

ACTIVITY PICKING UP

City Putting On New Face

What's going on in Littlefield? A lot of cleaning up, painting and fixing up of the older businesses and buildings, opening of some new businesses, changing of management of others.

Projects include everything from the new Goodyear Service store being built at West Fourth and XIT to the modern-day Huckleberry Finn whitewashing of the fence at the Country Club by teenagers. D.W. Bawcom is building the 50' x 140' concrete block and steel structure that will house the Goodyear retail store. It is one of two commercial building permits issued since the first of the year.

Building permits for the first five

months of this year total \$67,900 compared to \$45,875 for the same period last year. In addition to permits totaling \$35,000 for commercial buildings, two more new dwellings for a total of \$28,600 are under construction. Permits have been issued for \$17,000 for five car ports and garages in the city limits, and additions total \$2,600.

Mechanics lien contracts for \$313,800 the first five months of 1971 include three new residences of over \$50,000 each, and a \$19,800 addition to a greenhouse just outside the city.

This month and the past two months have been busy times for lumber yard dealers, especially in the fix up, paint up departments.

The Littlefield city council budgeted \$12,750 for this year for the first phase of extensive remodeling of the city hall.

The new Goodyear business going in on Fourth has prompted the whole block to do a face lifting job. Robison Upholstery, located to the west of the Bawcom building, is about through with an extensive remodeling job and the firm is adding a Singer Sewing Machine distributorship to their upholstery business.

Bigham Furniture, to the west of Robisons, painted its front. Across the street, Littlefield TV Service is planning a new plate glass front.

Perry Brothers Variety doubled its floor space by taking in the two buildings to the north, and added several new departments.

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Bogus \$20's Show Up Again

Bogus \$20 bills turned up at two more Littlefield business places Saturday.

Jim Jones Service Station and Merlin's Food notified authorities of the "funny" money.

The serial number was K29973226B, a different number than the 11 counterfeit bills passed to Littlefield merchants last month, and sheriff's officials said the reproduction wasn't as good as those passed here in May.

Authorities are seeking a man described as in his early forties, about six feet tall, weighing about 200 pounds, and with a rough, ruddy complexion and with light sandy hair.

Counterfeit \$20 bills bearing the same serial number as those passed in Littlefield turned up in Muleshoe, Clovis, Portales, Hereford, Lubbock and Morton.

At press time Wednesday, reports of other counterfeit bills had come in from Pampa and Amarillo.

Downpours Douse Most Of County

The rains came again this weekend. Downpours of two inches and more fell on parts of the county, and some pea-sized hail fell from the cauliflower clouds that built up late Saturday evening and moved slowly across the South Plains.

Official gauges in Littlefield measured 2.50 with unofficial reports of three inches and more inside the city limits. Cars drowned out on Hall and U.S. 84 and over other parts of town. Water backed up into McCormick's Service Station for the first time in several years. The deluge closed U.S. 84 at the east loop for a time and left the houses there standing in lakes.

Roads were under water at Lumsden Gin, the Spade Highway, XIT and Delano and north 385.

A tornado touched ground about 5 p.m. Saturday on ranch land south of Plant X, but no damages were reported.

Parched land in the Bula and Pep area got drinks of up to 2.5 inches, giving many farmers in that area hopes of a 1971 cotton crop.

Rains were spotted over the county. Around Sudan, Marvin Bowling got two inches on an irrigated place and less than 50 on a dryland farm less than one-half mile apart.

Monday farmers were "scratching like crazy" trying to get planted crops up or were planting—some for the third time.

Saturday evening moisture reports included Amherst 2.50, Bula 2.50, Olton .50, Spade .49, Springlake 1.03, Sudan 1.50, and 1.33 to 2. at Whitharral.

Area Woman's Adopted Son Makes Good As Entertainer

In 1930, at the courthouse in Cleburne, a baby boy was adopted by Minnie Thacker.

Minnie is now Mrs. Johnny Smith of Amherst, and the son she adopted is Bill Thacker, a successful entertainer in Concord, Calif., where he is known as one of Greater Bay's finest musicians.

At the age of four Billy Joe was entertaining people by singing and playing a guitar. When he was eight his mother had him start taking piano lessons, but in a very short time the teacher advised the lessons were useless because after the boy knew a song after hearing it one time, and he could play the tune by heart on the second attempt. He was piano soloist at the Assembly of God Church in Cleburne when he was eleven.

Not only did he have unusual talent in the field of music—when he started to elementary school he was placed in the second grade instead of the first as other beginners because of his advanced knowledge.

Bill has played with well known bands such as those of Bob Wills, Roy Acuff, Ferlin Husky, Grand Ol' Opry at the Cow Palace, and the Johnny Cash house band.

He also worked as a disc jockey at radio stations in Vallejo and Napa and presented live television shows. He has his own band now, known as the Southlanders.

From 1961 to 1963 he and a partner

operated the Palomino Club and Restaurant and while in that business in West Pittsburg proved he also recognized talent in others, booking two struggling artists that everyone knows quite well today—Buck Owens and Glenn Campbell. He hired Hank and Jewel Fay White to play with the Southlanders, before the couple separated. She went south for fame, via Nashville, and is doing great with her new name Sammi Smith and the current hit "Help Me Make It Through The Night."

While in the service during the Korean Conflict he did very little piano playing since "there were no pianos on the battlefield," but he did manage to find an accordion. While playing a harmonica in a fox hole, his music enticed some Koreans to come over to hear him play. There have been necessary interruptions such as the Korean interlude, and there have been interruptions by choice, but each time he returns to his favorite job—playing and singing. He is always ready and willing to play a benefit for Juvenile Hall or other worthy causes.

Bill's wife, Barbara, is a pretty brunette, who is planning to teach in the near future. The rest of the family is composed of two teenage sons, David and Kevin, Debbie, who is eleven, and Jo Ann the five-year-old—a pair of boys and girls each for this unusually industrious and talented couple.

David and Jo Ann inherited their father's musical talent and Kevin and Debbie will probably seek higher education like their mother.

Bill Thacker and his family have visited in Amherst twice in recent years, and plan to visit again this summer. It is hoped the gifted musician who plays by ear with his heart and hands will entertain at Amherst while here.

The woman who gave the musician her heart and home and name feels that the reason he found his place in the sun so early in life was because she assured him that although his mother gave him away he should never feel unwanted because he was very special to her and she loved him dearly, and he grew up knowing the most treasured thing in life—true love.

Old Laws Still In Effect

Lawful for any horses, mules, ponies, sheep, goats, or kids to be herded within the city of Littlefield.

Any person or keeper of any of the animals mentioned are responsible for the destruction of any trees, vines, crops, fruits or vegetables, or damages done by any of the animals may be recovered in civil action.

One of the city ordinances passed by the city commissioners in 1924 was that no dogs, cats, geese, ganders, turkeys, pigeons or any domestic fowl or fowls between the first of March and the first day of each and every year. The ordinance protected gardens from the fowl by prohibiting pea planting time through the planting time.

An ordinance was passed in 1925 that gave the office of city scavenger, and the cleaning of privies and the prescribing the kind of privies. Any person who failed to pay for his services was subject to a fine of not less than \$10 nor more than \$25.

The city scavenger, in the collection of cleaning privies, had the right to remove from the landlord in the event the owner failed to pay.

It was unlawful for anyone to make any noise by the use of public outcry, horns, or in any manner, for the purpose of advertising any article or any kind of merchandise for sale within the limits of the city. The ordinance did not apply to any products offered for sale any products offered for sale upon a farm, poultry, or dairy.

The mentioned ordinances show that the city has a long history of maintaining order and cleanliness.

One ordinance was repealed in 1967, which was restricting the location of public houses, shows, dance halls, and animal shows, shooting galleries, or tin pin alleys. It was repealed because it was no longer illegal to have a dog's life at the pound until he was bailed out Tuesday. Locations of slaughter houses, horse and cow barns, and places for keeping and curing hides were specified in 1926, also, and permits for such had to be agreed upon by persons in adjacent blocks and permits were issued by the commissioners.
