





Live Peaceably



LIVE PEACEABLY must be our aim. This will not be a discussion of governmental foreign policy

Bond Sales Reach \$6,904

In releasing Treasury figures, County Bond Chairman C. O. Stone announced that sales of United States Savings Bonds in Lamb County during March totaled \$6,904.

During the first quarter of 1972, sales were \$26,594 for 20 per cent of goal achieved.

Texans purchased \$18,288,542 in Savings Bonds during the month compared to March 1971 sales of \$17,180,080 increase of 6 per cent. Quarterly sales totaled \$56,927,138 for 28 per cent of the state's goal of \$202.3 million.

National sales of E and H Bonds amounting to \$582 million were reported for March, 13.3 per cent above 1971 sales of \$513 million. Sales for the threemonth period totaled \$1,640 million — 31 per cent of the National goal of \$5.3 billion.
