Turner also punted 8 times for a 45.5 yard average per kick with his longest being 58 yards

For the night, Littlefield had 130 net yards total offense as compared to the visitors 290. Littlefield's yardage came as a result of 76 net yards rushing and 54 passing. Friona rushed for 175 yards and passed for 115 more. Littlefield was penalized for 35 yards while the yellow flags accounted for a loss of 90 yards for

Littlefield wasted little time in getting on the scoreboard as on their first possession of the night and with the aid of a Friona fumble, Turner bulled over from the 12 yard-line for the score.

On this initial drive, the 'Cats garnered three of their six first downs as they steadily marched from their own 21 yard line, after receiving the opening kickoff, to their own 43 before being forced to punt.

Turner got off a spiralling kick that was silhouetted beautifully against the harvest moon. The only heavenly body that the Chieftains' David Hutson saw though was a comet in the form of Stanley Patterson as the senior halfback hit the receiver with perfect timing and the ball squirted away to be recovered by the 'Cats on the Friona 12 yard line.

From here it was all Turner as on the first play from scrimmage, the 'Cats leading rusher went over the left side of the line and crossed the goal line spewing Chieftains as he went. The point after kick was good by Turner and Littlefield owned the scoreboard with 7:23 left in the first quarter, 7-0.

Friona was not to be denied though as on their first possession, they marched 75 yards on 9 plays to knot the score at 7all with 1:09 left in the first quarter. The Chieftains scored on a 24 yard pass from Clay Bandy to end Dale Cleveland. The visitor's march downfield was no easy chore however as the entire 'Cat defense "came to play" and Reginald Payton, Steve Cruz, Ben Farmer and Rick Hopping all registered key tackles on the drive.

# State, District, County Candidates On Ballot

Voters go to the polls Tuesday to elect a governor, lieutenant governor, attorney general, comptroller of public accounts, state treasurer, land office commissioner, commissioner of agriculture, railroad commissioner and have their say, whether they are yea or nay for unopposed candidates from U.S. representative to various precinct justices of peace.

In many cases, the number of people who show up at the polls will be the deciding factor in which party rules. A non-commital attitude among a majority of Democrats or Republicans could spell victory for the other side.

In the governor's race incumbent Democrat Dolph Briscoe is opposed by Republican Jim Granberry. Ramsey Muniz is running again on the Raza Unida ticket. Also on the ballot are candidates for the Socialist Workers Party and the American Party.

Bill Hobby is opposed in his bid for lieutenant governor by Republican Gaylord Marshall and a socialist candidate, Dan Fein. For attorney general, it is Bob Bullock and Nick Rowe.

Treasurer Jesse James is opposed by Robert G. Holt; Land commissioner Bob Armstrong is opposed by Mary Lou

Commissioner of Agriculture John C. White has Zack Fisher running on the Republican ticket, and Railroad Commissioner Jim C. Langdon has three opponents. For the unexpired term of railroad commissioner, Democrat Mack Wallace, is opposed by Republican Dale W. Steffes.

Congressman George Mahon and State Representative Bill Clayton are unopposed as are Democratic candidates for three associate justice on the Supreme Court, two places for judge on the court of criminal appeals, member of the state board of education for this district and District Judge Pat Boone Jr.

On the local level, none of the candidates have opponents on the ballot. Democratic candidate for county judge is Bill Angel; for district clerk Ray Lynn Britt; for county clerk, Mary Beth Willey; Lucy Moreland for county treasurer; C. Roy Stevens for county school superintendent; Clarence H. Kelley for county commissioner precinct 2 and Hubert Dykes for commissioner of precinct 4.

Five justices of peace are on the ballot- W. G. Finney at Olton, E. Ted Borum at Earth, Stanley Doss at Littlefield, W. T. (Tobe) Vereen at Sudan, and E. L. (Jack) Yarbrough at Amherst.

# Rainfall Totals 17.82 For Aug., Sept., Oct.

While the rest of the state has been hit by tornadoes, high winds and name of floods, the Littlefield area has suffered what some call the "quiet damage" of more steadily falling rain that has brought the August, September and October rainfall totals to 17.82 inches for the previous three-months in the immediate Littlefield area and up to 25-30

inches in and around Lamb County. The Pioneer Natural Gas Company records the official rainfall in Littlefield. Pioneer reports 8.69 for August, an even five inches for September, and 4.13 for October. This gives this area one of the wettest late summer, early fall seasons

This falls on the heels of an unprecedented dry winter and early spring, turning the tables on the needed and expected as far as agriculture is concerned.

Prior to the July rains, Pioneer recorded the following precipitation for the first six months: .40 in January, .03 in February, .84 in March, .34 in April, 2.04 in May, .99 in June, and .25 in July. This gives the city limits of Littlefield a total of 22.71 inches thus far this year.

Thursday's and Friday's warm temperatures and breeze helped dry crops and farmers are hoping the drying conditions will hold until they can get crops harvested.

As Chief Election Officer of Texas, it is my responsibility to encourage all registered voters to take part in their government through the election


