## Is It a Bird? A Plane? Who's Up There?

who sugh farmers in Lamb County who support cloud seeding are in the majority when it comes to digging into
the hip pocket there the hip pocket, there are those who say
and support their right to whatever comes out of a cloud, whether it's haill or high water, and they object to anyone
doing anything to change the natrual doing anything
course of events.
This is Lamb County's fifth year of participation in a county's seedifing year of proet specifically devised to to decrease
damaging hail during damaging hail during the crop growing
period. But during this time period opposition to cloud seeding has
developed and become particuarly strong during prolonged dry periods. As a result, an injunction is pending a
district hearing before Judge Pat Boone Jr. here on June 14 th. Meantime, the three plane operation
continues to fly and continues to fly and seed clouds with
silver iodide when hail threatens the target area, or the area where the
majiority of farmers have paid yo majority of farmers have paid voluntar
fees for the hail protection. Only trouble is, the three planes have become something like the fabled manyheaded dragon, In every instance where
the weather has produced a hail tireat the weather has produced a hail tirea
strong enough to warrant observation or strong engugh to warrant observation or
multiply multiply.

Monday night an irate Pep Com-
munity farmer and his son stormed into munity larmer and his son stormed into
the radar base at the Littlefield airpor

home gardeners face, one horticulturis has noted. "Certain steps will prolong life of cut flowers--whether homegrown or from a
forist." says Dr. William C. Welch landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The

He offered the following suggestions to maximize cut flowers' beauty:
