to a nationwide study of in-the distribution. Lamb County income families counterbalancing a larger income families counterbalancing a larger proportion with small earnings?

In Lamb County, the report shows, 60.4 percent of the households had \$5,000 or more in disposable cash remaining from their incomes after paying their personal

By way of comparison, the proportion three years ago, when a similar study was made, was only 57.6 percent.

Because the survey takes into account only cash income, it does not do full justice to farm communities, where income-inkind and lower living costs are important considerations

The breakdown figures for Lamb County list 23.2 percent of the local households with net incomes of \$5,000 to \$8,000 after taxes, 13.0 percent at the \$8,000 to \$10,000 level and, in the over-\$10,000 brackets, 24.2 percent. The remainder are below \$5,000.

Because of the steady rise in the cost of living, these income gains were offset to a large extent, it is noted. However, the advantagaes have outweighed the disadvantages in the past five years.

### MARTHA HAYNES WILL BE RN SOON

# Dream Is 41 Years Late

Mrs. Lee (Martha) Haynes has been 57 years fulfilling her dream of becoming a nurse, but she will be a full-fledged RN in

just six months. When she finished high school in 1931 she planned to go into nursing. She even went to Plainview to start training. But Lee Haynes, who was a Tennessee boy then (Haynes is co-owner of Pioneer Super Market now), kept telling her that he was going back to Tennessee and she'd never see him again, so she became Mrs. Haynes

instead of a nurse. That was 40 years ago. But Mrs. Haynes never lost her interest in the medical field.

And in May she will graduate-at the top of her class-a registered nurse at last.

"I'll be the oldest one in my graduating class," Mrs. Haynes said. "I don't mind telling my age. I'm 57. And that RN means a lot to me. It's taken a lot of time and money and effort and just plain guts to get

"I've been scared all the way through, since I first started at South Plains College to get my LVN (licensed vocational nurse). At times I get so scared I'm sick. It's been like a long pregnancy: Every mor-

ning when I get up I'm nauseated. Mrs. Haynes became interested again in going into nursing when she worked as a receptionist at the Littlefield Hospital two and one-half years. She told SPC Dean Nathan Tubb that she didn't know whether she could make the grade or not when she went to Levelland to sign up for the LVN course. "Oh, sure you can make it," he assured her.

"But it's been 39 years since I finished high school," Mrs. Haynes objected. 'Dean Tubb was a real inspiration to me,' she said, "He said: 'You've just lived that much longer, know that much more. You'll make it.


And she did. In the top third of her college class. And when she took the state test, she came out in the top 10 out of 650

"I started out pretty bad," she said "And every morning I'd be so scared I'd get sick. The first semester I made two A's and two B's (the B's were 88's), but the next semester I made five A's. "All the way through I'd say: 'Oh, but I'm so

old!' "
Mrs. Haynes said the age limit for going into RN training was 35 when she started her LVN training at SPC and the Medical Arts Hospital some nine years ago. "I didn't even consider becoming an P.N. then." she said.

Mrs. Haynes said she told herself she didn't really intend to work after she became an LVN, that she was just going to school in case she ever needed to make her living. But when she got through she said she realized that she was just at the threshold. So she decided to work awhile and learn some more. She had been Dr. Ralph Maurer's office nurse seven years when she picked up some literature one day outlining a new one-year RN program

The program was offered through See MRS. HAYNES, Page 4







THE RATIONAL is a proper aim for all of us. It is very important to us personally and to the common good that everybody seek that which is based upon, or agreeable to reason.

That is, we must be reasonable; not extreme or excessive; but using good

Some may do better than others, but most of us have great potential for this attainment. It is so much a part of "the rational" which is so very essential to our well-being

TO ACT WITH COMMON SENSE according to the moment, is the best wisdom I know; and the best philosophy is to do one's duties, take the world as it comes, submit respectfully to one's lot; bless the goodness that has given us so much happiness with it, whatever it is; and despise affectation."-Walpole

The only constructive and productive course for us is in our movement toward the rational, the sensible; the reasonable; and the responsible. The reverse movement is the way of diminishing returns; from the hopeless to ever greater and greater hopelessness

It carries us farther and farther into the gloom and despair of senseless existence. Along this reverse course, the point of "no return" is always closer than we think.

IRRATIONALISM SEEMS to have some

kind of subtle appeal to many people. All of us may have some inclination toward this lack of good sense, but it does not dominate

Many people are forcing themselves into this profitless mental and spiritual condition by their retreat from intelligent, sensible and reasonable thought and ac-

INCREASE IN SUBJECTIVE irrationalism is in proportion to the insistence that there is no objective truth. These people are self-conceited, selfdeceived, and are willing dupes for almost every crazy and ridiculous viewpoint presented to them.

They reject everything that they need for a worthwhile life, and espouse everything that is harmful to themselves, Thus, they soon become a big, big problem, to themselves and a nuisance, sometimes a threat, to other people and to everything that is good for mankind.

THE IRRATIONAL have no light to guide them; no strength, but a kind of artificial strength, to sustain them; and hey are perpetually haunted by feelings of despair, uncertainty and inadequacy.

These people waste the resources which are needed for and could be used for the good of themselves and others. They are vorse than parasites; they are more like termites undermining the whole structure of human wellbeing

THE RATIONAL is where we will find solutions to problems, rewards for our labors; and better things for all humankind

It is not out of our reach.

Amarillo's Northwest Texas Hospital for LVN's who could qualify and pass the hospital's "challenging" test. Mrs. Haynes said when she got there to take the test and saw all those young women there, most of them taking the test for the fifth time, she just told herself she shouldn't get into the program, anyway, since she didn't have too many years left.

She forgot about the program until she got a letter about four weeks later asking her to come back for further testing. She went back four different times while the hospital kept weeding out applicants. Out of about 90 trying, 14 were taken into the

"I didn't know I was in until March or April," Mrs. Haynes said. The ones that had been accepted were called in, and there were our nameplates and caps and everything all laid out. I didn't know until then that I'd made it. They reviewed us one week, then we took the test their juniors take. We finished our junior year in four days.

Two full years are crammed into the one year program. "It is intensive. Intensive." Mrs. Haynes said. "It's unbelievable what we have to do, the pages after pages of research required." She started on the program in May, but before that she learned she would need another year of college, so she attended a summer session at Amarillo College, For the past 20 months she has been living in Amarillo and

driving back to Littlefield each weekend. She lives in a dormitory at Saint Anthony's since she would have had to have a roommate at Northwest Texas. "I live for Fridays when I can hit the road for home,' she said. "And we count the days until I graduate. If it wasn't for my very understanding husband, I'd never make it.

She has no intention of not making it. I'm not a quitter," she said. "It's been hard to adjust. You don't know what you can do until you try.

The Haynes have two daughters, and they are both medical technologists. The oldest, Sue Mouser, is head bacteriologist at the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. Dot Simmons teaches in the eighth grade here, but she trained as a medical technologist before going into teaching. Dot's husband, Bob, works in the Medical Arts laboratory. Interest in medicine runs in the family, Mrs. Haynes concluded.



# Pockets On Jumps

THE COMMERCIAL pattern often has pocket designs and pocket sizes you will want to change. Use the measurements shown on the sketch or from a ready-made garment and make paper patterns for the pockets. Most jumpsuits have six large patch pockets.

Cut them lengthwise with the selvage grain running from top to bottom on the

ON THE BREAST and hip pockets turn the hem to the wrong side and press to make a crease. Then turn the hem back on the right side and stitch the ends of the hem, sewing on the seamline.

This job is easier if you sew with the pocket side up and the hem side down so you can follow the cloth grain. Trim bulk away and turn the hem back to the wrong side. Shape the corners square. Figures A, B, and C.

NEXT PRESS the seam allowances under on the bottom and sides. For a neater finish always press the bottom first and then the sides. Figures C and D.

Trim the bulk from the corners (figure F) but take care not to cut all the way to the seamline. Leave 1/8 to 1/4 inch to prevent the corner from ravelling out.

CONSIDER the topstitiching that will fasten the pocket to the garment. If it is to be 1/4 inch or more from the edge, miter the corners as in figure G. If it is to be directly on the edge, make a modified miter as in figure H

Press the pockets well before sewing them to the garment and your work will look more professional. Remember that all topstitching must be done to perfection. Slip a patch of firm cloth under each top corner for reinforcement but place it on

the back side of the garment w not show. Secure the endr backstitching or by pulling the the back side and tying them knot. It is advisable to take a in a crosswise direction at each for reinforcement.

Terry Muncy got his first six-pointer for the Hornets on a 21-yard pass play from Alexander. The extras were good. Highland went to the dressing room at


the half leading 34-16. In the second half Highland controlled the ball and scored another 32 points
