## Water Supply Loan Okayed

A \$48,000 loan has been approved by the Farmers Home Administration for development of a rural community water system by the Sunnydale Water Supply Corporation, according to a release from Congressman Bob Price.

The loan will enable the Association to install water lines and other equipment for the development of an adequate water system to residents who live west of the Highway 84 Bypass.

Water lines in the system will be tied to city water lines near the bypass, and the water supply will be purchased from the City of Littlefield.

A large number of the water wells in that area are contaminated. Approximately 33 families will be served

by the system, which will extend to the airport and beyond Lumsden Gin. The FHA loan will be repaid in 40 years,

#### MAIL CARRYING DONE

## Thaxton Retiring To 'Go Fishing'

Ewing C. Thaxton is trading in his righthand-driving car he terms "the answer to a lazy mail carrier's dream" for fishing

After almost 33 years of postal work and "talking" fishing, Thaxton says he's going to quit playing post office and do more than just talk about fishing.

This smiling rural mailman, who was named "Rural Mail Carrier of the Year" this past summer over 1,500 fellow employees, will make his last delivery next

Thaxton started his postal career in Littlefield as a substitute clerk the first day of August, 1938. He became a regular clerk in 1942 but his civil service career here was interrupted during WWII while he served in the Army from June, 1942 until October, 1945. Twenty-one months of his oversea's duty was in North Africa and Sicily where he was in an Army Post Office

He resumed work at the Littlefield Post Office in November, 1945, and became assistant post master in 1949.

Thaxton took over C. A. Joplin's rural route after Postmaster W. D. T. Storey died, and more than 16 years, or half of his postal service tenure has been carrying rural mail.

He has finished off the better parts of seven cars delivering mail to his rural patrons. The last three cars have been right hand drive autos. The Thaxtons have lived in Littlefield

since 1928, and with a big grin Thaxton declares that he has lived here almost long enough to be an early settler.

Thaxton worked for his brother in a hardware store here for 10 years before

beginning his postal work. His route begins on East Ninth, goes within three miles of Anton, two of Hart Camp and Fieldton, and one of Bull Lake and ends north of the railroad track. He is 'the mailman' to almost 350 families on

the more than 100-mile round trip. Since beginning his rural route, Thaxton said good roads and better autos have about done away with the dependency rural patrons used to have for their mailman. But there is still a closeness in many instances. Thaxton said, "and people always come to your aid when you need it."

This summer he hopes to get in plenty of fly casting experience on mountain trout. And if a fly doesn't work, he'll use the fly casters' secret weapon-a big juicy worm.
