## GS Cookie Sale Scheduled Friday

Littlefield Girl Scouts and Scouts out of the 18-county Caprock Girl Scout Council, will be knocking on doors again this year beginning at 4 p.m. Friday, Feb. 25 through March 11, selling five different flavors of cookies.

According to Mrs. Bobby Beale Littlefield service unit cookie chairman, she "expects 179 cases of cookies to arrive Monday morning sometime.

"In the past the cookies have been 50 cents a box, but this year they will sell for \$1 a box. A family-size pack has been prepared this year, containing two 13 oz.

The girls will be wearing scout uniforms or their pins while selling the cookies. All profits from these sales will be divided between the local troops and the Caprock Council for building and improving Camp Rio Blanco, northeast of Crosbyton. Camp Rio Blanco is for the entire 18-county Girl

Scout Council. A two-week campership will be awarded to the Girl Scouts selling 180 boxes of cookies or more.

Girls selling at least 48 boxes will receive a cookie "champ" patch; 24 boxes, a Girl Scout book mark; and those selling 12 boxes will be presented a certificate of





# EDITORIAL

#### **National FFA Week**

SLICK MAGAZINE articles portray the youth of today as a wholly new breed. As events continue to prove, the

portrayal is about as substantial as the froth on a milkshake.

One of these events is the annual observation of National FFA Week-February 19-26. The theme of FFA Week in 1972 is "Youth With A Purpose". And, in spite of the cynics and skeptics, youth does have a purpose, now as always.

THE FFA is a national organization of 430,000 students studying vocational agriculture in 8,200 public schools.

The foundation upon which FFA is built leadership. character development, sportsmanship, cooperation, community service, thrift, scholarship, improved agriculture, organized

recreation, citizenship and patriotism. The goal of FFA members is to learn the

technology and get the practical experience for a career in agriculture.

The strength of FFA lies with the local chapters where student officers and members are developing into the agricultural leaders of tomorrow under the guidance of advisers and teachers of vocational agriculture.

THE YOUTHS who follow their dreams of tomorrow in the work of the Future Farmers of America can hardly be called a new breed

They are a new generation seeking to build a better future on the knowledge and experience of the past which is what each generation must do if mankind is to

#### **Justice**

THE SEARCH FOR TRUTH in many courtrooms today has taken on new dimensions

In some instances, the court, in addition to administering justice, is forced to justify its existence and physically police its proceedings to maintain a modicum of

THERE ARE OCCASIONS when the court seemingly spends as much time trying to control shouting defendants and their recalcitrant counsel as in conducting the trial

In short, the courts are now experiencing some of what law enforcement for years has suffered in full measure - - violent disrespect for the law and diabolical schemes to prove that the system of justice does not work in

FOR MANY, reverence for the law is no longer a sacred principle. The attributes so vital to impartial courtroom procedure are scorned, and court authority is tested. Let us make no mistake about it.

When defendants call the jurist "a fascist dog" and " a lying pig," shout curses and obscenities at the court, chant in unison, and completely destroy the dignity of the courtroom, the duty of the court is axiomatic. The consequences must be sufficent to deter such action.

ASIDE FROM the contemptuous courtroom conduct itself, equally disturbing are the public agitations and blatant outcries from some quarters against a judge who takes firm action to meet the problem head-on.

The beleaguered jurists is an instant villian in these contrived sideshows and, like the law enforcement officer before him, becomes a target of repeated abuse.

IN DISCUSSING courtroom conflicts in March, 1971, Hon. Warren E. Burger, Chief Justice of the United States, stated in .. I do know this -- and so does anyone who has read legal history and read the newspapers in recent years- that John Adams, and his reincarnated colleagues at the bar, would be shocked and bewildered at some of the antics and spectacles witnessed today in the courtrooms of American.

They would be as shocked and baffled as are a vast number of contemporary Americans and friends of America all over the world." The Chief Justice urged that prioity be given to methods and machinery, to procedure and techniques, and to management and administration of judical resources to meet the challenges to our system of justice,

Fortunately, there is indication that most of the members of the legal profession agree with the Chief Justice and are working to correct these conditions.

IF THE JUDICIARY is to keep the faith of the American people, then it must deal promptly and decisively with vituperative outbursts and disruptive tactics in coort. Justice without strength will soon become no justice at all.

We accept the normal challenges with a spirit of good cheer and a willingness to keep trying. We do not give up, because we know that this is loss by default.

MUCH OF GOOD IS LOST, because of disinterest. Somebody must be interested enough to plan, and somebody must be interested enough to work the plan.

When good things are done, somebody must do them. Of course, the bad things are done by those who are interested in

"The virtues and vices are all put in

motion by interest." Interest not only

triggers the action, it also sustains it.

Therefore, whatever objects, good or bad, attract the greatest interest will dominate a life and a social order. POTENTIAL BECOMES ACTUAL, when interest is great enough; and

maintained long enough. Otherwise, it will remain forever undeveloped and unused; and might as well never have been. This is true regarding personal development, community development

and every other aspect of life that involves the human potential. INTEREST IS NOT everything, but where there is not sufficient interest

everything else is useless. We may have the ability, we may have the material resources, and we may see

the need; but without the interest nothing can be accomplished.

INTEREST MAY NOT surmount all barriers, but one fact is sure; without interest, none will be overcome.



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# EDITORIAL

#### **National FFA Week**

SLICK MAGAZINE articles portray the youth of today as a wholly new breed. As events continue to prove, the

portrayal is about as substantial as the

froth on a milkshake. One of these events is the annual observation of National FFA Week-February 19-26. The theme of FFA Week in 1972 is "Youth With A Purpose". And, in spite of the cynics and skeptics, youth does have a purpose, now as always.

THE FFA is a national organization of 430,000 students studying vocational agriculture in 8,200 public schools

The foundation upon which FFA is built includes leadership. character development, sportsmanship, cooperation, community service, thrift, scholarship, improved agriculture, organized

recreation, citizenship and patriotism. The goal of FFA members is to learn the technology and get the practical experience for a career in agriculture.

The strength of FFA lies with the local chapters where student officers and members are developing into the agricultural leaders of tomorrow under the guidance of advisers and teachers of vocational agriculture.

THE YOUTHS who follow their dreams of tomorrow in the work of the Future Farmers of America can hardly be called new breed.

They are a new generation seeking to build a better future on the knowledge and experience of the past which is what each generation must do if mankind is to

#### **Justice**

THE SEARCH FOR TRUTH in many courtrooms today has taken on new dimensions

In some instances, the court, in addition to administering justice, is forced to justify its existence and physically police its proceedings to maintain a modicum of

THERE ARE OCCASIONS when the court seemingly spends as much time trying to control shouting defendants and their recalcitrant counsel as in conducting the trial.

In short, the courts are now experiencing some of what law enforcement for years has suffered in full measure - -violent disrespect for the law and diabolical schemes to prove that the system of justice does not work in

FOR MANY, reverence for the law is no longer a sacred principle. The attributes so vital to impartial courtroom procedure are scorned, and court authority is tested. Let us make no mistake about it.

When defendants call the jurist "a fascist dog" and " a lying pig," shout curses and obscenities at the court, chant in unison, and completely destroy the dignity of the courtroom, the duty of the court is axiomatic. The consequences must be sufficent to deter such action.

ASIDE FROM the contemptuous courtroom conduct itself, equally disturbing are the public agitations and blatant outcries from some quarters against a judge who takes firm action to meet the problem head-on.

The beleaguered jurists is an instant villian in these contrived sideshows and, like the law enforcement officer before

him, becomes a target of repeated abuse.

IN DISCUSSING courtroom conflicts in March, 1971, Hon. Warren E. Burger, Chief Justice of the United States, stated in part, "... I do know this - and so does anyone who has read legal history and read the newspapers in recent years- that John Adams, and his reincarnated colleagues at the bar, would be shocked and bewildered at some of the antics and spectacles witnessed today in the courtrooms of American.

They would be as shocked and baffled as are a vast number of contemporary Americans and friends of America all over the world." The Chief Justice urged that prioity be given to methods and machinery, to procedure and techniques, and to management and administration of judical resources to meet the challenges to our system of justice,

Fortunately, there is indication that most of the members of the legal profession agree with the Chief Justice and are working to correct these conditions.


IF THE JUDICIARY is to keep the faith of the American people, then it must deal promptly and decisively with vituperative outbursts and disruptive tactics in coort. Justice without strength will soon become no justice at all.

It is the only way to tap the unlimited supply of the riches and rewards which life has to give. It is the best expression of a justified feeling of gratitude for the gift of

PEOPLE WITH WHOLESOME and constructive interest in themselves, in others and in worthwhile things are interesting people.

Being interested will make us interesting, and this opens many avenues of meaningful and life-sustaining privileges and opportunities.

WHEN WE ARE INTERESTED in life, we are enthusiastic and joyful in the living we do. We do not live under the clouds of gloom, despair, boredom and futility.

We accept the normal challenges with a spirit of good cheer and a willingness to keep trying. We do not give up, because we know that this is loss by default.

MUCH OF GOOD IS LOST, because of disinterest. Somebody must be interested enough to plan, and somebody must be interested enough to work the plan.

When good things are done, somebody must do them. Of course, the bad things are done by those who are interested in

"The virtues and vices are all put in motion by interest." Interest not only triggers the action, it also sustains it. Therefore, whatever objects, good or bad, attract the greatest interest will dominate a life and a social order.

POTENTIAL BECOMES ACTUAL, when interest is great enough; and maintained long enough. Otherwise, it will remain forever undeveloped and unused; and might as well never have been.

This is true regarding personal development, community development and every other aspect of life that involves the human potential.

INTEREST IS NOT everything, but where there is not sufficient interest everything else is useless. We may have the ability, we may have


