Deadline for entries is March 1, 1972. They should be mailed to: Rural Heroism Award Committee, Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council, P. O. Box 489, Waco, Texas 76703. The 1971 recipient of the

Next Tuesday the Littlefield Varsity JV and girls basketball teams will journey to Lockney for District 3-AA action.

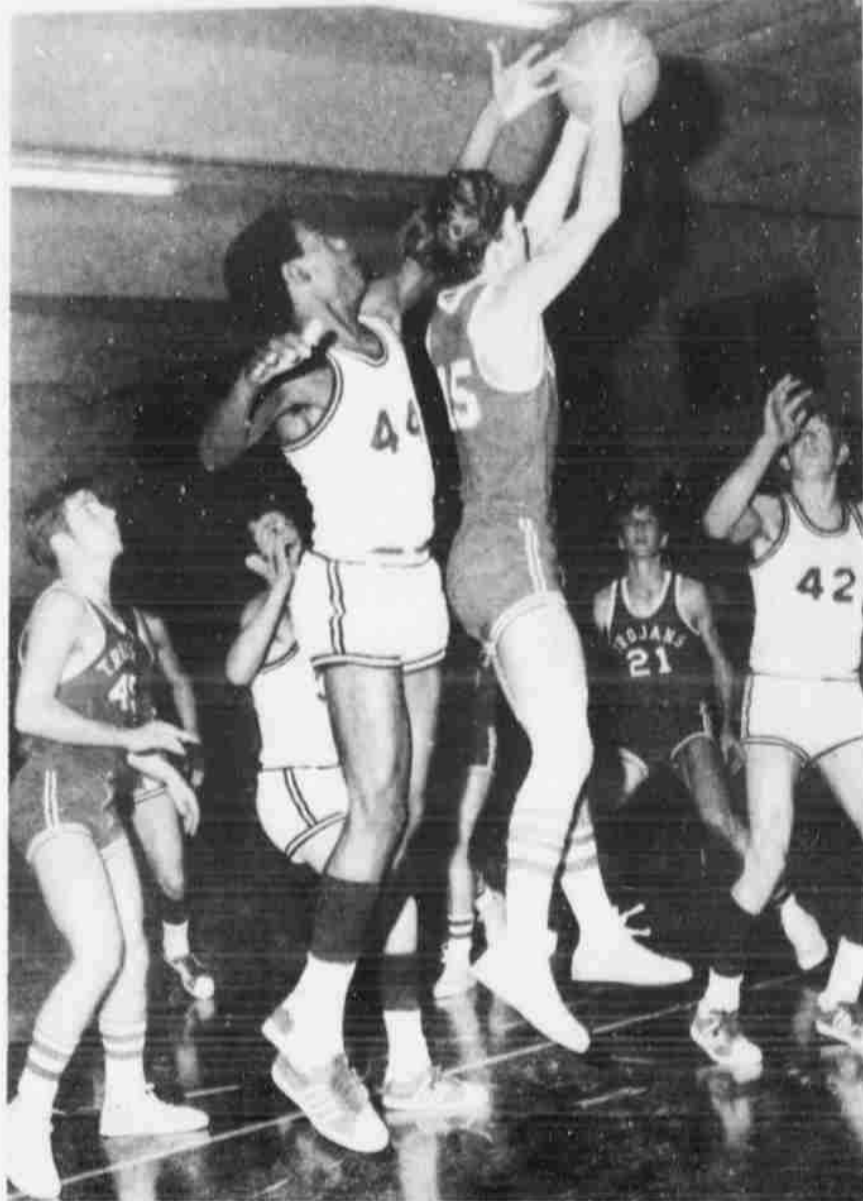

Mohair Production, A Texas Challenge

World production of mohair is down and Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White has warned that there may not be enough of that unique fiber to meet the demand unless Texas producers readjust to meet a serious situation.

Texas produces about 60 per cent of the world's mohair and about 97 per cent of the total United States production. Mohair brings about \$15 million a year into the Texas economy.

White said that reports are that the 1972 market demand for natural fibers will be stronger but that apparently the mohair inventory at the end of 1971 is at the lowest level in a number of years.

The commissioner joins with the Mohair Council of America and other agricultural figures in expressing concern over the growers marketing their goals for slaughter in wholesale numbers.

"Proper marketing methods can increase the demand for such unique natural fibers as mohair," Commissioner White said. "I hope all mohair producers will reassess the situation before selling all their breeding stock for slaughter."

DDT, Now A 'No-No'

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White announced that registration of DDT for use in and around the home will not be continued in Texas.

This means that use of DDT for households in Texas will not be allowed under the Texas pesticide law.

White made his decision based on recommendations of the Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas. The committee was created by the Texas Legislature to study use of pesticides in Texas and to make recommendations.

White emphasized that the regulation has no bearing on use of DDT for agriculture and in matters relating to public health. "DDT is still a very valuable chemical for agricultural producers and public health officials. But because of the concern of everyone about the quality of our environment, I am announcing that registration of DDT for household use will not be continued in Texas," he said.

About half of the DDT now used in Texas is used in and around the home.

White noted that use of DDT has declined drastically in the past decade. Nationwide, it has been cut by more than a half. The effective date of White's

public health can use it in accordance with already-prescribed regulations and limitations," White said.

The PACT based its conclusions on the fact that the Environmental Protection Agency does not recommend DDT for household use. The Texas A&M University Extension Service in its recommendations for control of household pests does not recommend DDT in its lists of approved pesticides.

Members of the PACT are Charlie Chapman, director of the Agricultural and Environmental Sciences Division of the Texas Department of Agriculture; Dr. Perry Adkisson, Texas A&M University, chairman of the committee; Dennis Russell, Parks and Wildlife Department; Dr. Donald Ashdown, Texas Tech University; and Kenneth Lauderdale, State Health Department.

Household use of DDT can continue until August 31, 1972. After that date, formulators will have to change their labels to show that DDT is not registered for household use.

Southwestern Public Service Plans Improvement

A five-year construction and improvement program which envisions an investment of more than \$144-million between now and the end of 1976 to stay ahead of the electric service needs of this area was announced today by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service Company.

"We see nothing but growth - real growth - in the future of our area. It is not a question of a 'created demand' for electric power, which is the current battle cry of the uninformed critics of our industry, but it is a true growth based on the development of the area's economic potential and customers' need for more electrical power. There really wouldn't be much sense in planning to invest nearly \$150 million if all you were doing was trying to make headlines.

"This region, and the nation as well, needs more electric power not only for growth, but for environmental considerations. Electricity is the cleanest of all energies at the point of consumption, and we will need more and more clean energy for sewage and water treatment, disposal of wastes and the solution of other environmental problems," Tolk said in announcing the construction plans.

Generating station additions scheduled for the five-year period will add more than 600,000 kilowatts to the company's power production capability. At the present time, the 11 major power stations produce a little more than 2,000,000 kilowatts.

The first of these capacity additions is already under construction as the second unit at Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. A 256,000 kilowatt unit, it is scheduled to be in service for the summer of 1974. The first Jones Station generator, also a 256,000 kilowatt unit, went into service earlier this year.

The generating unit planned for 1976 operation is slated to be the company's first 350,000 kilowatt machine. However, the company has "reserved" three capabilities — 250,000, 350,000 and 450,000 — with the manufacturer, and the final decision will be made after all growth factors have been weighed.

"We have some interesting options with this 1976 unit. In June of 1972, we will complete an intertie between our company and the Public Service Company of Oklahoma. This is our first major interconnection with another utility. The tie line offers us the opportunity to exchange power; to sell power into power-deficient areas; to install units with larger capacity; and to locate units where fuel and water resources and load balances are most favorable. These are factors of efficiency and economy which are important to our customers, as these factors will be

combined to provide the least costly kilowatt hour for our customers," Tolk said.

Also, in its continuing efforts to conserve the resources of the region, the company plans to install a combined cycle unit at its Riverview Station, near Borger, in 1973.

The combined cycle unit is a gas turbine capable of producing 25,000 kilowatts of electric power.

The heat that remains in the gas turbine exhaust, after the electric power is produced, is used to provide a major part of the steam requirement for a steam turbine unit at the plant.

The result is that more power is generated with less fuel and water as a result of the combination than could be accomplished with the two units operating separately. So there is both fuel and water conservation.

Expanding on the intertie with Public Service Company of Oklahoma, Tolk said that the 230,000 volt transmission line would run from Southwestern's Nichols Station, northeast of Amarillo, to Elk City, Oklahoma.

"We have been responsible for providing our own power resources since this company was formed. I'm happy to say that we have always had an adequate supply and ample

reserves. This new tie will make us members of the Southwest Power Pool and will provide a market for any excess power we might have at off-peak times. It is conceivable that, by the process of transformation from one adjacent area to another, our excess off-peak capability will make it possible to help other companies meet their needs as far away as the east coast," Tolk pointed out.

Continuing on the reliability and capability to serve them, Tolk went on to say that the company was projecting a 22% reserve margin of available power for the peak demand expected in the summer of 1972.

This is a relatively high margin, but Tolk pointed out that 1972 will be the first full year of operation of the Jones Station first unit, which was installed to meet three years of normal load growth, and that it is normal for the reserve to be higher at this time.

"We'll be right back down to a normal reserve capability when it is time for the 1974 unit to come on the line. Then, we'll have additional new capacity to assure our reserve position again. Once you get started in the utility business, it's like perpetual motion, you must stay ahead to meet your obligations to your customers," Tolk said.

Southwestern Public Service Company serves 230,000 customers in a 45,000 square-mile service area running from the southwest corner of Kansas

across the Oklahoma and Texas Panhandles, the South Plains of Texas to the Clovis-Portales and Pecos Valley regions of New Mexico.
