The and reduced lunchess to olow-income family
students, was initiated here after the first students, was initiated here after the first
of the year. Since that time the number of of the year. Since that time the number on-
students getting free lunchess has increased more than 300 per cent.
Because of this increase in free or Because of this increase in free or
reduced price meals, the additional work necessary tokeep the records, and the loss
of money from additional free lunches, the Littlefield system may have to decide
whether to go along with the government program and be entitiled to commodities or
drop the program and lose the commodities and have to finance the entire
cafeteria operations. Under the program, schools either do it
the governments' way or do without. "We might be just as well off financing the
program ourselves as the government telling us how to run it and go into the hole
anyway,
Superintendent Paul 1 Jones said this week.
"It could come to that, if the cost is more than the help," he said "The board will make a juggment on that fater.
