





COOKING MEAT outdoors is a great way to keep the house cool in summerbut don't forget that vegetables can be cooked on the grill too, advises Marilyn Haggard, foods and nutrition specialist.

"Skewer raw vegetables and cook on the coals, turning slowly until done. Raw vegetables such as potatoes, carrots and onions may be parboiled a few minutes before placing on the skewer to hasten cooking time," she said.

Frozen vegetables can be cooked on the grill in aluminum foil folded into a package, using the drug-store wrap.

"Place the frozen vegetables in the center of a piece of heavy duty aluminum foil. Dot with about 2 tablespoons of margarine or butter, 2 teaspoons of water and 1/4 teaspoon salt for each 10-ounce package.

"Close the package carefully to keep moisture inside. Place it on the grill and cook 15 or 20 mimutes, turning once or twice," she said.

LAWN MOWING can be hazardous to your health, especially if you disregard safety when using a power mower.

Every year 55,000 Americans are treated in hospital emergency rooms for injuries resulting from the use of power lawn mowers. Many victims lose fingers or toes; some accidents prove fatal.

"Most of these lawn mower accidents could have been prevented if a few safety rules had been follwed," contends Wayne Keese, agricultural engineer for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, who is in charge of safety educational programs.

"The first rule in safe operation of a lawn mower is to become completely familiar with your machine. Read the owner's manual carefully. Make sure everyone who will be operating the lawn mower understands the controls and knows how to stop the engine quickly in case of an emergency," emphasizes the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Before mowing, clear the entire lawn of sticks, stones, wire and debrisanything that could be thrown by the mower blade. Then get pets and small children out of the mowing area."

Keese advises disengaging the clutch and shifting into neutral before starting the engine. Keep your feet away from the blade when starting the engine.

"Stop the engine whenever you leave the mower, if even for a moment,' cautions Keese. "Always stop the engine and disconnect the spark plug wire if you intend to check or work on the mower.

"Also stop the engine and allow it to cool before refueling. And use safety containers for gasoline," advises the

'Exercise extreme caution when mowing on slopes or wet grass, and never pull the mower toward you. Use a 'plug-in' electric mower only when the grass is dry," adds Keese.

HOME VEGETABLE GARDENS are highly susceptible to high winds, heavy rains and hail contained in spring thunderstorms in Texas. And recent weather has taken its toll.

"Damage is often widespread, and then decisions must be made as to whether to leave the damaged plants in the garden or to start over and replant," points out Sam Cotner.

"Some plants such as squash, cucumbers and beans often receive heavy damage," says Cotner, a vegetable specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. "They

generally recover slowly, if at all, so it is often best to replant. If there is suf ficient room, the less damaged plants can be left while the remainder of the crop is replanted."

Most vegetable seed will germinate rapidly now that the soil has warmed, so replanting is often the best alternative. Of course, if transplants can be obtained, the gardener can gain several weeks of valuable growing time.

In many areas it is too late to replant some garden crops such as potatoes, carrots, cauliflower and other cool season vegetables.

"Due to late season cool weather, spring gardens have generally been making limited growth until the past several weeks," points out the specialist. "So, even though replanting will bring some delays, these may not be quite as great this year due to overall seasonal conditions."

Whether gardeners leave damaged plants to recuperate or whether they decide to replant, the overall delay in home vegetable production will mean closer attention to care and maintenance of the growing plants in the coming months, emphasizes Cotner. "Insects will become more active as the growing season progresses, so plants must be checked more closely and control measures taken as the situation warrants. Also, watering will become more critical as the growing season enters the hot summer months.

"Adversity such as that resulting from severe weather damage tests the 'true grit of the home gardener," says Cotner. "It makes him realize that vegetable production isn't all 'peaches and cream' and that all the fresh produce at the supermarket doesn't just happen. Hopefully, however, it will bring all home gardeners closer to nature and to living things, and will instill in them the will to try again."

USE RIGHT JARS

Use standard canning jars, with appropriate lids and screw bands for home canning. Mayonnaise and other jars are not made to withstand the high temperatures of canning- and they're not safe to use.

HANDY AIDS

Washed mascara brushes and short leftover lengths of seam or bias tape are excellent cleaning aids for sewing machines. Use these "recycled" items to remove build-up lint from thread guides, tension, discs and/or the bobbin

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


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





















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Hale Center, Dalhart Win Regional
