Murder Trial Starts

Trial proceedings against Charles Allen Nance got underway in Levelland Friday for the murder of little 1-year-old Ernest Michael Jordan Jr.

MARRIED LITTLEFIELD'S FAVORITE BACHELOR

She Ran Boarding House

When Mrs. Maud Foster (later Mrs. Maud Street) came to Littlefield in 1924, there were two eating places but no boarding house.

Mrs. Street became a young widow during WWI when her husband was killed just eight months after he joined the Army. With money from the pension, she was determined to make a life of her own. So she built the first boarding house in Littlefield-an 80-foot long, two-storied frame building on Phelps Avenue

This was in Littlefield's land boom days when land agents brought prospective land buyers in by the car loads.

About 150 people came by for pie and coffee at her opening on a Saturday afternoon in 1924

She served her first meal the following day. When the big after-church crowd was gone, the new proprietor found the great mounds of mashed potatoes she'd prepared for the Sunday dinner. In the haste and confusion, she'd forgotten to

During the next four years, 50 to 150 people were served three times a day. Food was put on the tables family style and customers ate all they wanted for 50 cents. "They got their money's worth," Mrs. Street said, "because a meal sure was hard to put together.'

Fresh vegetables were served during season. Mrs. Street and one of the young girls who worked for her would go out in the country early in the morning to buy fresh peas, beans and corn. "And I'd start shelling the peas or snapping the beans on the way back to town," Mrs. Street said. "I had to, so we could get them cooked before noon. We didn't waste food, either. If potatoes were left from dinner then we

served hash-browns at supper.' At times the cooks came and went almost as fast as the boarders. Her best cook had a drinking problem. "When he'd show up drunk, one of the little girls working for me would tie an apron around her head, and we'd get in the kitchen and

do the best we could. When someone came around looking for a job as a cook, I'd tell him that if he was willing to live in the chicken coop out back for a few days, I'd probably have a job for him.

Roomers paid \$1 a day, with the meals extra. Mrs. Street, or "Ma Foster" as some of her boarders affectionately called her and the four girls who helped her all lived in one of the 11 upstairs rooms, and the other 10 were rented out. "And there was hardly ever a vacant room," Mrs.

There was no electricity in Littlefield, so kerosene lamps provided light. All the cooking and heating was done with coal. There was no running water, either, unless there was someone around to run across the street and get it.

At first there was no laundry, and all the sheets were boiled outside in pots, rinsed

by hand, dried and put back on the beds. Mrs. Street bought many of the staple groceries at Lamb County Mercantile the grocery store across the street from the boarding house. J.T. Street and his brother W.G. Street had come to Littlefield in 1913 and put in the store. J.T. was considered Littlefield's favorite bachelor, and the friendship that sprung up between Maude Foster and J.T. Street during the years turned into a wedding in 1928. A few years later, Mrs. Street's first and only child was

After four years of running the boarding house, Mrs. Street decided to move the building to 10th Street and make apartments. Top-heavy and too long, the building had to be sawed in half before it could be moved. On moving day the skies opened up and flooded the dirt streets. Alfred Dunagin stuck the truck before he got half-way to the new site with half of the

MRS. MAUD STREET ran Littlefield's first boarding house. It was a monstrous two-storied structure on Phelps Avenue. The building was sawed in half so it could be moved to a new location. The "two" apartments are now owned by Chester Harvey and are on 8th Street. Maud Foster was a widow 11 years before she married the town's most eligible bachelor, J. T. Street. Then when their son was a small child, Street died, and Mrs. Street became a widow again. "You can be scared into doing a lot of things", Mrs. Street said of her active business life.



The Elastic Waistband

By FRANCES JONES

the tops of skirts and pants due to ease of application and comfort in wearing. It is to minimize bulk. Do all of this work with found in all kinds of fashionable and high priced garments, many of which are made of knitted cloth.

For correct fitting, pin a tape measure or a strip of elastic around the natural waistline and over the top of the garment in question. Mark the adjusted waistline on the garment, after pulling up any excess length to remove wrinkles

If allowance for the elastic finish was not made in the cutting, a strip of cloth can be stitched on to cover the elastic. Many readymade garments are finished with the strip of cloth stitched to the top. It is cut from the scraps to the side, thus saving precious cloth. In home construction it is easier to allow the extra length in most cases-it just requires thinking ahead

ABOVE THE NATURAL waistline you will need to allow the width of the elastic plus about 1/4 inch. After fitting, trim any excess cloth from the top. On woven fabrics that will ravel, allow an extra 1/4 inch for turning the raw edge under-this will not be necessary on knits.


Cut a length of elastic to fit the waist and join the ends to make a circle. Lap or butt the ends as seems best for handling bulk. Figure A. With pins or chalk marks divide the circle into fourths. Do the same on the garment top. Often the seams mark the

TURN THE GARMENT right side out and pin the elastic circle in place with the division points matched. Figure B. Thread the machine and adjust it to make a zig zag stitch. Sew the lower edge of the elastic to the garment, stretching fully as you stitch.

FOLD THE TOP over to cover the elastic and stitch the other edge of the band, stretching as you sew. In cloth that

THIS FINISH is used more and more in ravels, fold the extra 1/4 inch under but in knits simply leave the raw edge extending the garment right side out and it will be easier to handle. Figure D.

This method is quicker and more satisfactory than to make a casing and draw the elastic through because there are two rows of stitching to hold the elastic in place. This reduces the tendency to fold over or bend in half. A special elastic that will not fold is available for waistlines, but regular elastic will do


I'M OF THE OPINION that the throttling of free trade into our country may have something to do with the outburst of resentment that our "Friends" are







Voter registration laws, as taken as intent to g applied to college students, have caused some confusion

Although the courts have ruled that it is unconstitutional to treat 18 to 21-year-olds different in the registration laws from the treatment of adults, the old residence law applying to students of any age still stands.

Under that law, students cannot acquire residency by living in the college town six months. Their official residence is their home before they became students unless they are prepared to swear they intend to remain in the county after they leave school.

Citizens Earn Wages From Government

How large a segment of the population in Lamb County derives all or part of its income from the federal, state or local government?

How many local residents are holding down public jobs or are getting social security pensions or are getting funds from other governmental agencies? As in other parts of the country, the proportion of local residents receiving

income from such sources is large. According to computations made by the Tax Foundation, a non-profit oganization that reports on the fiscal aspects of government, about 72.8 million people in the United States-more than a third of the nation's population-are getting income

from public treasuries. This covers only those who are receiving general income support. Not included are private institutions and individuals who are being aided by such special purpose programs as farm support, scholarships, job training and other assistance.

The largest single category of Lamb County residents whose support comes from government, in whole or in part, are the social security beneficiaries. As of Jan.

1. they numbered 2,782

Second in line, in point of number, are public employees. Approximately 650 men and women in the area are on federal, state or local payrolls, according to the latest figures.

Veterans, also, represent a sizeable portion of the people deriving income from government sources. The report shows that 5.5 million of them, nationally, are getting compensation or pension checks from the federal government.

Of those in Lamb County, an estimated 450 living veterans, or survivors of former veterans, are receiving such checks.

In addition, income is going to local residents through various other public agencies. Included are people on the retirement rolls of federal, state and local governments, those who are now in military service and those who are getting unemployment insurance and other

Even though, as the Tax Foundation points out, some persons may be getting income under more than one program, the validity of the figures would not be affected materially, it states.





SWPS To Open New Plant

facility on the Southwestern Public Service Company's system, will be dedicated at ceremonies to be held at 11 a.m. Saturday, Nov. 6.

The plant is located southeast in 1974. of Lubbock on Farm Road 3020. just west of the Buffalo Springs Lake Road

Following the dedication ceremonies, the plant will be open to the public for two days. with the visiting hours on Saturday being 11 to 7 p.m. and on Sunday from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m.

Dr. Clifford B. Jones, president-emeritus of Texas Tech University and a director of Southwestern Public Service Company for more than a quarter-century, will dedicate the new facility.

The response to Dr. Jones' dedicatory remarks will be made by Roy Tolk, president of Southwestern Public Service

The new generating facility

Clifford B. Jones Station, the has a first unit capability of newest electric generating 246,000 kilowatts. This machine is the largest single unit on the Southwestern system. Construction has already started for a second unit of the same size, scheduled to be in service

> When the second unit does go on the line three years from now, Jones Station will be the largest of the 11 major generating stations on the Southwestern system.

The turbine control system at the new station is the first of its type in the world. The result of cooperation in research and development between Westinghouse Electric Corporation, the manufacturer of the turbine, and Southwestern, the system utilizes a digital computer and data recording devices to bring the turbine on the line and control it while in operation. Peter G. Botsonis, a supervisory engineer for Southwestern and a 1958 Texas Tech graduate, played a major role in the development of the control system.

The new facility uses treated sewage effluent, purchased from the City of Lubbock, as its cooling water. In addition, it has equipment which makes it possible to use sewage effluent for the boiler water for test periods of operation

The sewage effluent is also used for irrigation purposes after it has left the plant system.

The use of the reclaimed water at Jones Station and at Nichols Station on the North Plains results in a daily saving of tresh water which is sufficient to meet the needs of a city of 25,000 people.

The generating capability of Jones Station will be controlled by an automatic dispatching system, which regulates the production of all of Southwestern's major generation
