## 9 e Tried, Nine Sentenced In Criminal Court

Cases set for trial by jury this week were tried. Nine entered pleas before District Judge Pat and were sentenced to a total of five years each, probated. The other criminal cases set were passed or continued. Charge of burglary against Neal was tried and the jury found him guilty of a charge of burglary of a home of Antonio. Hernandez waived trial by entering a guilty plea before Judge Boone. He was found guilty and sentenced to five years, probated. J. Polando Jr. waived trial guilty to a charge of attempted burglary. He was found guilty and sentenced to three years, probated. Gloria waived a jury trial and entered a guilty plea to a burglary charge. Judge Boone found him guilty and sentenced him to eight years. In the same charge was Ruben and this charge was dismissed. J. Greene waived jury trial and entered a guilty plea to a charge of burglary. He was found guilty and sentenced to four years each, probated.

Willie Conley and Robert Earl Conley waived a jury trial and pled guilty to a charge of aggravated assault. They were sentenced to five years each, probated. Charles Edward Freeman waived trial on a forgery charge and was sentenced to five years each on two different charges, probated. Jessie Trevino and Adolfo Romero waived trial on a burglary charge and were found guilty and sentenced to four years, probated. Freddie Trevino was the third defendant in the charge. His case was continued on

a motion by the defense. Joseph W. Arnold waived jury trial on an aggravated perjury charge and Judge Boone found him guilty of his plea and sentenced him to serve five years. Mrs. Vicky Ward was not in custody for trial on a worthless check charge. A charge of arson against Brownie M. Martinez was passed. A charge of criminal mischief against Raymond Garcia was passed, and a case against Bobbie Lee Robinson on a charge of theft was passed. Other cases passed or dismissed in-

cluded a charge of unauthorized use of motor vehicle against Raymond Clark Jr. which was dismissed. Continued on a defense motion was a case set charging Rosie Linda Garcia and Mary Hernandez Huerta with theft. Passed for later trial was a charge of burglary against Kenneth Ray Williams. Continued on a defense motion was a possession of marijuana charge against Gilberto Ortega Gonzales. A theft charge against James Wayne Thomas was passed.

## City Awards Street Seal Bid, Mobile Home Ordinance Discussed

In their regular meeting Thursday night, Littlefield's city council accepted the audit report for the fiscal year ending Sept. 30, 1974; awarded a street seal coating bid; discussed a mobile home and mobile home park ordinance; re-appointed the city judge; and passed a resolution authorizing the mayor to sign a grant application to Farmer's Home Administration. Present to discuss the city audit report

were Alvin Webb, Billy Tom Grant and Benny Zahn, all certified public accountants. Councilmen accepted the report as rendered. Only one councilman, Chester Harvey, was absent. Two companies placed bids for the 1975 seal coating project, and the bid was awarded to Jake Diel Construction of Muleshoe, whose low net bid was a total of \$34,678. High Plains Pavers of Plainview had submitted a net bid of \$27,279.

The bids included prices for 72,000 square yards of seal coating and 2,700 square yards of double seal coating around the T hangars at the airport. Diel's bid was 31.5 cents per square yard for the 72,000 square yards of seal coating, netting a \$22,680 cost; and 74 cents per square yard for the double seal coating at the airport, netting a total of \$1,998. Grand total for the two projects was the low net bid of \$24,678. High Plains Pavers' bid was 72,000 square yards of seal coating at 35 cents per square yard, totaling a net price of \$25,200; and 2,700 square yards of double seal coating at 77 cents per square yard, totaling a net price of \$2,079. City Manager Jim Blagg informed the councilmen that \$20,000 had been budgeted for the project, and that the total yardage of paving to be done would be cut to fit the budgeted funds. Councilmen discussed at length a proposed ordinance providing minimum standards for mobile homes and mobile home parks. Councilmen decided to study the proposals included in the document, then discuss them further in other council meetings. The proposed ordinance does not require that mobile homes be moved

## IN EMERGENCY AID BILL

### County Schools To Receive More Than \$130,916 In Funds

The emergency aid for public schools and junior college bill, requested by Governor Dolph Briscoe and passed this week by the Texas House and Senate, will mean more than \$130,916 to Lamb County schools.

Amherst \$10,567 (\$34.01 per ADA) and Sudan \$9,112 (\$19.86 per ADA).

Public schools across the state are expected to receive a total of \$80 million in supplemental aid for maintenance and operations.

While we increased the maintenance budget by a sizable amount over the past year's figures, we've pretty well used it up in re-roofing Elementary I and we anticipate very shortly doing badly needed roof work on Elementary II and the Primary Building."

## Senior Citizens Transportation System To Begin Operating Monday



Beginning Monday, Lamb County senior citizens without transportation can ride the new van for senior citizens.

security representative, shop, and take care of business.

The 11-passenger van or mini-bus will transport eligible persons from Littlefield, Amherst, Sudan, Earth and Olton to Littlefield on a five-day a week schedule.

Tentative plans call for the van to bring Amherst residents to Littlefield on Mondays. Tuesday is the tentative schedule for trips from and to Sudan. Wednesday the van will bring Earth residents to Littlefield and then return them to Earth.

The shuttle service is provided by the Farmers Union and the Green Thumb program, sponsored by the Lamb County Senior Citizens Committee and the Lamb County Community Action.

Thursday the van is scheduled for transportation from and to Olton. Friday is the day set for picking up Littlefield senior citizens. (These dates are subject to change by the board.)

There are 20 such programs set up over Texas, and eight of these are in this region.

The Community Action Center will be the dispatching point for Littlefield residents. City halls in the other towns over the county will probably be designated dispatching centers.

This county was chosen as one of the program centers by Farmers Union since Lamb County has a Green Thumb program.

Bill Powell, with the Human Resource Development in conjunction with South Plains Community Action, said the program is in the planning stage and it will take time and patience to develop.

Lamb County Green Thumber Murrell Chisholm of Littlefield will drive the bus on a 30-hour per week schedule.

Judy Jackson with the office of the Governor's Committee on Aging and the South Plains Association of Governments is helping coordinate the program.

Persons 55 years old or over may use the transportation service. It is especially designed for those without other means of transportation for trips to town to buy groceries, medicine, medical appointments, see the social

Lamb County has 3,122 persons over 60 years of age. This region rates third in number of senior citizens in the 15-county SPAG program.

Other programs in the planning stage include an information and referral service through the South Plains Community Action and with the regional office of aging.

Such a service would direct people where to go for help in filling out Social Security forms, welfare papers, get medical appointments, a lawyer or other information they do not know how to find.

Another program in the planning stage is a Senior Advocate program through the governor's office. This would include organizational work similar to the program in Hockley County, which could include a drop-in program, home delivery of meals, and homemaker services for elderly who aren't hospitalized but need some assistance at their home.

For further information on this free public transportation service for the elderly, phone the Lamb County Community Action at 385-5425.

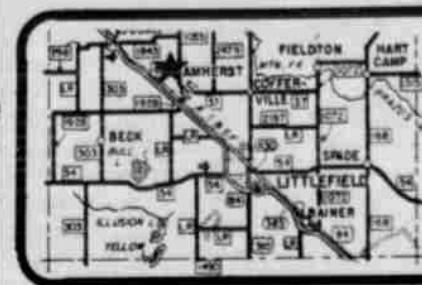



**GI Home Loan Interest Rates Dropped**

THURSDAY, FEB. 13  
LITTLEFIELD Young Homemakers of Texas will hold their regular meeting at 7 p.m. in the Flame Room of Pioneer Natural Gas Co.

The maximum interest rate on Veterans Administration GI home loans was dropped from 9 percent to 8.5 percent effective Jan. 21, 1975, according to Richard L. Roudebush, Administrator of Veterans Affairs.

Roudebush, who established the lower VA rate after consultation with the Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, noted that the reduction was the second since last Nov. 24 when the maximum interest rate was 9.5 percent. The new 8.5 percent rate will also apply to FHA home loans, he added.

The 8.5 percent rate is the lowest since April 1974 when the rate was increased from 8.25 to 8.5 percent. The rate was increased to 9 percent last July, then to 9.5 percent last August, and then was cut to 9 percent effective November 25, 1974.

The half-percent decrease would mean as much as \$9.90 per month savings to the typical veteran home buyer, and over the 30 year life of a \$27,500 VA loan, the total saving could be as much as \$3,535.

The legislation also increased the maximum VA loan guarantee amount from \$12,500 to \$17,500, authorized loans for the purchase of mobile home lots, increased the amount of mobile home loans and broadened the possibilities for guaranteeing loans on one-family condominiums.

**VA Offers Tips On Income Taxes**

Here are tips from the Veterans Administration on federal income taxes for veterans filing returns.

In general, Texas VA officials noted, veterans benefits are exempt from federal income tax, and need not be reported as income.

This income tax exemption applies to dividends and proceeds from government life insurance policies, but federal estate tax does apply to insurance proceeds. Also, interest earned on government life insurance dividends left on deposit or credit with VA is considered income and must be reported on federal income tax returns, it was explained.

Among major tax exempt veterans benefits are compensation, pension, GI Bill and other education assistance, including subsistence payments to vocational rehabilitation trainees.
