powered well digging equipment to drill for water, but when a windmill was placed over the well there wasn't enough breeze to turn the wind wheel. To get the fans of the mill up above surrounding cliffs, the tallest windmill in the world was erected. The 132-foot tower reached as high as a 10story building.

The tower and wind fans stretched so high that none of the cowboys wanted to grease it. The ranch foreman made the cowboys take turns at this hazardous task, and many a green hand found it convenient to quit just before his turn to ascend the tower that swayed amid the whirlwinds of the Staked Plains.

Little did Campbell realize that he was building a Plains landmark with the placing of the windmill. In the years that followed, many picnics were held. Shouts of "meet you at the windmill" echoed through the canyon.

Daring boys climbed to the top to impress onlookers. Young people journeyed to the canyon on Sunday afternoons to have pictures taken under the windmill.

Then the tallest windmill in the world blew down during a blizzard in 1926.

White's great half uncle, Major George W. Littlefield, and George White's dad, J Phelps White, bought the entire Yellow House Division of the XIT Ranch in 1901, paying \$2 an acre for 275,000 acres. Due to a surveying error, Littlefield became owner of an additional 37,000 acres. The Yellow House spread totaled 312,000 acres of land in Lamb and Hockley Counties.

The giant ranch was sold to the Yellow House Land Co. when Major Littlefield died and the estate had to be sold to satisfy the Major's estate.

Glancing Back At 1971

The year 1971 was a quiet one as far as smashing news making events were concerned

Traffic accidents made headlines. There was little activity politically in 1971, with elective incumbents running without opposition.

There were no major fires. Volunteer firemen answered a total of 94 fire alarms but the total property damage for the year was only \$24,420.

Bank deposits were up every quarter despite "no money" cries.

The first half of 1971 was dry following

only 10.61 inches in 1970. Then the rains started falling, and the year ended with a total of 24.04 inches. Highway patrolmen investigated 98

wrecks in Lamb County during 1971. From this total, five persons were killed, and forty-five were injured.

City police investigated 185 accidents, none involved fatalities, but 20 were injured.

Here are some of the items that made news during 1971:

Lamb County's first 1971 baby was Becky Kay Garrett, born to Mr. and Mrs. James Garrett of Littlefield. High winds and bone-chilling

temperatures plunged the mercury to below zero on January 5. Two hundred sixty-two 4-H, FFA and

FHA y 1 ths entered the 1971 Lamb County Annual unior Livestock Show that opened Jan 14. Gary Ham of Sudan won grand champion with his Hampshire lamb. Kent Lewis of the Springlake-Earth FFA won grand champion of the barrows with his Duroc, Kenan Lichte's steer won the grand champion award.

Sixteer students from Littlefield, 10 inglake-Earth, four from Olton rom Sudan made the All-Region m 131 Region and 16 band who tried for the honors.

A targe grain theft ring was suspected Deaf Smith officials after two Littlefield men were charged with the theft of over \$5,000 grain in that county on Jan.

Jerry Kenoe was 1971 president of the Chamber of Commerce. Guests "saw red" at the annual C-C Banquet with "Roll Out the Red Carpet" as the banquet theme. Flora Besst Boone was named "Woman of the Year", and Cecil Mason Johnson was "Farmer of the Year".

Sixteen-year-old Kenney Claunch of Bula was Lamb County's first traffic fatality. The youth was killed, and Tommy Crosby, a 16-year-old Littlefield boy, was paralyzed in a one car turnover on a curve just west of Amherst.



Our Prejudices

ALL OF US HAVE prejudices, but this is not necessarily bad or even objectionable. We make some judgments without sufficient knowledge; we jump to conclusions; and we form poorly founded opinions. Most of this kind of action is nothing more than part of our human

imperfection. For the purpose of differentiation, we call these benign prejudices. Of course, they can develop into something very damaging to us and to others: they can become malignant. We must not permit this to happen.

IF WE ARE WISE, we will not become so set in these prejudices that we discontinue our efforts to add to our limited knowledge. We must remain openminded, by remembering that we may be

When we are interested in learning the truth, we have nothing to fear. We must be honest enough to correct faulty supposed characteristics conclusions, and opinions, and judgments as we become better informed.

THE WORD "PREJUDICE" is often misused. It is incorrectly applied to the legitimate views and actions of people. When we make a carefully considered business, our action may be motivated by prejudice but not necessarily so.

We must not arbitrarily label differentiations, discriminations, and discernments as prejudices

IF WE GIVE STIGMAS to all mindedness. differentiations and discriminations, we set ourselves against the legitimate laws of both God and man.

differentiations to be made are either of truth and understanding

without understanding, or they are playing the role of hypocrite.

MANY DISCRIMINATIONS and differentiations are so basic that they cannot be changed.

They cannot even be ignored, and they will exist forever as part of established order. They have absolutely nothing to do with prejudices or anything undesirable or degrading. They are just part of reality

THE MALIGNANT PREJUDICES are the prejudices we must guard against These are the prejudices which people elevate above truth and fact. These are the violently destructive prejudices.

They blind people so that the people do not see truth, and justice, and fairness, and reality People controlled by such prejudices have irrational attitudes of hostility which they direct against an individual, a group, a race, or their

"HE WHO IS POSSESSED with a prejudice is possessed with a devil, and one of the worst kind of devils, for it shuts out the truth, and often leads to ruinous error."-R. Edwards.

The evils of malignant prejudice are choice in some matter that is our own easily recognized when we realize that two of its principal elements are dishonesty dnd wilfull ignorance.

A life style built upon such prejudices is the worst one of all; because it is fashioned false conclusions. misunderstandings, and extreme narrow-

Man's Jumpsuit

By FRANCES JONES

Altering The Pattern

MANY WOMEN have told me that they liked the columns about making the jumpsuit for men.

Let us go back to the subject and get some pointers on altering the pattern so the suit will fit well.

Really, this is more difficult than sewing the seams. Let us deal mostly with enlarging because most alterations concern increasing rather than reducing the pattern. We slash and spread the pattern to enlarge and fold in tucks to

LOOK FIRST at the shoulders.

On figure A, slash and spread on the dotted lines to widen and lap over to make the shoulder more narrow.

On figure B, the pattern is slashed and spread to accommodate the stooped or rounded shoulder. The shoulder part of the center back seam will be slightly curved. For the very erect back when extra length bags down in the garment, make a slash in the same place and lap the pattern

Figure C shows where to enlarge for bulging hips. Slash and spread and also enlarge along the dotted lines.


IF ALLOWANCE must be made for a protruding abdomen (the "bay window"), see figure D

To lengthen the total crotch so the garment will not bind, see figure E. An adjustment may have to be made in the leg length if the upper part of the garment is altered. Of course, to shorten the total crotch length fold tucks crosswise in the pattern. Use the tape - do not guess.

Do not swoop out too far with the scissors at the point on the lower crotch line or you will make the leg size too large and the garment will be baggy

THE SLEEVE LENGTH can be changed by slashing and spreading to lengthen or by folding a crosswise tuck to shorten. This as an alteration with which most sewers careful measurements.

Do not be afraid to cut into a pattern. hand to underlay the slashes

Phelps White decided to sell his land at the same time the Littlefield land was sold The land company issued Plains Investment Bonds to be paid back in sequence, and began selling tracts of farm

Meantime the Dust Bowl days and the Great Depression hit, and in 1932, it was evident to Phelps White that the Yellow House Land Co. couldn't pay for the ranch.

The University of Texas bought the majority of the bonds sold by the Yellow House Land Co., and Phelps White took back 23,000 acres of the 312,000 acre Yellow House Ranch to protect his first lien note he had with the land company

George White married in 1933 and moved to the Yellow House Ranch from Roswell, N. M.

The Yellow House Ranch has been the home where buffalo roam, and it was once strictly a sheep ranch. For generations the ranch was picnicking grounds for the people in the Littlefield area and surrounding towns. The bunk house, with its walls covered with pages of funny papers, was a favorite spot. Over the years many hoys have gone swimming in their birthday suits in the stock watering tanks or gone skinny dipping in New Goat Dam.

The big buffalo slaughter took place in 1877 when George and John Causey and another man invaded the area and killed more than 7,000 buffaloes on the Yellow House and Running Water Draws. For the cow hides the hunters were paid \$1 each, and they received \$2 each for the bull

Native buffalo thus wiped out, J. Phelps White later bought 50 head of buffalo cows. calves and bulls from McKenzie at Fort Sumner, N. M. The rancher soon learned the amazing homing instincts of the buffalo

"It took an extra man just to keep the buffalo from heading home," George White said. "Those wire fences didn't mean a thing to them when one of them decided to head home.

Phelps White sold the buffalo to a circus man in 1924. By that time there were four train car loads of the animals. The man who purchased the animals loaded cows calves, bulls and all into the cars without separating them, White said. "At the time father said he didn't like the way the man loaded them all in together," George White said," but they were paid for and father said he didn't feel like it was any of

his business telling the man how to ship

When the train reached Gallup, N.M. the buffalo started fighting. "The biggest end of them were killed," White said, "You never saw such a bloody massacre in your

White said he doesn't know whether buffalo hunters smelled as badly as the movies depict them to smell or not, but he is willing to bet on it.

White recalls the bad blizzard in 1918 when more than 700 of his dad's cattle died. Due to hard times many men were forced to gather bones from the prairie and sell them for a small price to keep their families fed. "They just picked up the bones." White said, "and you could smell them for six or seven miles.

The George White or Yellow House Ranch has been many things to numerous people-a place for outings and picnics and swims in cattle tanks.

Through the years George White unselfishly donated the four and one half mile wide by eight and one half mile long ranch to many worthwhile activities, especially to youths and the armed forces.

The scouting district that includes Lamb, Hockley, Bailey and Yoakum Counties is named George White District because of White's generosity in letting scouts use the ranch. The ranch was leased to the Air Force

during WWII for a bombing site. For several years Marine reserves have used the ranch for practice maneuvers. Twice a year ROTC members from Lubbock have used the ranch for mock battles. The new chapter of ranch history is

about to begin John Lincoln has been named manager of the ranch and will be moving to the ranch in the near future. Lincoln is vice

DDT, Now A 'No-No'

Texas Agriculture decision is August 31, 1972 Commissioner John C. White announced that registration of DDT for use in and around the home will not be continued in

This means that use of DDT for households in Texas will not be allowed under the Texas pesticide law.

White made his decision based on recommendations of the Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas. The committee was created by the Texas Legislature to study use of pesticides in Texas and to make recommendations.

White emphasized that the regulation has no bearing on use of DDT for agriculture and in matters relating to public health. "DDT is still a very valuable chemical for agricultural producers and public health officials. But because of the concern of everyone about the quality of our environment, I am announcing that registration of DDT for household use will not be continued in Texas," he said.

About half of the DDT now used in Texas is used in and around the home.

White noted that use of DDT has declined drastically in the past decade. Nationwide, it has been cut by more than a half. The effective date of White's

The need of a quality environment is uppermost in everyone's mind. The Texas Department of Agriculture is committed to providing as best we can through our programs as they relate to the overall economy procedures which will not only maintain but improve our surroundings

"I believe with discontinuance of registration of DDT for household use, we will meet our goal of a quality environment. This decision should cut the use of DDT by about one-half in the state. At the same time, we will allow the use of DDT in those formulations approved for agriculture production and will also allow the use of DDT in public health programs." "DDT is a chemical causing

much controversy. Too much of it is based on emotion, not fact. In following the recommendations of the Pesticide Advisory Committee of Texas, I believe this decision is based on factual information. The committee has studied this problem at great length, particularly as it affects all Texans. I, therefore, concur in their recommendation which will curtail the use of DDT around the home but still provides that agriculture and shredding vegetables.



The Asps' Sting

Asps, those little woolly worms most often found in trees and shrubs, have been active lately and individuals should beware of their sting, cautions Dr. Philip Hamman, Extension entomologist. The worms are about an inch long when mature and have a short, thick body covered by silken hairs ranging from light tan to gravish in color. Under the hairs on the backside of the worms are Hall. numerous short, poisonous spines. Stings occur when a person brushes against the worm or attempts to remove it from exposed skin or clothing.

The sting is accompanied by an extremely painful and intense burning sensation. Severe headaches, nausea and vomiting may occur. If a patient has a severe reaction' to an asp sting, consult a physician

Generating station additions scheduled for the five-year period will add more than 600,000 kilowatts to the company's power production capability. At the present time, the 11 major power stations produce a little more than 2,000,000 kilowatts.

The first of these capacity additions is already under construction as the second unit at Jones Station, southeast of Lubbock. A 256,000 kilowatt unit, it is scheduled to be in service for the summer of 1974. The first Jones Station generator, also a 256,000 kilowatt unit, went into service earlier this year.

The generating unit planned for 1976 operation is slated to be the company's first 350,000 kilowatt machine. However, the company has "reserved" three capabilities - 250,000, 350,000 and 450,000 - with the manufacturer, and the final decision will be made after all growth factors have been weighed.

'We have some interesting options with this 1976 unit. In June of 1972, we will complete an intertie between our company and the Public Service Company of Oklahoma. This is our first major interconnection with another utility. The tie line offers us the opportunity to exchange power; to sell power into power-deficient areas; to install units with larger capacity; and to locate units where fuel and water resources and load balances are most favorable. These are factors of efficiency and economy which are important to our customers, as these factors will be
