ANOTHER POW-WOW NEXT WEEK

Wildcats 21, Chieftains 14

It would be a little unfair to the Wildcats to compare their execution of plays to the precision of a fine (scoreboard) clock considering the state the scoreboard clock was in during most of the game, however the Cat passing game was superlative, the running backs had another great game, and the line blocking was steady and reliable. However, it was the Wildcat defense that stole the show and sealed a 21-14 district victory over the visiting Friona Chieftains.

With 10 minutes left in the fourth quarter, Friona had the ball on their own 31 yard line trailing 21-14. Clay Bandy tried the middle of the line on first down but was slammed to the ground by Jerry Cox and Eddie Surrett. On second down,

quarterback Johnny Bandy found James Bartlett two steps in front of the Wildcat secondary and hit him for 34 yards to the Cat 34 yard line. After three more passes it was fourth and five to go, and Bandy passed over the middle to Robert Jackson. Friona had new life on the 18, and more importantly, a crucial penetration.

The first down pass was nearly picked off by a lunging Terry Bryson. Clay Bandy was chased out of bounds at the 21 on second, and on third down, Bill Hamblin came in on a blitz and dropped the passer back to the 27. Bandy tried an option pass on fourth down which was intercepted by Kenny Francis and run back to the 20.

Before anyone could appreciate the relief of stopping that drive, J. E. Johnson fumbled and the visitors took

control on the 19. A first down pass was barely beyond the fingertips of Jackson, so on second down the Chieftains elected to try another pass. Kenny Owens rushed in on a blitz, trailed the scrambling Bandy for a few yards, and then wrestled him to the ground after Randy Wesley closed in. It was a loss of 23 yards back to the 42. Surrett then broke up a screen pass by tackling the runner from behind, and Friona punted to the Wildcat four.

On fourth and seven, Chris Pope punted from six yards deep in the end zone, and Friona began their last drive with 3:23 left in the battle from the 36.

The Chieftains drove to the 22 where they were faced with a fourth down and seven. As Bandy rolled back looking for a receiver, Owens again came in on the

blitz and again sacked the passer on the 32 presenting the victory. Owens received a pounding on the sidelines by his jubilant teammates, and the Cats ran out the remainder of the game for their second district victory.

The game started out bleakly for the Cats. Friona took the opening kickoff and drove 72 yards for a relatively easy score. The big gainers came on option plays and sweeps as the Chieftains ate up half the time in the quarter.

Littlefield took only half that long to drive 75 yards for their own score. Leneral Lewis provided most of the yardage on a draw play that covered 40 yards. A personal foul penalty was tacked on giving the Cats the ball on the Friona 23. Lewis went in for the score from the two. Following the block of Arturo Soria, Lewis was stopped cold on the one, but was still on his feet. He delicately reached out with the ball and placed it just on the other side of the goal line. An astounded referee watched for a moment, then shot both hands skyward indicating a touchdown. Larry Hobratschk kicked the tying point after.

Friona punted away their possession, and on first down from the 35, Bryson's handoff to Pat Henderson was fumbled and recovered by Friona. They scored after a short drive, and took a 14-7 lead.

Henderson ran the kickoff back to the 40. On first down Lewis went up the left side for five yards. Two back-to-back personal foul penalties put the ball on the 25, and Bryson received tremendous protection as he passed to Pope crossing over the middle to the 12. Johnson took the handoff up the middle, knocked down several would-be tacklers, and fell to the three. Johnson carried the ball on in from the one, and Hobratschk came in to attempt the point after. The snap from center sailed over Alan Mackey's hands, and a desperation pass by Hobratschk was incomplete. The big break gave Friona a one point lead with about eight minutes left in the half.

The remainder of the half was highlighted by two tremendous efforts by Lewis and Soria. On first and 16 from the Wildcat 21, Lewis took the handoff, then spun, paused, cut, dived, and broke an assortment of tackles for a 29 yard pickup. Soria's run came after an exchange of punts with the Wildcats on the Chieftain 44. Bryson threw to Soria on the 36, where he was apparently stopped cold. Soria kept churning and scrambling and was finally brought down on the 25. Bryson then hit Leon Hodge on the four, but an offside infraction nullified the play. On third down, Bryson again hit Hodge, who apparently fell out of bounds at the 22. But the official motioned the clock to keep going, and Hobratschk hurriedly tried a 39 yard field goal before time ran out. The ball hung in the air for what seemed an eternity before going off to the left. It was a great effort, but it was all for naught when the Wildcats were called for having only six men on the line of scrimmage instead of the required seven.

The third quarter saw only one score, which was by way of a blocked punt. From the 26, the Friona punter dropped back. Mackey stormed in and blocked the ball solidly, then tried to pick up the elusive pigskin and run it into the end zone. A Chieftain finally recovered, but the Cats still had the ball on the six. Henderson scored on first down, and Bryson hit Lewis for the two point play, giving the Wildcats a 21-14 lead.

Clay Bandy carried twice in succession after the kickoff, and the runs netted 30 yards to the Cat 41. Bandy ran a third time, but Cox and Francis saw to it that he got just a yard. The defense allowed no more yardage, and the Chieftains had to give up the ball on fourth down.

Bryson made a spectacular run of his own from the 35. Dropping back to pass, he was nailed on the 30, but broke that tackle and five or six others, skirting down the sidelines for 26 yards. On third and 11, Bryson hit Hodge who was all by himself. The end ran to the 25 before fumbling the ball away.

The third quarter ended shortly thereafter, and the wild fourth quarter ended in just the right way—a victory for the Wildcats.

The passing game, which has been inconsistent since the Saton game, came alive Friday night. Time after time, Bryson got fine protection and threw accurately to his targets. For the night, Bryson was seven out of twelve for 78 yards, and he had a couple of dropped passes.

If the Wildcats continue the pace they set against Friona, a District championship is within their grasp.

Jr. High Voters To Go To "Polls" Tuesday

Littlefield seventh, eighth and ninth graders will vote in the general election here next Tuesday.

And while a great deal has been said concerning just what effect the newly enfranchised 18, 19 and 20-year-olds will have on the political scene across the nation this fall, the way the Littlefield Junior High School students vote may have a direct bearing on candidates running in the next few general elections.

When all the results of the polls are in at L.J.H.S. here Tuesday week, the results will be sent to Scholastic Magazine and from there the votes go to Washington.

When students go to the polls in the auditorium next Tuesday, if they can't produce their registration slips, their eligibility will be checked against the poll list.

This week election clerks, election judges and poll watchers will be appointed by the teachers.

When teachers checked with the county clerk's office for a copy of the official ballot, it was decided that the ballot was too long to run off on the duplicating machine. So the clerk ordered enough additional sample official ballots for the junior high election.

In addition to the actual ballots, the county clerk's office is furnishing locked voting and stub boxes.

Campaign posters and political speeches highlight the political scene at the school this week. Posters go up in the junior high halls this week. They are a part of a poster contest to get voters out. The posters will be judged Friday and the winners will receive prizes of \$5, \$3, and \$2.

Students are writing campaign speeches and making spot bookings for use of the school's public address system between classes. And in the social studies classes this week, the discussion centers on the candidates and issues.

"The students are getting to know their candidates better," Mrs. Reid concluded. "They are interested, they will remember this election, and we hope it encourages them to be better citizens."

A coffee was served in the All-Purpose Room at the break, then delegates divided into discussion groups. Each group listed questions which were presented to Paul for his answers and comments.

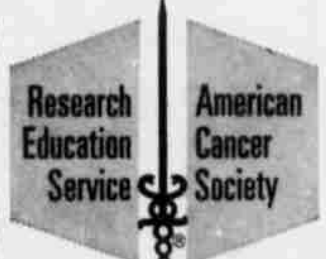

Ten Wrecks In September

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 10 accidents on rural highways in Lamb County during the month of September, according to Sergeant Thurman Keffer, Highway Patrol supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in two persons killed and nine persons injured.

The rural traffic summary for this county during the first nine months of 1972 shows a total of 77 accidents resulting in nine persons killed and 62 persons injured.

Region 5 of the Texas Department of Public Safety

shows a total in September, 1972, of 561 accidents resulting in 21 persons killed and 335 persons injured as compared to the same month in 1971 with 499 accidents resulting in 33 persons killed and 268 persons injured. This was 62 more accidents, 12 less fatalities and 67 more injured in 1972 at the same period of time.

The Highway Patrol supervisor reminds you that speed is one of the main factors in accidents on the highway. Slow down a little and live a lot. Drive friendly the Texas way!

CHEAP CIGARETTES ARE NOT CHEAP

Mail Order Cigarettes

Cigarette smokers throughout the State of Texas are being tempted to order cigarettes by mail from out of State firms at what appears to be bargain prices--some quoted prices are as low as \$2.95 per carton. Since advertisements by most out of State suppliers have neglected to mention that Texas Cigarette Taxes have not been paid, many unsuspecting Texans have found that mail order cigarettes can be anything but cheap.

Federal Law requires the out of State firms to report each shipment made into Texas to the Comptroller of Public Accounts. The Comptroller is then charged by Texas Law with the collection of tax and penalty on cigarettes purchased unlawfully.

Imported Cigarettes From Mexico

Persons traveling across the Texas border into Mexico find American and Mexican cigarettes available in many shops at very low prices. Because United States Customs will allow a \$100.00 total value of imported goods (including cigarettes) to be returned into the United States tax free, tourists are frequently encouraged by Mexican storekeepers to stock up on favorite brands of cigarettes. The Texas Cigarette Tax Law, however, allows only two packages (40 cigarettes) of untaxed cigarettes to be brought into the State for personal consumption provided the seal of each package has been broken. Untaxed cigarettes possessed in excess of two packages are subject to seizure and the person transporting the cigarettes will incur the penalties prescribed by law.

Penalties

Persons not authorized by Texas Cigarette Law who receive or transport untaxed cigarettes into the State of Texas in quantities of less than 50 cartons (10,000 cigarettes) shall be required to pay \$1.85 tax plus \$1.85 penalty on each carton possessed or transported. Misdemeanor charges shall be filed against any person who shall fail or refuse to pay the required tax and penalty.

Unauthorized persons receiving or transporting untaxed cigarettes into the State of Texas in quantities of 50 cartons (10,000 cigarettes) or more shall be guilty of a felony and any vehicle used for such transportation shall be seized and forfeited to the State of Texas.

We ask that you post this notice in a conspicuous location in your business in order that employees, business associates, and customers may avoid being tricked into buying bargain cigarettes only to learn at a later time that tax paid cigarettes purchased in Texas are really much cheaper after all.

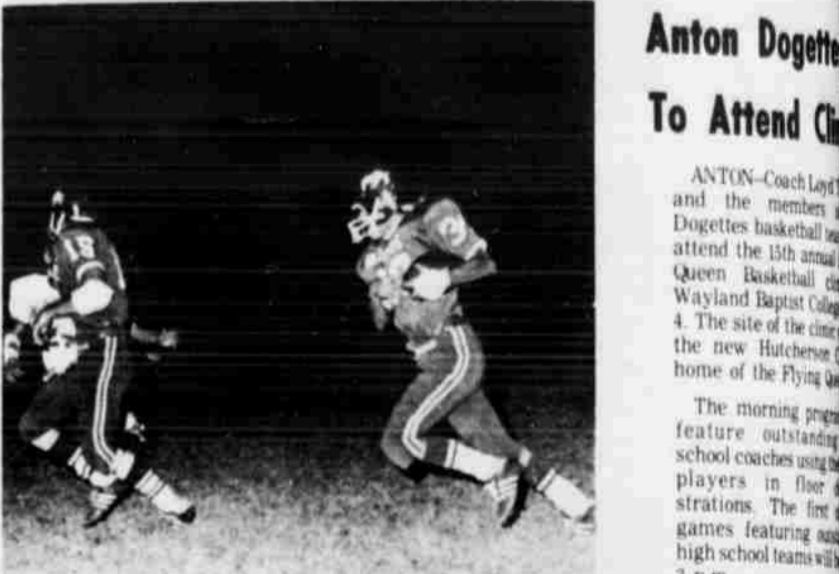
Later in the same quarter, Silhan widened the gap in the score for Morton with a 33-yard field goal for a 10-7 halftime lead.

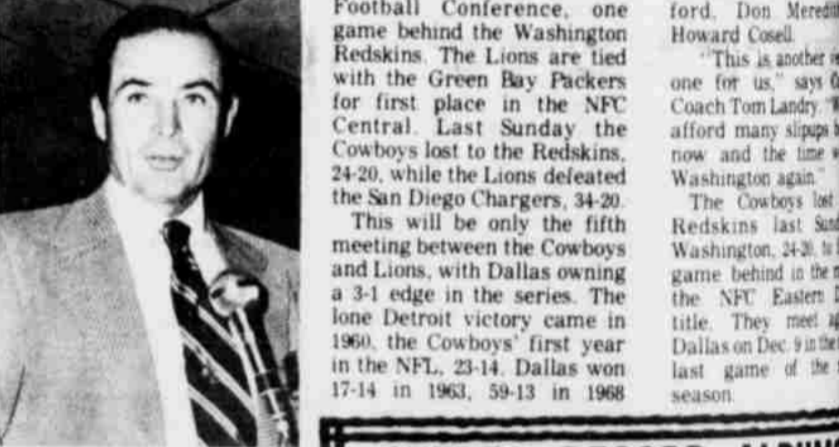

LOOP 40, WHITHARRAL 0

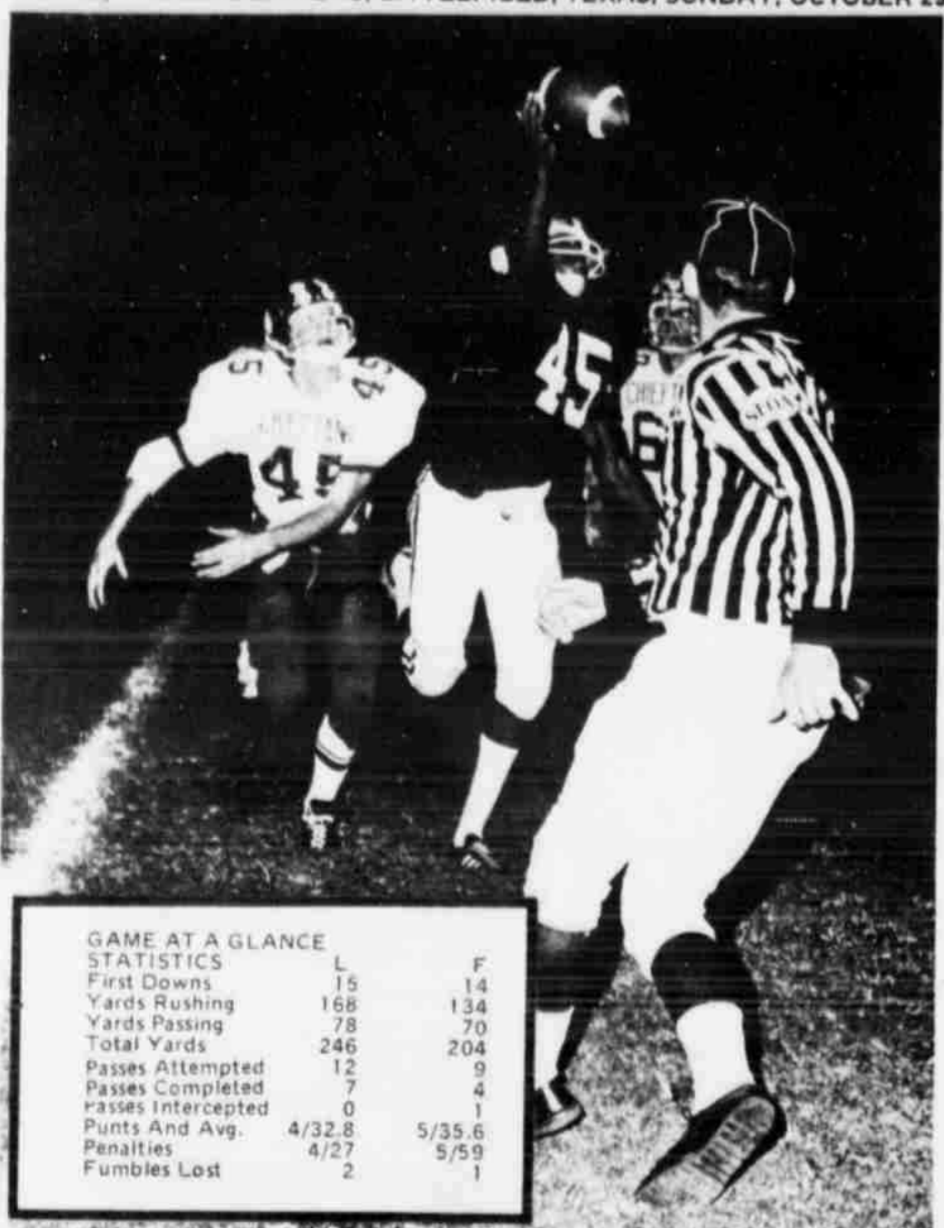
Whitharral rushed for 240 yards and was still blanked by Loop 40-0, at Loop before a homecoming crowd at Loop Friday in eight-man football.

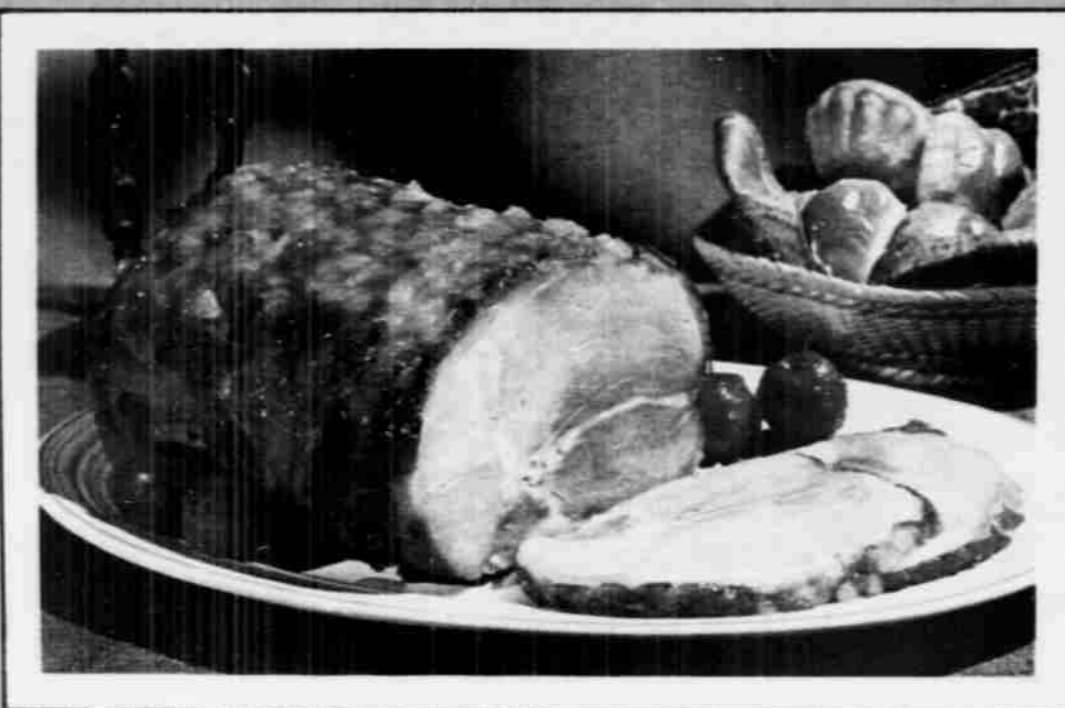
