Littlefield, 9 Schools Graduate 294 Seniors

Littlefield and nine area schools are graduating 294 seniors this week.

There are 101 graduation candidates from Littlefield High School. LHS commencement exercises will be tomorrow, Friday, May 26th, at 8 p.m. in the Littlefield Junior High Auditorium. Doug Walden, president of the Littlefield school board will present the diplomas.

FRIENDS AND parents of graduates are asked not to take flash photos during the ceremony. Colored photos will be made by a professional photographer.

Mark Rogers is valedictorian with a 95.37 grade average. Kathy Turner is salutatorian with an average of 95.22.

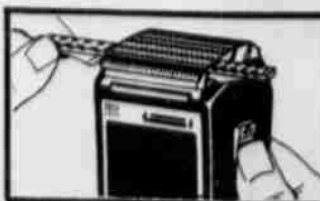

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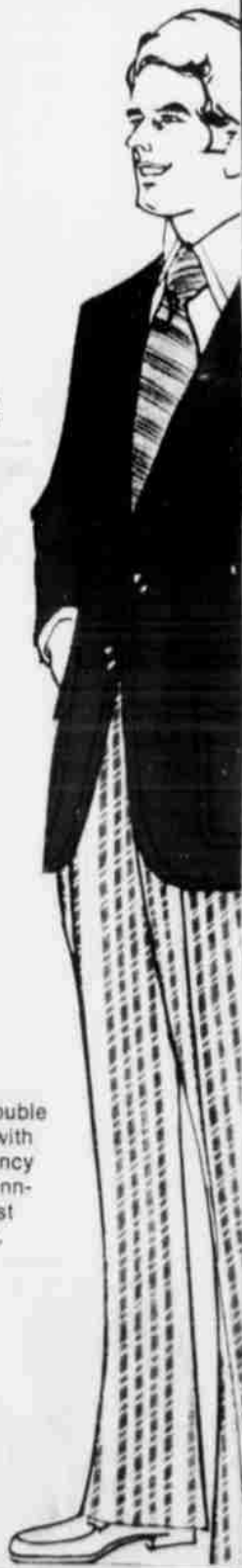

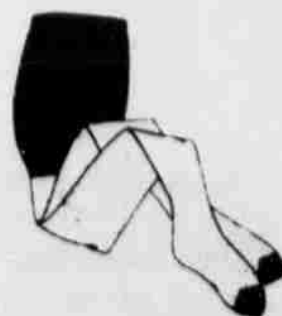

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THE ABUNDANT LIFE

Live Peaceably

LIVE PEACEABLY must be our aim. This will not be a discussion of governmental foreign policy.

So much is lost through conflict and agitation; sometimes lost forever. Whereas, peace helps preserve the beneficencies which are so essential to our well-being and it also enriches and enhances the total life structure.

WE MUST BE INTERESTED in the things that make for peace. These guidelines which will produce peace within us, and peace between us and the people with whom we are associated are easily identified and applied.

WE MUST DESIRE PEACE before there can be peace. Of course, desire alone will not bring peace. It will, however, help set us on the right course and help us move in the right direction.

Our continuing, sincere effort to live peaceably is never wasted effort, even though, at times, the peace we seek seems elusive.

Individually, it is important and helpful to know that we can often find our own peace in an environment that is something less than peaceful, if desire for this peace continues with us.

PEACE IS MORE than the absence of strife. It is the presence of wise self-rule, wholesome self-confidence, consideration and understanding, and generous thought and action.

THERE ARE ENEMIES of peace which we can recognize, and against which we can build effective defenses.

WHEN WE ARE AT PEACE within ourselves, we will be at peace with others; unless they deliberately make it impossible. We must, however, regardless of what others do, preserve the peace within our own lives.

These enemies, however, are not overpowering, because they are not that strong; but they must be opposed with diligence.

This we can do, and we dare do no less. It will be accomplished by our devotion to the good and the true of life.

SOME GREAT ENEMIES of peace are "avarice, ambition, envy, anger, and pride. If these enemies were to be banished, we should infallibly enjoy perpetual peace." — Petrarch.

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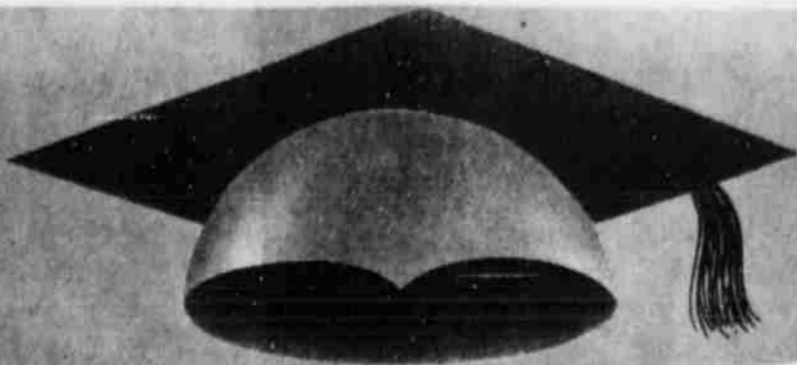

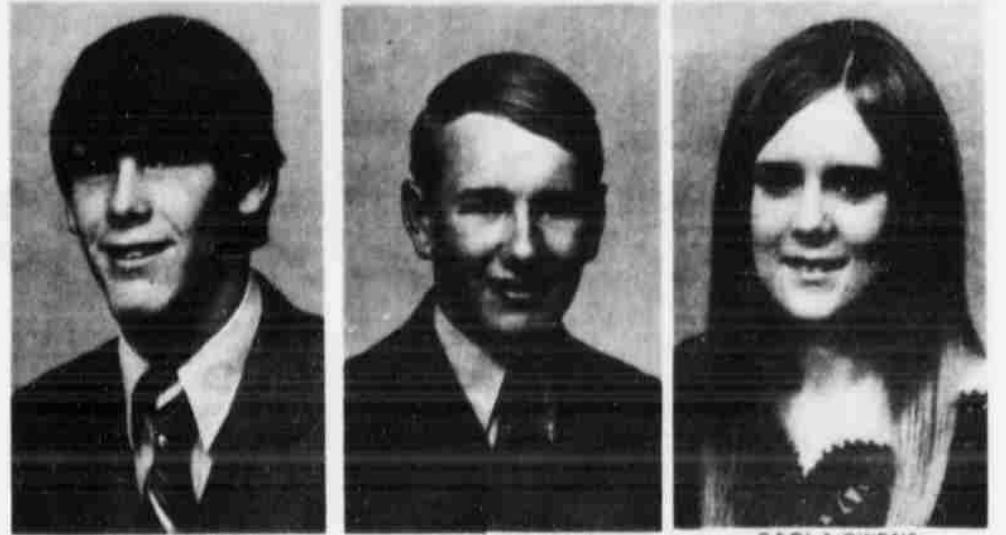

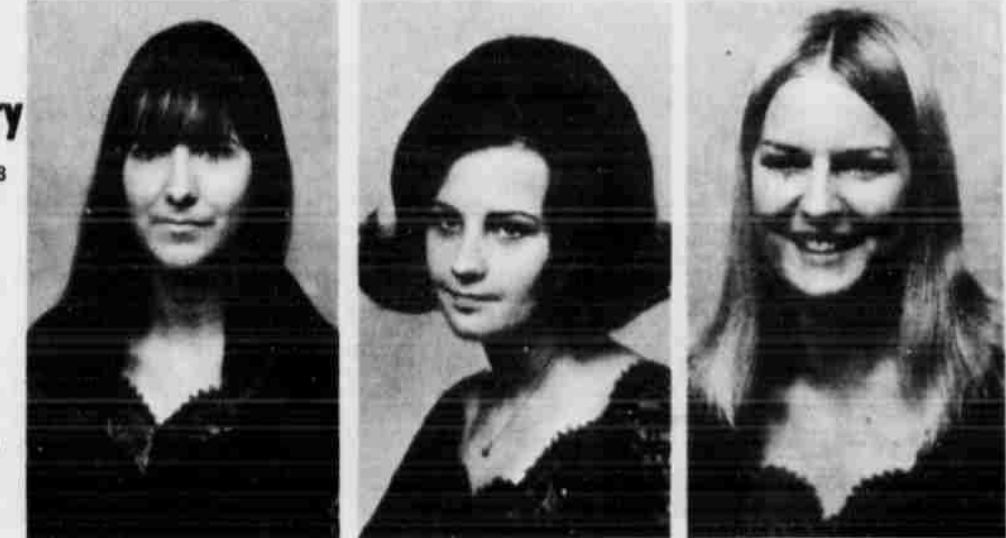

Each registrant inducted is given 30 days notice before the reporting date. All orders for June will be May 31, 1972.

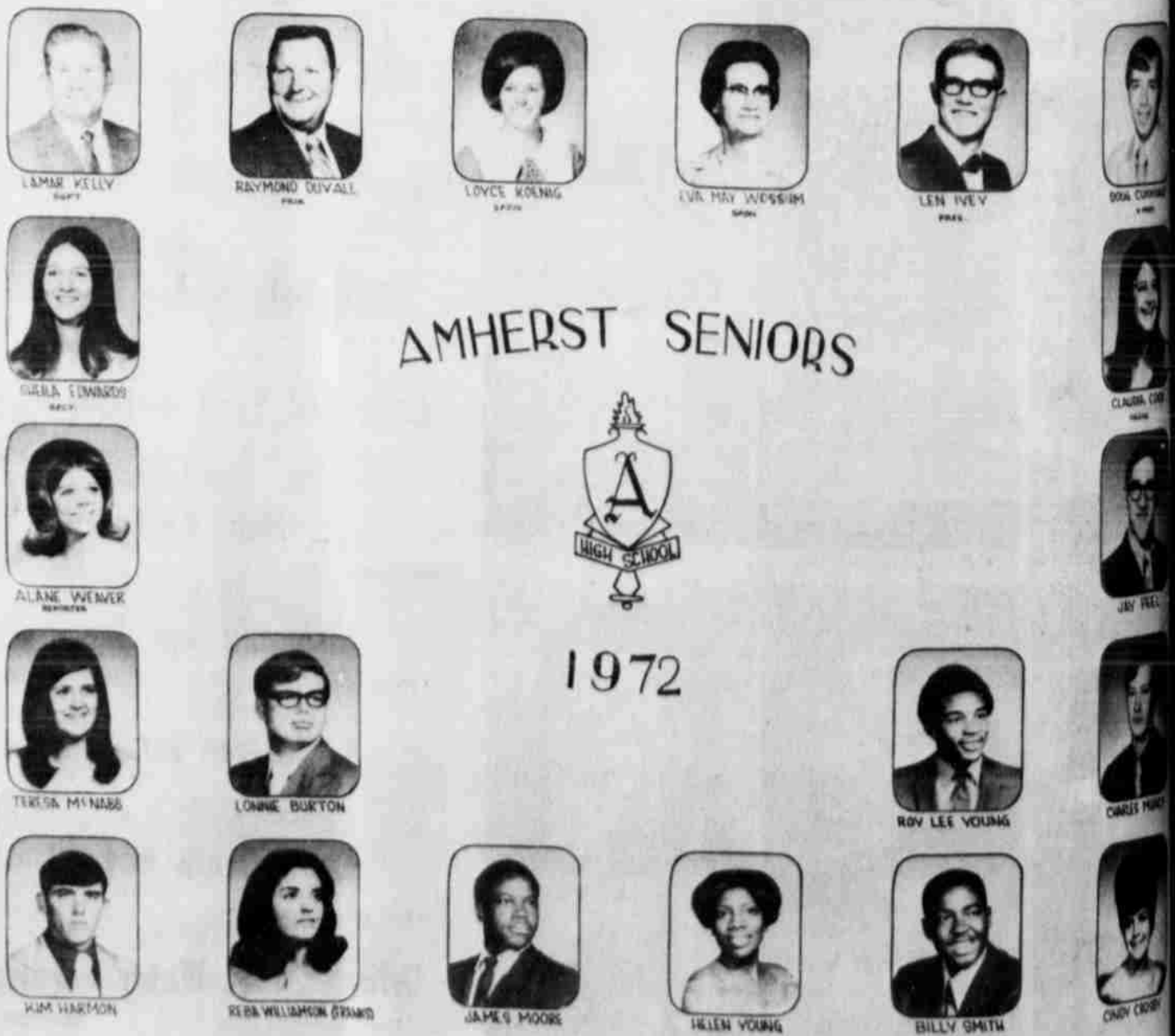

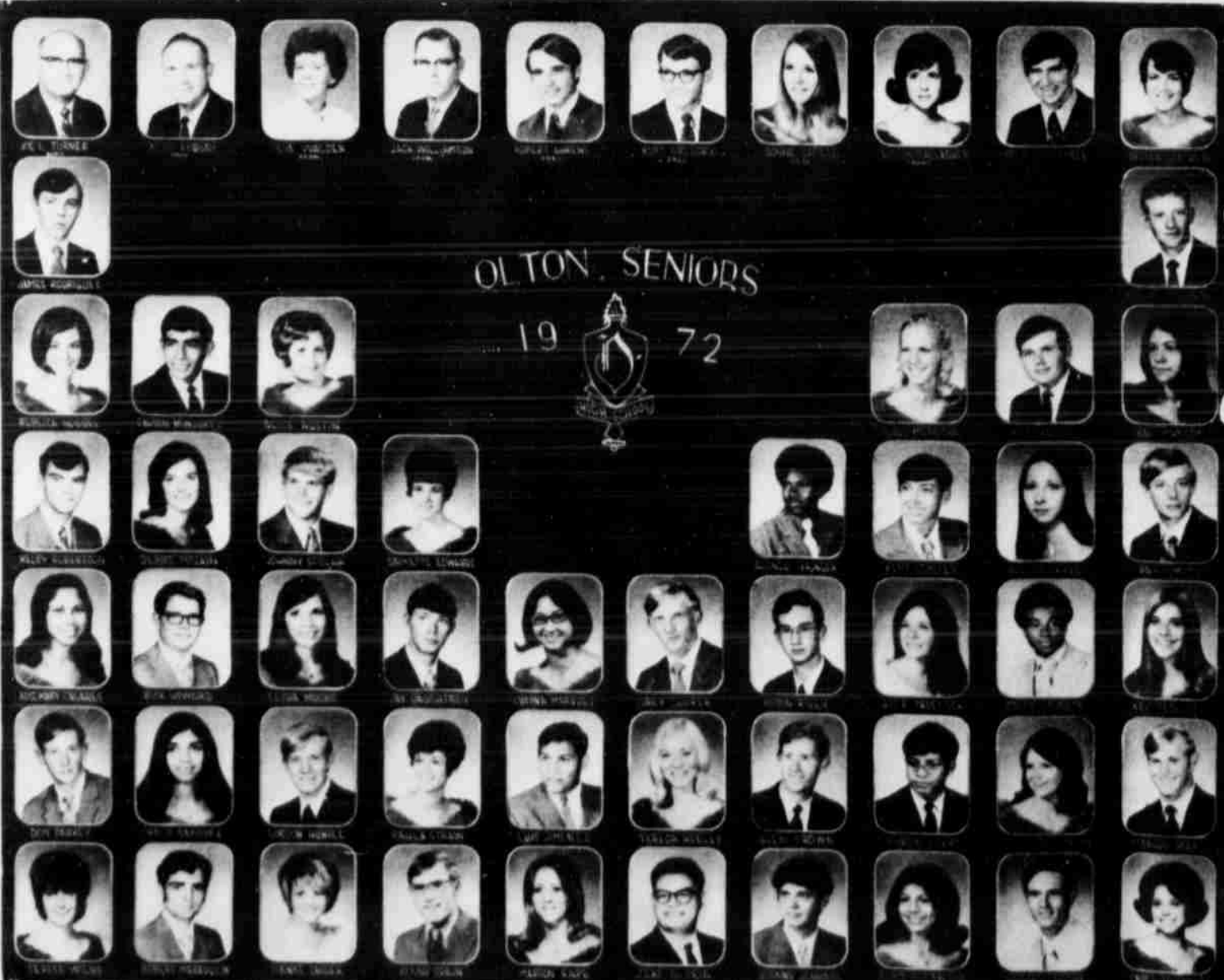

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Baylor's 83rd Summer Will Begin June 5

Baylor University's 83rd summer session that will begin June 5 will feature programs of study in 29 academic fields in addition to several unique and diversified travel programs, workshops and other in-residence programs.

More than 3,000 students are expected to enroll during the two six-week sessions, which will be June 5 through July 12 and 13 through Aug. 18.

The summer quarter of the Baylor School of Law will begin May 15 and end Aug. 4. Law students will register for classes beginning at 10 a.m. May 13 in the courtroom of Morrison Constitution Hall.

Day students will register for the first six-week session from 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. June 5 in the Lloyd O. Russell Intramural Sports Building on the campus. Continuing education (evening) students will register for summer classes from 5:30 to 7 that evening in the same place.

Some summer classes will be conducted for the entire 12 weeks. Several two-week and three-week courses for both undergraduate and graduate credit in the fields of education, music and oral communication are planned also.

All university facilities will be open for use by students during the summer. Students who desire to live on campus will be housed in air-conditioned dormitories.

Summer school students are allowed to take a maximum of two courses plus physical education each six weeks. In a three-week period, they may take only one course. Maximum credit that may be earned during both semesters of summer school is 14 hours.

Students need not be enrolled at Baylor full-time to participate in the summer program. Credits earned may be transferred to their home college or university.

Regular freshman-level college courses will be available to high school students with three complete years of high school credits. They must be in the upper one-fourth of their high school principal or counselor to participate in summer school.

College credit is offered to them for successful completion of these courses once the student has received his high school diploma, but no courses can be used to complete high school graduation requirements and count as college credits.
