

Military Goods To Be Filled First By Mills

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. — The government soon will announce a priority order directing factories, mills and mines to fill military orders ahead of any others.

Aides of William H. Harrison, administrator of the National Production Authority (NPA), said today the regulation is due this week-end or early next week. They said it will be simple but mandatory.

The officials disclosed that several other orders—setting up allocations, or limiting the civilian use of scarce materials—can be expected in "the near future."

One of them, NPA announced last night, will allocate synthetic rubber to tire firms and other rubber companies. Officials still foresee no need to ration tires or gasoline.

These moves underlined President Truman's assertion that the armament program will forge ahead at full speed despite the apparent collapse of Communist invasion forces in Korea.

At about the same time Mr. Truman told that to his news conference, Secretary of the Interior Chapman set up a new "Defense Petroleum Agency" (DPA) to deal with military-civilian problems in oil, gasoline and aviation fuel.

Interior's experts have reported it may be necessary to limit the octane rating of gasoline to insure sufficient high-octane fuel for the swiftly expanding air force.

At the request of the oil industry, the new DPA was set up separately from Interior's newly-born Minerals and Energy Administration (MEA). The latter agency will continue to regulate coal, electric power and the country's metal and mineral resources in the interest of defense production.

TO ASSURE PEACE

UN Must Keep Up With Its Troops

NEW YORK, Sept. 29. — The United Nations shifted into high gear today, racing to keep up with allied troops who are pushing the Communists back into North Korea.

High officials feel UN political action must stay abreast of events brought about by the victories of its forces in the field.

The triumph of the UN's first venture in crushing armed aggression has caused a tremendous upsurge of optimism here. It makes most non-Communist delegations feel that UN decisions concerning the political and economic future of war-torn Korea will make that Asian country a show-piece of what the UN can accomplish.

These decisions will be embodied in a British resolution which is the subject today of last-minute consultations among many delegations. The United States already has given its approval to the British propositions.

High officials believe the resolution will be completed in the morning and will be put before the 60-nation political committee when it meets for the first time this year at Lake Success today.

On the other hand, the Indian delegation said it must await instructions from New Delhi and was pressing for a delay until Monday or Tuesday. This conflicts with the sense of urgency that has seized UN delegations as a result of the Korean victories and probably will be over-ridden.

Key UN officials, meanwhile, pressed a move to keep the political committee in session — all night if necessary — to vote another resolution giving express authority for Gen. MacArthur's forces to cross the 38th Parallel into North Korea.

They feel the psychological effect of such a resolution would be gratifying.

TO MAKE LOANS HARDER

RFC Overhaul Is Aim Of Probers

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29. — Senators investigating the Reconstruction Finance Corporation (RFC) will ask Congress to overhaul, but not abolish, the huge government lending agency, Sen. Fulbright (D-Ark.) said today.

One objective, he told reporters, will be to stiffen RFC's resistance to political pressure for loans.

In recent months the big agency's lending policies have been under fire from a Senate banking subcommittee, headed by Fulbright, which has been investigating many of the loans made to business concerns.

Fulbright said the subcommittee is at work on legislation for submission to Congress when it returns Nov. 27.

Although only tentative and incomplete drafting has been done so far, Fulbright said the measure will attempt to remedy what he called RFC's present defects. Among other things, he said it would give the RFC less freedom in handing out loans, bring its powers within more carefully defined bounds and require more detailed reports on loans that are approved.

Fulbright said political pressures were the only explanation for some of the loans RFC has made. He expressed doubt that politics could be eliminated altogether.

But he said he is considering the idea of substituting an administrator for the RFC's present five-member board of directors. His group's hearings, Fulbright said, showed how difficult it is to pin down responsibility for RFC loans under the existing set-up.

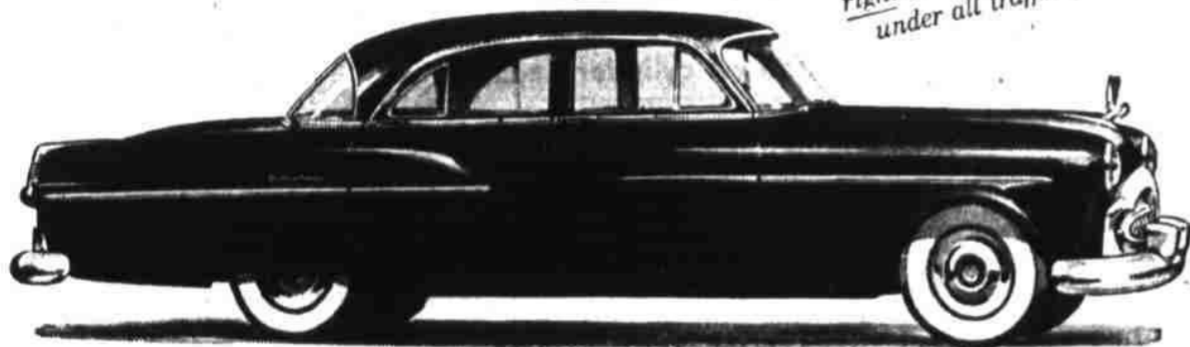

Hotel Strike May Come Off During Series

PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 29. (AP) — A hotel strike in Philadelphia during the World Series loomed as a definite possibility today.

In a joint statement last night, AFL and CIO unions announced 4,000 workers would leave their jobs at 15 major hotels Sunday midnight unless new contracts have been signed.

The hotels involved are the Bellevue-Stratford, Adelphia, Benjamin Franklin, Essex, Ritz-Carlton, Walnut Park Plaza, Penn-Sheraton, Sheraton, Warburton, St. James, Normandie, Warwick, Drake, Sylvania, and John Bartram.

Loyola Cancels TW Game When Negro Barred

LOS ANGELES, Sept. 29. (AP) — Loyola University of Los Angeles, with potentially one of its best teams in recent years, has chosen to forfeit the game with Texas Western College at El Paso Saturday because of restrictions against Negro players.

Only one Loyola Negro athlete, Halfback Bill English, was scheduled to make the trip today, but Loyola's Coach, Casassa, president of Loyola, declared.

"We cancelled the game not only because of public opinion here in Los Angeles, but generally throughout the country. Several schools have refused to play in the South unless they could use all their players, white or Negro. We felt the same way."

Father Casassa said he so advised Dr. W. H. Elkins, Texas Western president, last night after Loyola authorities considered the decision two days.

"The Texas Western people have been very decent about the problem," said Father Casassa, "but they couldn't do anything against the policy laid down by the Texas Board of Regents, who control Texas Western."

Loyola has two Negro players on the squad, but the other, Fullback Vernon Horn, was injured and was not slated to make the trip. The Lions also have a Negro trainer, Oscar Cunningham.

HST Has Job To Keep People Alert To Danger

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29.—President Truman is setting for his administration the task of keeping the people alert to the continuing danger of war without also touching off some unpleasant mass psychology.

He says there cannot be any let-up in defense preparations after the Korean war is over, but that he expects opposition to continued expansion of the program.

But he didn't tell a news conference yesterday how he and his defense and diplomatic chiefs would go about keeping the defense program alive.

The President says he hopes the peace which he has long sought will be realized.

It may be an uneasy peace, at least at the outset and perhaps for years. Or it could be only another interlude between wars, like that which ended with Communist aggression in Korea last June 25. It is to be prepared for such possibility that Mr. Truman wants the country to be well armed.

No administration ever has been able to keep the American people interested in military matters when there wasn't a war in progress. Mr. Truman may have more success.

However, he will have to reckon with some old as well as new factors.

There is the national apathy, the dislike of laying out money and military manpower when no conflict actually exists.

To counter this, the government must show why it believes another war may be launched against the United States and its friends. And it also must tell what that war could be like.

Here lies the danger of producing mass fear.

Big Grid Guns To See Action On Saturday

NEW YORK, Sept. 29.—Notre Dame, Army and Oklahoma pick up the strings of college football's grandest success streaks tomorrow, making their season bows on a loaded program.

All of the gridiron elite will be in action across the land as the "one-two-hep" boys fry to steal some thunder from baseball's approaching World Series.

The No. 1 attraction is at South Bend, Ind., where the Fighting Irish, fabled as the country's mightiest, are host to the North Carolina Tarheels.

Army, undefeated in 20 straight games, will be unveiled at West Point with Colgate furnishing the opposition. Earl Blaik's Cadets have been rated second behind Notre Dame in the pre-season Associated Press poll.

Oklahoma's Sooners will make their debut at Norman against Denny Myers' Boston College, which was held to a 7-7 standstill last week by Wake Forest. The Sooners are favored to extend their winning streak to 22 games.

The pass-throwing Southwest and the solidly tough Midwest match might result in two of the best games of the day.

Southern Methodist, boasting one of the season's most highly rated backs in Kyle Rote, invades Columbus to test Ohio State's Rose Bowl champions. Texas' Longhorns, meanwhile, are at home with another big ten stalwart, Purdue.

Other inter-sectional plums will see Rice the Southwest Conference tilt, meeting Santa Clara at Houston and Southern California playing Iowa at Los Angeles. The latter game is tonight.

Alabama and Tulane knock heads at New Orleans in the game that has Southerners drooling.

Says President, Marshall Conspire To Oust MacArthur

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 29.—President Truman and Secretary of Defense Marshall, says Sen. Capehart (R-Ind.), "are conspiring to oust" Gen. MacArthur from his Far East command after the Nov. 7 election.

"Government circles in Washington are conscious of the bitter animosity held by President Truman and Gen. Marshall against Gen. Douglas MacArthur," Capehart told a Republican rally in suburban Southport last night.

Capehart, campaigning for re-election, said MacArthur has advocated supporting China's Nationalist government and "opposed the Marshall-Truman policy which delivered China to the Reds" and "brought on the Korean war."

Capehart added that Gen. MacArthur "warned the President not to withdraw our troops from South Korea in the first place because it would take the blood of our boys to recover it if we left South Korea helpless, but that is exactly what happened."

DETROIT, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Henry Ford, widow of the world-famed automobile pioneer, died early today at the age of 84.

More Foreigners In India These Days

NEW DELHI, India.—There are 45,661 adult foreigners in India, not counting Commonwealth citizens and diplomats, according to registrations under the foreigners' act. This is an increase of nearly 12,000 over the number here in 1948.

Largest group of foreigners is the 12,539 Chinese. There are 4,157 Americans and 332 Russians.

Clara Bryant Ford and Henry Ford spent 60 years of wedded life

together until the husband's death in 1947.

Their only son, Edsel, died in 1943. At that time he was president of the Ford Motor Co. as successor to his father. The elder Ford had then retired.

Mrs. Ford's survivors include her grandson, Henry 2nd, now president of the company.

There are three other grandchildren, Benson, William Clay and Josephine. All four grandchildren are children of Edsel.

Ford, who always credited Clara with much responsibility for his accomplishments, called his wife "the believer." He used to say that she never doubted his ultimate success in the original lean days when he worked day and night at his mechanics.

Each, as it turned out, had the same span of life—84 years. Ford was that age when he died in the spring of 1947.

Measure Wax Thru Electron Microscope

NEW YORK.—When will wax and water dissolve in each other? Doing research to improve floor wax products, Robert Pugh, technical director of David E. Kennedy, Inc., found the answer. The two will not dissolve, he discovered, until they are broken down into particles about three-millionths of an inch in diameter—so small that an electron microscope is needed to see the emulsified particles.

Hospital's "Home" To Future Nurse

RENSSELAER, N. Y.—Miss Doris Stenger, who has spent most of her 19 years in hospitals as a patient, is going to become a nurse.

Miss Stenger was burned severely when she was five years old. Since then, she has been in hospitals much of the time and has undergone more than 40 operations. She has entered the nurses training school at Pittsfield, Mass., general hospital.
