— which is equal to the 1969 level of \$1.05 for average quality. The National average loan le-

vels of the other feed grains will be: grain sorghum \$1.61 per hundredweight; barley, 83 cents per bushel; oats, 63 cents per bushel; rye, \$1.02 per bushel. (Price-support is required.)

Diversion Cut, Yields Up On County Grain

The 1970 feed grain program when announced and two important changes affect farmers in Lamb County and the Plains area.

There will be no advance payments. The diversion payment is cut from 45 per cent of actual county price support to 40 per cent in 1970.

Diversion payments are less, but yields are up in Lamb.

County farmers can expect total 1970 cotton and feed grain payments to be more than in 1969 provided he goes the same way in the program. Approximately \$800,000 more will be paid to county farmers on feed and cotton over last year.

The Lamb County ASCS office is still taking appeals on cotton yields.

Farmers will have 15 days after they receive notice of feed grain yields to appeal these yields.

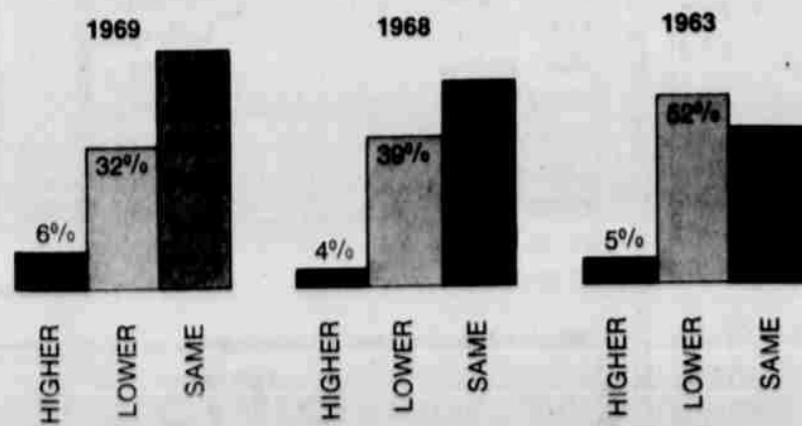

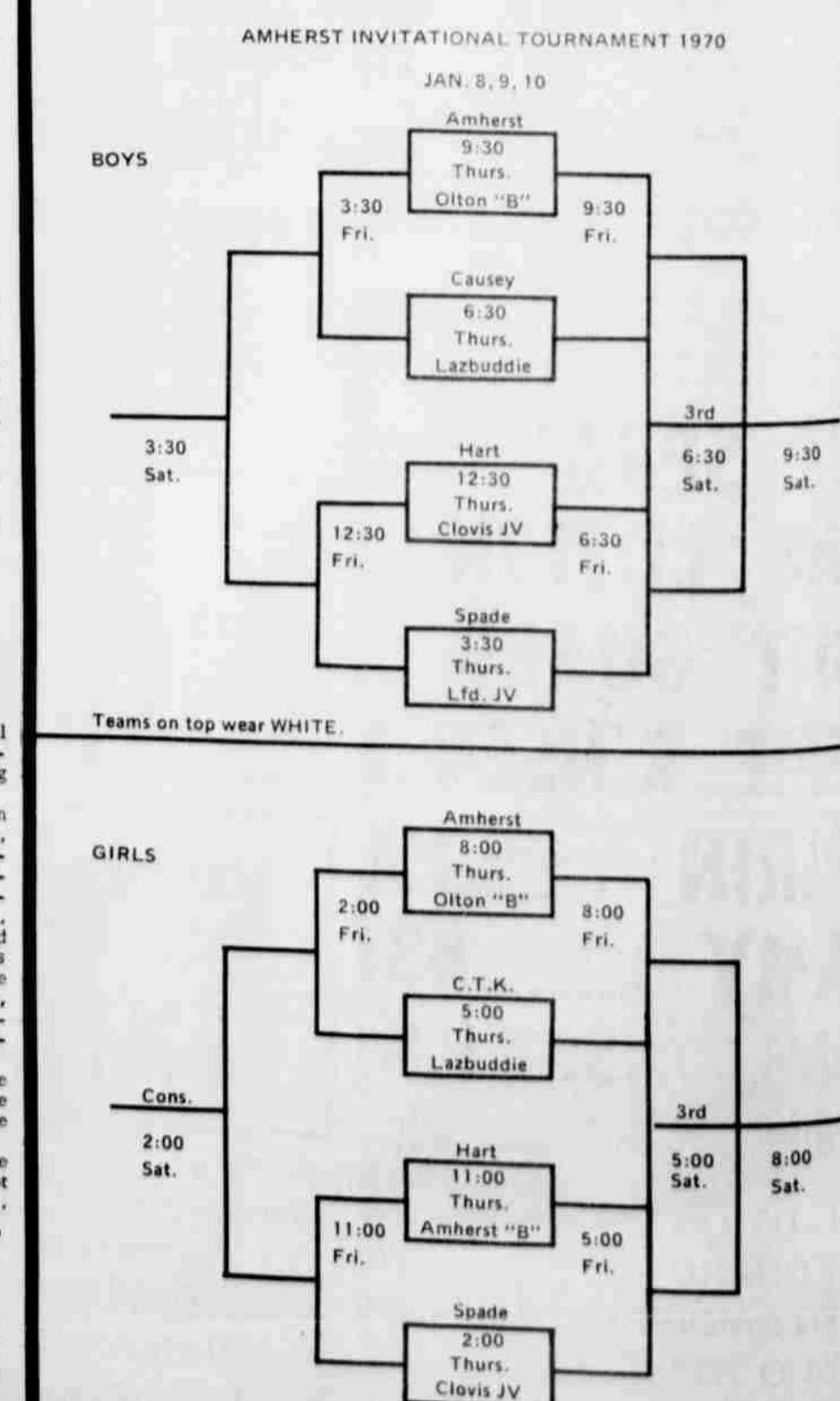

"Farmer's Tax Guide," Publication 225, provides information on this subject and may be obtained free by dropping a post card to Supply, International Revenue Service, P. O. Box 1738, Dallas, Texas, 75221 or your county farm agent. Fishermen who expect to receive at least two-thirds of their gross income from fishing follow the same rules as those for farmers.

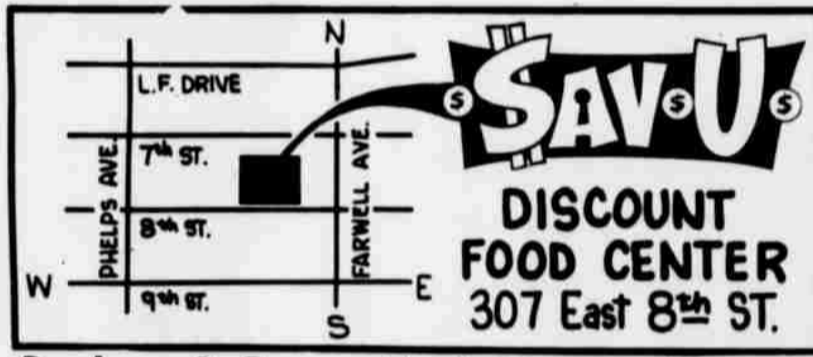

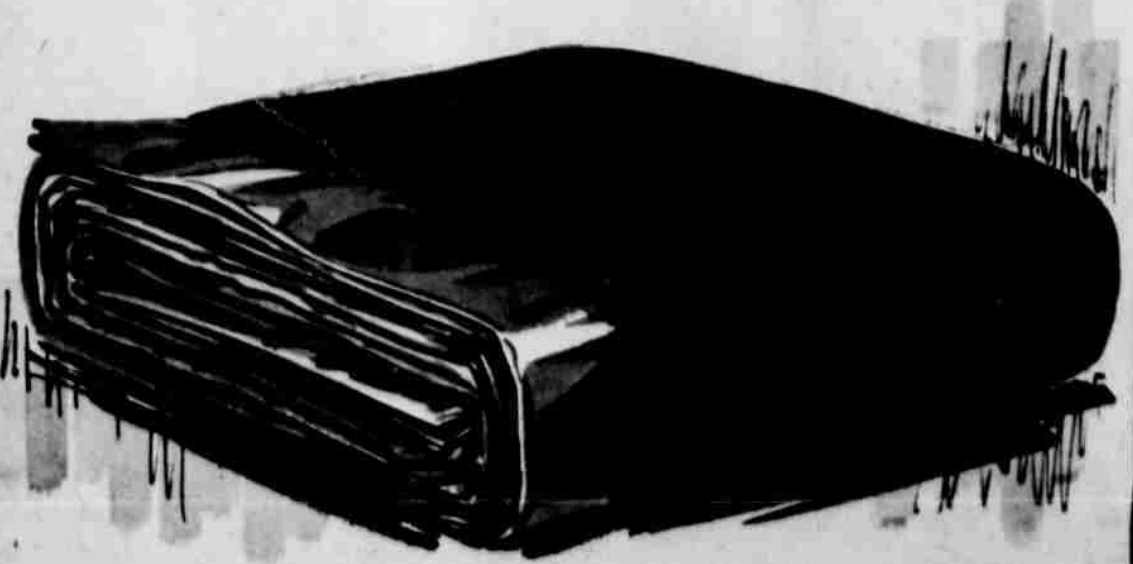
