General Telephone Asks For Rate Increase

Littlefield city councilmen discussed at length a rate increase request from General Telephone Co. of the Southwest, and discussed a proposal for the seal coating of approximately 105,000 square yards of city paving during their regular meeting Thursday night.

Bill McMorries, city engineer, appeared before the councilmen to discuss the proposed telephone rate increase, and presented a proposal to them concerning the request.

Councilmen decided to invite representatives from the Spade, Whitharral, Anton and Amherst communities (the communities which will be affected by the increase) to attend a study session on the matter.

If the proposed rates are enforced, the present rates of one party residence phones will go from \$5.45 to \$9.15 in Littlefield; from \$6.50 to \$9.15 in Spade; from \$6.25 to \$9.15 at Whitharral; from \$5.50 to \$9.15 at Anton; and from \$5.75 to \$9.15 at Amherst.

All one-party business phones in the area will go to \$20.40 if the proposed rates are enforced.

Present rates on one-party business phones in Littlefield are \$11.50; at Spade, \$14; at Whitharral, \$13.50; at Anton, \$11.25; and at Amherst, \$11.25.

All residence extension phones will be a rate of \$1.25 — no increase to the area exchange, but a 25 cent increase in Littlefield.

Business extensions would all remain the same — \$1.75.

Rural business phones (four party) now cost the user \$8.25 and the proposed rates would raise the cost to \$18.30 in the Littlefield area.

Rural residence phones (four party) are now listed for \$5.25 and would be raised to \$8.40 per phone.

City councilmen will receive bids for the seal coating project during the next regular session June 15. No seal coating was done in the city last year, due to the major seal coating and paving the year before.

Some streets need minor repair, and the current project will take care of that need.

Jake Diel, contractor for the major paving project, is to make some corrections in streets.

In other matters of business, city councilmen:

1. Discussed a letter from the Texas State Department of Health concerning recommendations for the public drinking water supply. City Manager Pat Bradley advised the councilmen of the minor details involved.

2. Were advised of several things which have come up since May 1 when Bull Lake was taken as a city park. City Manager Pat Bradley consulted them on their wishes as to admitting special groups to the lake, and advised them of state regulations governing the lake.

Councilmen felt that firearms should not be allowed — except during special designated hunting seasons. They decided that campfires should be built only in designated areas.

Councilmen advised Bradley to check with other lakes about their regulations.

3. Approved the minutes from the last meeting, payment of bills, and departmental reports.

Commissioners Relinquish Quail Hunt Jurisdiction

A long standing feud between Lamb County quail hunters and the commissioners court may be resolved following a resolution passed by the court Wednesday.

The court passed a resolution requesting that the control of the quail hunting season in Lamb County be placed within the jurisdiction of the Parks and Wildlife Department and that all control of said hunting season be

relinquished by the Lamb County Commissioner's court.

Commissioners Jack Peel, and Hubert Dykes, and T. L. Free voted for the measure, and A. J. Spain voted against.

The resolution will have to be acted upon by the state legislation before it becomes effective, therefore the resolution does not affect this year's quail hunting season.

This year's quail season as set by the Parks and Wildlife will be either approved or disapproved by the commissioners court here as it has since the season came under the rule of the court in 1969.

Judge G. T. Sides said the court will act on the Parks and Wildlife recommendation after they receive the state commission's quail hunting dates.

If the court approves of the number of days set for hunting quail this year, they will approve. If they disapprove, the quail hunting season in Lamb County will revert back to 46 days.

Breakfast Set Tuesday

Tuesday is National Clean-Up Day and Littlefield residents will start the day with a "Beautification Breakfast" at 6:30 in the Lamb County Community Center, and the city's young people will clean up Bull Lake.

The Community Improvement Committee of the Littlefield Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture is sponsoring the breakfast in an effort to report to citizens what has been done in the current clean-up campaign, what the present needs are, and what the plans are for the future.

Ham, eggs, sausage and homemade cinnamon rolls will be served, according to the chairman of the cooking committee, Mrs. Pat Bradley. Cooks will be women from First United Methodist Church.

Co-chairmen of the Improvement Committee have promised that the breakfast will be completed before 8 a.m., to allow participants to get to work on time.

Reports on various phases of the clean-up campaign will be presented, and Bob Wear will serve as master of ceremonies.

A spokesman for the young people will present their plans for the Bull Lake clean-up, and will tell of that group's plans to aid in future projects in the city.

Several "before and after" shots of cleaned areas will be shown on colored slides, with Chamber of Commerce Manager Bill Payne at the projector.

Other committee chairmen will report on the official city flower, the dailyly; abandoned property; industrial areas; approaches to the city; the business district; residential area; and school grounds.

Dr. Bill Armistead will then present a wrap-up of the committee's efforts.

Following the breakfast, Littlefield young people will report to Bull Lake for clean-up duty. They will take their rakes, hoes, pails, baskets and other tools to be used in cleaning up the area.

The area became a Littlefield city park May 1, when the city took over operation of the lake.

Yet, the wasting of resources in planned obsolescence is necessary to the economy. If we did not have to make all the things we replace the material wasted other stuff, people might not have jobs, and corporations couldn't show an increase in profits.

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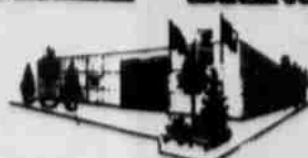

Littlefield Youths Seeking Summer Jobs

The summer youth employment program was officially kicked off by the Chamber of Commerce, City of Littlefield and the Texas Employment Commission.

Since school was dismissed last Friday, the Littlefield office of the Texas Employment Commission has been a "bee hive" of activity according to Roy Wilson, manager of the local office. It is estimated that nearly all the students who were interested in summer work, have registered at the local TEC office.

Bill Payne, Chamber of Commerce manager, pointed out that some employers may have misinformation about the type of jobs being sought. Summer jobs do not mean that the job has to be permanent. On the contrary, a job of any duration will be acceptable. Young persons seeking summer work

can be used very effectively by employers in fill-in jobs, or temporary jobs such as temporary clerks, receptionists, and sales clerks during the time a regular employee is on vacation. TEC official, Wilson, reports that there is a youth ready to work regardless of the type of job.

Openings are being sought for such jobs as sales clerks, receptionists, office clerks, truck driver helpers, service station helpers, restaurant workers, irrigators, tractor drivers and many others.

Employers, homeowners and farmers are urged to list their job openings with the Texas Employment Commission. The telephone number is 385-5107. It is pointed out that the summer employment program for youth is being operated as an addition to the regular TEC placement services offered here.

This bracelet honors the man whose name is inscribed and includes the date he was lost. It should be worn with the vow that it will not be removed until the day the Red Cross is allowed into Hanoi and can assure his family of his status and that he receives the humane treatment due all men.

These bracelets are distributed by VIVA (Voices in Vital America) a nonprofit, non-political national student organization dedicated to the fact that progress and freedom can only be achieved and maintained by rational and responsible action.

There are two types of bracelets; nickel-plated or solid copper. And for those who feel copper has a therapeutic value, the solid copper bracelet is left unacquainted, hence it will tarnish. To help cover the costs of the VIVA, a minimum of \$2.50 for nickel or \$3.00 for copper is requested. 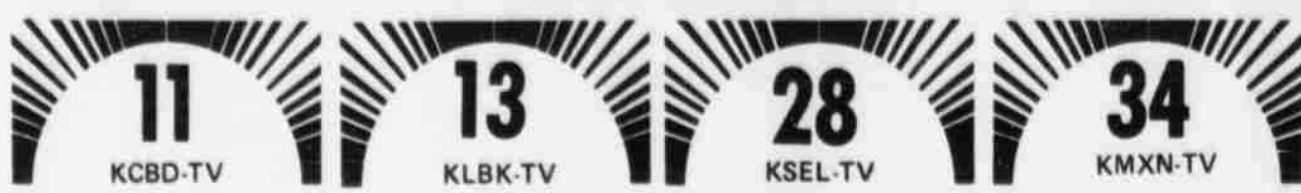
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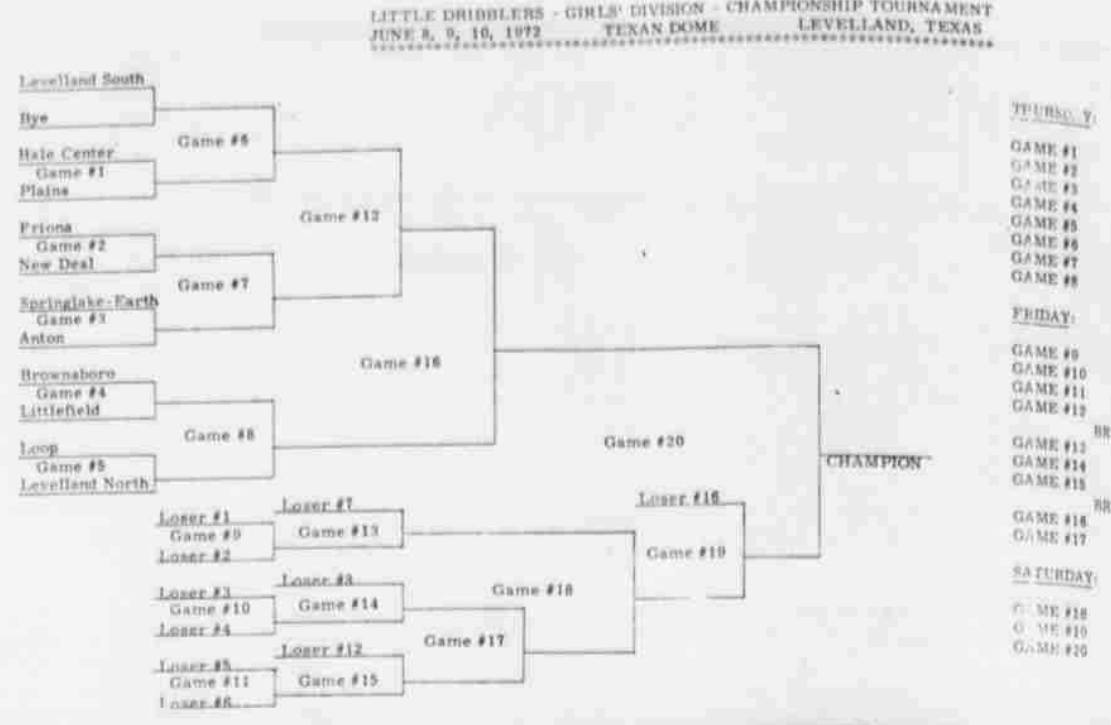

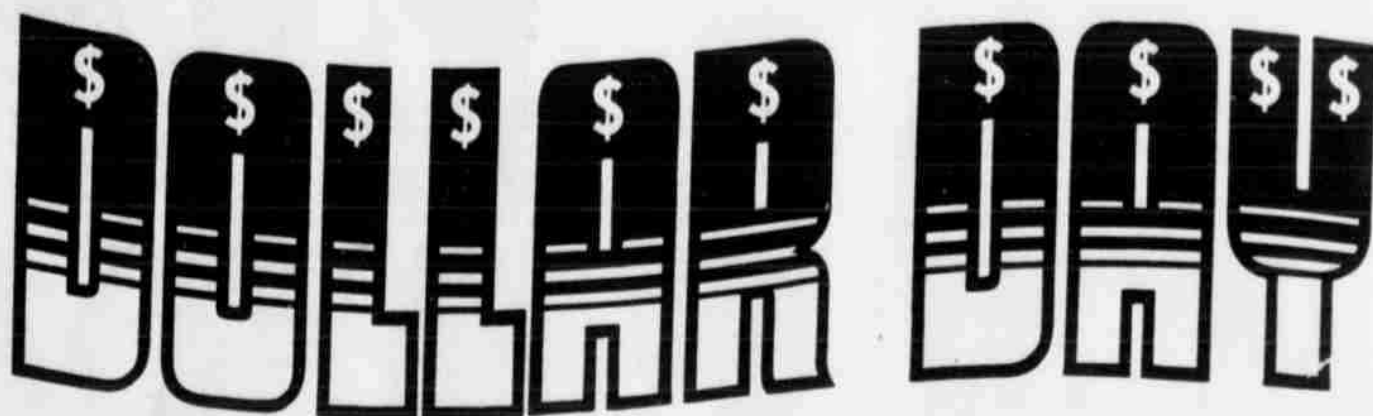

Mexican Auto Insurance Needed By U.S. Tourists

Thousands of vacationing Americans will be driving their cars into Mexico this summer. Many of them will be falsely confident that they have proper liability protection in case of an accident in that country, the Insurance Information Institute warns.

When planning to drive South of the border, U.S. residents should check with their insurance agent or broker about obtaining an official Mexican automobile liability insurance policy.

Unless properly informed and insured, their pleasant vacations could turn into costly nightmares.

Tourists should be warned: "Don't drive into Mexico without auto liability insurance from a Mexican company!"

Most Americans are unaware that only insurance companies located in Mexico are recognized under Mexican law. And contracts of insurance written by non-Mexican companies are not accepted in that country.

A tourist involved in an accident in Mexico could be faced with a large cash outlay, informal detention, or even jail, under the strict provisions of the Mexican law—even if he has the "Mexican auto endorsement" attached to his U.S. policy.

The "Mexican endorsement" on some U.S. policies is designed for a limited purpose and its application to vacation use should be thoroughly discussed with an insurance agent or broker before a person drives across the border.

Without proper Mexican coverage, the motorist has four alternatives if he is involved in an auto accident which results in even minor personal injury or property damage. They are:

1. Post a cash bond with the local officials.
2. Post a commercial bond from a Mexican bonding company (a possibility if the tourists speak Spanish, knows someone locally and has enough money).
3. Contact a U.S. insurance agent, via telephone or telegram (but, under Mexican law, it is illegal for the agent to settle the claim in Mexico. He may, however, advance the cash necessary to post bond).
4. Face legal detention and impounding of the automobile.

As visitors to Mexico, Americans are bound by Mexican law, just as Mexicans traveling in the U.S. are bound by its law. Compliance with those laws can make a happier vacation in Mexico.

Here are some additional pointers for traveling South of the border.

—Obtain a tourist card from the office of the Mexican Bureau of Tourism, the Mexican Consul or at the border.

—If you have an auto accident in Mexico, look for help from one of the green Turismo jeeps that patrol the highways. The driver will assist insured in

contacting an adjuster for the Mexican company which issued you insurance.

—If no patrol car arrives in a reasonable time, call the nearest police officer. The policy should be shown to the chief or police and no officer should be paid for his services. This is the responsibility of the Mexican insurance company.

Plan Ahead For Fall Color

"Now is the time to plan ahead for color in the fall landscape. All too often, gardeners forget that many of our more popular summer annual flowers are pretty well done in before cool weather returns," states Lady Clare Phillips, county home demonstration agent.

Four plants, chrysanthemums, candle tree, copper plant, and Joseph's coat, are outstanding for their brilliant fall colors.

Chrysanthemums (Chrysanthemum Morifolium), more commonly known as mums, are the queen of fall flowers. When grown in loose, well drained soils and given ample water and fertilizer (high phosphorus, such as 5-15-10, two pounds per 100 square feet), they will grow from 12 to 24 inches tall and will cover themselves with colorful blooms. Divided clumps or rooted cuttings can be planted on 15-inch spacings during May, while small plants can be transplanted from pots through June.

June planting dates will result in less need for staking. Keep terminal buds pinched about every week or two through mid July, to promote side branching, concluded Lady Clare.

Six Flags Tops Records

Six Flags over Texas has begun daily operation at Arlington following a record-setting spring season which saw more than 400,000 persons visiting the family entertainment center.

A record was also set for a single day's attendance when 36,607 persons passed through the turnstiles on May 13.

Six Flags will be open daily from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. and the summer schedule will continue through Aug. 27.

Do You Want To Know What You're Cooking?

A filet mignon is what part of a beef carcass? What's the difference between a rolled fresh ham and a smoked ham? From what part of the lamb do shish ke bab cubes come from? You can get your answers to these questions plus a lot of helpful information on how to cook meat by writing for three colorful meat charts available from the Texas Department of Agriculture.

Texas Agriculture Commissioner John C. White said housewives will find the charts invaluable in helping to stay within family food budgets. Each chart shows a breakdown of all the cuts of a beef carcass, a hog, and a lamb.

The beef chart shows you that the filet mignon comes from the T-bone steak, the Porterhouse steak, and the top loin steak. The pork chart shows you that a rolled fresh ham is from the leg and a smoked ham from the rear portion of the leg roast.

On the backs of each chart are detailed information on how to best cook the meat.

Mrs. Maurer said they have always been careful to choose schools which were strictly boarding schools and not half day students and half boarding students.

The Maurers all enjoy bicycling, camping and back packing. "But we never have the opportunity to all go together," Mrs. Maurer said. "If we ever do, I'll end up heading the grub committee and being the cook."

The Maurers all get home just a couple of times a year, but they drop by one at a time or in twos whenever the opportunity

arises. "People ask us where we're going this summer," Mrs. Maurer said. "We aren't going anywhere. We want to be here when the children come home."

Two of the children were here over the weekend and Mrs. Maurer was busy cooking. One of her specialties is a jelly roll, and she had one baked and ready. "Some people think something like that is hard to make," she said, "but it just looks that way."

This is the recipe Ethel Maurer uses:

JELLY ROLL
1 t. baking powder
1/4 t. salt
4 eggs, unbeaten
3/4 cup sugar
3/4 cup flour
1 t. vanilla extract
1 cup jelly

Add baking powder and salt to eggs in bowl, and place bowl over bowl or pan of hot water. Gradually add sugar by tablespoons and beat with egg beater until thick and lemon colored. Remove from water. Fold in flour and vanilla, turn into 15" x 10" x 1" pan which has been greased and lined with waxed paper to within one-half inch of the edge and greased again. Bake in a 400 degree oven for 13 minutes. Don't over cook. Remove from oven, quickly cut off crisp edges. Turn out on clean towel covered with powdered sugar. Remove paper. Spread with beaten jelly, roll up lengthwise. Wrap in towel and cool on rack.

Mrs. Maurer uses two or three flavors of jelly.
