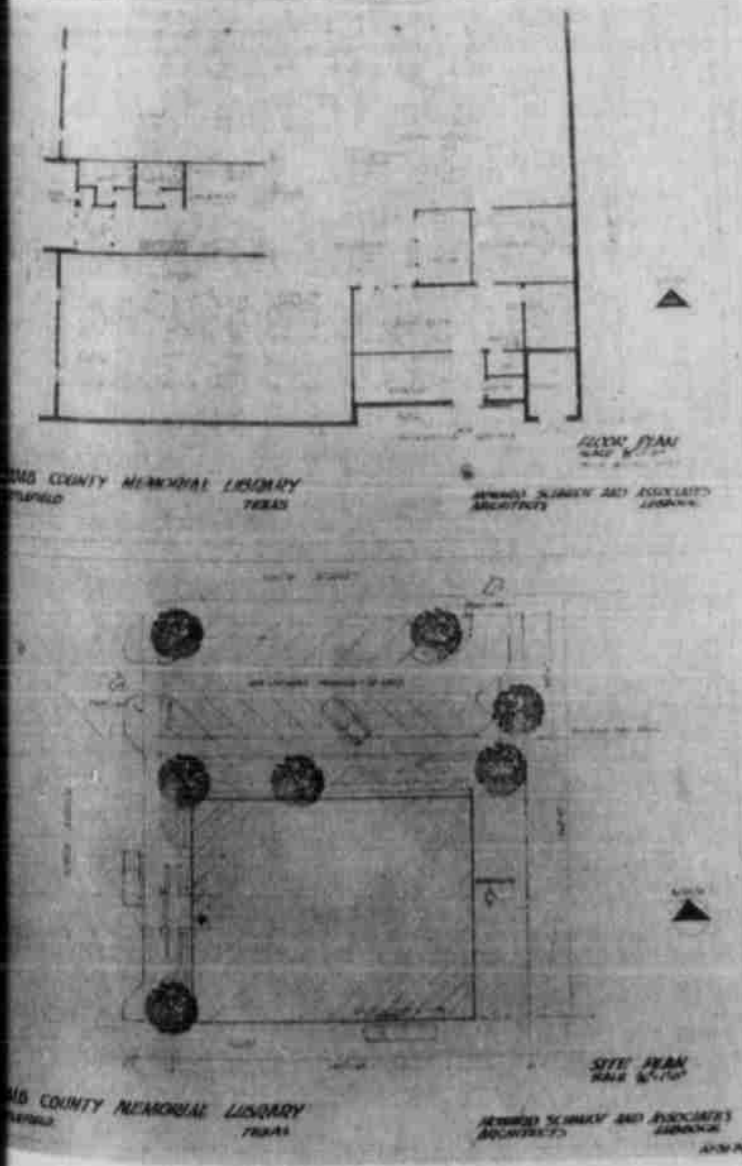

As you know, Texas voters will go to the polls on Nov. 5 to elect state, federal and local officials.

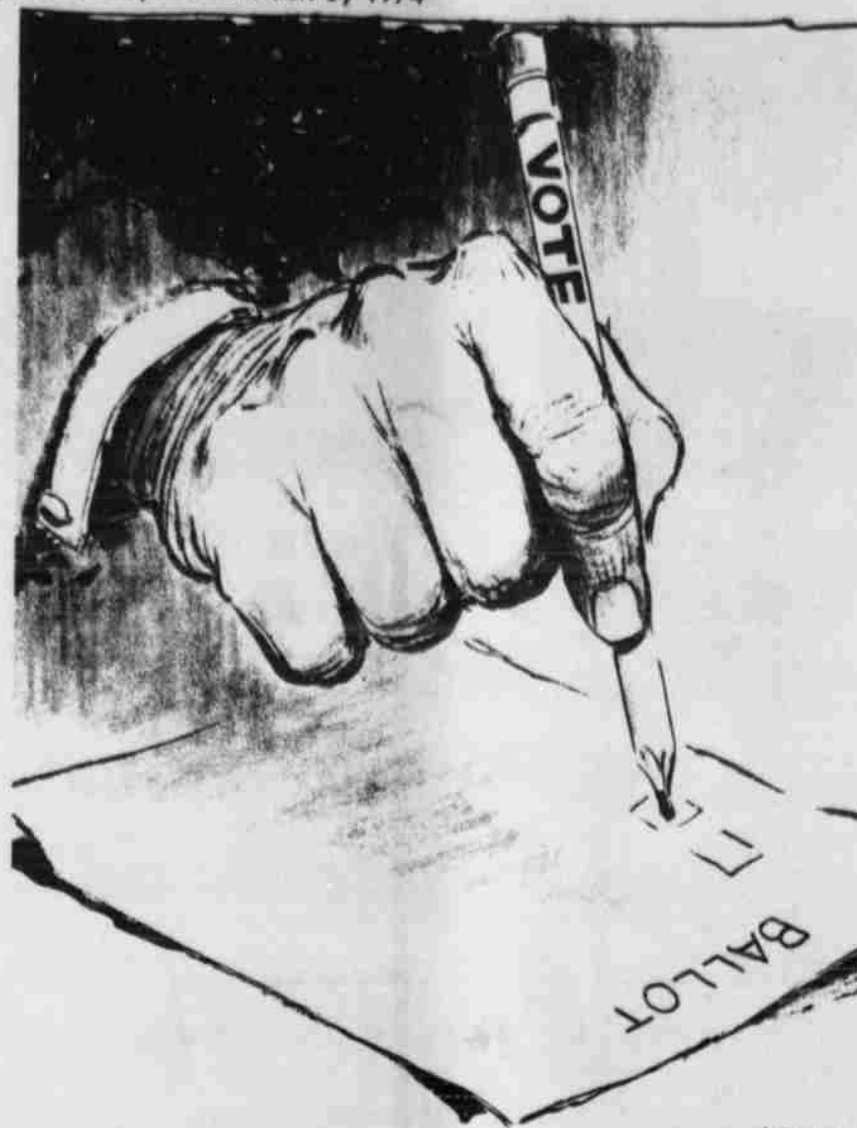
As Chief Election Officer of Texas, it is my responsibility to encourage all registered voters to take part in their government through the election process.

The module builder and disperser was developed by Texas A.M. University's Department of Agricultural Engineering under the leadership of Lambert Wilkes, associate professor. The work was funded through research grant from Cotton, Inc., Raleigh, N.C.
