EDITOR'S NOTE: This editorial "Is there a Santa Claus?" by Francis P. Church first appeared in the New York Sun Sept. 26, 1897, in response to a query from 8-year-old Virginia O'Hanlon. It attracted nationwide attention and was reprinted annually in The Sun. The Leader-News has reprinted the editorial periodically at the request of parents when their youngsters approach Virginia's age at the time she wrote The Sun.

We take pleasure in answering at once and thus prominently the communication below, expressing at the same time our great gratification that its faithful author is numbered among the friends of The Sun.

I am 8-years-old.
Dear Editor:

Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says "If you see it in The Sun it's so." Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth and knowledge.

Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! How dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith, then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus? You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus, but even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign that there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? Of course not, but that's no proof that they are not. Nobody can conceive or imagine all the wonders that are unseen and unseeable in the world.

You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest men, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else real and abiding.

No Santa Claus! Thank God he lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.



Noon Prayer Call

The old White's Auto building will be open at noon as a prayer center.

Citizens are urged by ministers and involved laymen "to participate in this effort at confronting and reconciling our people with Christ. Talk to your friends, neighbors and relatives about this prayer call: make plans to get together at homes, in lunchrooms, in business places or on the street and in yards. Perhaps you'd rather pray alone or on the telephone to a prayer partner. . . the form doesn't matter as much as that the prayer is made," a spokesman said.

The program organizers call upon all citizens to join together in this effort—a nationwide effort involving some fifty-million Christians—to call upon God to direct, guide and bless the efforts of Key 73 in "Calling Our Continent to Christ."

Beginning Tuesday, Dec. 26, at 12 noon and continuing each day until Saturday, Jan. 6, the people of Littlefield will be called to join together in prayer: "The Key 73 Noon Prayer Call."

The noon prayer call, in preparation for the Key 73 program aimed at bringing Christ to the entire continent in 1973, urges all Christians to pause for a moment—or more—and to go before God with a plea that our continent will be brought to Christ.

The noon prayer call will be signalled by a short blast on the fire siren at city hall, and downtown, a devotion will be led by the ministers of Littlefield. Christians are urged to pray: alone, in groups on the street, in shops or church gatherings; on the phone with a prayer partner, with a neighbor—wherever and however they can at this time.

Peace At Hand

AMONG THE IRONIES of this holiday season is the elusive nature of peace on earth. The optimistic statement during the heat of political battle by negotiator Henry Kissinger that "Peace is at hand" echoes through the detonations of bombs falling on Vietnamese villages.

It becomes a modern parable. While men cry "Peace, peace" there is no peace.

THE SONGS of angels announced that the Prince of Peace was born. The vision of men in the Old Testament prophets was of peace reigning in a world in which the lion could lie down by the lamb.

But the Prince of Peace died at the hands of men of war. And the prediction of the Christ was that there would be "wars and rumours of war" on into the last days.

IN VERY PRACTICAL terms, what is to be the role of the follower of the Prince of Peace in a war troubled world? Historically some followers of Jesus have chosen to ignore the moral questions of war and peace. They have concentrated their energies on looking for a new age and on personal morality of relationship between individuals. Others have justified war and even promoted it.

Blots on Christianity's history are those occasions in which religion itself has been the source or opportunity for wrecking violence on men. A number of believers have decided that no war of any kind can be justified under any circumstances.

They view war as the ultimate of human evil and condemn it whatever price must be paid by society in surrender to the order of tyranny rather than the disorder of war.

SINCE THIS WORLD serves up our moral questions not in blacks or whites but in mixtures of gray, the task of the alert Christian in his citizenship is to inform himself on the issues involved, accept peace as the goal toward which he strives, and work realistically for its accomplishment.

The use of force to hold evil in check is a tragic necessity in an evil world. The proper and right measure of that force is the question to be answered. Few persons are seriously and publically advocating the war in Vietnam at this point in our nation's history.

The basic issue of conflict is how and when for peace. What price is to be paid to bring it about? Unfortunately the leaders of our nation have not trusted the public with accurate information throughout the Vietnamese conflict. Therefore, there is a strong tendency to distrust public explanations of public policy during this crucial time.

THE RESPONSIBILITY of Christians in this troubled time is to pray for peace. We should pray not in a routine way which becomes meaningless. We should intensely and earnestly petition for cessation of hostilities.

In addition to our prayers for our leaders in their decision making, we should continue to create an atmosphere

of support for peace which will free them to pursue it meaningfully. It is the very debate over issues and exchange of honest opinions which are the essence of a democracy. It is not just theoretically needed; it is absolutely vital to the pursuit of wise national policy.

THE BIBLE PROMISES that there will be a day when peace will not only be at hand but will reign. God will bring it about when He brings time to a halt and the Prince of Peace becomes the King of Kings. Until that time, his followers are to join a great Christian of yesteryear in the prayer, "Make me an instrument of Thy peace."

Absentee voting in this election may top the election held on Nov. 7 when 173 cast absentee ballots.

Election day is set for Saturday, Jan. 6, in the Littlefield City Hall.

Only qualified voters living inside the Littlefield city limits are eligible to vote.

The commissioners court named T. W. Bryson as election judge and Billy Tom Grant as alternate election judge.

THE ABUNDANT LIFE We Can Be Useful

TOO MANY PEOPLE assume the view that they cannot be useful persons. Of course, they are mistaken. They are mistaken, because all of us can do useful things.

The major problem is in the limited outlook. Part of this is a failure to realize just how much there is that we can do. Too many opportunities are overlooked, because of incorrect classification of what is useful and what is not.

THERE ARE OPPORTUNITIES for usefulness all around us. In the home, the office, the shop, the schools, the neighborhood, the church, there are useful things to be done.

The courtesies, the acts of thoughtfulness, the words of kindness and good cheer, the encouragement we give, the sympathetic understanding we extend, the helping hand, etc. are all ways of being useful. In fact, the possibilities of usefulness are almost unlimited.

SOMEONE MAY SAY, "but these are all such little things, and I want to do something big and exciting." It is probably a very serious mistake to call anything useful a "little" thing.

Of course, by some standards, some actions and some services may, in some ways, be more helpful than some others. If, however, we make too much to do about "big" and "little" usefulness, we may spoil everything. Usefulness is usefulness, and must be seen and appreciated as such.

THE MAELSTROM ATTRACTS more notice than the quiet fountain; a comet

draws more attention than the star. But it is better to be the star than the maelstrom, and the comet, following out the spiral orbit of quiet usefulness in what places us." —J. Hall

WE HAVE A NEED to feel that we are useful, and most of us do useful things, and would like to do more. Too many of us keep thinking that we would do useful things, if we had more money. Some of us feel that we would be useful, if we had more schooling.

Then, some of us just keep ourselves that we would be more useful if we had better breaks. The question is "Are we being as useful as we can with what we have, where we are?"

WILLINGNESS TO BE USEFUL is one of the basic requirements for a meaningful life. With this willingness, there are a continuing alertness to opportunities for being useful.

These are not qualities of the centered life, but are prominent in the life of a person who is interested in himself, but genuinely wholesome regard for fellowmen.

WE CAN BE USEFUL in meaningful ways, and such actions have two-fold benefits.

They contribute to our sense of fulfillment and wholesome satisfaction, and make significant contributions to the betterment of ourselves and to the improvement of the world around us.

Then, they that are His shall be resurrected also, to live with Him throughout eternity! Surely, that shall be cause for the spirit of Christmas prevail in our lives, at the dawn of every day!

NEW INSURANCE

A new insurance plan—Modified Life-Age 70—makes it financially feasible for 200,000 aging veterans with term insurance policies to convert to the new plan under which premiums remain at a level amount, VA reports.

British Friends Give Olton Man Party

Dael Cordero of Olton was recently discharged from the U.S. Air Force where he served four years, two and a half months. He and his wife, Hilary, were married in England in August, 1971.

Mrs. Cordero told of a farewell party her husband was given on the eve of his departure from the Air Force in England which was an unusual gesture from his British friends who presented him with a radio.

While serving three years and nine months of his military duty in England, Cordero visited Italy and Spain. He said Italy was a beautiful country but he was surprised to see many horse-drawn carts on its streets.

Hilary said "Germany is the most progressive country. It is so beautiful, so clean. Even the docks are clean. And the people are so enthusiastic. They work harder and have

more self-discipline." Hilary's mother is a native of Germany who married a British soldier.

Hilary stated, "America, even though we speak the same language, is really a foreign country compared to England. America is so vast, the sky is so high. She explained one cannot see the crops in England for the hedgerows. She misses the flowers which are grown so abundantly in her native country where gardening is taught in the schools.

In England she said one city block may include a house a century old with many stories, a thatched roof cottage and a single level bungalow.

Hilary said the English are basically meat and potato eaters who will not taste the foods from other countries prepared in the English restaurants. She said steak is \$2.50 per pound and eggs 80 cents per dozen. Often only one egg is purchased.

Safety Health Act Must For Farmers

A farmer who employs anyone in addition to members of his family at anytime must comply with the Williams-Steiger Occupational Safety and Health Act of 1970. Failure to do so may subject him to severe penalties.

The Act requires farmers who hire anyone at anytime outside their own families to:

1. Display a 10 by 16-inch U. S. Department of Labor poster titled "Safety and Health Protection on the Job" at the point where employees

normally report to work; and

2. Keep up-to-date and have available for inspection a "Log of Occupational Injuries and Illnesses."

The county Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office has available for inspection by farmers a copy of the U.S. Department of Labor's instruction booklet titled "Recordkeeping Requirements" which contains the poster and Form No. 100 mentioned above. The county ASCS office can also supply a pamphlet giving more details on the agricultural safety standards and addresses of regional Department of Labor offices for farmers who need additional information



Mrs. Jackson Celebrates 90th Birthday

ANTON—Mrs. Ella Jackson of Anton celebrated her 90th birthday Saturday, Dec. 23.

Mrs. Jackson, the former Ella Smith of Erath County near Stevenville, was married to Tom Jackson at Mangum, Okla. They moved by covered wagon to the South Plains in 1921 and settled near Idalou.

In 1929 they moved to Anton where Jackson farmed until his death in 1938.

Five of the nine children of Mrs. Jackson are deceased. Those still living are: two sons, Dick of Dallas, George of Anton, and two daughters, Mrs. Ruth Harrison of Hale Center and Mrs. Mary Belcher

of Anton. She has 25 grandchildren, 33 great-grandchildren and 12 great-great-grandchildren.

In recalling some of the events that happened during her lifetime, Mrs. Jackson tells of the tornado that demolished their home Sept. 8, 1929. She said, "After the tornado was past, the ground was swept so clean that you couldn't tell a dwelling or anything had ever been there." She continued, "The only thing that I ever recovered was a rolling pin that my father had made out of a cedar fence post."

Other days she remembers most were the black sand storms that used to cover the Plains.

"I remember the bad sand storm that most folks refer to as 'Black Sunday' that occurred back in the 30's," said Mrs. Jackson. "That day

my husband was sick and after the storm blew over, we poured a teacup full of sand off his top sheet." Going on with her reminiscing, Mrs. Jackson said, "I've seen lots of changes during the last 90 years."

And so she has—from covered wagons, to men walking in space, from rub boards and wash pots to automatic washers and dryers. In fact she still uses a rub board to wash all of her dresses. She also does the house work and cooking for her son Goege and a grandson, Wyman, who make their home with her.

Mrs. Jackson is proud of the fact that she has been a member of the Methodist Church for 77 years, after having been baptized when she was 13 years old, a thing of which few will ever be able to boast.

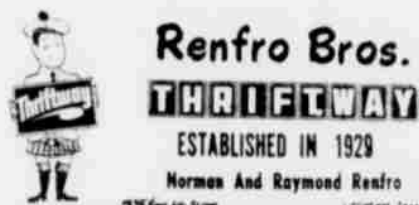
